Call Goldfine 'in Contempt'

Police Changes Action Expected Within 30 Days

Willman Expecting to Choose Public Safety Director Shortly

Action may be forthcoming in about a month on two big changes in the Pontiac Police Department.

City Manager Walter K. Willman figured last night that he will have selected a candidate in about that time for the office of Public Safety Director.

And City Commissioners, meeting informally gave themselves 30 days in which to decide whether to transfer the Traffic Violations Bureau from the police department to Municipal Court.

Both moves were recommended by the Public Administration Service (PAS) study of police department morale and efficiency.

10 CANDIDATES APPLY
Willman said he has received applications from 10 candidates for safety director, "several of whom are really outstanding, in my opinion."

He said those being considered are "experienced policemen, with a wide background in training. I believe the final choice will be a man who will be able to command the respect of the entire department."

Commissioners gave Willman the task of making the final selection. Since the City Charter is indefinite about how the appointment is to be made, it has been decided that Willman will appoint the new official with Commission approval.

Willman called the safety director, who will be over both police and fire chiefs, "the key" to bringing about other organizational changes recommended by the PAS.

It is expected that the city will give the new director a copy of the PAS report and let him (Continued on Page 2, Col. 4)

For Philippine Islands

To Propose Fluoridation

GRAND RAPIDS (AP)—A Philippines official says he will recommend adoption of the Grand Rapids water fluoridation system by his homeland.

Dr. Emilio M. Sison, supervisor of the Philippine Department of Dental Health, yesterday disclosed his proposed action after hearing reports from Grand Rapids officials on results of the pioneer program adopted in 1944-45.

Dr. W. B. Prothro, city-county health officer, said dental decay has dropped 60 per cent along Grand Rapids children since the project was started. Dr. Sison said he would urge a pilot program in the hope of persuading the Philippine Congress to finance water fluoridation in cities throughout the islands.

Quality of Instruction, Building Program Hang in Balance

Pontiac Must Raise \$2 Million for Schools

The Pontiac Board of Education will have to raise more than \$2 million to avoid a cutback in quality of instruction or a halt in its building program.

This disclosure was made last night by Superintendent Dana P. Whitmer in reviewing the system's financial picture with the board.

Dr. Whitmer said that the cutback in income for this fiscal year due to a reduced state equalized valuation of the school district has brought the system face to face with an emergency.

He said that income for this year would leave Pontiac schools owing \$501,000 on current construction and no money for further building.

The alternatives are to raise more money or to reduce the operating budget, already at austerity level, and halt building plans, he stated.

Dr. Whitmer asked the board to go on record as opposing any cut in instructional quality and to endorse further necessary construction.

The five board members present decided to wait until the next meeting so that all members could vote on the matter.

If the board approves the recommendations, Dr. Whitmer pointed out, it will need to raise \$2,237,000 between now and the end of next year.

He recommended that the board borrow \$1,800,000 this year by issuing long-term bonds, a practice which the board has not followed before.

The superintendent noted that the board, because it has been on a pay-as-you-go basis for new

schools, has a low indebtedness and could borrow more than \$2 million without a vote of the people.

The state law permits such borrowing up to 2 per cent of assessed valuation of a school district.

STATE PICTURE BAD
Supported by board member Louis Schimmel, Dr. Whitmer noted that the state picture must change within the next two years to the benefit of school districts and advised the board to do only short-range planning of its finances until the future is clearer.

Schimmel, a finance expert, said that if Pontiac was feeling the pinch, the rest of the state's school districts must be in much worse shape.

"At the next session of the Legislature, you will see an army of school people demanding high-

Pontiac to Build New Library

Hope to Have Structure Ready for Dedication on Centennial Date

A new City Library by centennial-time was tentatively set by the City Commission last night as the city's next building project.

They decided to get pay-as-you-go financing under way now in order to have the new building ready for dedication by March 15, 1961, Pontiac's centennial date.

City Manager Walter K. Willman said he would submit a plan whereby the city could start laying away enough money in a capital structure fund to let contracts next year.

He said he would formally propose Tuesday that the city set aside \$200,000 after tax collections this year and next. This fund-raising pattern was used, he said to finance the City Hall, Public Safety Building and other new buildings.

He assured commissioners that a big capital improvement fund would be left for neighborhood improvements such as streets, sewers and sidewalks.

Looking for a building project that would crown the centennial festivities, commissioners supported Willman's belief that a new library "would offer a service available to all the citizens of Pontiac."

The building would replace the existing Williams street library, which Willman described as "cracking at the seams."

Tentatively scheduled to be erected on a site across Parke street from the City Hall, the library building should cost roughly \$500,000, according to unofficial estimates.

Willman said he is compiling a list of architects interested in designing the building and announced, at the same time, that the Planning Commission has agreed to take action on the choice of site.

He Won't Reply to 23 Questions on Finances

House Probers Taking Steps Toward Hailing Tycoon Into Court

WASHINGTON (AP)—Counsel for House investigators today accused Bernard Goldfine of contempt after the Boston industrialist refused to answer 23 questions about his financial affairs.

The questions had been specially drawn up to prepare the way for possible contempt action.

Robert W. Lishman, lawyer for the subcommittee checking Goldfine's dealings with presidential assistant Sherman Adams and federal agencies, charged that Goldfine was in contempt.

The charge was not immediately acted on. But the subcommittee headed by Rep. Oren Harris (D-Ark.) had taken steps toward citing Goldfine for not answering questions which they said were pertinent to their inquiry.

Goldfine was asked particularly about financial matters connected with his East Boston Co., a holding firm; and its subsidiary, the Boston Port Development Co.

Goldfine declared again and again that these had nothing to do with the House probe of regulatory agencies, Harris said the questions definitely were pertinent.

"I contend that this subcommittee has no right to inquire into the internal affairs of the companies concerned," Goldfine maintained.

Lishman then told the subcommittee that Goldfine has refused to answer enough pertinent questions "to establish in my judgment that the witness is guilty of contempt."

That contempt, Lishman declared, consists of a Goldfine effort to prevent the subcommittee from performing the responsibility. (Continued on Page 2, Col. 5)

Rocket-Riding Mouse May Be Floating in South Atlantic

WASHINGTON — At the bottom of the South Atlantic, or possibly floating somewhere on the surface, the Air Force's space-traveling mouse is believed resting in a tiny hammock today after its spectacular rocket ride.

The mouse is Mia II, an albino female, shot 6,000 miles out of Cape Canaveral off Florida Wednesday night in a Thor-Able rocket.

The impact area was 1,000 miles off the African coast.

The Air Force announced that the missile's flight and re-entry into the earth's fiery atmosphere was a complete success, but attempts to retrieve the nose cone had been stymied.

Recovery of the nose cone and "Mia," the mouse, was the main objective of the test.

HAMMOCK IN CAPSULE

Her hammock is contained within a "life support capsule" in the rocket's nose cone, for which the Air Force and Navy are still searching.

The mouse has food, water and oxygen enough to last several days.

The "life support capsule," like a nuclear submarine, also contains equipment for releasing oxygen and keeping the air purified, as well as food and water.

Mia II wore two "skin electrodes" attached to the back of her head.

These were connected with radio telemetry transmitters to record her heart beat during her periods of pressure, and weightlessness in flight.

The nose cone may have sunk, or may still be supported by a balloon at the surface. In either case, Mia II should be horizontal and comfortable until some time next week.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Los Angeles is in the clutches of a heat-and-smog attack. The 93 degrees recorded in the city yesterday made it the hottest July 10 in Los Angeles in 74 years. But it was much hotter in many suburbs—104 in Van Nuys—and it was 120 at Palm Springs, on the desert.

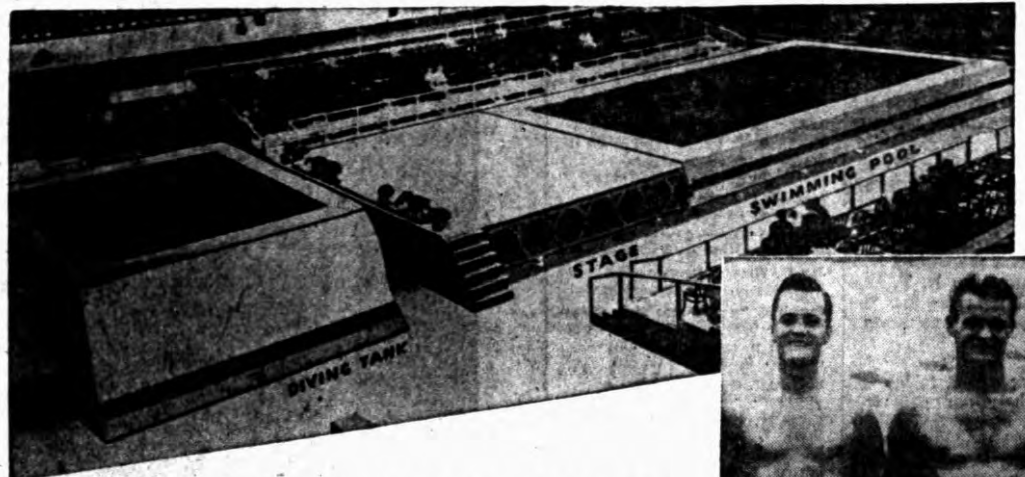

ESP, What Is It? Vincent Price Finds Out

NEW YORK—In spite of the fur that bristles warmly beneath his nose, Vincent Price is a comfortable man to be with on a hot humid day. He talks with briskness. His enthusiastic arm gestures circulate the air.
"I wouldn't want to know what's to happen to me in the distant fu-

ture," Price says, stirring up a breeze as he waves toward eternity. "But I would like to know what is happening to me from minute to minute. I think everybody could use a sixth sense, to keep him more attuned to life. Maybe I'll develop one, starting tonight. It can be done, you know."

Price, the actor-artist, referred to the new ABC-TV show, "ESP" (for extra-sensory perception) which begins tonight. He is the M.C. and he explains it as a quiz show in which the contestants do not need knowledge, or even luck.
"They just need—what should I

call it—the thing that women call 'intuition,' and men call a 'sixth sense' and horseplayers call a 'good hunch.' Let me put it this way, what you need is what you wish you had at Las Vegas
Price laments that he has never had this extra sense that extends beyond seeing, hearing, feeling, smelling and tasting. This is not,

then, why he was chosen to head the show.
The reason he was selected is that three weeks ago, "simultaneously," from three parts of the city of New York, phone calls came in to the producer's office suggesting my name. Amazing!"

The producer, feeling this was extraordinary if not extra sensory, wired Vincent in his California home. "I called my agent and said, 'What is ESP, for heaven's sake?' He said, 'What do you mean, what is ESP? You're talking to a sensitive.'"

Unable to fight such concentrated perception, Price took the job—even though other commitments will make it necessary for him to commute across country weekly to fulfill it.

The six-foot actor turned down dozens of television quizmaster jobs before this came along. ("Too many Empire State Buildings were given away for to little.") The reason he took "ESP" is obvious. He is a probing intellect, who abhors only three facets of life: Snobbery, closed minds and intolerance.

"I think there's no question about it, extra sensory perception is an amazing and powerful sense," he says. "It has been studied by Duke University and others (under the heading, parapsychology), but the time has come for the masses to know about it—that more experiments may be made possible."

It may be recalled that Price's long session on "The \$64,000 Question" as an art expert did national wonders for art museums. Curators have said that his TV appearances "gave art a haircut," and were responsible for the beginning of a sharp upsurge in prices on American paintings.

Some scientists contend that ESP can be developed with time.

'The Drunkard' Given 9,225th Performance

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—This is a report on that Methuselah among melodramas, "The Drunkard," by one of its oldest living patrons.
How well I remember — thanks to some clippings — July 9, 1933. "The Drunkard" was then three nights old. Last night I saw performance No. 9,225 — the silver anniversary show, plus three.

Neely Edwards is the only member of the original cast still in "The Drunkard." I saw Neely again last night, for perhaps the 30th time. He was as spry as ever, although he's 74. He was a mere 49 when he first became the father of the girl who is tearfully wronged.
In 25 years, Neely Edwards has missed only about 50 performances.

"The Drunkard" became a musical five years ago and now is called "The Wayward Way." It is pretty corny stuff, but it was taken seriously as a dramatized temperance lecture when P. T. Barnum produced it in the 90s. The current cast plays it very broadly indeed.

The audience sits at tables and drinks free beer and eats free pretzels and hisses the villain. Very freely. They cheer and applaud, always a little more loudly by about the fifth act, when the heroine escapes from the clutches of the leering you-know-who.

Nither the drama nor the moral explains the success of "The Drunkard." It's the sociability, the fun, the taking part in the performance that have attracted 2½ million. July 6 is the actual anniversary, but that date fell on Sunday, when there never is a performance.
"The Drunkard" has more fig-

ures than the Bureau of Statistics. If all the empty beer bottles — an average of three per adult customer — were laid end to end, it would take forever to pick them up. If all the pretzels fell on you, they'd crush you.
But it wouldn't be as big a crush as some of us have on the play that has broken all theatrical records.

Exercise, Diet Govern Proportions

Q. "Am I proportioned right for my height? I am 4 feet 11 inches tall and weigh 100 pounds. My bust measures 34 inches, waist 24 and hips 35."

A. Your measurements are in just about perfect proportion, but you are a little underweight. Because you are so short you might be wise to take hip-slimming exercises to lose that inch.

Q. "I have developed long dark hairs on my bust. Can they be removed? Please help me. I want to get married but won't because of these hairs."

A. They can be removed by electrolysis.

Q. "I am a young man and I have hair on my forehead. I have to shave there as well as the rest of my face. Is there anything I can do about it? Would not electrolysis be too expensive for such a large area?"

A. I do not believe that you will find it prohibitive, and feel sure it could be arranged on a budget plan. Why not consult a well-trained electrolysis?

Q. "My measurements are: bust 37 inches, waist 31 and hips 42. I am 5 feet 6 inches tall and weigh 162 pounds. Please tell me how much overweight I am. I have a large frame."

A. If your frame is really very

large, you are only about four or five pounds overweight. If it is medium or in between medium and large, you are about 20 pounds overweight. I suspect from your measurements that you would be wise to lose at least 10 pounds, perhaps more.

Q. "I am 35 years old. I recently had a baby and it left stretch marks all over my abdomen and thighs and the upper part of my legs. They are so noticeable that I cannot go swimming. What can I do about them?"

A. Given time they will become less noticeable, but I know of no way to banish them. Don't allow them to cause you to give up swimming. They are probab-

ly much more noticeable to you than to others.

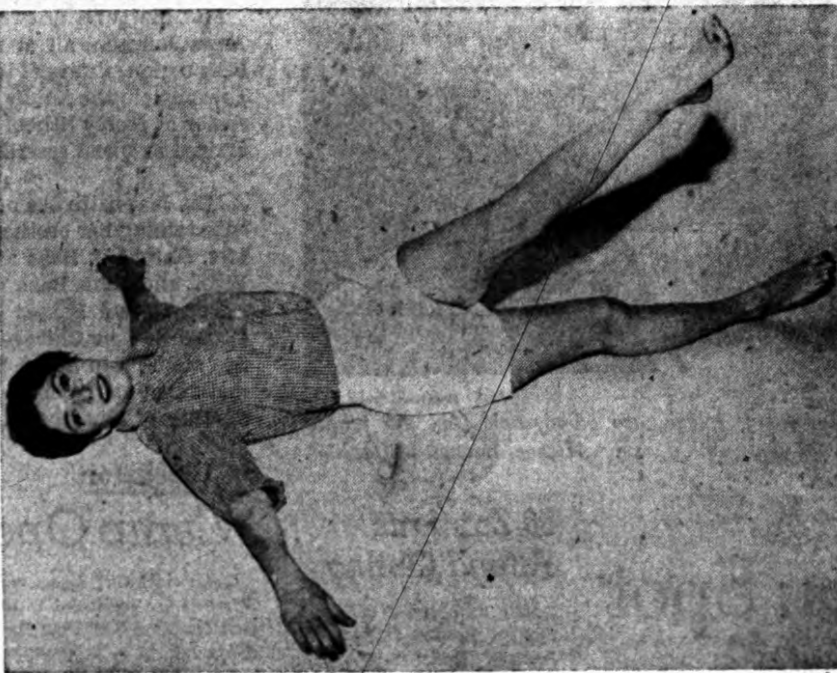
Q. "I have been wanting to take a course in ju jitsu but do not know how to go about it. I know this is out of your line but could you help me?"

Posses Close In on Hermit Who Killed Two Children

REGINA, N.M. (AP)—Cautious posses early today closed in on a black-bearded prospector hermit who shot two children to death. The uranium prospector, who cashed a postal money order Wednesday in the name of Norman A. Foote, also wounded a mother of one of the dead children and put a high-powered rifle slug through the shoulder of a pursuing posse member who stumbled on the fugitive's ambush.

State and Navajo tribal police, aided by Game Department officers and civilian volunteers, bracketed the area where the slayer was found. About 50 men armed with rifles covered roads in the area. The killer was armed with a high-powered deer rifle equipped with telescopic sights and was holed up in northwestern New Mexico's rugged Gallina Mountains. State police said the slayer was "definitely a paranoid" who had recently been released from the Blackfoot mental hospital in Idaho.

State Police Chief Joe Roach, who said he would direct operations when the posses go after the fugitive, said, "The man's treacherous and dangerous. It'll be a streak of luck if we take him alive."

The fugitive had been prospecting for uranium in the area for about six months and knows the country well. An old-timer in the area, Sheriff's Deputy Robert E. Thomason, said there were several ways he could slip out of the trap.

The slayer left his camp about noon yesterday and drove to the mountain town of Cuba, a farming village of less than 500, about 75 miles northwest of Albuquerque.

Driving up in front of a grocery store, he stopped and leveled his deer rifle across the car window.

"I thought he was just bringing his rifle in to pawn it," said Weldon Vernon, clerk in the grocery store. "Then he fired. I ran out and the little girl was lying there. Then he shot a little boy and drove off as if he weren't in too much of a hurry."

The dead girl was Maria Cebada, 12. The soft-nosed 30-06 slug passed through her back and raked a flesh wound across the stomach of her mother Mrs. Sofia Cebada. Eddie Cebada, 13, nephew of the slain girl, was sitting 45 feet away on the porch of his family's store. The second bullet struck him in the right hip and

severed an artery. He was dead on arrival at an Albuquerque hospital.

Mrs. Cebada said of the killer, "I never saw him. I never saw him before."

State police cars took up pursuit. No trace of the slayer was found until dusk.

Then, acting on a tip from Jack Davis, a rancher, a three-man posse went to check a camp where Davis had seen the curly-bearded slayer several days before.

"We walked right in on him but didn't know it until it was too late," said Leonard Brasuel, a Cuba.

Sam Hill was wounded in the shoulder and rushed to an Albuquerque hospital. Police converged on the dish-shaped mountain valley 20 miles north of here.

Searchers Find Bodies of 3 'Vacationing' Miners

SOPHIA, W. Va. (AP)—The bodies of three workmen were recovered from a southern West Virginia coal mine yesterday after an explosion.

The men had interrupted their vacation for what they thought would be a single day's work at the Slab Fork Coal Co. No. 1 mine. Deep inside the mine, they were killed by a sudden gas explosion.

Sam Sawyers, 54, was the father of 12 children. He and Walter Moore, 38, lived at Slab Fork. Herbert Cline, 42-year-old night foreman from Maxwell Hill, had six children.

Madame Chiang Rips Defeatists

Addresses 1,200 People at U. of M.; Presented With Honorary Degree

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—Mrs. Chiang Kai-shek attacked defeatist intellectuals in a speech last night at the University of Michigan.

The wife of the President of Nationalist China mentioned no names in saying there are some intellectuals who would surrender to communism.

"It is a tragedy," she said, "that some powerful minds have allowed themselves to be enmeshed in arguments over means such as relaxations of tension, appeasement and finally slavery, better-than-annihilation, groveling in the hopeless hope that life would be spared them."

Mrs. Chiang was presented an honorary doctor of laws degree by the university's president, Harlan Hatcher. She was cheered by a capacity crowd of more than 1,200 attending the university's special convocation.

She said communism is moving toward its doom. "In fact," she said, "anticommunism runs deepest wherever it is under the Communist heel."

The horrors of nuclear war, she said, have come so uppermost in the minds of some present-day eminent men "that freedom and values of human dignity which we were taught to cherish above all else have become secondary to biological survival."

She cited as an example of defeatism a recent protest march made against Britain's atomic research center. She called it "supine docility."

She said defeatist intellectuals "are ignoring the fact that if total darkness should fall upon the world, it would be they who have made the Communist conquests possible by destroying the will to fight."

Hopping onto the lift and into the open hood, he promptly curled up and went to sleep in the right fender well.
