HERE'S WHERE THE FOOD LINE FORMS

In case the summer session hours for grill and cafeteria service had you confused, the schedule really did call for you to have your morning coffee break in the South Cafeteria, eat your lunch in Sunset Cafeteria, and drink your afternoon tea in the Grill. To simplify matters and handle the unexpected jamups, however, the Food Service folks have decided to open the grill $6\frac{1}{2}$ hours earlier than previously planned and to trim the hours for public a la carte service in the Sunset Cafeteria to 10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. If we understood the changes, here is the new schedule:

OVERSEAS OPENINGS

Faculty members interested in overseas teaching and research opportunities are encouraged to register with the Committee on International Exchange of Persons, 2101 Constitution Ave., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20418. Among other assistance, the committee is handling applications for Senior Fulbright-Hays Program awards. Although July 1 is normally the application deadline for both research grants and lectureships, applications are still being accepted for a number of lectureships which remain open. A recent listing showed the following positions available: agricultural engineering--Ireland; American literature--Italy, Jamaica, Paraguay, and Romania; chemistry--Honduras and Spain; linguistics--Italy; management studies--Trinidad; mathematics--Spain; physics--Spain; sociology--Trinidad; unspecified fields--Romania.
