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Championships a Way of Life

Championships became a way of life on the Oakland University campus last year for the Pioneers. The OU teams had many standout individual and team performances against Division II competition in the NCAA.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Coach Dewayne Jones had them running full steam all year long and the Lady Pioneers finished fourth in the NCAA Division II Basketball Championships in Springfield, Massachusetts last spring. They compiled an impressive 27-5 overall record and went undefeated in 16 Great Lakes Conference contests. Linda Krawford, Brenda McLean and Teresa Vondrasek were members of the GLIAC All-Conference team.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

Under the direction of coach Lee Frederick, the Pioneers were the nation's eighth best scoring machine, averaging 83 points per game. Those offensive numbers enabled OU to produce its winningest season ever with 18 victories. Frederick is expecting even more scoring this year and a possible NCAA bid that they barely missed last year.

MEN'S SWIMMING

Tradition is something that doesn't come easy and is hard to keep in a program. The men swimmers stayed true to form last year with a third place finish in the NCAA Division II Swimming Championships. They set several national records and 14 All-American honors were collected by 17 swimmers that competed in the meet. Tracy Huth was a national champion in the 200 and 400 yard individual medley that gave him the Division II Swimmer of the Year honor for the second straight year. Gordie Geheb and

Mark Vagle finished their careers by earning All-American honors in six events.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING

The Lady Pioneers are starting to build some tradition of their own and last year marked the start of a new dynasty. Coach Mark Johnston's squad finished third in the NCAA Division II Championships for women. Karen Enneking won national titles in three events (50, 100 and 200 yard breaststroke) and participated in two relays that won and finished second in another. Another individual standout back this year is Kathy VanValkenburg, who was a national champion in two events (50 yard backstroke and 100 yard individual medley) as well as swimming on the 200 yard medley relay championship team.

WRESTLING

John Craig and Gregg Mannino may be the two best wrestlers in the Great Lakes Conference. They posted a combined 72-12 record and were NCAA Division II qualifiers. Both will be looking for another championship crown this year and possible national honors as well.

FALL, 1982

Coach Gary Parsons soccer team took the world by surprise and went to the NCAA Division II Soccer Championships final four last fall. OU's soccer men, ranked as high as fourth this year with a 14-4-4 record, used a potent offense and deadly defensive play to post one of the school's all-time best finishes. Senior sweeper back Lou Vulovich, who was drafted by the Major Indoor Soccer League's Phoenix Inferno in the second round, was selected to play in the Senior bowl (a collegiate all-star game) this winter.

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MEN'S BASKETBALL — Head Coach Lee Frederick

Lee Frederick has dedicated himself to making Oakland University a standout athletic program. He's accomplished a lot in the past seven years and finally turned the corner with men's basketball last season by registering a 18-9 record, the best in the school's short athletic history.

Serving as an assistant athletic director along with his coaching duties, Frederick posted the school's first winning season since 1973-74. The road hasn't been easy for the 38-year-old Frederick, who has a master's degree in psychology, as the Pioneers hit record breaking heights last year.

"We have tried to bring players in that make sense for Oakland University," Frederick said. "So far, my coaching staff has tried to build something that will be stable and not one of those fly-by-night programs."

It's evident that Frederick's program is working as he enters the 1982-83 campaign with his best group of players ever. He welcomes back eight veterans and four outstanding recruits, including point guard James Tubman from Baltimore, Maryland.

"We pretty much have stayed with our program plans," Frederick said. "The upperclassmen have really developed and our young freshman and sophomores are going to help us. Hopefully, everything will fall right and we'll be fighting for a conference championship."

It's been a long time since any coach has mentioned conference championship in basketball at Oakland University and Frederick's long range plan of bringing a conference contender to Oakland seems to be working.

WRESTLING — Head Coach Jack Gebauer

Entering his fourth season as Oakland University's wrestling head coach, Jack Gebauer has brought respect and tradition to a program that has existed for eight years.

Prior to arriving at OU, Gebauer guided the high school programs at Waterford Kettering and Bishop Foley to a combined 70-32 record.

A star wrestler and football player at Cincinnati, Gebauer completed his bachelor's degree at Northern Michigan.

The 35-year-old Gebauer earned his master's degree at OU and developed an appreciation for the scholastic standards of the institution.

"After receiving my master's I knew what a fine academic program Oakland had," Gebauer said. "I wanted to make high school seniors aware of where they can go and get a fine education and wrestling program rolled into one. It has taken three years to let everyone know about the caliber of our program."

Gebauer's squad went 7-7 in dual meets last year against some

of the top wrestling powers in the nation. That moved his career mark to 20-23-1 with OU. The Pioneers, who compete in the Great Lakes Conference, finished fourth in Great Lake Conference action while facing three GLIAC teams that cracked the nation's top twenty.

Nationally, OU finished eighth in the NCAA Division II Midwest Regional and 30th in the entire NCAA Division II Wrestling Championships.

Among Gebauer's greatest recruits was bringing two-time Oklahoma standout Maaska Hatta, a national champion as his assistant coach.

"Maaska was and still is my best recruit," Gebauer said. "I feel there isn't a better coach in the entire country."

With Hatta's help, eight returning lettermen and a strong recruiting season, Gebauer feels the Pioneers will be conference contenders this winter and draw some more national attention.



MEN'S SWIMMING — Head Coach Pete Hovland

Whenever Pete Hovland gets near a swimming pool, success is soon to follow.

A 23-time All-American at Chico State, Hovland has continued the outstanding work of his predecessors, Corey Van Fleet and Ernie Maglischo, in coaching the Oakland University men's swimming and diving team to successful seasons. In his first season as men's head coach last year, Hovland directed the Pioneers to a third-place finish in the NCAA Division II Swimming and Diving Championships. It marked the ninth time in a row that OU had finished among the top seven in national competition.

The California native took over the top position after serving as Maglischo's assistant and coaching the OU women's team one year. Hovland came to OU with Maglischo and helped the coaching legend guide the Pioneers to the 1980 national championship and a second place finish the following year.

Hovland took over the reins several months later after Maglischo left OU to enter teaching at Chico State where he had produced four national championship teams.

While swimming for Maglischo at Chico State from 1972-76,

Hovland won five national titles, participated in eight national title winning relays and was named 1977 Far Western Conference Swimmer of the Year and Chico State Swimming Athlete of the Decade.

Hovland earned his bachelor's degree in physical education from Chico State in 1977 and his master's from Northern Iowa in 1979. He gained some extra coaching background at both schools.

A devoted believer in Maglischo's proven methods of winning swimming championships, Hovland will be experimenting with some of his own training ideas this year.

"Our goal as always is to go after the national title," Hovland said. "This year we are going to put a little more emphasis on winning other meets rather than just using them to prepare for nationals."

Regardless of Hovland's training techniques for the 1982-83 season, the Pioneers will be blazing come time for the national meet. It's a tradition Hovland inherited with the job.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING — Head Coach Mark Johnston

The women's swimming and diving team has finally moved out of the shadows of the men swimmers thanks to head coach Mark Johnston.

Last season, in his first year at OU, the 25-year-old Birmingham, Michigan native convinced the Pioneers of their ability and guided them to a third place finish in the NCAA Division II Swimming Championships for women.

Before Johnston arrived, OU was struggling against tough company in the AIAW Division I ranks against the largest, best-funded programs in the nation while the OU men were taking all of the glory in the Division II ranks, a level more suited to OU's size.

Johnston's goal was "to come from behind the shadow of the (OU) guys." The high national finish accomplished that goal in fine fashion.

"We stole that meet from everyone," Johnston said. "We weren't worried with how we finished, we just wanted to race as hard as we could."

The Pioneer achievement was put together with only nine women, a remarkable feat considering 18 qualifiers are allowed from each school. All nine of the Pioneers at nationals earned All-American status including junior sensation Karen Enneking, who won all three breaststroke events. Johnston considers her one of

the best breaststroke specialists, regardless of competition level in the nation.

One of the reasons the Pioneers were so successful in national competition at the Division II level was Johnston's emphasis on swimming against Division I opponents in dual meets and sacrificing wins for experience. The Pioneers were 6-5 in dual meets last year, but peaked for the important NCAA meet.

"Winning is always relative," Johnston said. "If you lose to a school like Michigan by 20 points, but your swimmers all had their best times, then I think you have won."

Johnston, a standout runner and swimmer at Birmingham Brother Rice High School, began coaching in the Birmingham AAU swimming and diving program after a leg injury cut short a promising track career at Michigan. During his senior year, he served as an assistant coach for the Michigan women's swimming and diving team. Johnston came to OU after earning his bachelor's in business and economics.

Johnston, who took over for Pete Hovland, is looking for an even better season this campaign. With only two more spots on the ladder to go, Johnston looks like he has an eye on a national championship at Oakland University this year and out of the men's shadows forever.



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL — Head Coach Dewayne Jones

In just two seasons at Oakland University, women's basketball coach Dewayne Jones has compiled a 47-14 record, guided the Pioneers to a Great Lakes Conference title, taken a trip to the NCAA Division II final four and earned the respect and admiration of many across the nation.

Last year's Great Lakes and Michigan Basketball Advisory Council's Coach-of-the-Year, Jones' dedication and coaching style has OU knocking on the door of a national championship for the first time since men's swimming won it all in 1980.

A Northern Michigan University graduate, Jones began his coaching career at Ferndale, his high school alma mater. From

1976-80, his women's and men's squads racked up a combined 67-30 record.

Jones and his assistant Patti Graves have molded the Pioneers into one of the most prolific scoring machines in the Division II ranks. This collection of talent ranks with the best in OU history and for the first time since he began coaching the Pioneers, Jones has a squad that includes seniors on the roster.

"There's more balance with this team than any team I've coached before," Jones said. "They're good athletes, they work hard and they enjoy the game."

With Jones at the helm, it isn't hard to understand why.

Oakland Hopes Running Game Brings Success in '83 Season

Oakland University finally turned the tables after all those losing seasons last year with a run and gun offense. The Pioneers, who graduated just two starters, finished with an 18-9 record to post their best mark ever.

Coach Lee Frederick welcomes back the nucleus of the 1981-82 unit which finished eighth in NCAA Division II team scoring (83.1) and one of the finest recruiting classes in the school's history. Frederick hopes to blend his eight returnees with four highly-regarded freshmen to continue playing a style of basketball that resembles Nevada-Las Vegas' high scoring attack.

The key to the running game is veteran co-captain Mike Mohn. A starter in a school record 54 games, he finished last year as the team's fourth leading scorer and third best rebounder. Those statistics are misleading because he was forced to play in the shadow of graduated forwards, Rich Brauer and Bill Peterson. In addition to his forward duties, Frederick will not hesitate to shift the 6-7 junior to any position on the floor, including the point guard spot.

The Pioneer triggering the fast break for Oakland will be junior Larry Lubitz, a 6-7 center who topped the team in rebounding (7.5) and then was the second leading scorer (15.1).

"Lubitz had a great off season and most of our fans won't even recognize him," Frederick said. "His improvement in quickness and effectiveness will be a tremendous help to our program."

This year the Pioneers find themselves knocking on the Great Lakes Conference championship door because of their offensive firepower. They figure to be quicker than ever with 5-7 freshman spark plug, James "Pop" Tubman running the attack.

Frederick feels Tubman will raise Oakland to its highest level ever. Tubman has been doing things that even his coach can't believe he's doing as a freshman. A point guard on the nation's number one prep team, Tubman helped pilot Calvert Hall in Baltimore, Maryland to an undefeated 34-0 season.

Considered too small to play major college basketball, he has dispelled those thoughts quickly with his lightning fast play during pre-season drills.

"Without a doubt, Pop will be one of the most exciting players in the league," Frederick said. "He'll enable us to maintain our goal of scoring lots of points each night out."

Tubman, Mohn and Lubitz all appear assured of starting nods on opening day against Northeastern Illinois November 23, but the off guard and small forward positions appear up for grabs with veterans being pushed by freshmen for playing time. A pair of quick freshmen are giving senior co-captain Tom Blythe all he can handle right now.

Blythe is receiving stiff competition from Chris Howze and Randy Strunk for the vacated forward spot. Howze led Orchard Lake St. Mary's to the Michigan Class C-State championship last year and Strunk averaged 14 points and 12 rebounds per game to pace Stevensville Lakeshore High School to a 48-5 ledger over the last two seasons. Both players are pressing for playing time because of their quickness.

At shooting guard, the Pioneers have some question marks that need to be solved. Craig Tonti, regarded as the team's best outside shooter, will be tested by part-time starter Craig Mitchell and Class B all-state performer Rob Skinner. Mitchell, who endured an injury riddled freshman season, has the best shot of overtaking Tonti. Skinner figures to see playing time at off guard and as a back-up point guard.

"Our ability to fill the gaps left by graduation and general improvement of our veterans over the summer should help us," Frederick said. "I feel like this is the first time since I've been here that we will be in the hunt for the conference championship."

With the Pioneers in the "hunt", Lepley Arena should be an interesting, exciting place to watch college basketball in 1982-83.

Women's Basketball Points Towards NCAA Tournament

A puzzle. By dictionary definition a puzzle, as a toy, is purposely arranged so as to require, time, patience and ingenuity to solve its intricacies.

When putting together a basketball team, in particular the Oakland University basketball team, the puzzle is to put together a cohesive unit to play in a style fitting its skills.

Three-year head coach Dewayne Jones has the puzzle put together in grand style. Last season he directed the Pioneers, 27-5 overall, to the NCAA final four of the national tournament in Springfield, Mass. by putting the puzzle intact before losing to Tuskegee Institute in the semi-finals.

Jones is looking to duplicate that feat again this campaign. With the entire puzzle still intact, Oakland University figures to make a run at the national championship.

The key to the Pioneers success is their fast shooting offense that averaged 79.5 points per game and was second in the nation in scoring. OU should hover near those numbers again with all five starters returning and its four top reserves ready to burn the nets.

"We make the transition real well," Jones said. "We're not afraid to run with anybody and our people will put up 70-75 shots per game this year. All five of the starters have the green light to shoot at any time."

Heading the list of returnees coming back for Jones are seniors Teresa Vondrasek (Owosso) and Linda Krawford (Detroit Lutheran West), sophomore center Brenda McLean (Marysville), point guard Gwen Browner (Detroit Henry Ford) and off guard junior Pam Springer (Temperance).

The entire Pioneer frontline was selected to the Great Lakes Conference All-League team. Krawford, Vondrasek, and McLean supplied most of the OU firepower as it posted a perfect 16-0 conference ledger.

Krawford, a quick 5-10 forward, averaged 19.1 points and 11.7 rebounds last season to rank first in the conference and 21st nationally in scoring. Regarded as the premier player in the league,

Krawford has improved her overall game even more during the off season.

A former two-time NCAA National Champion in Judo, Vondrasek tossed in 10.6 points and 9.5 rebounds per game while playing the best defense on the team at forward.

Rounding out the trio of All-Conference performers is McLean. The 6-0 center made the All-Tournament team and came into her own during the NCAA festivities. She collected 14.4 points and 10.7 rebounds a contest.

The glue keeping the puzzle together is Browner. The unselfish 5-3 speedster dished out 165 assists and picked up 84 steals, topping the team in both categories. Her strongest asset is her ability to get the ball out on the break quickly.

Springer started all 32 games last year and finished with a 7.9 scoring average. Jones hopes the 5-8 backcourt player can draw more fouls this season. She managed just six free throws attempts last campaign.

A pair of seniors, Kelly Kenny (Utica) and Anne Kish (Bloomfield Hills), sophomores Anya Williams (Detroit Henry Ford) and Kimberly Nash (Trenton) also are being counted on to contribute to the OU cause.

Jones recruited three players to complement the returning veterans. Kimberly McCartha (Detroit Cooley), Sue Mausolf (Harbor Beach) and Joanne Mecoli (Berkley) will wait in the wings as Jones has the chance to bring them along slowly.

As the season opener comes up on December 1 at Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Jones has two goals in mind this year.

"We would like to win our conference and go to the NCAA tournament one more time," Jones said. "We don't have any guarantee we can make it to the finals again, but our players know what it takes to get there."

The puzzle is almost together. It just needs a caption on it reading, 1982-83 National Champions.

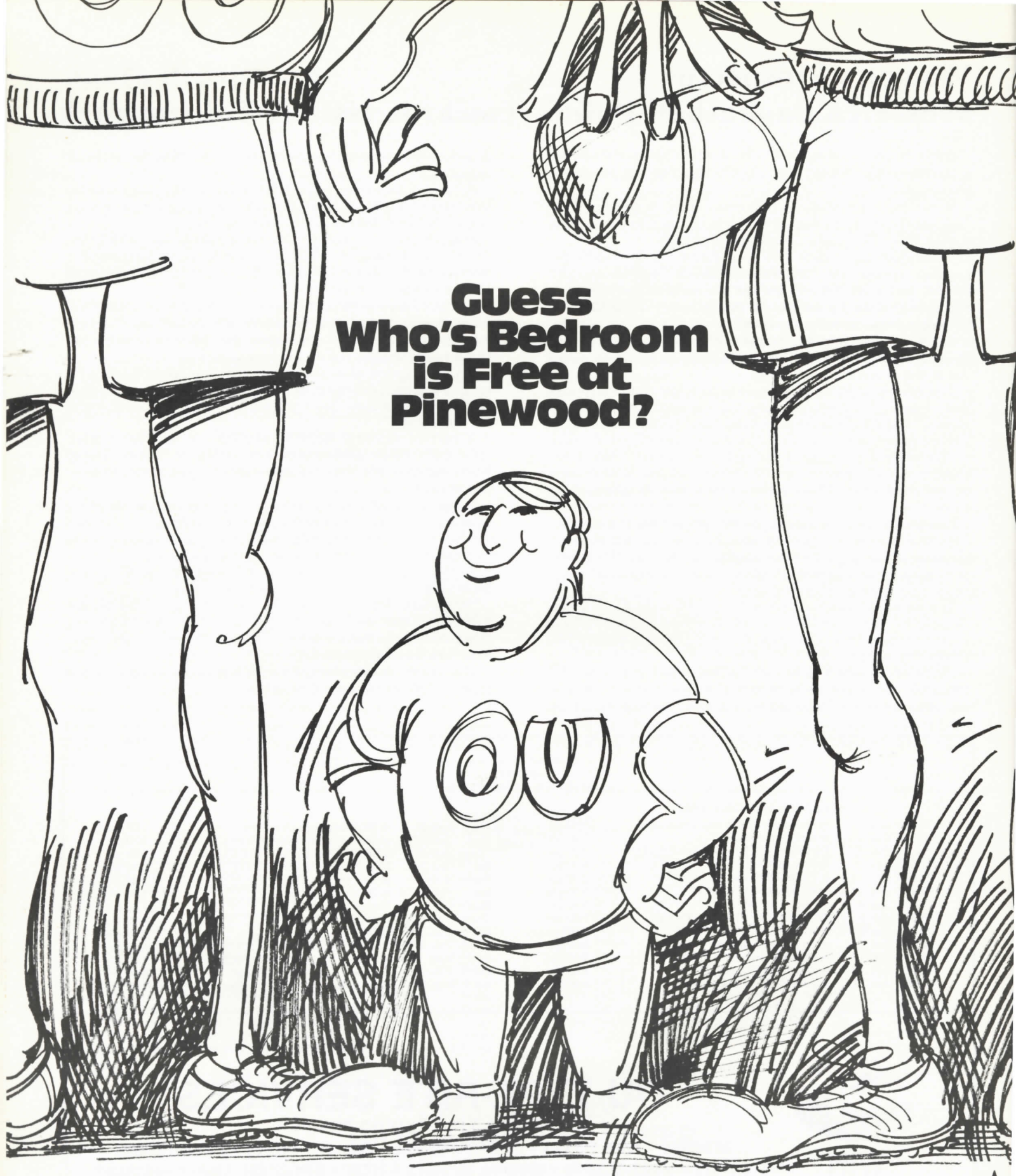
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National Status a Swimming Tradition

Winning swimming meets is a tradition at Oakland University. The Pioneer swimming and diving squad has broken into the nation's elite and stayed there for eight years.

The Pioneers won it all in 1980, finished second twice and captured third for the third time last year in the NCAA Division II championship meet. They have also registered no finish lower than fifth in the last eight years.

One of the major reasons for the success nationally the last few years is Tracy Huth, a 12-time All-American and NCAA Division II Swimmer-of-the-Year. The standout Pioneer is a two-time national champion in both the 200 and 400 yard individual medley and was a member of the nation's top 800 yard freestyle relay team.

Huth and company hope to bring OU a national championship in swimming this year. In order for the Pioneers to obtain their lofty goal, Huth will have to receive some help from eleven veterans returning, including five members of the All-American team last year.

"Our goal as always is to go after the national title," head coach Pete Hovland said. "I feel we are as strong as we were last year."

Hovland hopes to overcome the graduation losses of Brian Brink, Gordon Gehab and Mark Vagle with a strong group of newcomers.

A pair of prep All-Americans, Jeff Colton and Brian Michalik, figure to crack the NCAA qualifying standard and be a factor in OU's effort to win a national championship. Along with those two talented freshman, classmate Phil Zupic should improve the butterfly events for the Pioneers.

Along with Huth's superb accomplishments in the NCAA meet last year, Alan Faust turned in All-American honors in both butterfly events and Mike Schmidt was a three time All-American.

Hovland hopes to again reach the top three in the NCAA Division II swimming ranks. The Pioneers have high standards to follow, but with OU's tradition and performers like Huth swimming as well as ever, it could be another successful year of championship level swimming.

Tankers Set for Banner Season

Oakland University has some lofty goals in mind this season for head coach Mark Johnston's swimmers. The Pioneers will be shooting for an even higher finish than a year ago when they took third-place in the NCAA Division II Championships.

Johnston's first edition brought an unexpected success to Oakland. Those Pioneers placed nine swimmers on the All-American honor roll last year. Senior Tammy McGinnis, juniors Karen Enneking and Patty Doherty, sophomores Kathy VanValkenburg and Jackie Parks are the key veterans returning that shined last year. Junior diver Mary Vincent also returns to man the spring boards with grace.

"This is without a question the best OU women's swimming team in the school's history," Johnston said. "They are all winners and each swimmer has the ability to set new school records anytime they enter the pool. I'm looking for some great things this year and I've got some good recruits to push the returnees."

Johnston's optimism about this campaign is for good reason. He welcomes back seven returnees and eight freshmen that should more than compensate for graduation setbacks.

Enneking is the franchise. A sensational breaststroker, the junior copped three breaststroke NCAA crowns and is unbeaten in 23 straight collegiate dual meets in her speciality.

Along with Enneking, Johnson expects scoring out of VanValkenburg. The NCAA champion in the 50 yard backstroke and 100 yard individual medley, VanValkenburg must battle staying fit more than anything else.

On the diving boards, Vincent gave OU its best performances ever on the boards. She finished third in the one meter and eighth in three meter diving. With added experience of the NCAA atmosphere under her belt, Vincent should be one of the nation's best this season.

Others expected to challenge in their events for national honors are McGinnis (distance medley), Parks (freestyle), and Patty

Doherty (sprinter). All three have improved their times since last year and look ready to mature as collegiate swimmers.

A bumper crop of newcomers will also make the Pioneers even more dangerous to compete against. Freshman Linda Scott, a product of the OU Live Yers program, figures to qualify nationally in the butterfly and middle distance freestyle events. Johnston figures the relay squads should be improved enough to keep them challenging for the national titles. OU captured two relays last year and finished second in another.

"She's an exceptional swimmer and I'm looking for some great achievements from her," Johnston said. "We beat out Michigan for her and she could turn in some remarkable times in the next four years."

Several newcomers are expected to help this year. Hope College transfer Sarah Stanwood, who was a national champion in the 200 yard individual medley among NCAA Division III competitors last year, Michigan All-State performers Kim Pogue and Jennifer Hodgson and sleepers Carmen Houtman, Teresa Asher, Michelle Trudeau and Becky Hush will help OU.

"I'm really impressed with our newcomers," Johnston said. "I've attempted to recruit racers and they have reinforced our feeling of confidence. Quality and versatility appear to be our strengths."

The Pioneers play a tough schedule that surely will season them for the NCAA Division II Swimming Championships. OU faces top notch competition from Michigan, Michigan State, Eastern Michigan, Western Michigan, Wright State and Northern Michigan.

Goals are sometimes hard to reach, but at OU it looks like Johnston has the swimmers ready to reach those goals of a national championship.

It will also take them from out of the shadows of the successful men swimmers and you can bet Johnston will enjoy that day.

Grapplers challenges for conference crown

This looks like a great year for head coach Jack Gebauer's grapplers. After annexing two championships in the Great Lakes Conference last year, the Pioneers are looking to challenge for championships in four weight classes.

"We are as tough as any Oakland wrestling team I've ever had here," Gebauer said. "This is a tough region and our goal is to win the league championship so we can compete in the NCAA Mideast Regional."

Gebauer appears to have the personnel necessary to reach those goals. It won't be easy for an Oakland squad sporting just two seniors, but they figure to have their share of fun in at least four weight classes.

The nucleus for this Pioneer wrestling edition rests with two holdovers and two transfers. Gregg Mannino and John Craig have the ability to defend their conference championships and two newcomers, Brad Wilkerson and Matt Vandrosek, appear capable of knocking on the door of a conference title.

Mannino, a 167 pound junior, turned the trick twice on the national champion Mike Cribbs last year, but came up empty when NCAA titles were being passed out to Cribbs. This year Mannino is primed and ready to claim a NCAA championship. He posted a 35-6 record last season.

Another championship caliber wrestler is Craig. The GLIAC's champion at 134 last year, he is ready to defend his title for the third straight year. Some added confidence and experience should propel him even higher in the national standings.

If the Pioneers hope to improve on their fourth place conference finish, eighth place in the Mideast Region and 30th nationally, some help must come from the newcomers.

The junior college ranks were the proving grounds for Wilkerson and Vandrosek last year. Wilkerson notched sixth-place overall in the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Wrestling Championships and Vandrosek failed to place after qualifying. Gebauer feels they are capable of holding their own against GLIAC competition.

Gebauer must rely on some great improvement from the rest of his wrestlers to have a national championship caliber team. Veterans like juniors Tim Zipple (177), a transfer from Michigan State, and Keith Patton (190) will play major factors in how much OU improves in the conference.

A severe blow was handed Gebauer when heavyweight Bob Warnke left the team. Gebauer has the option of putting Patton up one more class or playing freshman Steve King.

King won't be the only freshman being counted on this year by Gebauer. Scott Manross (118 or 126), Clayton Faw (150) and Mike Umin (158) can be expected to see plenty of action. Gebauer is hoping they will be surprisingly effective by conference championships time.

Gebauer does feel his players peaked too early last year and precautions have been taken to eliminate the problem.

"We are going to wrestle all our people one weight higher until January," Gebauer said. "We peaked early last year for conference championship and it showed in the NCAA Regionals. This time they'll peak around tournament time."

It will be an interesting year for the proven veterans like Craig and Mannino and the freshman, but the Pioneers will be in the thick of the conference race.

Any team with a Craig or Mannino couldn't help it.

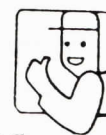

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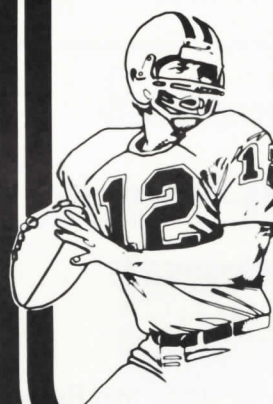

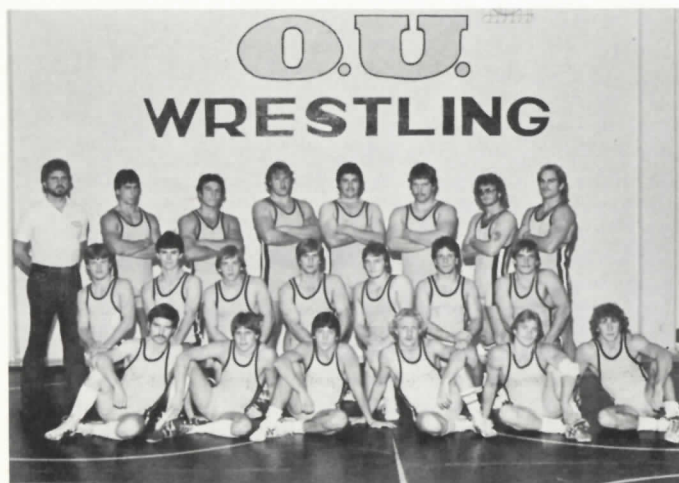

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Total enrollment approaches 12,000 students, most of whom commute from the surrounding counties of Oakland, Macomb, and Wayne. More than 1900 students live on campus in modern residence hall facilities. The 1500-acre campus houses not only an extensive complex of academic buildings, but also the Meadow Brook Theatre, Meadow Brook Art Gallery, and Meadow Brook Hall, a 100-room Tudor mansion used as a cultural and conference center. The campus, through the Meadow Brook Music Festival, is the summer home of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra. The Katke-Cousins 18-hole championship golf course is also located on the campus. Approximately one-half million people visit Oakland University each year to participate in the activ-

ties sponsored by the institution's educational, cultural and recreational centers.

All academic programs of the university are accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. In addition, most professional programs are accredited by their respective professional associations. The university faculty of nearly 400 scholars has distinguished itself in many areas of instruction, research, and service. Approximately 85 percent of the full-time faculty possess an earned doctoral degree. Research and development play a major role in the university with external support exceeding \$3 million per year. Public service is a growing and vital dimension of the university with new and effective community/university and industry/university partnerships being formed.

The university was founded in 1957 when the late Matilda R. and Alfred G. Wilson donated their 1500-acre estate and \$2 million to Michigan State University to begin a new college in Oakland County. Named Michigan State University-Oakland, the new campus enrolled its first students in 1959. In 1963 the name was changed to Oakland University, and in 1970 the State Legislature recognized the maturity and stature of Oakland and granted the university its independence. The governor appointed Oakland's first Board of Trustees in fall 1970.

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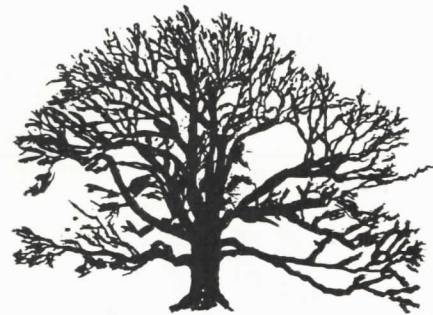

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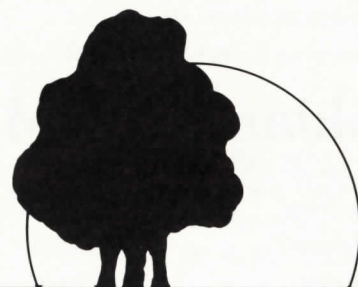
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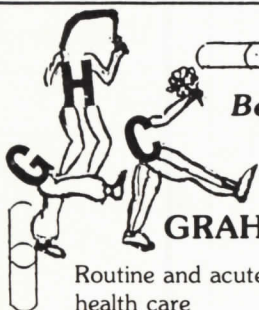
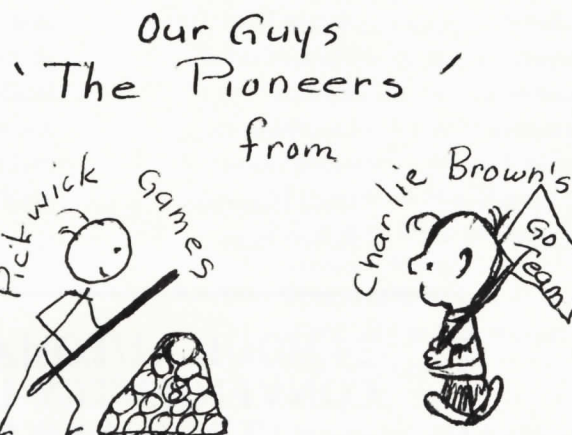
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Oakland 100 A True Asset To Pioneer Basketball

ROCHESTER, MI - Involvement in projects of community interest is something Bill Potere, Tom Varner, Bill Fox and Dr. Dick Somerlott all have in common.

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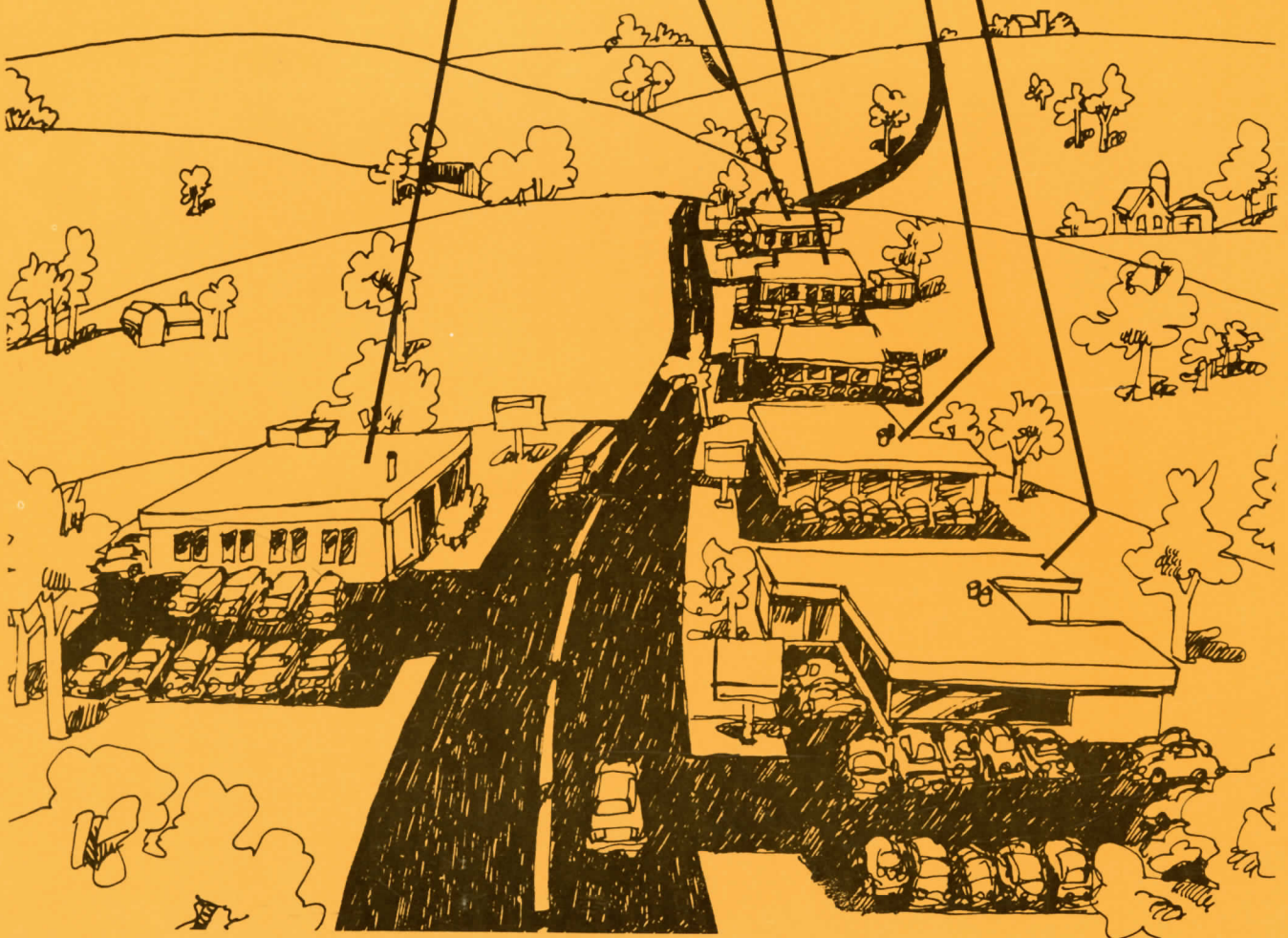
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
