TO MSUO

...and for good reason

MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY OAKLAND is the kind of place that excites and stimulates the person who wants to learn.

In one of the loveliest natural college settings in America, you have the privilege of daily contact with a brilliant, friendly young faculty of the highest competence, assembled from the great universities of the world. You get the most from them because classes are of congenial size and faculty office doors are always open.

THE FACULTY is teaching a curriculum which requires that every student take about one half of his work in liberal arts studies that are the heart of a college education, which in turn is a process of developing the powers of mind and character. The spirit of this quality program is rooted in the idea that as a man thinketh, so he is. It rides the wave of the future, for the world into which we are moving will require no abilities as much as those developed by the broadening and en-

lightening influences of a liberal education.

Michigan State University Oakland's curriculum has four programs: liberal arts, engineering science, teacher education, and business administration. It was developed in a year of study by many distinguished persons seeking the best and most promising ideas in higher education.

THIS PROGRAM has been the subject of much international attention. TIME, LIFE, and READER'S DIGEST have called it "glittering" and "remarkable." Hundreds of newspapers across the country have carried feature stories on it. The U. S. Office of Education recently published a booklet suggesting that it is such new colleges as MSUO that offer the best hope of resolving higher education's massive problems. The Voice of America and the U. S. Information Agency have devoted worldwide radio broadcasts and news stories to MSUO because the MSUO idea appeals to people everywhere. That is why this three-

year-old institution already has attracted students from four other countries and 12 other states.

THE YEAR-ROUND PROGRAM AT MSUO provides three full semesters instead of two. MSUO is one of the leaders in this major evolution in higher education. MSUO's students thus graduate in two and two-thirds years and get into graduate school or a career 14 months sooner. This means an extra year's salary or a gain of approximately \$5,000, even after any loss of summer earnings is subtracted.

THE ATTRACTIVE CAMPUS is spreading out from the northwest corner of the 1,600-acre estate given by Mr. and Mrs. Alfred G. Wilson. The first three structures were North and South Foundation Halls and the Oakland Center. To these have been added several others. The \$1.5 million Kresge Library was provided by the Kresge Foundation out of its interest in MSUO's program and ideals. A \$2 million Science and Engineering Building provided by the Legislature is newly completed, as are an expansion of the Oakland Center's recreational and dining facilities, and a new kind of student housing. These residences accommodate 48 students to a house, so as to offer the warmth

of small group living. Work is also under way on a \$1.5 million Intramural Sports and Recreation Building which is to be completed next year.

MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY OAKLAND welcomes visits by all interested persons, and it welcomes applications from prospective students. Here are the salient points on admission of freshmen:

Admission Requirements

- A. Graduation from an approved high school in the upper quarter of the graduating class, in a college preparatory curriculum.
- B. Recommendation of the high school principal.
- C. A student not in the upper quarter of his class will be required to take an entrance examination, the result of which will be one of the criteria for determining admissibility.

Calendar for Applying

FALL, 1961 — Application for admission may be submitted. Applications should be made as early as possible and in any case before the end of the school year.

JUNE, 1962 — Final grades are submitted by the high school.

AUGUST, 1962 — Final admission materials and directions for orientation and registration are sent to students.

Admissions and Counseling Services

The University wants to do all it can to help prospective students. Appointments for aid or advice on admission procedures may be had by telephoning the Admissions Office. For the sake of smooth and effective operation, appointments should be requested at least two weeks in advance.

To give students a clearer understanding of university life and to help them in planning their college work, a summer orientation program is conducted on campus in which all entering students take placement tests, have individual interviews with professional counselors, meet with members of the faculty and staff and upper classmen, and tour the campus.

Financial Aids

A number of scholarships are available for deserving students, and information on this program can be obtained from the office of

your high school principal. For further information write to the Director of Scholarships, Michigan State University Oakland. The deadline for scholarship applications is March 1, 1962.

The University also has loan funds made available under the National Defense Education Act which bear interest at the low rate of 3 per cent starting the year after students leave school. There is a 10-year repayment period. Up to 50 per cent of such loans are forgiven for those who go into public school teaching. Privately donated loan funds are also available.

More than 10 per cent of the students have part-time jobs obtained through the Office of the Dean of Students.

Student Housing

Space for 96 men and 96 women is available in the new student residences. Applications for room reservations should be made to the Dean of Students as early as possible, preferably before March 1.
