#### BOARD RATES GO UP THIS SPRING ROOM AND

Room and board rates at Oakland University have been increased effective with the spring term opening April 28, 1976.

The Board of Trustees approved the actions at the March 24 meeting on campus. The increases cover only part of the increased expenses in the residence halls, the board said. The major problems were increasing utility rates and food

The new room and board rate for both the fall and winter semesters is \$1,498, up \$80; a room-only rate for both of these semesters is \$938, up \$50; and the students in the cooperative student housing project will pay \$754 for that period, an increase of \$42.

Rates for the spring and summer terms have been raised to \$419 a term for room and board, up \$20, and to \$260 a term for a room-only option, an increase of \$10.

There is no cooperative student housing program during the spring and summer terms.

#### FULBRIGHT-HAYS DEADLINE IS JUNE 1

Announcements of 1977-78 Fulbright-Hays advanced lecture and research grants for Latin America, Australia, and New Zealand have been received by Fulbright-Hays faculty adviser William Schwab. Deadline for applications is June 1. In addition, lectureships to the U.S.S.R. are available for 1976-77, Schwab said. Inquiries should be directed to Schwab in room 305A, Wilson Hall.

A major development in the program is the provision of travel for one principal dependent of grantees in the lecture category.

### EDUCATION HAS DROPPED AS BUDGET PRIORITY

The decline of higher education as a Michigan budget priority is illustrated in a publication from the Michigan

Council of State College Presidents.

The report is entitled "Higher Education 1976 and a Review of the Decade 1966-1976." The statistics show that appropriations to colleges and universities have been a declining percentage of the state's general fund expenditures during that period.

The percentage of general fund expenditures for education has dropped from 20 percent in 1965-66 to 14.2 percent

in 1975-76.

Over the decade Michigan dropped from 7th to 26th place among states in the amount of state higher education appro-

priations per capita.

In 1965-66 the state ranked 19th in state higher education appropriations per \$1,000 of personal income. Today Michigan ranks 34th in that category. The report calls this an important comparison statistic because "it shows the state's willingness to support higher education measured against its ability to support."

A declining state priority, surging enrollment demands, inflation, rising tuition costs, and the slow economic recovery have combined to place higher education in a critical position,

the report states.

# MORE HIGHER EDUCATION AID PROMISED FOR 1977-78

Gerald H. Miller, director of the Department of Management and Budget, told state educators recently that higher education will receive very high priority in Governor William Milliken's budget recommendations for 1977-78.

Miller said there was recognition in the governor's office that the persistent erosion of state support for public higher education in recent years has reached the critical point.

He said institutions will have to "tough it out" for 1976-77, but he called that period a "turn-around year for Michigan

and for higher education."

"The revenue outlook for 1977-78 is encouraging at this point," Miller said. "The message from Governor Milliken's office now is that "higher education will be a prime beneficiary of the anticipated growing fiscal strength of the state in 1977-78."
