#### OU ENROLLMENT INCREASE TOPS FOR STATE SCHOOLS

Oakland University's 1,431 student increase between fall of 1972 and fall of 1973 leads all state four-year colleges and universities for that period.

The headcount enrollment figures are included in statistics filed by the institutions with the State Bureau of

Trailing OU in the size of their increases were University of Michigan, Dearborn with 960 more students and Wayne State University with a 919 student increase.

Others showing gains were University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, 671; Grand Valley State College, 552; Northern Michigan University, 494; University of Michigan, Flint, 350; and Lake Superior State College, 10.

Institutions showing declines include Eastern Michigan University, 742; Western Michigan University, 351; Michigan State University, 297; Ferris State College, 280; Central Michigan University, 59; Saginaw Valley College, 45; and Michigan Technological University, 43.

Shevelov, of Columbia University, delivered a talk at OU recently on "The Slavic Literary Languages: Regularities and Paradoxes." Guest faculty from Wayne State University and the University of Michigan attended in addition to OU faculty from modern languages, linguistics and area studies.

## MEADOW BROOK PRESENTS .

Tennessee Williams' Pulitzer Prize-winning play, "A Streetcar Named Desire," will "STREETCAR" STARTING NOV. 8 open at Meadow Brook Theatre on Thursday, Nov. 8 and run through Sunday, Dec. 2, as the theatre celebrates the 25th anniversary of this American masterpiece.

The production will be directed by Dr. Charles Nolte, whose earlier stagings of "Inherit the Wind" and "The Andersonville Trial" at Meadow Brook broke box-office records.

The role of Blanche DuBois will be played by Debra Mooney, who has created the role in productions at the Manitoba Theatre Center in Winnipeg, Ontario, and the University of Minneapolis.

Blanche's antagonist, Stanley Kowalski, will be portrayed by Martin Kove. Mr. Kove's film credits include featured roles in Alan Arkin's "Little Murders," "Savages," directed by James Ivory, and "Cops and Robbers." He recently co-starred with TV's "Gilligan," Bob Denver, in "The Paisley Convertible," and has played off-Broadway with the Cafe LaMama Theatre Troupe as well as with the Classic Stage Company Repertory and the Lincoln Center Repertory Co.

Other featured roles are those of Stella Kowalski, played by Lee Bryant, and Mitch, enacted by John Hallow.

Performances for opening week are Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday at 8:30 p.m.; matinee on Saturday at 2 p.m.; and Sunday evening at 6:30 p.m.
