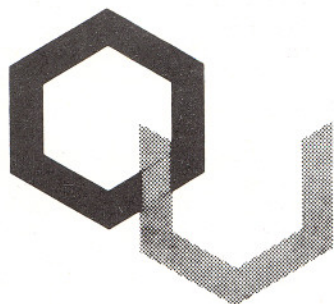

OU Submits Appropriation Request for 1973-74 Fiscal Year to Milliken

OU will submit a \$12,820,000 appropriation request to Gov. Milliken for the 1973-74 fiscal year. An additional \$4,054,750 will be requested for capital outlay purposes.

The \$12 million general fund request compares with \$10,394,000 allocated to the University by the State for the 1972-73 fiscal year.

The requests were approved by the Board of Trustees Nov. 27 along with

a total operating budget for 1973-74 of \$25,663,000. The 1972-73 operating budget was \$22,305,000.

Major items in the capital outlay request are: \$2 million for the proposed Classroom-Office Building II; \$490,000 for a proposed Public Safety and Services Building; \$321,750 for a storm drain system; \$313,500 lump sum for maintenance and \$200,000 for the expansion of Kresge Library.

The general fund and capital outlay budget requests will be considered by the Governor who will later make his own recommendations. The Governor's proposals then go to the Michigan Legislature for consideration.

Board Appoints Coffman V.P. for Student Affairs

Kenneth H. Coffman, 42, has been named Vice-President for Student Affairs at OU.

His appointment, effective Dec. 1, was approved Monday, Nov. 27, by the Board of Trustees. Coffman replaces James Appleton who resigned

to become Vice-President for Student Affairs at the University of Southern California.

"I am pleased with the opportunity given me with my new position and

feel comfortable moving into my new assignment," Coffman said. "I know how competent the Student Affairs staff is."

Coffman came to OU in 1963 as Director of Psychological Services. He was named Asst. Professor of Psychology in 1965 and became an Assoc. Professor of Psychology in 1969. In November of 1971 he became the University's first Ombudsman hearing problems of students, faculty and administration. In addition to his duties as Vice-President for Student Affairs, he continues to hold the position of Assoc. Professor of Psychology.

He received a B.S. degree from Greenville College, an M.S. from Illinois State University, and a Ph.D. from Northwestern University.

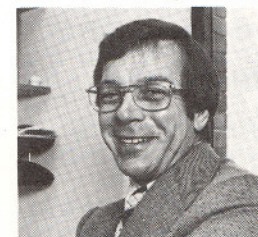
"I have great confidence in Dr. Coffman's ability to insure the continuance of the high level of service to the community that has characterized the work of the Division of Student Affairs," said President O'Dowd.

"I am charging Dr. Coffman with the early responsibility to explore ways of strengthening the ties between the divisions of Student Affairs and Academic Affairs with the goal of giving better-coordinated advising and counseling assistance to all students," he added.

No successor has been named to replace Coffman as Ombudsman.

Dr. William Jones, senior member of the OU faculty, was named to the newly-created position of Special Assistant to the President for Community College Relations.

His appointment was confirmed at the Nov. 27 meeting of the OU Board of Trustees. Jones, 39, had been Asst. Dean of Graduate Study. His new

duties begin immediately.

He is charged with the high-priority task of working closely with all area community colleges to help initiate programs which can be beneficial to these institutions and OU, President O'Dowd said. Jones will represent both President O'Dowd and Provost and Academic Vice-President Frederick Obear in his work with the community colleges.

Dr. Jones came to OU in 1964 served as assistant and then as associate director of admissions. He holds a B.S. from Eastern Michigan,

Internationally-known expert Lewis Lancaster is lecturing on the "Early Influence of Buddhism on Chinese Thought," in two OU appearances.

The current talks are sponsored by the Area Studies Program. Lancaster is serving this semester as a visiting lecturer at the University of Michigan. He has recently returned from England where he collaborated on the translation of a recently discovered ancient Tibetan Buddhist manuscript.

MERC, Pontiac Schools Give Biggest Grants to OU

The OU Board of Trustees accepted \$389,729 in gifts and grants during the Board's Nov. 27 meeting on campus.

Largest grants were for \$125,080 from the Michigan Employment Relations Commission (MERC), and for \$102,080 from the school district of Pontiac. The MERC grant will support Institutes in Human Resources Development which will be conducted by James C. Schmidt, School of Education. The Pontiac grant will support OU's Career Opportunity Program (COP).

Joseph der Hovanesian, School of Engineering, is director of a workshop for college teachers on coherent optics and holography to be conducted through a \$49,705 grant from the National Science Foundation. Roderic Righter, School of Education, will direct a year-long study of teacher competence for licensing purposes under a \$20,116 grant from the School District of Pontiac.

Two grants from the National Institutes of Health will cover indirect costs of research projects conducted by faculty in the Dept. of Biological Sciences. The grants were for \$18,928 to John R. Reddan, and for \$10,821 to Arun K. Roy. Reddan is conducting research on "Control of Cell Division in the Ocular Lens," and Roy is investigating "Hormonal Control of 2 U Globulin Synthesis in Liver."

Gifts and grants accepted by the University include: \$1,776 from the

National Foundation of Rochester in support of the General Scholarship Fund; \$3,121 from the Chrysler Corporation of Highland Park in support of Meadow Brook Hall; and \$1,046 from the Matilda R. Wilson Fund in support of Meadow Brook Hall.

Gifts on behalf of Meadow Brook Music Festival included \$1,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Johnson, Bloomfield Hills; \$2,000 from American Motors Corp. of Detroit; \$1,000 from Mrs. Grace B. Frost, Birmingham.

Mme. Schwarzkopf's program includes selections from Mozart, von Gluck, Schubert, Schumann, Brahms, Liszt, Grieg, Loewe, Wolf and Richard Strauss.

The famed soprano is master of the lieder or art song and has appeared at many major summer festivals, including the 1969 Meadow Brook Music Festival.

Last season, Mme. Schwarzkopf performed with the Washington National Symphony, the Toronto Symphony and the Louisville Orchestra.

Collegium Performs "Christmas Story"

An evangelist, a messenger angel and the chorus tell "The Christmas Story" as the Collegium Musicum performs Heinrich Schutz's classic piece.

The concert of Christmas music from the 16th and 17th centuries is at 8 p.m., Dec. 10, at St. John Fisher Chapel.

"The Christmas Story" is the first of the large baroque works composed dealing with the Nativity. The composer couples the three characters (evangelist, angel and chorus) in the narration with specific instruments. Wise men are accompanied by the violins, while the viole de gamba accompany the angel. Recorders reflect the pastoral life of the shepherds and the pomp of trumpets marks Herod's plotting.

OU's Collegium Musicum is one of few groups in the country which can perform the "Story" with its original instrumentation. Choral parts will be sung by the sixteen-voice Collegium Singers, under the direction of Dr. Lyle Nordstrom.

Sponsored by the Dept. of Music, the concert is open to the public. Tickets are \$1/adults and \$.50/students and may be purchased at the door.
