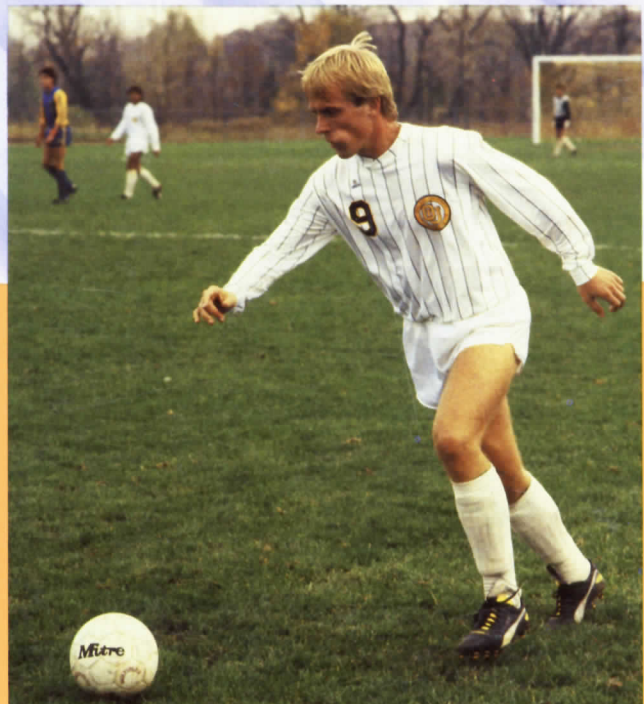

### **GANNON UNIVERSITY — 20-1 in 1985**

Gannon made its first two appearances in the NCAA tournament the last two seasons, losing both times in the first round. The Knights return two first-team All-Americans in sophomores Hans Van Rheenen, a midfielder, and Gerry Van DeMerwe, a two-time choice at forward.

### **NEW HAMPSHIRE COLLEGE — 14-5 in 1985**

New Hampshire College has risen into prominence the last two seasons, cracking the top 20 poll and rising as high as sixth. Jon Sakshaug is New Hampshire's lone All-American, earning that honor as a freshman in 1984.

### **NEW YORK INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY — 18-3-1 in 1985**

Also new on the scene as a national soccer power is New York Tech, which made its first NCAA tournament appearance in 1985 and advanced to the semi-finals. Tech was led on its run to the final four by 23-goal scorer Steve Papadopoulos.

## OU ATHLETIC STAFF

### Dr. PAUL HARTMAN Athletic Director



In his career as an athletic director, one which has spanned three decades and covered four different institutions, Dr. Paul Hartman has been one to make visible changes wherever he has been.

As athletic director at Plymouth State College in New Hampshire, his first position, Hartman started a football program with enthusiastic student support. Fifteen years later, a running back named

Joe Dudek put that program on the national map with his bid for the Heisman Trophy. In his second post, at Florida International University in 1974, Hartman began a women's golf program. One of the first women's scholarship award winners was Pat Bradley, who later became the first \$2 million winner on the Ladies Pro Golf Association tour. Hartman did not begin the basketball program at his next stop, the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, but one of his athletes there, Terry Porter, drew national attention as an NBA draftee from a non-scholarship school.

The programs Hartman has instituted at Oakland University are not as visible as some at his former schools, but they have been plentiful. This past year the department began a Varsity "O" Club for former athletes, brought back baseball as a varsity sport, and made several changes in the Lepley Sports Center — ranging from a refurbishing of the locker rooms and equipment area to renovation of the offices and the addition of the Pioneer Lounge, which will be used for

conferences and athletic receptions.

"I don't think any one person does one certain thing," said Hartman. "I depend on the president to answer our needs, so maybe the best thing I have done is to adequately translate our needs to the president."

"There are many ways to be an administrator and I choose to be one that's more of a facilitator. I look at my job as more of a service job. I try to keep people happy because I believe a happy family, or a team concept, is healthy."

Previously Hartman had developed additional summer camp programs, created a new season ticket plan and instituted a Hall of Honor for exceptional Pioneer athletes, as well as introduced the first athletic team banquet. Additionally since Hartman's arrival, there has been a large changeover in the coaching staff, as well as in the department's support staff.

Now in his fourth year at Oakland, the veteran athletic administrator still sees more changes for OU on the horizon.

"A lot of our goals involve getting our building and office area improved (much of that has happened in the past year)," says Hartman. "I am working on a proposal for a new facility that will hopefully be presented to the president by Christmas. The approximately \$15 million proposal will include a new field house and aquatic center."

"I would also like to see us expand our program and add more women's sports. Sixty percent of our students are women, yet we offer them only four sports," he concluded.

Hartman, Oakland's third director of athletics, succeeded Corey Van Fleet in June of 1983. The only other AD was OU's founding father of athletics, Hollie Lepley.

A graduate of Ohio State University and a native of Columbus, Ohio, Hartman lives in Rochester with his wife, Jane.

### ANDY GLANTZMAN Sports Information Director

In his second year as Sports Information Director is Andy Glantzman. Andy joined the Pioneer staff in August, 1985 after six years in the University of Detroit's sports information office. This Brooklyn, New York native has won a pair of publications awards from CoSIDA, most recently for last year's OU soccer media guide. Glantzman earned a bachelor of science degree in athletic administration from St. John's University (NY) and a Master of Business Administration at U of D. He and his wife, Kim, live in Southfield.

### RON FORBES Business Manager

Entering his 17th year at Oakland, Ron Forbes serves as business manager for the athletic department. A graduate of Western Michigan University and a native of Royal Oak, he also handles ticket distribution and receipts for the Pioneers.

### SANDY JORDAN Head Athletic Trainer

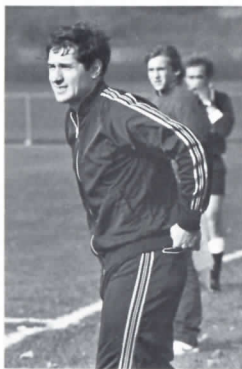
Sandy Jordan is beginning her fourth year as head athletic trainer at OU. Jordan came from the University of Detroit, where she spent a year as assistant trainer. This native of Rochester, New York spent four years as a student assistant at Lock Haven State College while earning a bachelor of science degree in health and physical education, with a specialization in athletic training. Prior to going to U of D, Jordan was a graduate assistant at Edinboro State College where she received a master of education in administration degree.

### TOM VanVOORHIS Marketing and Promotions

Tom VanVoorhis handles marketing and promotions for the athletic department. Among his duties are selling advertising for Pioneer publications, arranging special game and sports camps promotions and scheduling speaking engagements for the coaching staff. This retired General Motors public relations and marketing employee is a graduate of the University of Michigan.

## GARY PARSONS

Head Coach



One of the finest decisions ever made at Oakland was the one that brought Gary Parsons in as head soccer coach. Then an assistant coach with the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Parsons came to OU and, in five years, has never won fewer than 14 games in a season and has guided the Pioneers to three NCAA Division II tournament appearances.

Parsons, who had been to four straight Division I tournaments with Wisconsin-Milwaukee, came to Oakland and turned around a program that had been struggling since its first national tournament appearance in 1976.

The Pioneers just missed the playoffs in Parsons' first year, with a 14-4-1 record and a number one ranking in the Mideast Region. He upgraded the schedule and shored up some weak areas for his second season, and Oakland had one of the top soccer programs in the nation.

His 1982 squad, featuring All-American Lou Vulovich and high-scoring Morris Lupenec, lost in the national semi-finals to Florida International University; the following season, they suffered a 1-0 defeat to Seattle Pacific University — both losses were to the eventual national champion on the road.

The Pioneers returned to the national tournament for their third consecutive season. This time, however, Seattle Pacific needed a penalty kick shootout to oust the Pioneers. OU just missed another trip last season, to the nationals, despite a 14-3-2 record (which included a 13-1-1 mark in the last 15 games) and the presence of a pair of All-Americans in Meally Freeman and Gray Haizel.

"I was disappointed about not making the playoffs last year," Parsons said. "I really felt we deserved to go. But if you were to tell me that we would be in the national tournament three out of every four years, I would take it."

In the three years that Oakland made the playoffs, they also earned the number one ranking in the Mideast Region. Parsons, who has developed his squad into a Division II powerhouse, was voted Mideast Coach of the Year all three seasons.

His on-the-field accomplishments have made him well-known among fellow coaches. Parsons serves as chairman of the Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America Division II Mideast Ranking Committee and has a role in the national rankings for collegiate soccer for every level of NCAA competition.

In addition to his coaching prowess, Parsons, a native of Oakham, Massachusetts enjoyed a noteworthy playing career. He was voted the Most Valuable Defensive Player at Plymouth State College as a senior, and helped the Panthers make the New England State College Athletic Conference finals in his last two years. Parsons holds degrees in math and physical education from Plymouth State.

Parsons also coaches the Michigan State Select Team and directs highly successful Oakland University youth soccer camps during the summer.

Parsons lives with his wife, Joanne, in Auburn Hills.

## BRIAN TINNION

Assistant Coach



When Brian Tinnion agreed to join Gary Parsons on the sidelines last year, it insured that Oakland would have one of the most recognizable and respected soccer names in the Detroit area as an assistant coach. Tinnion now begins his second year of what has already proved a very valuable relationship.

"I feel very fortunate to have someone like Brian working with us," says Parsons. "With his pro-

fessional experience, he has been very valuable to myself, as well as to our players."

Tinnion served as player-coach of the American Soccer League's Express from 1981 to 1983, guiding the squad to the league title while earning loop MVP honors in 1982. During that time, Tinnion also participated in the Major Indoor Soccer League, playing with the Wichita Wings in 1981 and the Golden Bay Earthquakes in 1983, where he also was an assistant coach. Brian logged five years of experience in the North American Soccer League, including three with the NASL Express from 1978-81 and another with the New York Cosmos in 1976. This native of Workington, England, most recently coached the Ukrainian Soccer Club to the National Amateur Cup finals, the Rochester High School girls soccer squad and the University of Michigan club program, all in 1984.

Tinnion, who assists Parsons with the Michigan State Select Team, is very involved with soccer camps and indoor soccer in the Detroit area.

# 1986 SOCCER PREVIEW

Seven starters are gone from last year's 14-3-2 squad — one that should have made the NCAA Division II playoffs. And that will mean a lot of rebuilding and replacing for sixth-year coach Gary Parsons. But Parsons feels he has achieved that with what he considers a deep and talented recruiting class.

"We lost a lot of key players from last year's team," Parsons began, "but I feel we have done a solid job of replacing them with the players we are bringing in. We will be very young, but we will also be very talented. It will be a matter of experimenting to find the right combination of players."

The Pioneers will be missing players responsible for 36 of their 55 goals last year, as well as both starting-caliber goalkeepers. Double-digit goal scorers Meally Freeman (13), a first-team All-American, and Mark Christian (12), plus midfielder Mike Vigh and goalies Dave Marttila and Paul Larkin will be difficult to replace, but even with these losses Parsons has a solid corps of returnees to rely upon.

That group is led by second-team All-American Gray Haizel, a slick midfielder who set a school record with 19 assists a year ago while scoring seven goals. Haizel, a senior, will anchor the OU offense from his midfield spot as the Pioneer trigger man. One of his main duties will be to try to get the ball to fellow senior Marty Hagen, who should finish his career as one of OU's all-time bests at putting the ball in the net. Hagen had eight goals and six assists last year, with six of his goals being credited as game-winners. As the Pioneers' only returning starter up front, Hagen will carry an even greater goal-scoring burden.

Sophomore stopper John Stewart returns on the back line. Stewart, moved into a starting spot on the veteran-filled club a year ago as a freshman, was OU's most consistent player last season. With another year under his belt, all he can get is better.

OU has eight returnees overall from last year's squad, including super-sub Brian Fitzgerald. Now a junior, Fitzgerald has a shot at breaking into the starting line-up either at forward or midfield after notching three goals and six assists last season. He played almost 1,000 minutes in mainly a part-time role a year ago. Allan Schneck, the top defensive substitute last season, also returns for his junior year after seeing ample playing time, including three starting assignments last year. Fellow juniors Tom Duff and Tony Williams, both forwards, also return looking for increased playing time.

Parsons has added 9 new players to the OU roster and helped himself greatly at both midfield and on defense. Two newcomers arrive from the junior college ranks. Thomas Murray, a junior defender, comes to Oakland from Macomb County Community College with a shot at an outside back spot. Murray is a JUCO All-American and was a Prep All-Stater in Michigan. The third transfer is Swedish born Mikeal Carlstrom, a 26-year-old defender and midfielder from Springfield Technical CC. The smooth

Swede was an All-Region choice and could make an immediate impact at OU.

Four other newcomers will be battling for positions in the midfield or on defense. One is Tony Soave, who played at North Texas State University in 1982. Soave, a 1982 State Select team member after graduating from Harper Woods Notre Dame High School, will be transferring from Macomb County Community College, although he did not play there. The remaining three are freshmen, all with solid chances to see ample playing time. Erik Enyedy, a possible starter at either an outside back spot or in the midfield, is an All-Stater from Southfield High School with excellent offensive skills. Also in the same position is Ender Ibisoglu, an Ontario Provincial Team member and an outstanding player at Lowe High School in Windsor. Ibisoglu is a steady, versatile player. A potential midfield starter is Alan Stewart, the younger brother of OU's John Stewart. Also a player in the Ontario Provincial program, the younger Stewart is a hard worker with solid ball skills.

Two additions to the forward unit are freshman Roger Jacks and Simon Mayo. Jacks, a graduate of Craig High School in Janesville, Wisconsin, was a Michigan State Select Team member after his sophomore year before moving. Jacks has a strong shot and will be a solid addition to OU's front line depth, as will Mayo. A Sarnia, Ontario native like the Stewarts, Mayo could find himself as a starting forward thanks to his ball-hawking ability and potential to be a good finisher, and he could be a key goal scorer for the Pioneers.

The toughest replacement job for Parsons came in the goalkeeping spot, where he found a newcomer to take over for a pair of All-Region performers. Parsons came up with a solid candidate in Gino Soave. Soave, brother of

newcomer Tony Soave, is also from Harper Woods Notre Dame High School, where he was the top goalkeeper in the state as a senior in 1984. The top goalie on the State Select Team during the summer of 1985, Parsons feels that Soave was the best in-state keeper available this year. A small goalkeeper at 5-9, Soave is a good anticipator who comes out of his net quickly and very well. Like his brother, Gino is a transfer from Macomb.

The schedule the young squad must face is a traditional tough one, packed with good Division I's in Akron, Cleveland State, Michigan State and legitimate Division II contenders in Wright State and Davis and Elkins, plus NAIA power Alderson-Broaddus. OU will also host two tournaments in the Third Annual National Invitational Soccer Tournament and the Pioneer Classic. The NIST features Division II powerhouses Gannon University, New York Tech and New Hampshire College in what should be the most competitive NIST yet. The Pioneer Classic will see OU host Lewis University, Northern Kentucky University and the University of Southern Indiana.

The Pioneers will have four matches prior to the NIST and they will be tested by the best in Division II. The key will be whether or not the young talent can jell together by that tournament. If so, Oakland could be in good shape on its way to returning to the NCAA Tournament. If not, the Pioneers could be facing an uphill battle similar to last year, scrambling down the stretch and leaving it in the selection committee's hands. This may be one of the most talented Oakland squads in the past few years, but the experience factor may decide whether or not it returns to post-season play.

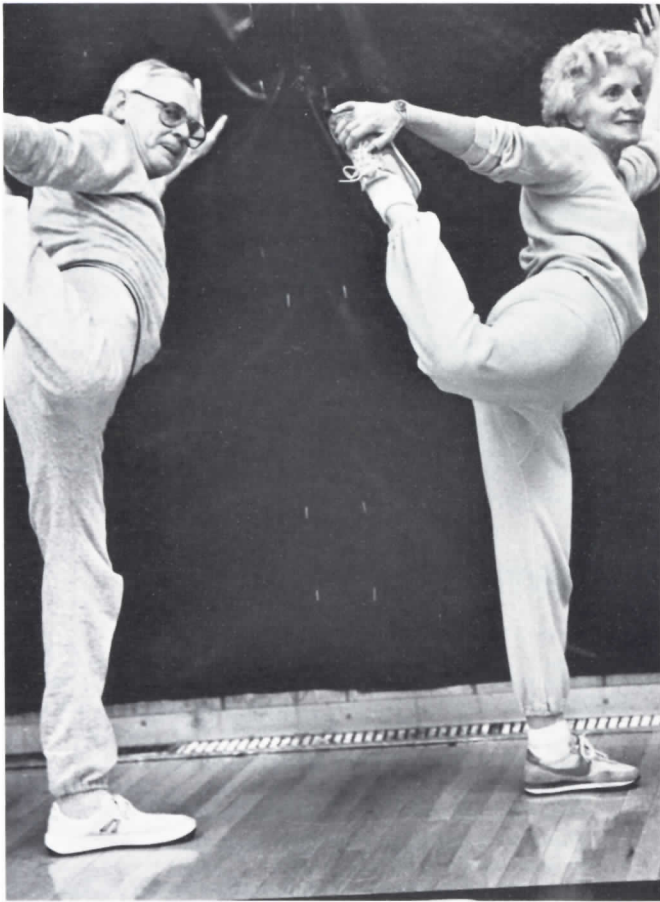

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## ABOUT OAKLAND UNIVERSITY

In 1957, the late Alfred G. and Matilda Wilson donated \$2 million and their 1,500-acre Meadow Brook estate to Michigan State University to establish a college in Oakland County.

Oakland University was founded in 1957 as a branch campus of MSU, with 570 first-year students. By the mid-1960s, it had evolved into a medium-sized university and in 1970 became an independent, state-assisted university. It now offers more than 70 undergraduate programs and more than 30 graduate programs, and enrolls about 12,000 students.

OU's distinct instructional programs — the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Economics and Management, School of Engineering and Computer Science, School of Health Sciences, School of Human and Educational Services and School of Nursing — offer a diverse curricula of general education and career preparation courses. Virtually all of these courses are taught by faculty members, not teaching assistants.

The Honors College, a division of the College of Arts and Sciences, meets the educational needs of highly motivated students. The Division of Continuing Education meets the needs of nontraditional adult learners through evening and extension programs.

Academic support facilities include such notable entities as the Eye Research Institute, the only major eye research center in the United States not affiliated with a medical school; the Meadow Brook Health Enhancement Center, which provides health maintenance/health improvement and cardiac rehabilitation community outreach programs; and the Center for Robotics and Advanced Automation, a unit of the School of Engineering and Computer Science that utilizes high technology manufacturing methods.

And OU's professional arts programs annually attract thousands to the campus. OU has received national recognition and local kudos for its Meadow Brook Theatre, Meadow Brook Art Gallery, Meadow Brook Hall and Meadow Brook Music Festival, the summer home of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

OU is located 25 miles north of Detroit, in the small town of Rochester. OU's modern campus, which houses the university's many academic and public service programs, is located on a beautifully wooded site — much of it still undeveloped.

All are committed to preparing their team members for peak performances in their sports and in their personal and professional lives.

Recognition of the interrelationships between the type of academic pursuit necessary in the classroom and the effort, skill and knowledge needed to physically perform at the national level is the strength of the Oakland University athletic program. We invite all interested parties — be they athletes, supporters or spectators — to participate in furthering our goal of providing access to excellence.

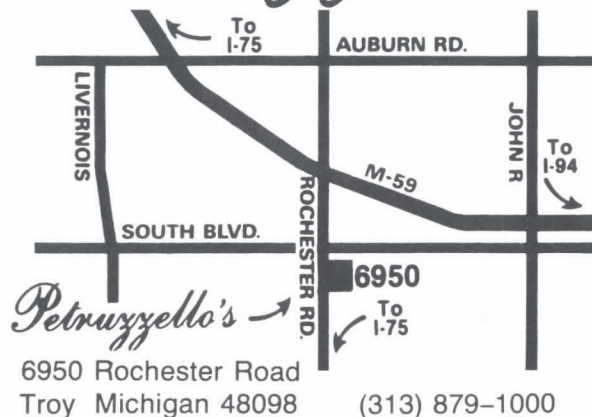


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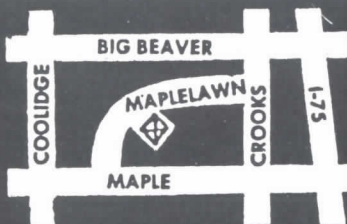

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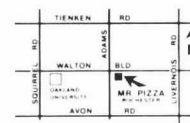
