

#### A MODEL OF GOOD HEALTH

For the past four summers, Oakland
University undergraduate students
participating in the Research Experience for
Undergraduates program supervised by
Department of Mathematics and Statistics
professors Anna Spagnuolo and Meir Shillor
have helped develop, analyze and digitally



simulate mathematical models for the spread of Chagas disease.

Their work, funded by the National Science Foundation, addresses this parasitic affliction affecting 8-10 million people in rural parts of Central and South America. Currently, there is no cure for the disease once it becomes chronic.

The mathematical models this team is creating may lead to improved strategies used in insecticide spraying, which is used to control the "kissing bug" population that spreads the disease. This important work may eventually protect and improve the quality of countless human lives and has been highlighted in numerous academic journals.

Associate Professor of Psychology
Martha Escobar and colleagues from the
University of Alabama and Tuskegee
University recently were awarded an
approximately \$1.2 million National Science
Foundation Grant to support their project to
help African American girls from rural
school districts successfully complete the AP

Computer Science Principles course.

In the process, the girls will also explore career options in the computer science field, which presently maintains a severely low representation rate for this targeted demographic.

Within days of learning of this grant award, Dr. Escobar also received word of a grant approval through the National Science Foundation's Alliances for Graduate Education and the Professoriate program to support her project to promote the development of junior faculty at historically black colleges and universities. These are among six grants Dr. Escobar has received in the last three years!

#### LEADING LIBRARY SCIENCE

American Libraries, the magazine of the American Library Association, recently selected the work of OU School of Education and Human Services alumna and Kresge Library Associate Professor Amanda Nichols Hess, Ph.D., as one of eight dissertations nationally to hold the greatest potential to advance library best practices.

In "From Information Experts to Expert Educators? Academic Librarians' Experiences with Perspective Transformation and Their Teaching Identities," Dr. Nichols Hess explores the ways in which academic librarians see teaching as a part of their professional



identity and create opportunities for professional growth – not only for themselves but also for fellow librarians.

Dr. Nichols Hess was commended for addressing practical implications for prominent library issues through quantitative, qualitative, and mixed-method research approaches. Her innovative academic work and her dissertation have been adapted and published as a book – Transforming Academic Library Instruction: Shifting Practices to Reflect Changed Perspectives.
