DEBATE TOURNAMENT: The University's newly organized Debating Society will play host to the two top contenders in the National Debating Society at 1 p.m. Monday in the Student Center Lounge. Augustana College (Ill.) will be defending its national debate championship against Pennsylvania State University, with a topic debated by all colleges and high schools this year in the national debate. It is: Resolved that the U.S. should adopt a program of compulsory health insurance for all citizens. The Debating Societies from all high schools in the area have been invited. The program will last approximately 40 minutes, and the audience will help judge the winner. All faculty members and students are invited to attend.

CULTURE INTERNATIONALE: Faculty advisors and student chairmen of the Planning Committee for Culture Internationale will meet at 1 p.m. Tuesday in room 167, South Foundation Hall.

THIRD EVENT OF LECTURE SERIES: Mr. John Scott, assistant to the publisher and a contributing editor of TIME magazine, will talk on "Russia Revisited" at 1 p.m. Wednesday in the Student Center. Mr. Scott worked as a welder in Russia in the '30's, returning to the U.S. for a few years before going back to Russia in 1940. He left there again just prior to the German invasion in 1941. In 1958 he began a two year period of reporting on Russia and its satellites, and during that time he witnessed the famous Krushchev-Nixon Kitchen debate. Following Mr. Scott's talk, there will be a one-hour discussion period with the students. The public is welcome to attend.

PARKING ON CAMPUS:    Mr. Swanson reports that the addition of the graveled parking area at the south end of the lot has relieved a rather tight parking problem, particularly as it affected the student drivers. He asks for the co-operation of students and staff members to eliminate a parking problem on the road to the north of North Foundation Hall and in the employees parking lot adjacent to the Student Center. Both have become so congested with illegally parked cars that deliveries with large trucks can be made only with the greatest difficulty. In fact, says Mr. Swanson, some truck drivers have refused to make deliveries until the congestion is relieved. It will also be appreciated if the five parking places outlined in yellow and posted "Reserved for Guests", which are located in the northeast corner of the large parking lot, are so reserved. It will be necessary to regulate parking in accord with the posted signs and markings, and everyone is asked to cooperate.
