#### CONTINUING ED RECEIVES AWARDS

The Division of Continuing Education accepted a special award on behalf of the Birmingham Center for Continuing Education and also garnered three significant awards for innovative institutional programming at the National University Extension Association's (NUEA) 62nd annual conference March 19-23 in Tucson, Arizona.

Harry B. Van Hook, Jr., assistant dean for courses, accepted a special Innovative Award in behalf of the community organizations, local government, and educational institutions which re-opened an unused public school facility, implementing a state goal to maximize and share educational resources.

Elinor Waters, Continuum Center director, accepted one of five Innovative Awards for the center's Peer Group Counseling for Older Adults program, while Audrey Marriner, director of specialized programs and marketing, accepted the Program Development Award for the course department's diploma/certificate program for legal assistants.

The Continuum Center also received the NUEA's creative programming award for its conference, Alternative Career Options for Teachers.

#### STUDENT EXCHANGE WITH JAPAN

Oakland has extablished a formal student exchange program with a foreign university, Nanzan University in Nagoya, Japan. In the 1977-78 academic year, two Oakland students will study at Nanzan and two students from Nanzan will be in residence at Oakland.

The Center for Japanese Studies at Nanzan offers a full complement of courses on Japan taught in English by highly qualified Japanese and Western scholars. Although a knowledge of Japanese is not necessary, all students at the Center are required to take an introductory course in the Japanese language.

A special feature of the program is the opportunity to live with a Japanese family and thereby gain firsthand acquaintance with the people and their culture. Regular sightseeing and field trips are scheduled and time is also set aside for independent travel in Japan.

Students will receive full Oakland credit for courses taken at Nanzan. The cost will be equivalent to spending a year at Oakland, since students will pay Oakland tuition and Oakland dormitory fees (room and board). The only additional expenses will be the charter flight to and from Japan and spending money.

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
