C.E.'s CONTINUUM CENTER CREATES TRAINING, IDENTITY COURSES FOR WOMEN

OU's Division of Continuing Education has planned several courses designed specifically for women this fall.

The Continuum Center, founded in 1965 by Priscilla Jackson, primarily to serve women, is changing direction to a life planning center. Life planning is the process of discovering "who you are, what you want to do, where you want to go and how you want to get there."

The former 10-session Investigation Into Identity course has evolved into a 2-stage Life Planning for Women course which helps them to be more effective in setting goals and working toward them. Stage I --Investigation into Identity, six three-hour sessions, assists participants in achieving this understanding through structured small

group work, readings and personality tests. Stage II -- Continued Investigation, five three-hour sessions, provides the options of continued personal growth or career development. University academic credit has recently been extended to these

To fill extensive requests for training programs to upgrade and promote women in business and industry, Janice M. Guerriero, the division's new director of business education, works with individual companies in planning tailored courses that prepare women for advancement opportunities in supervision and management.

GRANT GOES TO SUPPORT REMEDIAL MATH

Project Aimed At Disadvantaged Students

A new approach to the teaching of remedial and precalculus mathematics through tutoring and video tape cassettes is the goal of a pilot program now under development by Louis Nachman, asst. prof. of mathematics.

The project is supported by a twoyear grant of \$58,000 from the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation of New York City.

The new program should be of particular use to minority and disadvantaged students who could benefit from remedial and precalculus mathematics instruction, Nachman said.

INDIVIDUALS STRESSED

Universities have a growing concern for individual students. Their attempts to open doors to more minortiy-group and disadvantaged students

make it particularly important that they also find new ways to face this instructional problem and assist their students, Nachman maintains.


Nachman is quick to point out that this problem has not been ignored at OU. A year-long course in precalculus and a semester-long course for students who do not qualify for the longer course are available, but there are problems, including availability and size of classes. His new course may help in these areas, Nachman said.

PILOT PROGRAM FINISHED

His pilot program involves the presentation of 20 filmed, half-hour video tape programs which will cover a series of 'mini courses' in real numbers, functions and graphs, algebraic functions and transcendental functions. The total of the 20 programs and mini course areas will constitute a semester-length course at the freshman level.

Nachman explains: "As a student begins a mini course he obtains a cassette and programmed text. cassette contains an introduction to the material to be covered and points out possible tricks and difficult areas of the material to be covered."

NEW YORK PHILHARMONIC, KOSTELANETZ TAKE STAGE AT MEADOW BROOK FESTIVAL

The distinguished New York Philharmonic and vivacious Nancy Wilson are two of the featured artists in the final week of the 1972 Meadow Brook Music Festival. Other guest artists this week include Erich Leinsdorf, conductor; Kyung Wha Chung, violinist; the Brookside Jazz Ensemble; Jorge Bolet, pianist; Andre Kostelanetz, conductor, and young guitarist Christopher Parkening.

The New York Philharmonic, oldest and most prestigious orchestra in the United States, will make three appearances in the final week of the Meadow Brook Festival, on Thursday, Saturday and Sunday evenings.


Erich Leinsdorf, former music director of the Boston Symphony Orchestra and hailed as one of today's most brilliant conductors, will take the podium on Thursday and Saturday evenings at 8:30. His soloist on Thursday will be young Korean violinist Kyung Wha Chung, performing the Mendelssohn Concerto in E minor.

The guest artist under Leinsdorf's baton on Saturday will be pianist Jorge Bolet, performing Liszt's Piano Concerto No. I.

Exuberant Nancy Wilson will take center stage on Friday night at 8:30, replacing the ailing Ella Fitzgerald. Nancy, a top supper club, television and record personality for years,

will be accompanied by the Brookside Jazz Ensemble.

Sunday, August 27, will be the final concert of the season for the Meadow Brook Music Festival. It will feature Andre Kostelanetz conducting the New York Philharmonic in selections from Tchaikovsky, Prokofiev and Rimsky-Korsakov. Guest soloist will be Christopher Parkening, 24-year-old guitarist, already recognized as America's first important classical guitarist.

NANCY WILSON TO REPLACE AILING ELLA FITZGERALD

Nancy Wilson has been signed to replace Ella Fitzgerald on August 25 at the Meadow Brook Music Festival.

Sandor Kallai, Festival Manager, announced that "We had been informed, as late as last Tuesday, that Ella might possibly come after all, despite a previous cancellation. However, the final word from her physicians came on Thursday that she had undergone laser eye surgery and would have to have complete rest for several months.

The vivacious Miss Wilson will be accompanied by the Brookside Jazz Ensemble, a professional jazz group now enjoying an enthusiastic following in the Detroit metropolitan area. The Brookside Jazz Ensemble is also scheduled to perform by itself during the first half of the program.

Nancy, who grew up in Columbus,

Ohio, has been singing professionally since she was 15 years old, when she starred in her own television show on WTVN in Columbus. Voted one of the top female vocalists by Down Beat and Playboy magazines in 1963, she has played successful engagements in supper clubs, theatres, and television, as her records continue to score high on the charts.

The Brookside Jazz Ensemble, formed three years ago by Curt Neumann and Craig Strain, gained a solid musical reputation after concerts played to capacity crowds at Cranbrook Academy. Now in demand at supper clubs and featured at the Pontchartrain's outdoor jazz concerts this summer, the Brookside Jazz Ensemble draws its repertoire from arrangements by Buddy Rich; Maynard Ferguson; Blood, Sweat and Tears; Chicago; and Woody Herman, among others.

CPA REVIEW COURSES BEGIN FOR NOVEMBER CANDIDATES

Five review courses covering all phases of the Certified Public Accountant Examination began at OU Thursday evening, August 17, and will end October 26, in time for the candidates to sit for the November 1, 2, 3 CPA Examination. Late registration and make-up work is allowed.

CPA candidates may enroll for one or more of the subject areas, or all, if they wish. Tuition for those enrolling in all five subjects will be \$325. Texts and materials for the entire program do not exceed \$40.

Classes are scheduled to permit CPA candidates to enroll in all courses with intervals permitting time for class preparation. Classes are held in air-conditioned Dodge Hall.

Faculty for the program have been selected on the basis of both their academic background and an orientation to the educational requirements of the CPA examination.

Detroit Girl Scout Becomes Knole Cottage's Curator Of The Dolls

Knole Cottage has acquired a Curator for the Dolls in twelve-year-old Georgia Hill, a Girl Scout from Metro Troup 40 in Detroit.

Georgia has already discovered a boy Chase doll made in the 19th century by Simon and Helbig. Earlier Chase dolls, like the one at Knole Cottage, had joints at the elbows and knees. Later dolls had joints only at the shoulders and hips.

It will take 3 to 4 weeks to fully catalog the twenty dolls at the cottage, Georgia estimates. She begins her work by looking for markings on the dolls denoting where they were made—most of them are German, she says.

Leslie Schneider, a Girl Scout from Rochester Troup 242, is Georgia's ready and willing assistant. The two girls met when Georgia led a group of Brownies through the cottage on a tour this spring and became interested in the dolls. She offered her services to the Rochester Scouts then.

"Georgia's group of girls was the first to be really interested in the Cottage as a playhouse and in wanting to help restore it," commented Mrs. Jean Simmons, who has directed the Girl Scouts and leaders in cleaning and arranging the Cottage.

Georgia's fascination with dolls started when she was given an old bisque doll's head for her 10th birthday. "I wanted to find out where it came from and more about it," she said.

at an auto manufacturing firm, is a human behavior course which deals with motivation, attitudes, interpersonal relationships, solving of problems and the ability to cope with life situations. Nachman said students will be allowed to proceed through the course at their own pace, but that all work will take place for all students in a regularly-scheduled class hour.

The seeming rigidity will be necessary, Nachman claimed, because virtually all of the students will have trouble with some areas of the instruction materials. Use of a regularly scheduled class time will allow a corps of tutors to be present for individual instruction.

In her research, Georgia takes into account such things as whether the doll's mouth is open or closed-dolls with open mouths were made before 1900. Materials in the dollsmost have bisque heads (a form of china) and one Italian doll had a cardboard body-and whether their eyes are movable can also pinpoint the age of a doll.

There is a Bye-lo doll in a wicker cradle in the nursery. Bye-lo dolls were first made by Grace Story Putnam in 1922. Miss Putnam searched the world for a perfect baby, then made a doll of it. It was the first time a doll had been modelled from a live child. The original Bye-lo doll was black, made with colored bisque.
