OAKLAND UNIVERSITY



In 1957, the late Alfred G. and Matilda Wilson donated \$2 million and their 1,500-acre Meadow Brook estate to Michigan State University to establish a college in Oakland County.

Oakland University was founded in 1957 as a branch campus of MSU, with 570 first-year students. By the mid-1960s, it had evolved into a medium-sized university and in 1970 became an independent, state-assisted university. It now offers more than 65 undergraduate programs and more than 25 graduate programs and enrolls about 13,000 students.

OU's distinct instructional programs—the College of Arts and Sciences, School of Business Administration, School of Engineering and Computer Science, School of Health Sciences, School of Education and Human Services and School of Nursing—offers a diverse curricula of general education and career preparation courses. Virtually all of these courses are taught by faculty members, not teaching assistants.

The Honors College, a division of the College of Arts and Sciences, meets the educational needs of highly motivated students. The Division of Continuing Education meets the needs of nontraditional adult learners through evening and extension programs.

Academic Support facilities include such notable entities as the Eye Research Institute, the only major eye research center in the United States not affiliated with a medical school; the Meadow Brook Health Enhancement Institute, which provides health maintenance/health improvement and cardiac rehabilitation community outreach programs; and the Center for Robotics and Advanced Automation, a unit of the School of Engineering and Computer Science that utilizes high technology manufacturing methods.

And OU's professional arts programs annually attract thousands to the campus. OU has received national recognition and local kudos for its Meadow Brook Theatre, Meadow Brook Art Gallery, Meadow Brook Hall and Meadow Brook Music Festival. OU is located in Oakland County, near the small town of Rochester. OU's modern campus, which houses the university's many academic and public service programs, is located on a beautifully wooded site—much of it still undeveloped.

DR. PAUL HARTMAN

Athletic Director



Oakland University athletic director Dr. Paul Hartman is in his second decade as head of Pioneer athletics. Hartman has taken four different athletic programs to new levels of success in an administrative career that began in the mid-60's.

The OU athletic program has flourished under Hartman. Last year the women's swimming team won its fourth straight national championship, while the men's swimmers finished in the top three nationally for the eighth straight season. OU also had its soccer team earn an NCAA bid for the seventh consecutive year, reaching the national semi-finals. OU also finished second in the race for the President's Cup, its best ever ending in competition for GLIAC supremacy. In 1990-91 the Pioneers had their first-ever All-American in cross country. The 1989-90 season saw three winter teams place in the top four nationally, including the champion women's swimming unit. Those

three, men's swimming, women's basketball, and the women's swimmers, won GLIAC titles, and were joined by the soccer team in post-season play. OU won four GLIAC Championships in 1988-89, and eight of the 10 league teams finished no lower than third. Men's and women's swimming won league titles and finished in the top three nationally. Women's basketball and women's volleyball also won league crowns, with the hoopsters advancing to the NCAA tournament. Soccer, Oakland's only non-GLIAC sport, was defeated in the national semi-finals.

Hartman has made a number of changes since arriving at OU. The department has brought back a Varsity "O" Club for former athletes, as well as the Oakland 100, a basketball support group. OU has also brought back baseball as a varsity sport, and made a number of improvements in the Lepley Sports Center, ranging from the refurbishing of the locker rooms and equipment area to renovation of offices and playing facilities. The department has also added the Pioneer Lounge, which is used for conferences and athletic receptions.

Previously Hartman had developed additional summer camp programs, created a new season ticket plan, instituted a Hall of Honor for exceptional Pioneer athletes, and introduced the first athletic team banquet.

The OU athletic director also made a large impact in his previous posts. At Plymouth State College in New Hampshire, his first post, Hartman started a football program with enthusiastic student support. Fifteen years later, a running back named Joe Dudek put that program on the map with a bid for the Heisman Trophy. In his second post, at Florida International University, Hartman began a women's golf program. One of the first women's scholarship award winners was Pat Bradley, who later became the first \$2 million winner on the Ladies Pro Golf Association tour. Hartman did not begin the basketball program at his next stop, the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, but one of his athletes there, Terry Porter, drew national attention as a NBA draftee from a non-scholarship school, and is now a outstanding point guard for the Portland Trailblazers.

A graduate of Ohio State University and a native of Columbus, Ohio, Hartman lives in Rochester with his wife, Jane. He is the third OU director, succeeding Corey Van Fleet in June of 1983. The only other AD was OU's founding father of athletics, Hollie Lepley.

GARY PARSONS

Head Soccer Coach

Now into his second decade as head coach of the Pioneers, there isn't much that Gary Parsons hasn't accomplished with the Oakland University soccer program. OU has established itself as a soccer power during the last 11 years thanks in great part to Parsons' efforts.

Under Parsons OU has gone to seven straight national tournaments and 10 in the last 11 years. OU has also advanced to the national semi-finals on five different occasions, including one trip to the finals. The Pioneers have been the number one team in its region four different years, and have been rated as high as second nationally. During Parsons' tenure Oakland averaged almost 16 wins a year and has averaged one All-American and four All-Region players per season. His career mark is 181-48-23 in his 12 years.

OU's fifth semi-final berth came last season, when the Pioneers matched their mark for best record by going 18-3-1. Oakland beat California State-Chico at home in the first round, and then avenged a regular season loss by shutting out Lock Haven, 2-0, on the road. OU's run for the title ended with a 3-1 semi-final loss to host Tampa.

Parsons coaching success began before his arrival in Rochester. After going to four straight NCAA tournaments as an assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and Eastern Illinois University, he almost led OU to the playoffs in his first year with a 14-4-1 record and the number one ranking in the Mideast Region. He upgraded the schedule and shored up some weak areas for his second season and Oakland became one of the top soccer powers in the nation.

His 1982 squad lost in the national semi-finals to Florida International University. The following season the Pioneers returned to the final four, suffering a 1-0 loss to Seattle Pacific. Both losses were on the road to the eventual national champion. After those two tough semi-final losses, the Pioneers advanced to the national tournament for the third consecutive season. This time, Seattle Pacific needed a penalty kick shootout to oust the Pioneers. In 1985, OU missed out on the playoffs despite a 14-3-2 mark which included a 13-1-1 record in the last 15 games. This just fueled OU's fire in 1986.

That year's run to the national finals included a pair of 1-0 home playoff wins against Lock Haven University and Davis and Elkins College. These games sandwiched a stunning 2-1 win on the road against Gannon University, a team the Pioneers had never beaten before. The playoff run ended in Seattle, when Seattle Pacific scored two early goals and coasted to a 4-1 title win. In 1987 OU returned to the national tournament, losing a first-round match-up to semi-finalist Missouri-St. Louis. A third-straight trip came in 1988, and a fourth final appearance ended with an overtime road loss at California State-Northridge. OU was ousted from the playoffs in overtime again in 1989, losing a first round match-up at Gannon. In 1990, OU fell to the Knights again, this time in the Central Region final and in 1992 Oakland lost to national finalist Sonoma State in a shootout in the tournament's opening round.

Parsons has earned five Mideast Coach of the Year selections in his nine Pioneer seasons. He was the coach



of the victorious West team in the 1988 Soccer Senior Bowl in St. Louis, a team which included John Stewart, the second two-time All-American in Oakland soccer history. In 1989 Earl Parris became the sixth Pioneer under Parsons to be selected to the Senior Bowl, meriting a post-season trip to both the indoor and outdoor classics.

Parsons is the former coordinator of the Intercollegiate Soccer Association of America Division II national top 20 poll, as well as the former chairman of the NCAA Division II Soccer Committee.

In addition to his coaching prowess, Parsons enjoyed a noteworthy playing career. He was voted the Most Valuable Player at Plymouth State College as a senior and helped the Panthers make the New England State College Athletic Conference finals in his last two years. Parsons holds degrees in math and physical education from Plymouth State.

A native of Oakham, Massachusetts, Parsons also serves as an assistant coach with the Michigan State Youth Soccer Association's state select program, and is on the staff of the Region II Olympic Development program, serving as the U171/2 regional coach. He also directs his highly successful OU soccer camps during the summer months.

STEVE SEARGEANT

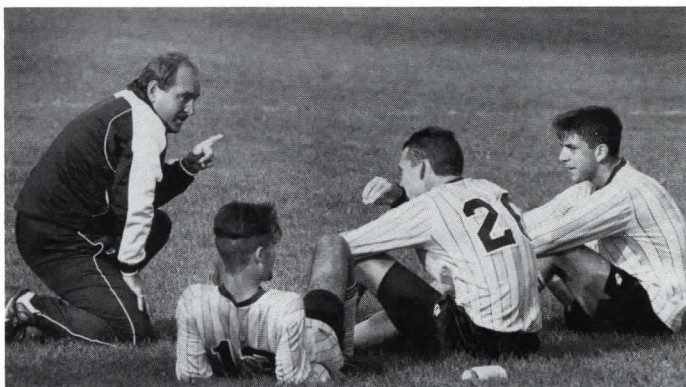
Assistant Coach

Steve Seargeant is back for his second season as Gary Parsons' top assistant coach. Seargeant was previously Parsons' assistant in 1984, before beginning his second stint at Oakland University last year.

Seargeant, a native of England, played soccer professionally for 16 years. He has been a camp coach and clinician since retiring from the professional ranks in 1982. His other coaching stints include the Sport Club and Michigan selects, and the Wallasey Youth team in his native England. He coached the Wallasey team for five seasons.

As a youth Seargeant had the honor of playing in historic Wembley National Stadium for England's national under 16 team.

The 42-year-old Seargeant is single and lives in Auburn Hills.



RALPH TORRE

Assistant Coach



Ralph Torre is in his fourth year as an assistant coach on Gary Parsons' staff. Torre was OU's starting goalkeeper for two seasons prior to beginning his stint as an assistant in 1990.

Torre earned All-Region honors in both 1988 and 1989. His 11 shutouts that year rank second on the single-season charts, while his 0.74 goals against average rates him fourth. He is fourth at OU in career saves and shutouts and second in goals against average. Torre helped lead

the Pioneers to a pair of NCAA tournament bids, including a trip to the final four in 1988. The Pioneers were 29-9-5 with Torre in net.

A native of Mississauga, Ontario, Torre is a graduate of Oakland with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English. He is currently pursuing a Master's degree in English at OU in addition to his coaching duties.

Torre is single and lives in Pontiac.

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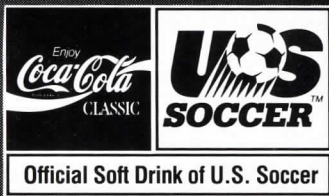
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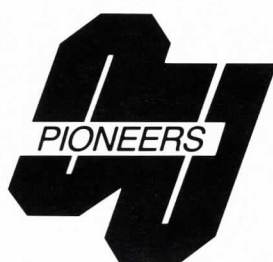

EXPLOSIVE PIONEERS LOOK FOR FINAL FOUR REPEAT

All the records fell last year. The Oakland University soccer squad scored more goals and won as many games as any in school history. A team that showed marked improvement as the year went on, OU won its last 10 games and was unbeaten in its final 12 heading into a semi-final match-up with host Tampa, one in which OU lost by a 3-1 count.

The Pioneers averaged almost four goals per game during that winning streak and allowed just five in the 10 games with seven shutouts. The streak culminated with a 2-0 victory in the regional final at Lock Haven, avenging an earlier 4-0 loss to the same team at the same site. That win stamped the 1992 version of the Pioneers with greatness.

"Our success this year is going to be keyed upon how bad the players want to win," coach Gary Parsons said, "We got close last year, made it to the semi-finals, and were disappointed with our result. We have almost everyone back, so on paper we have a good team. The question is what we are going to do about it."

The astounding offense was last year's story. The record-breaking Pioneers were fifth in the country in goals per game, and had two of the top 12 scorers nationwide in Eli Tiomkin and Mali Walton. Both will be back for their junior years. In fact, of OU's 80 goals last year, the players who scored 74 of them will be back. It looks like another bad year to be an opposing goalkeeper when Oakland takes the field.

"Our offense was excellent last year, but we could have played better as a team," Parsons said. "My key is whether we will be better as a team. We can improve our team attack and team defense either by making a few line-ups shifts or changing our formation."

Tiomkin and Walton lead the scoring parade. Eli was tied for ninth nationally in scoring with a school record 51 points on a record-tying 20 goals and 11 assists. Mali was 12th in the nation with 48 points on 17 goals and 14 assists, and earned second-team All-American honors. The two combined for eight game-winning goals and caused a lot of havoc around the opposing net. Sophomore LaMarr Peters also returns to the front line. Peters, a starter early in the year, scored four goals with six assists. Another soph, Nathan Bradley, returns after scoring five goals in limited time last season. As if the OU offense needed a boost, it will get one with the return of Mike Thornton after a year's hiatus. Thornton scored 16 goals in two seasons, and will give opposing defenses even more of a headache. Among the newcomers, freshman Anthony Verrino is the most likely to see extended playing time. He was a third-team All-State choice in Class A a year ago. Another front-line candidate is Andy Kalmbach, a solid high school goal scorer who, like Thornton, hails from Minnesota. Freshman Ben Cesa and sophomore Joel Bjerke round out the forwards.

The Pioneer midfield is solid with the return of seniors John Gentile and Dominic Scicluna and junior Andrew Wagstaff. Gentile will hold down the middle of the midfield and is as smooth as they come. He scored four goals and had seven assists despite missing seven games with a quad injury. The fiery Scicluna should be ready to play a full season and will add to the midfield stability. Wagstaff scored 11 goals with eight assists for 30 points last year, including both goals in the win at Lock Haven. Also back in the midfield is junior David Ankori, a defensive midfielder who also had a pair of goals and eight assists a year ago. Among the newcomers, both Kalmbach and freshman Matt Freeman have the best opportunity for playing time. Freeman is a Michigan Dream Team choice from Troy High School. Other midfield possibilities are Cesa, Bjerke, and freshmen Scott Roberts and Chad Seabold.



Senior Mike Sheehy

While the offense received all of the notoriety, the defense more than held its own. OU was sixth nationally in goals allowed, while senior goalkeeper Mike Sheehy was 10th in goals against average. Sheehy, a three-year starter, had a 0.97 goals against average with 10 shutouts last season. He is just five shutouts away from equalling the Pioneer career record, and earned his second All-Region award last season. Junior Bill Miller and sophomore Matt Infante, both unscored upon in limited action last year, as well as freshman Ryan Adams round out the goalkeeping crew. The Pioneers return both of their outside defenders in senior Jim Harrison and sophomore Will Bothe. Harrison is a three-year starter, while Bothe started every game as a freshman last year. The defensive question is who will replace second-team All-American Derek Williford at sweeper. Coach Parsons hopes the answer is sophomore Chad Schomaker. Schomaker played more minutes than any other Pioneer during his freshman season last year, and scored five goals with a

freshman school record 13 assists. Another back line candidate is freshman Paul Doroh, a solid one-on-one defender like Harrison and Bothe. Other defenders include freshman Mike Wdowiak. Ankori could also move back to defense if needed.

As usual the schedule reads like a who's who in the Division II top 20. The Marriott Soccer Classic concludes its first decade with perennial powers Florida Tech and Lock Haven providing OU's opposition. The Pioneers play at the Keene State Puma Tournament, and battle all of the toughies in the central region, hosting Northeast Missouri State, Missouri-St. Louis, Lewis, and Mercyhurst, and travelling to Gannon and Wisconsin-Parkside. Oakland also continues its rivalries with state Division I's Detroit Mercy, Eastern Michigan, and Western Michigan.

"We are looking for leadership from our upper classmen, particularly our seniors," Parsons said. "Your seniors can either lead you to the top or get in the way, so how badly they want to win will be important."

The Pioneers have made seven straight trips to the NCAA Tournament, and have extended their season 10 of the last 11 years. Still, Oakland has made just one trip to the championship game and has yet to win a title. That could all change this year. With a strong senior class and a high-scoring squad filled with young veterans, the Pioneers could finally reach the mountain top.



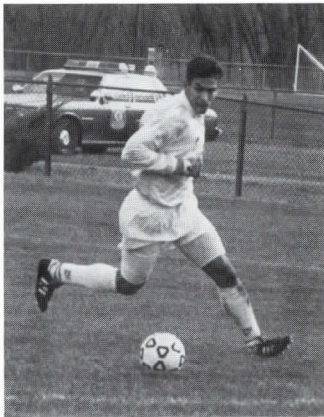
