

## GIFTS, GRANTS ACCEPTED BY OU BOARD

The Oakland University Board of Trustees accepted \$210,361 in gifts and grants at the January 28 meeting on campus.

Included was \$28,600 from the Oakland County Library Board for the county's reference hot line. The reference service is located in OU's Kresge Library and used by libraries in Oakland County.

Some \$39,386 was received from area individuals who are members of the President's Club, an organization that supports the university and its programs.

The largest single source of funding was the Michigan Council for the Arts with \$96,198 to assist the university in five separate cultural projects.

The arts grants were: \$80,000 to help support a Meadow Brook Theatre touring production of Garson Kanin's "Born Yesterday"; \$8,300 to help the theatre present "Yankee Ingenuity," the world professional premiere of a musical by James Wise (score) and Richard Bimonte (book) based on "Fashion," a 19th century comedy by Anna Cora Mowatt; \$6,028 to help support a Meadow Brook Festival appearance of the Pennsylvania Ballet; \$1,000 under the direction of Carol Halsted, physical education, for the Nonce Dance Ensemble; and \$870 to Harold McKinney, music, for a premiere performance of a sonata entitled "Creative Profile Impressions."

## 'VIEW FROM THE BRIDGE' AT STUDIO

Arthur Miller's powerful "A View From the Bridge" will open at Oakland University's Academy of Dramatic Art on February 13. Through it Miller demonstrates that classical tragedy, not limited to Greek and Shakespearean heroes, is present in the lives of all men.

Eddie will be portrayed by Gil Glasgow; Beatrice, his wife, by Mary E. Bergsman; and Kathryn Sanders as the niece, Catherine.

Al Ruscio, the director, has been a theatre professional for over 20 years with credits in stage, television, and feature films, and is a veteran of such classic TV series as "Playhouse 90," "Bonanza," "Gunsmoke," and "The Untouchables." In 1958 he starred in a production of "A View From the Bridge" directed by Meadow Brook Theatre's Artistic Director, Terence Kilburn, at the Player's Ring Theatre in Hollywood.

"A View From the Bridge" will play February 13-15 and 19-22 in the Studio Theatre on Oakland University's campus: 8:15 p.m. Thurs.-Sat., 2 and 6:30 p.m. on Sundays. Admission is \$1.75 for faculty and staff and \$1.25 for students. For reservations call 377-3015.

A Cornell University administrator has been named director of residence halls at Oakland University. Parker A. Moore will begin his new duties on February 23, Jack Wilson, OU dean for student life, has announced. Since 1973 Parker served as assistant director of housing and assistant dean of students at Cornell University.

He replaces Mitchel Livingston who resigned from OU in October, 1975 to become director of residential services at the University of Iowa.

Moore received his undergraduate degree in physical education from Ithaca College and the Master of Education in Guidance and Personnel Administration and the Ph.D. in Educational Administration from Cornell University.

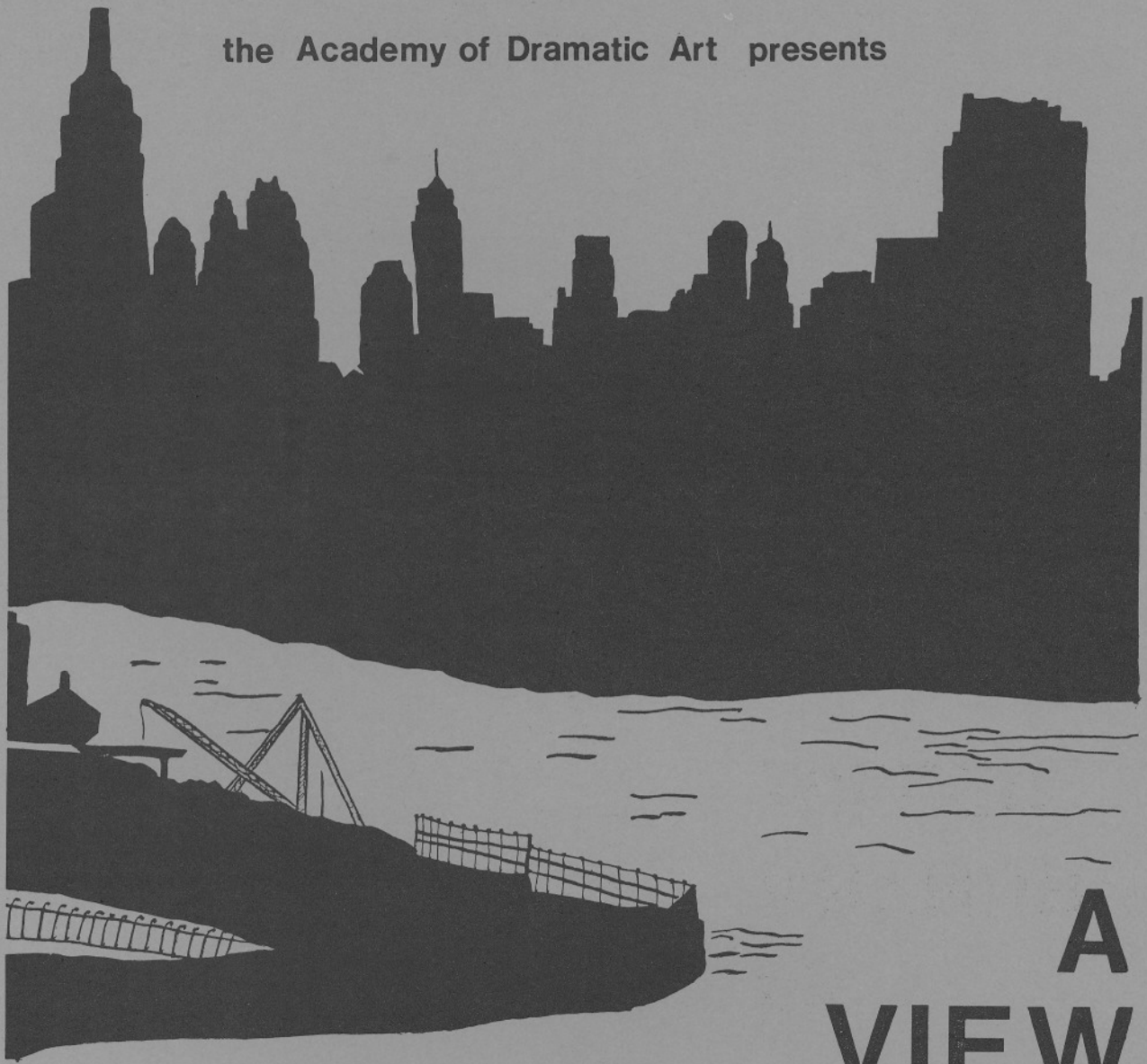
## GARDINER PUBLISHES PAPER

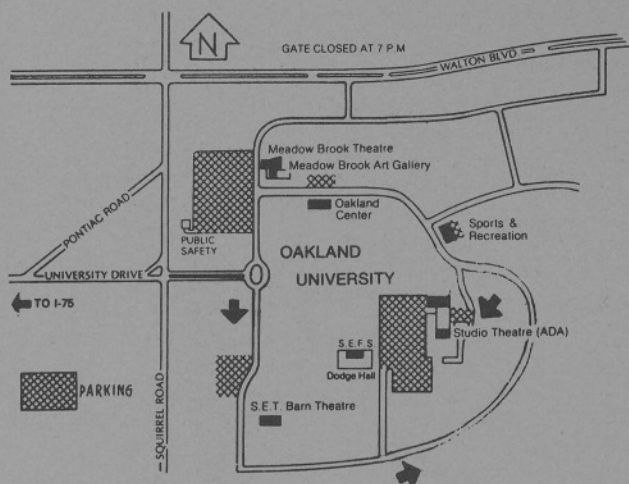

## SYMPHONIC BAND IN AMERICANA CONCERT

The Oakland University Symphonic Band will present its first concert of the winter season tomorrow, February 11, at 8 p.m. in Varner Recital Hall.

Featured will be Robert Levy, trumpet soloist from New York City, performing Alec Wilder's "Concerto for Trumpet, Flugelhorn, and Wind Orchestra." The work was written in the jazz idiom for Clark Terry. Works by other American composers will complete the program. The symphonic band is under the direction of James Dawson.

Dick Gregory will speak on "Social Problems: Anti-Social or Social" in a February 24 appearance at Oakland University.

The public is invited to the 9 p.m. address in the Sports and Recreation Building. Tickets at \$1.50 each are on sale in the Campus Ticket Office, room 48, Oakland Center. The lecture is sponsored by the OU Association of Black Students.

Gregory gained fame as a comedian but chose to give up that career to fight for the elimination of human suffering that has been brought on by ignorance and apathy.

## CHARLES AKERS PUBLISHES

Charles Akers, history, has published two articles in historical journals. "Our Modern Egyptians: Phillis Wheatley and the Whig Campaign Against Slavery in Revolutionary Boston," appeared in the July Journal of Negro History. Historical New Hampshire, Summer 1975, contains "New Hampshire's 'Honorary' Lieutenant Governor: John Temple and the American Revolution." The latter article offers the first full account of the career of a customs official who became one of the most controversial figures of the War for Independence.

## LIBRARY GETS ARTS GRANT

The Michigan Council for the Arts has recently awarded a grant to the Michigan Library Association for the purpose of planning and presenting a series of seminars on the contemporary arts. Librarians will be aided in evaluating and building collections as well as improving service to patrons in the areas of art/architecture, music, and film. Thomas Lyons, library, has been appointed to an advisory planning committee which represents all phases of the library field.
