MESSAGE TO UNIVERSITY FROM PRESIDENT O'DOWD

"The Constitution of the University Senate specifies that the president should give a 'State of the University' address in either the fall or winter semester of each academic year. Although I have reported to the university recently on a range of

problems and concerns that now face us, I still wish to make the specified formal address this spring.

However, because of the uncertainties surrounding budgetary, curricular and enrollment problems, I would like to delay formulating some statements on the university and its future until early May. Many activities are underway concerning each of these problems, and the next few weeks should bring more clarity and information on a number of important items.

This departure from the stipulated schedule will give me an opportunity to be more informative and, I believe, more optimistic in my annual review of the university status. The exact date of the talk will be announced later this month."

COMMISSION RECOMMENDS UNICAMERAL SYSTEM A proposal for a new internal governing body has been submitted to the University community by Governance Commission II. The special commission, chaired by President O'Dowd, recommends that the university adopt a modified unicameral system of

governance. The new University Council would have 65 members and would replace the existing University Senate, Administrative-Professional Assembly and University Congress. The 65 representatives would include 30 faculty members, 20 students, 10 A-Ps and five other staff representing clerical-technical personnel, hourly employees and police officers. The recommendation is currently before the existing governance groups for advisory opinions. If there is support for the proposal, it will be submitted to the various constituencies for referenda.

Under the new system, the Council would absorb most of the powers of the existing governing groups, but some powers would be reserved for some groups on campus. For instance, the faculty members of the body would have sole responsibility for recommending academic standing and honors, faculty research grants and graduation lists. Student members would be responsible for regulation of student organizations and dispersal of student activity fees.

SENATE APPROVES TWO PROGRAMS Two undergraduate degree programs in elementary education and in human resources development were approved by the OU Senate in a final vote, Thursday, April 5. The two programs will be presented to the OU Board of Trustees for that body's approval.

The new degree programs would be administered under auspices of the School of Education. Implementation for the human resources development degree program is sought for the fall of 1973. In the case of the elementary education program, implementation of the programmatic change is sought for the fall of 1974; in the meantime, students can proceed on the current B.A. program in elementary education.

Laid over until the Thursday, April I2 OU Senate meeting was a proposal to establish a Center for Community and Human Development. In other actions, a first reading was given to a proposal to offer four hours of credit for armed forces service and to offer credit for courses completed in the various armed forces schools and through the United States Armed Forces Institute.

### LEARNING SKILLS EXAM SCHEDULED FOR THURSDAY

A learning skills exam will be held Thursday, April 19 from 3-5 p.m. in the Sunset Room, Oakland Center. The exam is offered for: students not enrolled in learning skills who wish to secure proficiency for the graduation requirement; students cur-

rently enrolled in LS 100 who wish to try for proficiency at the end of one semester of learning skills without the recommendation of the instructor; students in LS 101 who have determined in consultation with the instructor that they will not be recommended for proficiency but who wish to take the exam as an alternative route; and students taking LS 075 or LS 050 who wish to be considered for proficiency. Pre-registration is not necessary.
