Legal Information Service Established

In recognition of the need for free, readily available legal information for students, Commuter Council submitted a Legal Aid Information Service proposal to the Oakland University Board of Trustees in October, 1973 for consideration. It was approved December 1, 1973. This service, a satellite organization of the Oakland County Legal Aid Society, will be initiated January 21 of this year.

This program is precedented by a similar attempt to establish a legal information service on campus. Initiated Fall, 1972, and abandoned the following semester because of a myriad of complications, the precedent program provided information to students in a all areas of legal consideration but primarily counseled draft, tenancy, and traffic violation problems.

DEAN WOODARD TO SPEAK

COMMUNITY DIAL-OG

The third in Commuter Services' continuing series of Community Dialogs will feature Doug Woodard, Dean for Student Life. Dean Woodare is professionally and personally concerned about the relationship between the student and the University, as an organization and as a viable community. Dean feels that students should be encouraged to learn from, and enjoy those "life experiences" which the University can offer beyond classroom instruction. Further, Dean Woodard offers an enlightening historical perspective as well as an innovative future orientation concerning student-university interaction.

The dialog, which will take place in Lounge II of the Oakland Center (near southwest entrance), at 12:30 p.m., January 11, will give students an opportunity to ask questions and contribute ideas.

In discussing the discontinuance of the previous program, Student Life Dean Doug Woodard cited the major issue as being that the previous program possibly went beyond the limits of state law.

"We were informed by the University attorney that it was his opinion that the informing students of legal alternatives was not an information service, as we saw it, but rather the practice of law. Therefore," according to Woodard, "in order to be sure we were within the limits of the law, we asked Oakland County Legal Aid Society to set up a satellite operation on our campus using law students."


"The law students," he continued, "still will only provide information about alternatives and in no way will a law student represent a student in a case."

The present program, supervised by Ms. Dorothy Cottrell and Mr. Steve Bernstein of the Oakland County Legal Aid Society, is funded by Commuter Council and coordinated by Commuter Council and Commuter Services. An intern attorney will be available approximately fifteen hours per week to provide information on legal alternatives in any legal problem a student may face.

Appointments may be made at the Office of Commuter Services, 118 Oakland Center.

The dialog series, set up by Bruce Campbell, will continue to facilitate student-university interaction by means of personal contact and unintimidated conversation between students and selected University officials. Bruce hopes to have Assistant President for Campus Development, Glen Brown, discuss parking problems in the near future. He would also like to have another dialog appearance by President O'Dowd later this year.

PIONFFRS WIN TWO ONE IN HOLIDAY TOURNAMENT LOSE

The Oakland varsity upped its record to 9-2 by winning two of three games at the six team Marshall Optimist Classic last weekend.

The Pioneers defeated Albion College in the first round of play at Marshall. Oakland broke away early in the game and had a 37-12 lead at one point which grew to a 55-31 score at halftime. Albion chipped away in the second half and closed the gap to 76-69 before Oakland senior Walt Johnson sank four free throws in the last minute to put the game away. Johnson led all scorers with 25 points. Pioneer seniors Larry Henderson and Frank Nesbit added 14 points each while Albion's high scorer was Paul Cryderman with 18 points.

It took a jumper by Oakland junior Larry Fotte with 12 seconds remaining to tie the score at 69 all at the end of regulation time. Wheaton center Steve Clum, however, became the night's hero when he grabbed a rebound off a missed Crusader free throw with three seconds left and fired the ball into the basket for the game winner. Clum was later named the tournament's Most Valuable Player. Larry Pierce led the Pioneer scoring with 16 points and Walt Johnson chipped in

Oakland senior Larry Pierce set a school record by passing for 17 assists and Walt Johnson scored 29 points as Oakland defeated Kalamazoo College 81-72 in the third round consolation game of the Marshall Tournament. The Pioneers led by only two at halftime 37-35 but broke away early in the second half on the passing of Pierce and the shooting of Johnson. Pierce scored 14 points himself and sophomore Kevin Williams added 12. Johnson, who prepped at Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills was honored by being named to the All Tournament team.

Oakland's tremendous success in basketball continues to go unwitnessed by the University's students. According to Sports Information Director Al Lavoy, only once has the three thousand-seat gymnasium been even half-filled. "Usually only five or six hundred people show up."
