Stevenson Gives U.S. Stand



Taunt Adenauer From E. Berlin

BERLIN (UPI) — East German Communists taunted West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer over a loudspeaker as he toured the Berlin border today and held up four American soldiers for more than 30 minutes at a crossing point.

While Adenauer walked within a few feet of the sealed East-West border the East Germans kept a water cannon trained on him and a jeering voice on a loud-speaker said: "Don't look so serious, Konnie."

Shortly after the elderly chancellor visited the barricaded border, East German police stopped four uniformed American soldiers returning from East Berlin in an official Army sedan.

For 25 minutes the police questioned the American major and three sergeants before releasing them.

The incident took place at the Friedrichshagen crossing point in the center of the city. The GIs were stopped half way through the zig-zag course of low

Concrete barriers set up by the Communists to make it easier for them to control traffic.

Eyewitnesses reported the Communists confronted the Americans had "unbehaved" and were traveling without proper documents.

In another incident a middle-aged woman leaped to her death from an upper story of her home on the East-West border in an apparent attempt to flee to the West.

Boss Orders: 'Come In'

"Better News" This day does not say, but it is as good as said. The FBI has been ordered to "come in" by the Bureau of Investigation.

Looking back over the years, several personal experiences stand out in my mind — nearly all of them keyed in one way or another to the six presidents and 13 attorneys general under whom I have been honored to serve as director of the FBI.

Without question, the most outstanding of these — an occasion which always will remain vivid in my mind — was that moment on May 10, 1924, when the Honorable Harlan Fiske Stone, then attorney general and later Chief Justice of the United States, summoned me to his office.

At the time, I was assistant director of the Bureau of Investigation, the name by which the FBI then was known.

Harlan Stone had been appointed attorney general the preceding month, with orders from President Coolidge to reorganize the Justice Department and restore public confidence in this vital facet of our government.

CLEANED HOUSE
It did not take the new attorney general long to begin cleaning house. On May 9 — the day preceding my summons to his office — he had requested the resignation of the bureau's previous director.

Throughout my seven years' service in the Justice Department, I had consistently done my best. My competence was clear. I had nothing to hide. Nevertheless, was I to be next?

Harlan Stone was a big man—over six feet tall and more than 200 pounds. Upon entering his office, I found him seated behind his desk, a pervasive, half-smiling expression on his face as he pondered the mountain of papers before him.

As I walked toward him, the attorney general rose from his chair and extended a firm hand for me to shake. "Sit down over here," he said. "There's something I want to discuss with you."

For the next several minutes, Attorney General Stone peered at me.

FROM CHICAGO
The captured man said he was from Chicago, was born Aug. 12, 1934, and had been in the area for one complete night and part of another. He gave his name as "Larry."

There was no immediate identification of the captured man. The FBI had identified one of the fugitives as William Joseph Weiler, 23, of the Chicago area. The arrested man did not appear to match Weiler's description.

The search continued for the third gunman. The posse included National Guard troops, volunteers, deputies from 20 counties, police, helicopters, airplanes and bloodhounds.

The arrest was made after Miss John Kratt, operator of a motel near Wisconsin Dells, said a "pretty ragged looking man" approached her and asked for two bottles of soft drinks.

Ford Bargainer Feels Package Good, Fair One

Proposal in Addition to Cost-of-Living Pay, Expands Benefits

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Corp., Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp., today offered the United Auto Workers new three-year contracts providing 6-cent-an-hour wage increases in each year in addition to cost-of-living allowances.

The Big Three, presenting a united front, also offered expanded fringe benefits and what they termed a new income guarantee to supplement pay in short work weeks for the nation's 490,000 auto workers.

Malcolm L. Denise, Ford's vice president for labor relations, termed the offer a "good one, a fair one, a respectable one, rather than a substantial one on which we would expect to be enticed up."

He said he believed it provided a reasonable basis for settlement by Aug. 31, when current contracts expire, "but we've got a awful lot of work to do."

"However, we've seen much darker clouds of gloom on the horizon in the past and still come up with a settlement."

Ford and Chrysler said their almost identical offers would expire Aug. 31 if not accepted fully. GM, however, indicated it would be willing to negotiate changes in the basic pattern of the agreement.

Denise characterized Ford's "current bargaining position as 'flexible, but we're not completely flexible.'"

The companies proposed hourly increases of six cents each year or 2 1/2 per cent of the employee's hourly base pay, whichever is greater. At all three companies currently this would run about seven cents an hour average.

Ford and Chrysler said their almost identical offers would expire automatically if not accepted fully by both the national and local union levels by Aug. 31, the date of expiration of current three-year contracts. GM, however, indicated it would be willing to negotiate changes in the basic pattern of the agreement.

6-CENT INCREASE
The companies proposed hourly pay increases of 6 cents an hour each year or 2 1/2 per cent of the employee's hourly base pay, whichever is greater.

They also proposed extra benefits for employees who, due to layoffs, work less than 36 hours in any week. The benefits would be one-half of the employee's straight time per hour for the difference between the hours he works in a week and minimum 36 hours.

Adlai Brands Russians Suppressors of Liberty

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United States today accused the Soviet Union of cynical suppression of freedoms while trying to picture the Western powers as supporters of colonialism.

The U.S. charge was made by Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson at a special session of the U.N. General Assembly.

He was replying to an attack Monday by Soviet Delegate Plinio D. Morozov on foreign-held military bases, especially those of the United States.

Stevenson called Morozov's attack "shameless" and said it should be ignored. He compared the record of the Soviet Union with that of France, which he said had freed numerous territories since World War II while the Russians were obliterating countries which resisted the presence of Soviet troops.

Stevenson told the 90-nation assembly Soviet forces still were in Poland, Hungary, East Germany and other countries 16 years after the end of the war.

"The Soviet record of cynical suppression of freedoms is in sharp contrast to the record of France," Stevenson said.

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On Trial for Fall of Radar Tower

Charge Neglect of Duty by Air Force Colonel Caused Fatal Mishap

NEWBURGH, N.Y. (AP) — An Air Force colonel went before a court-martial today on charges of neglect of duty in the collapse of a Texas Tower that cost the lives of 29 Air Force men and civilians Jan. 12.

The formal charges were presented at the outset, and then the session was closed until at least 1 p.m. at the request of defense counsel, Thomas King, a civilian. Col. Jean F. Rydstrom, law officer, announced the closed session to hear preliminary motions.

At noon it was announced the hearing had adjourned until Wednesday morning.

On a pre-emptory challenge of the defense, one member of the 400 Air Force Wing at Colorado Springs, Colo. The reason for the challenge was not made known immediately.

Col. William M. Banks, said on the eve of his trial that he was "confident of being exonerated."

"I have already pointed out that in the state of my knowledge at the time I acted properly, prudently and not in a manner derogatory of duty," he added.

Banks, who has a record of heroism in combat in World War II, is accused of ignoring reports of disaster to the Texas Tower off the New Jersey Coast.

The court-martial, at Stewart Air Force Base, will consider charges that Banks failed to keep himself advised of the threats of the storm in which the tower collapsed, to keep in touch with the officer in charge of the tower, and to take immediate action for any action necessary to rescue the men on it.

The tower that collapsed was one of three set up off the Atlantic seaboard to sound warning of a possible enemy air attack.

Lake Michigan Nearly Whipped

Research Engineer, 33, Would Be 1st to Cross 36 1/2-Mile Course

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind. (AP) — Ted Erikson, 33-year-old research engineer, was swimming strongly after 24 hours today about two miles from the end of his 36 1/2-mile Lake Michigan course from Chicago to Michigan City.

The lake has never before been crossed by a swimmer.

Erikson, father of two, was coached by his wife Loreta. He was the only one of six starters left in the competition for a \$3,675 purse offered by Chicago auto dealer James Moran.

The gruel, fifth annual challenge to swim across the lower end of the lake, began Monday morning when the three men and three women contestants entered Burnham Harbor at Chicago's downtown lakefront.

The first hopeful to drop out, Mary Margaret Revelle, 24, of Huntington Park, Calif., was forced by effects of a week-old back injury to quit after four miles.

Choppy six-foot waves and fatigue forced the others to give up. Elmer Korbi, 31, of Chicago, stuck it out with Erikson the longest. He was taken from the water exhausted early today after swimming 29 miles.

The 36 1/2-mile route is longer than that across the English Channel from Dover, England, to Calais, France, which has been conquered by many swimmers.

Posse Catches Suspect in Wisconsin Murder

WISCONSIN DELLS, Wis. (UPI) — Leaders of a 300-man posse said today they had arrested a man they believe to be one of the three gunmen who killed a deputy sheriff, wounded a police chief, and touched off one of the greatest manhunts in Wisconsin history.

The posse leaders said they flushed the well-built, dark-complexioned stranger from a farm site which lay in wooded country where the search had concentrated.

The man was wearing a dirty, torn T-shirt and ripped gray pants and looked as if he had been on the loose in the woods for some time. He was armed with a .38 Smith & Wesson.

His arms were badly scratched. The captive was brought to the sheriff's office at Wisconsin Dells. A spokesman for the sheriff's office said deputies were convinced the man was one of two being sought.

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Goya Portrait of Duke Stolen

\$382,000 Work Object of Protest by British Two Months Ago

LONDON (AP)—A Goya portrait of the Duke of Wellington was stolen from Britain's National Gallery today. The picture recently was bought for the nation for 140,000 pounds — \$382,000 — amid a great controversy.

Scotland Yard said the picture vanished overnight. The trustees of the gallery called in Yard detectives the first thing this morning.

The portrait had been on display in the gallery main entrance hall carefully guarded by rails and ropes.

The picture was bought at auction two months ago by Charles Wrightman, New York art magnate and collector and friend of President Kennedy.

BRITISH PROTESTED

An outcry developed among British art lovers at the thought that it might go to the United States. The picture was classified as a national treasure.

Wrightman immediately offered to sell it to the gallery, for what he paid for it. The British government put up the money to buy it.

The robbery came nine days after the Cezanne masterpieces were snatched from a gallery in Aix-en-Provence, France. Speculation immediately arose that the London theft might be the work of the same gang.

Stanley Clark, an art expert at Sotheby's, said the theft is unusual in that the portrait is painted on a panel.

This, he pointed out, meant that a thief could not roll it up or conceal it. The picture measures 25 1/2 inches by 20 1/2.

Both the Cezanne and the Goya pictures were far too famous ever to be sold on an open market. It was believed that the gang grabbed the Cezanne pictures, hoping to sell them back for a ransom from the insurance companies. The same could apply to the picture of the Duke of Wellington.

The rash of big-time art robberies has baffled police in Europe and the United States.

Another 15-year-old Bloomfield Township girl was killed Saturday when she fell off a horse while riding.

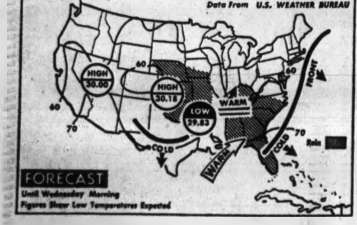

McNamara Testifies Free World Defenses Would Be Jeopardized

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara said today if a \$335-million Senate cut in military aid abroad is allowed to stand it will have the most serious implications for free world defense in a time of crisis.

He told the Senate Appropriations Committee "the importance of strong, ready NATO forces to the preservation of a free Berlin cannot be overemphasized."

McNamara and Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, testified in support of a request for \$1.8 billion in arms and money to strengthen free world defense. The Senate has voted only \$1.6 billion in an authorization bill setting ceilings on amounts that can be appropriated.

The House allowed \$1.8 billion, and McNamara pointed out that even that sum was \$85 million under the amount asked by President Kennedy as a minimum figure.

The difference represents one of the issues Senate-House conferees will try to iron out in a compromise of the two versions of the bill. Shortly before the Senate hearing got under way, congressional leaders told Kennedy they are very hopeful of getting through a bill with at least some of the financing provisions Kennedy has called imperative.

They proposed transfer of 12 cents of the present 17-cent cost-of-living allowance into the basic wage of hourly rate employees.

All three also offered a new moving allowance plan for employees transferred from one plant to another outside the area-Chrysler stipulated 50 miles or more; improved pension benefits; and more life insurance.

None of the Big Three offered a profit-sharing plan, as American Motors did. A profit-sharing plan was one of the UAW's main bargaining goals when the current contracts were negotiated in 1960.

The nation's three biggest auto makers also offered to increase separation pay by 25 per cent.

Separation pay is available to employees affected by long-term layoffs, such as in cases of plant relocation or closing.

General Motors noted that the UAW in negotiations during the past eight weeks had emphasized "employees' income resulting from short work weeks, particularly during a sharp reduction in auto sales earlier this year."

The industry offer apparently was a counterproposal to the union's demand that employees currently paid by the hour be put on a salaried basis to protect their income during short work weeks.

Whether they are sufficient to satisfy our demands is something we cannot say until we have analyzed them fully," he said.

GM made substantially the same contract offers to the International Union of Electrical Workers at a contract to cover 25,000 IUE members in GM appliance plants.

"Our proposals represent a sound, forward-looking program designed to fit realistically the needs of our employees, our own business and the nation's economy," said GM Vice President Louis G. Sestor.

Identical pension improvement plans were handed to the UAW by all the Big Three. They would increase benefits for employees retiring at age 65 or older from \$2.50 to \$2.60 per month for each year's service after 1961, and \$2.40 to \$2.50 for service prior to 1962.

JFK Has Hope for N-Test Curb

Sends Arthur H. Dean Back to Geneva With Full Confidence

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy expressed hope today the Soviet Union "will make some alternative response" to this country's renewed effort to reach an agreement on a nuclear test ban.

Kennedy issued a statement after conferring with Arthur H. Dean, chief U.S. negotiator at the Geneva test ban talks, who has been home for consultations and is returning to Geneva.

Kennedy described Dean's mission as most vital. Kennedy said Dean will make a further effort to reach an agreement for an effective ban on nuclear testing.

"He goes with my full support and confidence," Kennedy said. "Our proposed treaty carries hope for our country and the world, for relief from great dangers and the highest importance to these negotiations."

"We must all hope that the Soviet Union will make some affirmative response to this renewed effort."

The prolonged Geneva negotiations, in which the United States, the Soviet Union and Great Britain are involved, have been deadlocked over a test ban inspection system. The States continues to insist on the highest importance to these negotiations.

Forest Fires Rage in Canada

Newfoundland Airport 3 Villages Threatened; Ready for Evacuation

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (UPI)—Two government vessels stood ready today to remove women and children from three villages threatened by a fresh outbreak of forest fires that were burning in the direction of the Gander International Airport.

In Newfoundland, wildfires worst summer of fire damage is a four-day blast raged out of control near St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador Bay North, which have a total population of 1,000.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police, fire ward and the Department of Transport and Public Works are working to take about persons from the towns.

The fire crossed the Trans-Canada Highway five miles east of Gander last night. It was burning in the direction of the international airport, which already had been threatened by a forest fire earlier this season.

Police said the firefighters stayed throughout the night in fear the blaze would intensify in the morning.

Little relief was in sight for the fire weary province, where fires have destroyed millions of cubic feet of fir stands since last June.

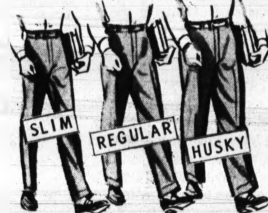

Treating One Problem Aggravates Another One

Efforts to solve economic problems through legislation frequently produce new problems.

Our Government uses a portion of the money raised by taxes on the American people to peg the price of cotton. This is done to aid the American cotton grower and to assure him a profitable price for his crop. Then what happens?

With the aid of the pegged price, the cotton can be sold abroad at a discount. Thus foreign textile manufacturers can buy it at less than American textile companies have to pay. Many of them also have lower labor costs.

So cheap foreign cotton textiles are shipped back into this country and undersell American cotton goods. Then textile workers have to be laid off, and our Government helps to support them, also with money provided by American taxpayers.

However, foreign competition is only one factor in the economic difficulties in which the American textile manufacturers now find themselves. Changing customs, rising labor costs, ruinous price wars have all played their part.

Textile companies have moved to other parts of the country to escape increasing labor costs. The American people use far more casual clothing today than they did previously. These frequently require less cloth and cost less than more formal clothing.

Synthetic materials also have resulted in a big reduction in the amount of material used, for one pound of synthetic goods substitutes for two pounds of the wool or cotton formerly used.

As a result, the textile industry is sick and looking to the Government for help. In this respect it is lining up with the farmers, the railroads and the mining industry, to name but a few.

More than eight hundred textile mills have closed during the past 15 years, eliminating some four hundred thousand jobs. The closing of these mills, however, has resulted in some slightly hopeful signs to offset their generally depressing effect.

Difficult times and excessive competition have brought about mergers, and the larger companies are better able to withstand the price wars which result from the efforts of large numbers of independent mills to supply and demand.

Conditions in the industry still are far from promising, but one steady factor has been provided in the agreement of 16 nations to freeze both imports and exports for one year, during which time an effort will be made to provide a more permanent solution.

David Lawrence Asks:

New Puppet in the Red Theater?

IN EUROPE: The Lyndon Johnson visit to West Germany and Berlin is over, and the cheers and the shouting have subsided.

It was a good idea for him to make the trip. It gave timely encouragement to the West Berlin populace, which had grown panicky. But the sad, unvarnished truth is that the Western Alliance stands in a dazed, if not frustrated, condition as it becomes clear that the Soviets have in reality seized and virtually annexed a piece of Berlin and apparently have gotten away with their aggression.

The Soviet Union has violated its trusteeship. The people of West Berlin were dumbfounded when the three Western powers of the western alliance sent a message to Moscow that merely called attention to the violation without seeming to be willing to do anything about it.

That's why the morale of West Berliners has plummeted over to the area to cheer them up.

But the small military contingent and the demonstrators of the crowd for the distinguished American visitor have little, if any significance so far as the Communists are concerned.

This is because, for all practical purposes, the Western Allies have already acquiesced in the cutting off of East Berlin, and there is really nothing to negotiate now except the ratification of the Soviet action in annexing the whole East German area through the device of a separate peace treaty.

Most of the voices that come from the Western governments, formally and informally, call vaguely for "abrogation." But there seems to be no one behind the scenes, and the peoples of Europe really don't expect any militancy from the Western governments now.

PRINCIPLE OF VALUE: If the principle involved is of no value, if the Soviets can annex a piece of territory and police it as if it were their own, shutting off access to West Berlin as they please, and the Allies continue only to send diplomatic notes of protest, then indeed the Berlin crisis is over. For the Russians will be glad to talk for months or years about their concepts of legal rights and postwar agreements.

For all practical purposes, the crucial moment has passed—the expected agreement now is likely to elicit some paper guarantees of the right of Allied access subject to Soviet whims and variable interpretations.

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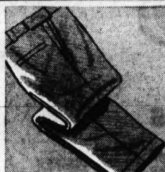
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Fidel Sends Propaganda

Senator Wants Steel Price Held

Gore Sees Signs of \$5 Per Ton Hike if Pay Raise Given

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., said today that President Kennedy and government agencies should use all their powers to prevent any steel price increase this fall.

Gore said in a speech prepared for Senate delivery he saw signs indicating that a \$5 per ton increase would amount to the raise in steel wages scheduled for Oct. 1 "unless something is done to restrain such action."

Steel is so important to the economy that an increase in its price would likely lead to a new round of inflation, Gore said. "The public welfare demands its prevention."

Gore said drastic steps may be needed to prevent a price increase.

EYES COMPETITION

"It may well be that the large steel companies can and should be broken up into smaller units so that true competition, including price competition, may be restored," said Gore.

Reports U. S. Forces in Berlin in Top Form

BERLIN (AP) — A colonel who led a battle group through the Soviet zone to bolster the Berlin command said today U. S. forces could move an entire division with the same speed and efficiency.

Col. Glover R. Johns Jr., of Austin, Tex., told newsmen "It may take a bit longer" to wheel a full division than the 1,500-man task force "but we are organized to do it."

Johns was introduced at a news conference by the Berlin post commander, Brig. Gen. Frederick C. Harrel.

The general congratulated Johns for moving his troops almost 500 miles from Mannheim in West Germany to Berlin in only 40 hours from the time he got the order "and without losing a single vehicle en route."

Reform Plan for Taxes Dies in Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Kennedy's stop-gap tax reform program is dead for this session of Congress, say informed House sources. The delay may push back for another year his planned general overhauling of the tax structure.

The House Ways and Means Committee Monday canceled a meeting at which it was to have heard Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon sum up the administration's latest position on the measure. But Dillon asked that the meeting be postponed.

Committee sources said Dillon will be heard later but there is no chance that Congress will be able to enact the complicated legislation before adjournment which is expected to come next month.

Market Thieves Fail to Crack Area Safe

An unsuccessful attempt to open a safe at DeMott's Market at 2700 Pontiac Lake Trail, Watford Township yesterday was discovered by the owner, Victor DeMott when he opened the store.

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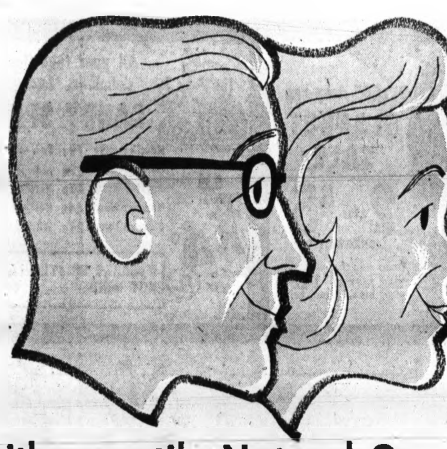

Refugees Show Up Communism

Embarrassed Reds Close Berlin Hatch

(Editor's Note: East Germany's closing of the border between West and East Berlin was shot to death last night following what police believed was an argument with a customer over the fare.

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BORDER FAMILIES MOVED—East German soldiers and police stand guard as moving vans load possessions of East Berliners being moved out of their homes on Harzerstrasse, located on the edge of the Soviet border. Barbed wire in foreground marks the dividing line between Berlin's East and West sectors. The street and sidewalks of Harzerstrasse are in the American sector but apartments on the street's north side are in Communist territory.

The city became the only easy road to freedom for East Germans who wouldn't put up with communism. The Red regime had made East Berlin their capital, so it was a logical place for East Germans to visit. Once there it was a simple matter for the would-be refugees to mingle with the 80,000 East Berliners who worked in West Berlin, take an elevated train or subway to the Western half of the city or walk or drive across the numerous street crossing points. Controls were lax along the 25-mile border through the city, and Red guards made only sporadic checks. Once in West Berlin the refugees had only to report to refugee authorities and they were flown to West Germany, their planes protected by the allied agreements with the Soviets.

Then mounting Soviet threats to sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany and drive the allies from West Berlin caused panic among discontented East Germans. They feared that once the treaty was signed the escape hatch through Berlin would be closed. The refugee stream swelled, to a peak of more than 2,000 persons escaping every 24 hours just before Aug. 13. The mass desertion gave the lie to the Communist claims that they could give their people a better life than the West. Embarrassed and infuriated, the Reds closed the hatch.

Quiz Youth, 19, in Boy's Slaying

New Jersey Cemetery Killing Followed Scrap Over Stolen Money

ELIZABETH, N.J. (UPI)—Police questioned a dark-haired youth today in the cemetery murder of a 14-year-old boy over robbery money.

The victim, John McKernan, was shot to death in Evergreen Cemetery Monday when he failed to turn over a large quantity of money on demand of the older boy, police said.

The assailant was identified as Fred Baron, 19. Police expected to charge Baron with murder later today after further interrogation.

John Conry, 14, a witness, told police the shooting followed a dispute over a \$25.00 cache of holding and burglary loot.

Detectives said they were still checking this story.

They said they were skeptical about the high cash figure, but they reported that the victim and his assailant were believed to have looted a number of homes and offices in Essex and Union counties.

Conry was booked and ordered held as a material witness.

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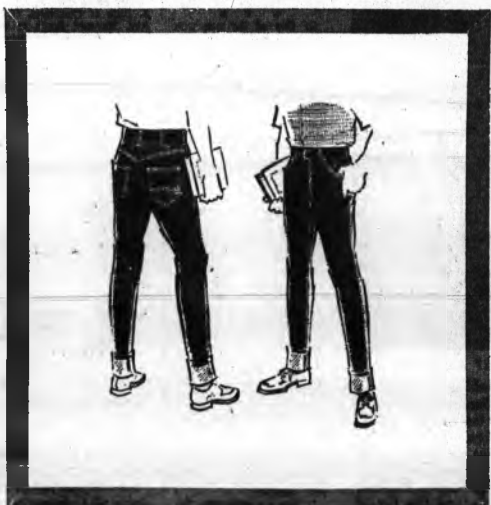

The new buildings are part of the district's \$3,980,000 improvement program which includes four new elementary units and a new junior high school.

Givian has taught at Auburnshire and more recently at Dresden Elementary School.

The board has 30 days to select a person to fill the vacancy until next June's regular school election. Bannow was elected in June 1960 to a four-year term.

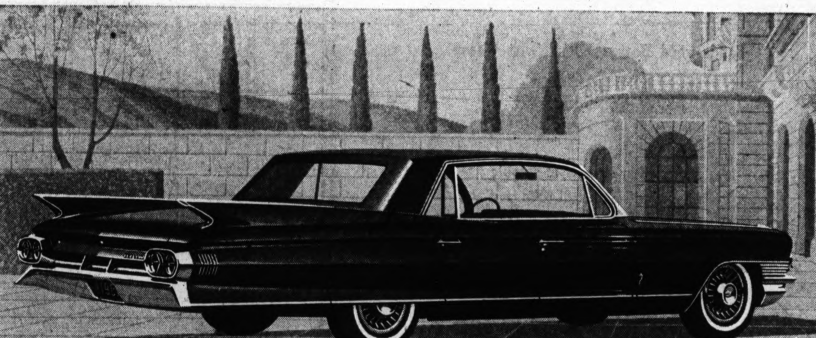

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Barnum Nips Evans for Golf Crown

Luckless Max Evans became a "brideless maid" for the 5th time Monday when long-driving John Barnum won his 4th Michigan Open Golf Championship in a sudden-death playoff at Farmington Country Club.

A great stretch drive by Evans' birdie the 18th hole to tie him, then birdied the 3rd extra hole of their playoff to win his 2nd State Open title and 3rd in the last four years.

It marks the 5th time that the veteran Utica professional has finished in the runner-up position in this tournament. He lost by one stroke to Walter Berkman of Franklin Hills in 1957 at Edgewood.

Barnum and Evans completed their regulation 72 holes in a dead-lock at 238, even par over the 6,604-yard Farmington C.C. course.

Both golfers posted routine par fours on the 1st hole. Evans earned an 18-foot putt for a birdie four on the 2nd hole, but Barnum's chip shot stopped 18 inches from the cup and he sank it to equal Max.

On the 165-yard 3rd hole, Evans was 26 feet below the cup and Barnum's tee shot landed 12 feet away on the right side of the pin. Evans' uphill putt felt one foot short, then Barnum dropped his for a device to annex another Michigan Open crown.

It was another heartbreaking setback for Evans, who observed his 62nd birthday last Friday, the opening day of the 41st annual tourney.

Evans started badly in this event by shooting a 71, but he bounced back with a 72 for a 149 score at the halfway mark. He carded another 72 in the morning of yesterday's grueling 36-hole finale, then made a brilliant stretch run with a closing five under-par 87.

The blazing finish was highlighted by seven birdies and a 21 on the back nine. He bogied twice. When he sank a 15-footer for a birdie three at No. 18 and his 238 total was posted on the scoreboard virtually everyone thought he had the title in the bag.

But onlookers forgot that Barnum also is a talented stretch-runner and they didn't realize it until the 18th green where the large Blytheheld pro canned a 20-foot downhill putt for a birdie to match Evans' 238 total and force the playoff.

Perhaps it was some sort of golfing justice that helped Barnum win another State Open title. The Grand Rapids veteran was six below par Saturday with a sizzling round in sight when rain washed out his card.

Barnum, who turns 49 on Oct. 6, shot a 69 in the 1st round. Following the Saturday cancellation, Barnum slipped to 73.

He posted a 74 in Monday's morning round and the huge let-low said he was unaware that he was still in contention until the last three holes of his final round. His tricky putt at No. 18 gave him a closing 70.

Berkman, the last-round leader after shooting a 68, couldn't come up with another hot round the rest of the way. He finished with rounds of 75-73-73 over the par 73-75-71 course for a 72-hole total of 291.

This figure bracketed him with youthful Phil Wichman, Barnum's assistant at Blytheheld, and each

pro pocketed \$375 as his share of 3rd place. Berkman, like Barnum, was shooting for his 4th championship.

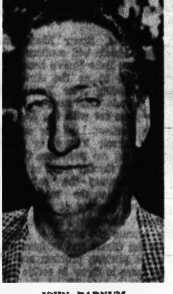
The victory netted Barnum \$750 while Evans earned \$500 for 2nd place. The total purse was \$5,000 with \$500 allotted to amateurs. Pro money was paid through 25 positions.

Barnum, Berkman, Muskegon's Cliff Sattergren and Tom Talkington of Washnaw shared the 54-hole lead at 218, but only Barnum maintained a winning pace. Evans was three strokes off the pace at the 54-hole mark with 221.

Wichman's Ben Lutz, the mid-way leader with 71-71-43, apparently couldn't stand the pressure yesterday. He scored to 79 and 78 for a 397 total.

Low amateur in the event was former Michigan Amateur champion Bud Stevens, who shot 74-79-70-71-24. Runner-up a meter hours went to Tommy Grace of Lathrup Village. The Notre Dame sophomore totaled 255.

Forty-four pros and 22 amateurs competed in the final two rounds.

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Police Allowing Illegal Gambling

WASHINGTON (U)—Senate and New York state racketeers charged today that corrupt judges, prosecutors and police are a factor in the growth of illegal gambling since a multimillion dollar-a-year activity.

"You and I know what the problem is," Ben Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., a member of the Senate investigations subcommittee, declared.

"They buy off the judges—they buy off the prosecutors—they buy off the police and the local press," he said.

"In many communities, yes," agreed Goodman A. Sarachan, chairman of the New York State Crime Commission, more formally known as the state's investigation commission.

"Not many gamblers can operate 48 hours without the police on the beat knowing about it," New York Crime Commissioner Miles J. Lane chimed in.

Sarachan and Lane were seated side by side at the witness table of a Senate subcommittee hearing on the state's investigation commission.

Appearing before the Senate investigations subcommittee, Sarachan said the work of his New York group, known formally as the State Investigation Commission, has convinced him that police chiefs can put their finger on virtually every professional gambler.

Kunster, an American Civil Liberties Union lawyer from New York, said he withdrew his motion because "I'm afraid they might move it to a segregation stretch."

He said Henry Thomas, 19, Howard University student, is a Negro and "Negroes have been systematically excluded from jury duty as discriminated against in the organization of a jury."

In drawing a jury list, he said in the motion, county officials either excluded Negroes from the venire or kept the number included so small they could be systematically struck from the jury.

Kunster argued that unless Judge Moore "quashes the venire, the defendant will be denied his constitutional right of equal protection under the law."

The all-male jury list drawn up for the trials included 51 white and two Negroes.

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Zoning Revision Only Arms Will Stop Meeting Subject Castro, Priest Says

Waterford Twp. Board Mulls Dividing Land Into Three Categories

At last night's Waterford Township board meeting, members discussed a revision of the zoning ordinance which would put commercial zoning into three categories.

The zoning and township members had drawn up a revised zoning ordinance and presented this to the Oakland County Planning Commission. After consideration the planning commission then recommended a 11-point recommendation that was tabled until next week's meeting.

Supervisor Elmer R. Johnson said he felt the new ordinance was a good one but that the board would have to take one step at a time.

Clark James E. Sesterlin said the new ordinance was a revision that was very commendable, but there are some flaws in terminology," he wanted the ordinance to be as complete as possible, rather than add amendments later.

In other business, the low bidder for the sale of construction bonds for backslapping five townships was the State Construction Company of Toledo and was awarded the contract.

The company's bid was \$41 per cent on \$54,000 for the project. The low bidder for backslapping 1,300 feet on Tyeon Street, the Ann Arbor Contract Co. was awarded a contract for \$9,314 for the work.

The board will continue its policy next year of paying one-third of the cost of chlorinating township water on request of residents.

Donald Freeman was hired as an additional reserve police officer at a token salary of \$1 a year.

British Guiana Marxist Triumphs in Election

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana (U)—Cheddi Jagan, 43, a Marxist admirer of Fidel Castro promising a foreign policy of active neutrality, was returned to power for four more years today in Britain's only South American colony.
 Returns from Monday's general election gave Jagan's Communist-leaning People's Progressive Party (PPP) 19 of 35 seats in the new legislature, and at least two of the five unopposed constituencies were expected to be added to the East Indian dentist's majority.

The Negro-dominated People's National Congress led by Forbes Burnham won nine seats and Peter Daguilar's conservative, anti-Communist United Force won two.
 The British ousted a government headed by Jagan in 1953, charging that he was planning to establish a Communist beachhead on South America's north coast flanking the Panama Canal. In elections in 1957 the PPP won 9 of the 14 legislative council seats and Jagan became minister of industry, a post equivalent to premier, under British governor Sir Ralph Grey.

Jagan was expected to come to Georgetown today from his inland home district to accept Grey's invitation to become British Guiana's first premier in name as well as fact.

 Britain has promised the colony internal self-government and said it could apply for independence within two years. Jagan is expected to demand independence within the Commonwealth immediately. He also opposed British Guiana's entry into the West Indies Federation and says he will hold a referendum on the question.
 The Western world watched the election with concern because of Jagan's avowed friendship toward Communist countries and the Castro regime. But the election apparently was decided on racial lines.

Jagan was backed largely by his fellow East Indians, who were brought to the country to work the rice and sugar fields and who won his seat in the legislature, but his party failed to gain a majority—losing out to the leftist People's Progressive Party.

Taunt Adenauer From E. Berlin

Stevenson Gives U.S. Stand

Stevenson opened the debate with an appeal to the United States and its allies to support the resolution by 31 African-Asian nations and Communist Yugoslavia calling for the French withdrawal from Bizerte and ultimately from Tunisia.

Informants said the United States plans to abstain on the resolution aimed at France, one of its chief allies. It was generally believed, however, that the resolution would get the two-thirds vote required for its adoption.

3-Year Contract Offers 6-Cent Wage Increases

Ford, Chrysler and GM Provide Cost-of-Living Allowances, 'Extras'

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Corp., Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp. today offered the United Auto Workers new three-year contracts providing six-cent-an-hour wage increases in each year in addition to cost-of-living allowances.

The Big Three, presenting a united front, also offered expanded fringe benefits and what they termed a new income guarantee to supplement pay in short work weeks for the nation's 490,000 auto workers.

Ford and Chrysler said their almost identical offers would expire automatically if not accepted fully at both the national and local union levels by Aug. 31, the date of expiration of current three-year contracts. GM, however, indicated it would be willing to negotiate changes in the basic pattern of the agreement.

6-CENT INCREASE

The companies proposed hourly pay increases of 6 cents an hour each year or 2 1/2 percent of the employee's hourly pay base, whichever is greater.

They also proposed extra benefits for employees who, due to layoffs, work less than 36 hours in any week. The benefits would be one-half of the employee's straight time per hour for the difference between the hours worked in a week and minimum 36 hours.

The Big Three also offered to increase the maximum weekly supplemental unemployment benefits from \$20 to \$35, and to make it easier for employees to apply for and receive benefits. Supplemental unemployment benefits is an auto industry program under which the companies pay their workers an additional allowance to supplement what they receive in government unemployment compensation.

STABILIZING REVISIONS

Ford, General Motors and Chrysler proposed "stabilizing" revisions with their offers to retain the cost-of-living allowance provided in current contracts. American Motors Corp., earlier had asked the union to abandon cost-of-living increases in return for a profit-sharing plan.

They proposed a revision of 12 cents of the present 17-cent cost-of-living allowance into the base wage of hourly rated employees.

All three also offered a new moving allowance plan for employees transferred from one plant to another outside the area—Chrysler stipulated 50 miles or (Continued on Page 2, Col. 1)

Throughout my seven years' service in the Justice Department, I had consistently done my best. My conscience was clear. I had nothing to hide. Nonetheless, was I to meet?

Harlan Stone was a big man—over six feet tall and more than 200 pounds. Upon entering his office, I found him seated behind his desk, a pensive, half-smiling expression on his face as he pondered the mountain of papers before him.

As I walked toward him, the attorney general rose from his chair and extended a firm hand for me to shake. "Sit down over here," he said. "There's something I want to discuss with you."

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United States airs its views on the French-Tunisian dispute over Bizerte today amid speculation whether it will answer a Soviet attack on U.S. military bases abroad.

Morozov unleashed his broadside against the West shortly after debate began Monday on Tunisia's demands that France withdraw her troops from the city of Bizerte and open negotiations to arrange a schedule for withdrawal of all French troops from Tunisia.

Morozov gave quick support to Tunisia's demands, then demanded liquidation of all foreign bases occupied by the West.

Tried for Neglect of Duty in Radar Tower Disaster

NEWBURGH, N.Y. (AP) — An Air Force colonel went before a court-martial today on charges of neglect of duty in the collapse of a Texas Tower that cost the lives of 28 Air Force men and civilians Jan. 15.

The formal charges were presented at the outset, and then the session was closed until at least 1 p.m. at the request of defense counsel, Thomas King, a civilian. Col. Jean F. Rydstrom, law officer, announced the closed session to hear preliminary motions.

On a pre-emptory challenge of the defense, one member of the board was dropped, reducing the board to eight members.

The member dropped was Col. James H. Gunn, commander of the 4600 Air Force Wing at Colorado Springs, Colo. The reason for the challenge was not made known immediately.

Col. William M. Banks, said on the eve of his trial that he was "confident of being exonerated."

"I have already pointed out that in the state of my knowledge at the time I acted properly, prudently and not in a manner derogatory of duty," he added.

Banks, who has a record of heroism in combat in World War II, is accused of ignoring reports of disaster to the Texas Tower staff of the New York Coast.

The court-martial, at Newburgh Air Force Base, will consider charges that Banks failed to keep himself advised of the threats of the storm in which the tower collapsed, to keep in touch with the officer in charge of the tower, and to hold himself in readiness for any action necessary to prevent the tower from falling.

The tower that collapsed was one of three set up off the Atlantic seaboard to sound warning of a possible enemy air attack.

Fisher Body Local 306 (UAW-CIO) of Pontiac voted yesterday 2,168 to 119 in favor of going on strike if local and national issues involved in negotiations for new contracts aren't settled by the contract deadline, Aug. 31.

The Fisher Body local is the first of Pontiac's three big United Auto Workers locals slated to hold strike votes this week.

More than 85 per cent of the local's members voted Sunday and yesterday, according to Gerald W. Kehoe, local president.

Pontiac Motor Local 453 will vote from 5 a.m. Thursday through 5 p.m. Friday. GMC Truck & Coach Local 594 will vote from 5 a.m. Wednesday to 5 a.m. Thursday.

Results of the votes could take effect if negotiations of local and national issues fail to reach a settlement.

Search for Killers in Wisconsin Dells

LYNDON STATION, Wis. (UPI) — One of the greatest manhunts in Wisconsin history fanned out over the famed Wisconsin Dells resort region today in search of two gunmen who killed a deputy sheriff and critically wounded a police chief.

More than 300 armed men, made up of law enforcement officers, National Guard soldiers and volunteers, combed the wooded and farmland area for the gunmen.

The fugitives have dodged capture since Monday morning following the shooting at nearby Lake Delton, Wis.

It was feared the gunmen might have staged a farm family as hostages.

A bus load of a dozen armed men made the rounds of farms in the area in hopes of uncovering the pair.

Several hundred other searchers beat through woods and fields. Authorities from all 29 counties were helping in the search for the gunmen.

Murder warrants were issued against the three men involved in the shooting.

The FBI identified one of the gunmen as William Joseph Weller, 33, of the Chicago area. The identity of the second gunman was not known.

In custody was Richard Nickl, 26, Prospect Heights, Ill. he had been with the other two men when Deputy Sheriff James Jantz, 26, Baraboo, was shot to death and Lake Delton Police Chief Eugene Robert Kohl, 46, was wounded.

Nickl was wounded in the flight from Lake Delton to the Lyndon Station area.

At first authorities believed Weller was with George Kriatovich, about 34, of the Chicago area. Nickl, Weller and Kriatovich had been linked together in past criminal activity and all are fugitives for other crimes. The FBI said.

However, the FBI said Kriatovich turned himself into the FBI office at Chicago last night.

Nehru Appeals to East, West

Urges Leaders to Seek Agreement to Settle Berlin Crisis

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prime Minister Nehru appealed today to "responsible leaders" on both sides of the conflict over Germany to confer in search of agreement.

Nehru, opening a foreign affairs debate in Parliament, said the Western Allies and West Germany must accept East Germany's present border, which gave Poland a large slice of prewar Germany.

"There is not the slightest chance in the world of changing those borders except by victory in a major war," Nehru said, "and any talk or hint of change only makes matters worse."

The Western Allies have refused to endorse the postwar German-Polish frontier, called the Oder-Neisse line, largely because it would give West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer a serious political setback at home.

Nehru said "one almost hears the drums of war" beating over the German issue. He said steps to lessen fear and suspicion on both sides are needed, and not the arming of both West and East Germany more and more.

"The only way to bring about unification peacefully," he continued, "is by increasing contacts between the two Germans in matters of trade and the like."

1962 Autos Inching Off Assembly Lines

DETROIT (AP) — The 1962 model automobiles began to trickle off assembly lines last week at General Motors and Studebaker-Packard plants. Chrysler and American Motors start up on 62s this week.

There was a note of cheer on the sales front as the 1962s got rolling. Ward's Automotive Reports estimated 100,000 1961s were sold in the first 10 days of August, compared with 75,000 units. The statistical agency predicted inventories would be down to a 19-month low of 65,000 compared with 188,000 on the same date a year ago.

New model assemblies started three weeks earlier this year than last, when new model production didn't get under way generally until after Labor Day.

Rights Action Poking Along

Southern Foes in Senate Fight Tacking Bill Onto Appropriation Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate, caught up in a dispute over civil rights legislation, appeared likely today to rock along for a while without any quick test of strength.

Efforts to throw open a \$781-million appropriations bill for the State and Justice departments to a batch of civil rights amendments ran into stiff opposition from Southern foes.

Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana told a reporter he did not know when a vote might be reached.

The scrap erupted Monday when Mansfield, with the backing of Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, moved to suspend the Senate rule barring legislation in an appropriations bill.

The purpose was to clear the way for tacking a two-year extension of the Civil Rights Commission on the appropriation bill up for Senate action. Suspension of the rules requires a two-thirds majority of the senators present and voting.

DUE TO EXPIRE

The commission, created in 1957 and extended for two years in 1959, is charged by law with investigating complaints of civil rights violations, particularly the denial of voting rights. It is due to expire Nov. 3.

Southern senators who fought establishment of the commission in the first place contend that its extension for a second time would be only a political move aimed at capturing Negro votes.

Even more objectionable to the Dixie "forces" were other civil rights measures offered as riders to the appropriation bill.

One of these, by Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., would provide for federal grants to assist schools that desegregate voluntarily in compliance with the Supreme Court's 1954 decision.
