

Line Forms Now on Seats Aboard 'Theater Special'

"All aboard...!"
No ordinary conductor's call, that one.
It's an invitation to reserve the week of September 10 and book passage aboard The Pontiac Press Theater Special for a trip to New York and five excitement-packed days along Broadway.

The late-summer excursion into the heart of America's biggest city will be sponsored by The Pontiac Press as a non-profit goodwill gesture toward the first 60 readers who sign up before July 30.

Highlights of the trip will be tickets to five top Broadway shows, a tour of the United Nations Building, an after-theater party at one of the city's most famous restaurants, tickets to several television shows, a boat trip around Manhattan Island and plenty of free time to view other outstanding sights and see New York!

The cost?—A rock-bottom \$140 per person.
Besides the plays and other events already mentioned, the price will cover railroad trips both ways, accommodations at one of New York's finest hotels, luncheon in the Delegates' Lounge of the UN Building, an arrival party at Greenwich Village and several "surprises."

During your stay you'll see five of the best plays and musical shows:
"No Time for Sergeants," "Damn Yankees," "The Most Happy Fella," "Will Success Spoil Rock Hunter?" and "New Faces." Each has won the acclaim of leading critics and they're all yours to see as members of The Pontiac Press Theater Special.

The miles to the coastal metropolis promise to be among the most entertaining of the whole excursion, according to planners who regard the 10-or-so hours as an opportunity for fellow-Oaklandites to meet and have fun in a "traveling, musical get-together."

The cross-town trip from the train to New York's Paramount Hotel (in the center of the theater district) will be followed by an "arrival party" in Greenwich Village Monday night. And then the real part of the event will begin...

Planners have purposely avoided crowding the schedule of events, so that participants can have enough free time to visit the various attractions that New York has to offer out-of-towners. Accounts of these and other highlights will be available to each traveler in a special pamphlet furnished by The Press.

The Paramount Hotel, "base of operations" during the stay, will provide comfortable, double-room lodgings within walking distance of the theaters at which the five shows will be appearing.

The Soviet Communist party organ, in an editorial broadcast by Moscow radio, suggested an exchange of students and said the Soviet Union is willing to train Greek scientists and technicians.

2,500 Rock 'n' Rollers Riot in California; 10 Held

SAN JOSE, Calif. (INS) — San Jose Police were holding 10 teenagers today in the wake of a riot at a huge rock and roll dance.

The 10 were arrested early Sunday when some 2,500 teenagers attending the rock and roll session at Palomar Gardens in downtown San Jose engaged in a wild melee with fists and beer bottles.

It took 75 police an hour to bring the mob under control.

When the riot was over 10 persons required treatment at a nearby emergency aid station, scores more were nursing minor cuts and bruises, tables and chairs were broken and some 1,000 bottles were smashed.

The riot was touched off when someone threw a beer bottle into the middle of the packed dance floor as the teenagers gyrated to the pulsating rhythms of rock and roll artist Fats Domino.

Five auxiliary policemen on duty at the dance were unable to restore order and 16 patrol cars with 30 officers rushed to the scene. They radioed headquarters they needed reinforcements and 40 policemen attending the annual policemen's ball nearby raced to the dance hall.

Two policemen required medical treatment after being struck in the back of the neck by a beer bottle and kicked in the head.
Domino and his musicians escaped out the door when the riot started.

Tidal Waves Accompany Shocks

Quakes Kill 46 in Aegean Islands

ATHENS, Greece (U-P) — Earthquakes and repeated tidal waves struck the Aegean Islands off southern Greece today. At least 46 persons were reported killed. The brunt of the quakes was felt by the island of Thira (Santorini), where 36 persons were reported dead, and Ios, where at least 10 were said to have perished.

Local police said an unknown number of victims still lay beneath the debris on Ios, due north of Thira.

Tidal waves struck the island of Crete three times in less than half an hour. Huge waves also hit Samos and Kalymnos in the Dodecanese, and the islands of Astipaleia, Paros, Amorgos and Icaria.

VOLCANO ERUPTS

The police chief on the Aegean island of Syros telephoned that the quakes—which also shook Athens—were accompanied by an eruption of the volcano on Thira, 125 miles southeast of the Greek capital.

The government announced that most of the houses on Thira had collapsed and the rest were uninhabitable. The island has a population of nearly 10,000.

About 20 per cent of the houses on Amorgos were reported damaged and heavy property losses were listed on other islands. Coastal residents of Kalymnos were moved to the interior after a 13-foot wave swept the harbor and shores.

The onrush of water smashed 300 feet inland on Kalymnos, wrecking shops and houses. Several ships were sunk in the harbor.

More damage was reported on the Dodecanese islands of Leros, Patmos and Nisyros, bringing to 11 the total number of islands known to have suffered.

In Leros, the tidal wave destroyed a power station, flooded fields and wrecked shipping. At

Patmos, a tidal wave damaged the historic monastery where St. John wrote the Revelations—the last book in the New Testament. The government rushed relief supplies to the stricken islands.

Today's quake appeared to be the worst since August 1953, when a series of major quakes devastated the Ionian Islands off Greece's west coast. Those earth shocks killed an estimated 1,000 persons and left 130,000 homeless.

Boy, 3, Dies in Livingston

County Lakes Claim Lives of Two in Boat Tragedies

Oakland County lakes claimed two more drowning victims and a Madison Heights boy lost his life in a Livingston County lake as a trio of boating trips ended in tragedy Sunday.

Oakland County Sheriff's Department skin diver Bill Jackson recovered the body of Harold Dew, 32, of Detroit this morning at Bald Eagle Lake near Ortonville.

Diving and dragging operations continued through the morning at Cass Lake for August Lutz, 62, of 3335 Doney St., Rochester.

The other victim of a boat mishap was three-year-old Ricky Lauber, of 886 East Dallas St.

Dew went down after the boat he was riding in with two companions overturned after being swamped by a passing boat. Investigators said the men were changing places in the boat to even up the weight when the accident occurred.

Robert Young, 25, and Robert Phillips, 43, both of Detroit, were able to swim to safety. Phillips told County deputies he grabbed Dew after the swamping but could not hold him.

The drowning took place 150 feet off shore in 30 feet of water.

Boat operator Arthur R. Dailey, 53, of 4680 Auburndale, West Bloomfield Township, is being held in the county jail under investigation for negligent homicide in the Lutz death.

Lutz toppled out of the speeding motor boat after standing up and losing his balance, according to Pontiac State police.

Troopers reported the fatal fall took place 1,000 feet from shore in 30 feet of water.

The Lauber child drowned when the boat he was fishing from with his brother, David, 5, and an uncle, John Mars, 49, of Oak Park, overturned. David and Mars were rescued but Ricky could not be found. Lauber was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence J. Lauber. County drownings for the season now total 16.

Girl Scouts to Present Final Pageant Tonight

Tonight will see the closing pageant of the Girl Scout Roundup at Highland. At 8:30 "The Girl Scout Story," written by Dorothy Fields, will be presented for the campers and visitors.

Dorothy Fields, author of the play "Annie, Get Your Gun," arrived at the campsite on Friday to put the finishing touches on her play during last-minute rehearsals.

Like the two spectacles given last week, this one will make use of a choral reading group to narrate the story. A few of the 1,000 participants will have acting roles.

The script tells the story of Girl Scouting from its beginning in 1912 to the present day. Nearly 5,000 visitors saw the exhibits in the Administration area and took tours of the camp on Saturday. Most of them arrived in time to witness the Americana festival, held in the outdoor arena. They heard Governor G. Mennen Williams welcome the Girl Scouts from all over the country to Michigan. Later they watched him lead off the American Girl Polka which climaxed the pageant of America on the move.

The Reverend Dr. G. Merrill Lenox, Executive Director, Michigan Council of Churches, gave the invocation before the festival. Mrs. George Dunham of New Jersey, national chairman of the Roundup, presided. The Flint Symphony orchestra furnished the music.

Monday is the last day the public will be able to take walking tours through the camp. The exhibits and the Administration area will be open on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Campers from the western states will leave on Tuesday, those from the east on Wednesday. Visitors are welcome today during the usual hours and through the arena presentation this evening.

Frantic Mother Waits Six Hours at Secret Place

Gotham Police Continue Questioning of Queens Trio That Made Call

WESTBURY, N.Y. (INS) — Police announced today that Mrs. Beatrice Weinberger had made a second unsuccessful effort last night to keep a rendezvous with the alleged kidnaper of her son.

The frantic, 32-year old mother returned to her home early today after a six-hour absence, and Nassau County Chief of Detectives Stuyvesant Pinnell disclosed she had been out trying to contact a man who identified himself as the kidnaper who took her son from his carriage on July 4th afternoon.

The mother made her heart-breaking trip in response to a telephone call yesterday from the man in which arrangements were made for the night meeting. No one showed up at the appointed place.

Shortly after Mrs. Weinberger's return, New York City police arrested three men in the Elmhurst section of Queens. Queens County adj. Nassau where the Weinberger home is located in Westbury.

These three men still were being questioned today. Pinnell declined to say if there was any direct connection between Mrs. Weinberger's wasted journey and their seizure.

THIRD TELEPHONE CALL

The phone call to the Weinberger home on Sunday was the third since the month-old infant, Peter, was taken from his carriage on the Weinberger patio at about 3:20 p.m. last Wednesday.

Sunday, police discounted the first two calls as having any significance.

On Friday, also in response to a telephone call, Mrs. Weinberger made another trip and another effort to contact the purported kidnaper, without result.

In his statement on the latest fruitless contact attempt, Pinnell said:

"Contact was made last night by telephone with the Weinbergers by the alleged kidnaper. Thereupon Mrs. Weinberger went to the appointed place but there was no successful outcome."

Mrs. Weinberger, driving the family's black and cream colored sedan, left home at about 9:30 p.m. and returned after 4 a.m. today.

Apparently she had kept a long vigil at the appointed place before giving up hope.

The three arrested men were not identified but it was reported two of them were youths about 20 years of age, and that they had been picked up after a telephone call was traced to a bar.

Two other men arrested last week for questioning were released. One was picked up when he seemed to be exceptionally interested in the Weinberger home and drove around it several times Thursday morning. The other man apparently had made a "crank" phone call.

Mrs. Weinberger made another radio-television plea to the kidnaper last night, appealing frantically to the abductor to return him to her arms.

Last Chance to Register for Primary on August 7

If you want to vote in the coming Aug. 7 primary, you'd better be registered before 8 p.m. tonight. At that time, all registrations for the August primary election will be closed.

The City Clerk's office in the City Hall will remain open until 8 to take last minute registrations.

On Friday, 105 un-registered voters became eligible for the primary by registering while on Saturday 48 persons filed at the clerk's office. Fifty-five registered on Thursday.

Today also will mark the end of registrations which have been taken at other locations in addition to the clerk's office. Both city banks will take registrations until their 3 p.m. closing time.

The Oakland County CIO Council, 21½ E. Lawrence St., and three local union halls will take registrations up to their 5 p.m. closing times today.

Total registrations in the city have reached approximately 38,271 to date.
