ADMINISTRATIVE CHANGES ANNOUNCED BY O'DOWD

The increasing importance of liaison work between the university and the state government in Lansing has led to a realignment of administrative responsibilities at OU, President Donald D. O'Dowd has announced.

Effective immediately, John H. De Carlo, vice president for public affairs, will devote his full energies to serving as liaison with the state government, acting as secretary to the Board of Trustees and as in-house legal counsel, O'Dowd said.

De Carlo has asked to be relieved of his additional administrative responsibilities for university relations, the Meadow Brook Theatre, Festival, and Art Gallery, O'Dowd said.

De Carlo has headed the festival and theatre for the past five years and he has done a magnificent job in guiding them to their current levels of excellence, O'Dowd said. He pointed out both the festival and theatre have been concluding their seasons "in the black financially" and that the theatre set attendance records last season.

But the growing size and complexity of the university has created more of a demand on De Carlo's energies in the legislative, legal, and board responsibilities, and he requested the administrative change.

Temporarily, the festival, theatre and art gallery will report directly to the Office of the President and university relations will report to that office through William Connellan, assistant to the president.

FOUR STUDENTS RECEIVE NEW SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

Four area youths have each been awarded \$2,000 a year for four years in a major new memorial scholarship program announced by Oakland University.

Jerry Rose, director of admissions and scholarships, said the Mary Fogarty Anibal and Eleanor Anibal Burgum memorial scholarships are the most competitive and prestigious awarded by the university. They are based on academic achievement in high school, test scores and counselors' recommendations.

The memorial scholarships are made possible by the generosity of Benjamin H. Anibal, retired Birmingham automotive pioneer and civic leader. They are named for Anibal's deceased wife and daughter, Mary Fogarty Anibal and Eleanor Anibal Burgum.

The winners are cited below.

James S. Bradford graduated first in a class of 683 at Thurston High School in Detroit. He plans to major in engineering, and he has participated in numerous student activities within his high school.

Sharon M. Burlingame graduated first in her class of 465 from West Senior High School in Garden City. Sharon plans to major in Computer and Informational Science, and she has been an active member of the National Honor Society, the Girls Athletic Association and the varsity swimming team.

Lawranne J. Stewart graduated second in a class of 156 students from Hill-McCloy High School in Montrose. She plans to major in Political Science. Lawranne has been extensively involved in extra- and co-curricular activities within her high school and community, and has been vice president of the National Honor Society, member of the Symphonic Band and member of the yearbook staff.

Ellen J. Collarini graduated first in her class of 497 from Sterling Heights High School. She plans to major in the allied health field. Ellen has been involved in several activities within her school and community, including the varsity chorus, Madrigal Singers, Spanish Club, National Honor Society, and various musical and service organizations within her church.

PINO NAMED CHAIRMAN FOR UNITED WAY DRIVE

Lewis N. Pino, director of research and institutional services, has been named to head the OU United Way Fund Drive. He said that within the next three weeks some 60 OU volunteers will be approaching individuals in the community for contributions.

Pino said the OU goal will be \$12,983 and the goal for the region is \$1,523,612.

He expressed confidence that the OU quota would be exceeded as it was last year. That drive, under Lowell Ruggles, raised \$12,605 to go well above the goal of \$10,663. The university was later cited for its fund raising efforts.

DANCE GROUP DEBUTS AT OU

The Department of Physical Education will host the debut of the Nonce Dance Ensemble on Friday, Oct. 4, at 8 p.m. at the Barn Theater.
