

Market Prices Set '58 Record

Average for Utilities
Soars to Highest Point
in 28 Years

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Stock Market climbed to a new high for the year yesterday.

The average for utilities soared to its highest point in 28 years. Both the industrial and railroad averages were near their best levels of the year. New highs were hit by 111 stocks.

The Market was pushed up by increased consumer spending, improved auto and farm implement sales, and a bright outlook for the aircraft industry.

Republic Aviation, which turned over a new jet fighter-bomber to the Air Force yesterday, ran up 2 points for the second straight session to pace the aircrafts.

Shell scored a 2-point gain in the oils, while Richfield and Amerada added more than a point each. International Nickel added a point in the metals. Du Pont headed the chemicals with a gain of 1%. General American Transportation climbed 2 1/2 points in the rail equipments. American Home Products jumped 2 points after its directors raised the monthly dividend.

The Dow-Jones averages showed industrials up 2.26 points to 462.70; rails up 0.38 to 116; utilities up 0.19 to 78.19; and 65-stocks up 0.66 to 160.55—the highest level for this average since Sept. 20, 1957.

Most of Nation Enjoying Mild Holiday Weather

It was mild in most of the country today but it looks like showers may dampen Memorial Day activities in many sections. Afternoon or evening showers were possible in most parts of the country except in the Far Southwest and from the Ohio Valley into the mid and north Atlantic Coast states.

Coolest weather was in the northern Great Lakes region and New England with temperatures in the 40s. In contrast, readings were in the 80s in the Southwest hot belt. But in most of the country, temperatures were in the 60s and 70s except for the 50s in the mid Atlantic Coast states and the Ohio Valley.

Thundershowers fell in scattered areas during the night in the central part of the country from the Dakotas through Texas. Some storms were reported. Winds of 50 m.p.h., with heavy rain and hail, hit Bismarck, N.D. Hall also pelted sections of Oklahoma and strong winds lashed the Houston, Tex., area.

UAW Contract Ends for 300,000 at GM

not be a condition of employment at GM.

The union said it planned to put men on GM plant gates to check membership cards of employees in an effort to maintain an all-union shop.

Reuther admittedly faced an uphill fight to achieve his goals for auto workers in this recession year. He wants wage increases, improved pension benefits and a share of profits from firms financially able to pay them.

GM earlier estimated the UAW demands would add 73 cents to the present \$2.40 hourly wage for GM workers. It changed this figure to 48 cents an hour after the union revised some demands. GM said extension of the old agreement would give workers a 9-cent pay hike this year and 7 cents in 1959.

The UAW president failed in a dramatic peace offer he made to GM in the final five minutes before the contract ran out.

Reuther suggested that GM hourly rated workers be given a chance to vote in a secret ballot whether they favored the two-year extension offered by GM or the multipoint demands made by the UAW.

Under Reuther's proposal, if a majority of workers favored the union proposals, GM would be bound to bargain on them.

If the workers preferred GM's contract offer, Reuther said the union would accept the two-year extension.

The UAW proposal stipulated that if the workers prefer the UAW package, GM would be obliged to bargain with the union on unresolved issues for 30 days. At the end of that time the unresolved issues would go to arbitration.

GM, through Vice President Louis G. Seaton, rejected the suggestion. Seaton said it was a revised version of proposals the union made earlier.

Seaton termed the UAW proposals "inflationary and excessive." He said there was no justification for a temporary extension of the contract.

Reuther told newsmen GM had not yielded an inch on a single point since Harlow Curtice, GM president, outlined the company plan in August.

GM's contract with the United Electrical Workers, representing 18,000 GM workers, also expired at midnight with each side blaming the other for failure to agree on new terms.

IUE-GM talks were to resume today as Ford and Chrysler continued their talks with the UAW.

GM and the UAW agreed to meet Monday to decide where future negotiations will take place. Up to now, the meetings had been held in GM headquarters but the union asked that further meetings be held in a neutral place.

from the Assembly "for a definite period the full powers necessary to act in the present grave situation." In other words, the Assembly must take a vacation, reportedly for one year.

The general consistently has refused to spell out the "full powers" he wants, giving rise to widespread fears of a dictatorial regime which might continue itself after the formal end of a definite period.

2. The Assembly must authorize him "to prepare and submit to the country, through referendum," constitutional revisions to create a stronger executive and to establish a new basis for the now troubled relations between France and her overseas possessions. De Gaulle's experience with referendums is bad.

One reason he quit his job as provisional president-premier after World War II was the voters' rejection of his draft constitution providing for a strong executive.
