JAZZ TALK TODAY

A noted social historian will perform a labor of love this afternoon (Monday) when he gives a slide- and record-illustrated talk on "Masterpieces of Traditional Jazz" at 2 p.m. in the Oakland Center Gold Room. The speaker will be Professor Larry Gara of Wilmington (Ohio) College, a well known American historian who has published in the area of his avocation, jazz, as well as his main historical interest. The two-hour talk will feature selections by Jimmy Yancey, King Oliver's Creole Jazz Band, Bessie Smith, the Johnny Dodds Washboard Band, Jelly Roll Morton and His Red Hot Peppers, Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Fats Waller, Jack Teagarden, Tommy Ladnier, Muggsy Spanier's Ragtime Band, Kid Ory's Creole Jazz Band, Lester Young With the Kansas City Five, Billie Holliday, Pee Wee Russell with Buck Clayton, and Coleman Hawkins.

VAN FLEET CHOSEN

1969-70 MEADOW BROOK THEATRE SEASON WILL OPEN NEXT WEEK

The John Fernald Company of the Meadow Brook Theatre will begin its new season on Thursday, October 16, with a performance of two short plays, Edward Albee's *The American Dream* and Peter Shaffer's *Black Comedy*. Scheduled for premiere night are a reception and dinner preceding the plays and an afterglow for members of the company and reception guests, both to be held in Sunset Terrace. Like all of this season's offerings, the opening double bill will be staged at Meadow Brook Theatre for four weeks (through November 2) and then will be presented in the theatre of the Detroit Institute of Arts for one week (November 5-9).

Other plays this season are *The Cocktail Party* by T. S. Eliot (November 13-December 7), *Pygmalion* by George Bernard Shaw (December 11-January 11), *Hedda Gabler* by Henrik Gibson (January 15-February 8), *The Castle* by Franz Kafka (February 12-March 8), *Summer and Smoke* by Tennessee Williams (March 12-April 5), *The Cherry Orchard* by Anton Chekov (April 9-May 3), and *Ah Wilderness!* by Eugene O'Neill (May 7-31).

COPPOLA EDITS JOURNAL Carlo Coppola (modern languages) is serving as editor of *Mahfil*, a quarterly of South Asian literature published by the MSU Asian Studies Center. In recent issues Coppola has written articles in the journal on annual awards of India's national academy of letters, a review of a study of medieval Indian mystic poet Kabir, and interviews with three of India's leading writers. Another *Mahfil* article was written by Peter Bertocci (sociology and anthropology) entitled "The Intellectuality of N. C. Chaudhuri."

HIGH SCHOOLS HONORED OU's academic achievement awards for 1968-69 were presented last week to Rochester High School and Detroit's Henry Ford High School. The competition annually honors high schools whose graduates have earned the highest averages at OU. The freshman award, won by Rochester, is based on the highest first year grade averages of any five graduates of a particular high school. The senior award, claimed by Henry Ford, is based on the highest four-year averages of any three graduates.

GIBSON ADDRESSES PARLEY Dean John E. Gibson (engineering) addressed the International Congress of Transportation and Communications in Genoa, Italy, last week, sharing keynote address honors with U.S. Secretary of Transportation John Volpe. Gibson spoke on the need to apply the skills and resources of American technology to cure the problems of the city, rather than to place a man on Mars.
