

Revolution in Iraq Shocks State Department

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower, Vice President Richard M. Nixon, and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles held a lengthy emergency meeting today on the revolt in Iraq. The President summoned Democratic and Republican congressional leaders to the White House today for a 1:30 p.m. EST meeting.

WASHINGTON (AP)—State Department officials were shocked today at the lightning military coup which overthrew King Faisal's pro-Western Iraq government.

Worried officials clearly regarded the revolt as a major development which could set off new, far-reaching repercussions in other Middle East countries.

Iraq is a cornerstone of the anti-Communist Baghdad Pact.

The news, confirmed by the American Embassy in Baghdad, brought hurried early morning conferences by U.S. officials here to assess its significance and decide, what, if anything, the United States could do.

Cables from Ambassador Waldemar Gailman reported that Iraqi army tanks had been deployed around the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad to protect the embassy and its personnel.

Iraq is the only Arab state unashamedly and legally bound to the West by treaty ties, as a member of the Baghdad Pact with Britain, Pakistan, Turkey and Iran.

The United States, although not a member of the alliance, supports it and is a member of its leading committees.

The immediate diplomatic reaction in London was that failure by the West to come to the aid of the legal Iraqi gov-

ernment almost certainly would spell the end of Western influence throughout the Arab world.

The Baghdad alliance does not commit its members to help each other automatically in case of attack or internal revolt. But it does place on the allies the obligation to consider all-out help in such situations.

All signs suggest that the Iraqi army plot was cunningly timed and long prepared.

Both in Iraq and Jordan there had been for some time much suppressed hostility against the pro-Western policies of the Baghdad and Amman governments.

In recent weeks there had been evidence of mounting tension between Iraq and Syria.

Restrictions on travel along and across the borders of the two countries had been made more stringent.

For the past three weeks all foreigners—which meant mainly Syrians, some Egyptians and some Palestinian Arabs

—had been barred from approaching Iraq's border areas, military camps and all oil installations.

William L. Ryan, AP Foreign News Analyst, writes from Belgrade, that Iraq's revolution can be the beginning of the worst of all crises for the Middle East.

It carries a real danger to world peace.

If King Hussein of Jordan is to survive the overthrow of his Iraqi cousin Faisal, he will need massive support from the outside.

If he gets that support, the Middle East will become a cockpit for a deep world political crisis.

But if the Iraqi revolution is made to stick, its effects also will be felt far beyond Jordan.

If the Iraqi revolution, therefore, consolidates itself, the real payoff crisis in the Middle East is at hand.

Report Adams Will Quit Draws Silence in Capital

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Detroit newspaper, quoting unnamed top-ranking Republican sources, said Sherman Adams plans to quit his presidential assistant's job during Labor Day weekend.

Its copyrighted story said the decision to quit is Adams' own, not that of President Eisenhower.

HAGERTY SILENT

White House press secretary James C. Hagerty declined to comment on the report. Adams himself was not available to newsmen.

The paper said details of Adams' reported plans to leave are still being worked out.

It noted that the timing it gave would be after Congress adjourns but still two months before the November elections.

In the absence of any new evidence to link Adams with Goldfine, Eisenhower has given every indication he regards the matter as closed.

STANDS ON STATEMENT

In the public record, he is standing on his statement that although Adams was imprudent, he is convinced of his aide's honesty and integrity and needs him as chief assistant.

Secretary of Interior Fred Seaton apparently is the overwhelming choice of congressional Republicans to succeed Adams—if Adams should quit.

In his Cabinet job, Seaton has been highly cooperative with senators and House members where it was possible for him to help out with their problems.

He also has the reputation of being able to say "no"—when he has to—in soft language that turns away their wrath.

Adams, on the other hand, has been known as a rather flinty "no" man.

And that obviously has contributed to the unwillingness of many Republicans to defend the presidential aide in the controversy over his acceptance of expensive favors from Bernard Goldfine, millionaire Boston industrialist.

Has No Plan for Starting Tax Inquiry on Goldfine

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Wilbur Mills (D-Ark) said today he has no present plan to start a tax inquiry involving Bernard Goldfine, gift-giving friend of presidential aide Sherman Adams.

Mills heads the Ways and Means Committee, which handles tax questions.

Rep. Oren Harris (D-Ark), chairman of the Commerce subcommittee now checking Goldfine's tangled financial affairs, disclosed yesterday he had talked to Mills "with reference to any possible income tax evasion."

Harris said his inquiry is limited to how regulatory agencies carry out the law. His subcommittee has brought out that Goldfine charged items like hotel bills for Adams as business expenses.

Both Goldfine and Adams have pictured Goldfine's favors for Eisenhower's top aide as acts of friendship.

But Harris' investigators say if that's true, then Goldfine's gifts could not properly have been de-

Lorna Denise Brockman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Brockman, of 150 Juniper St., was found about five feet off the end of a 25-foot long dock behind the family cottage at 6095 Hillsboro St., Springfield Township.

The parents told deputies they had lost track of her only moments before she apparently wandered onto the dock.

Expects Rebels in Cuba to Free 29 GIs Today

U.S. Consul Wollam Sends Hopeful Note From Oriente Province

GUANTANAMO, Cuba (AP)—Cuban rebels were expected to begin releasing their 29 captive American servicemen this afternoon after holding them more than two weeks.

The evacuation from the rebels' isolated mountain camps may take four days or more.

Word of the anticipated release came from U.S. Consul Park Wollam, who has been dicker with Fidel Castro and his lieutenants in the mountains of Oriente province for the captives' return.

"We are hopeful all will be released," Wollam messaged Rear Adm. Robert B. Ellis, commander of the big American naval base on Guantanamo Bay where the prisoners were stationed.

Twenty-eight of the sailors and Marines were kidnaped June 26 on a bus ride through the Cuban countryside and two more were grabbed near the base. One of the latter has been returned.

Ellis said he was not sure how many men would be freed today.

The copters have been the only foreign aircraft allowed to fly over rebellious Oriente province by President Fulgencio Batista's government.

The rebels' reported decision to start freeing the servicemen appeared to indicate they have given up hope the kidnappings would help them wheedle concessions from the United States.

They had been seeking recognition as genuine belligerents—instead of unorganized revolutionaries—and hoped this might lead to a promise that American aid to President Fulgencio Batista's government would be shut off.

C. of C. Hails High Success of Water Follies

The follies last night completed its fifth and final performance at Wisner Stadium.

Clamp Continuous Curfew on Terror-Gripped Cyprus

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—A round-the-clock curfew was clamped on Cyprus today to halt mounting communal warfare between Greek and Turkish Cypriots. Terror gripped the island.

The British governor, Sir Hugh Foot, ordered all persons to stay in their homes until further notice except civil servants and essential public workers.

It was the most drastic security move since the shootings, bombings, ambushes and riots began on this Mediterranean island three years ago.

The Greeks and Turks here have been fighting each other since June 8, ever since the word got out that the new British plan for the island would not satisfy the Greek majority's desire to unite with Greece.

or the Turk demands to partition the island to protect their rights.

The Turks took the initial initiative in the communal attacks. But last week EOKA, the Greek underground terrorist organization which had been generally quiet for months, announced it would take the warpath against the Turkish Cypriots.

There was a rising tide of Greek attacks on the Turks and of Turkish retaliation. Three Greeks and five Turks died yesterday, bringing the toll in the past five weeks to 31 Greek Cypriots and 20 Turkish.

Two British soldiers also were killed in a mountain hunt for EOKA fighters but this was an accident. Another soldier's automatic weapon went off.

Last week the island's Greek mayors accused the British administration—which has 40,000 troops here—of being unable to deal with the situation, they asked for United Nations observers and a U. N. police force. The Greek government has suggested a U. N. trusteeship for the island.

In London, there were growing fears of a civil war between the 400,000 Greek Cypriots and 100,000 Turks on the island. The gravity of the situation increased chances Prime Minister Macmillan, Greek Premier Constantine Karamanlis and Premier Adnan Menderes of Turkey.

Fearful Coup Perils Baghdad Pact With Western Powers

An Army group overthrew the pro-Western government of Iraq today and deposed King Faisal in a coup d'etat that may have wrecked the Baghdad Pact, Mideast broadcasts reported.

It was first reported that Premier Nouri Es-Said and Crown Prince Abdulla had been assassinated, but rebel army broadcasts from Baghdad now say that Premier Nouri Es-Said was not killed in today's coup.

The later dispatch by the semi-official Middle East News Agency, broadcast by Cairo radio, said only Abdulla was dead and that he was torn to pieces by angry mobs.

Middle East News Agency said the Iraqi revolt spread to Jordan.

ed Arab Republic in its swift uprising that once again brought the Middle East near to war. It claimed "total victory" in the uprising.

King Faisal, 23, apparently escaped. He was en route this morning to a meeting of the Moslem members of the Baghdad Pact in Istanbul when the army officers struck, seizing the city of Baghdad, assassinating the crown prince, an uncle of the king, and burning his body in the street.

HUSSEIN A 'TRAITOR'

The rebels called Hussein a "traitor."

United Press International correspondent Joseph Mazandi reported from Tehran that the plot also was directed against Hussein, Faisal's cousin who is linked with Iraq in the Arab federal state. Hussein acted in time and escaped the death plot.

In what appeared to be a broadcast from the streets of Baghdad, crowds could be heard shouting "Nasser, we are your soldiers."

The broadcast indicated there was some opposition and said "some of our compatriots are firing at us." The announcer appealed for calm and said "opposition obstructs this sacred revolution."

In Wiesbaden, Germany, the U.S. Air Forces in Europe declined to say if plans were under way to evacuate Americans from Iraq. A spokesman said any such request would have to come from the State Department.

News of the coup d'etat was first brought to the world by the Cairo, Damascus and Baghdad radios. Then the insurgents broadcast repeatedly over "free Iraqi radio" giving details of the plot.

The State Dept. in Washington confirmed that a coup had taken place in Baghdad and that there were a few initial shots. The information came from U.S. Ambassador Waldemar Gailman.

Continuously, the broadcasts received on the regular Baghdad radio frequencies indicated the principal station in the Iraqi capital was in rebel hands. However, there still was no word the rebels held the entire nation.

Tehran closed its border immediately and alerted its army for trouble from the insurgents. Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi of Iran flew from Cannes, France, today to Istanbul to be in close touch with the situation.

Reminding Area Candidates About Poster Limits

Pakistani President Iskander Mirza had just left Karachi to attend the Istanbul meeting of the Baghdad Pact and it was obvious the coup was timed to wreak the worst possible damage to the pact that is a keystone of Western defenses in the Middle East.

Iraq is one of the four Moslem members of the Baghdad Pact with Iran, Turkey and Pakistan. Those four nations form a solid link below the southern borders of Russia, sealing off the Soviet frontier from the rest of the coveted Middle East. Britain is a member of the Baghdad Pact, the United States an associate member.

It also would upset the entire balance of power in the Middle East with Nasser winning unprecedented power, and endangering little Lebanon even further.

Lebanon has been locked in a civil war for ten weeks and the pro-western government has accused Egypt and Syria of aiding the rebels.

Nasser himself has been in Yugoslavia conferring with Marshal Tito.

There were many ironic twists in the reports from Iraq. Faisal and Hussein formed a federation so

Faisal, with a large and powerful army, could protect Hussein against alleged Egyptian pressure. Diplomatic sources in Tehran believed the coup against the two kings was timed to break simultaneously.

But the plot against Hussein was believed nipped last week when Hussein arrested 60 army officers and men, including members of his own bodyguard.

Some of the "free Iraqi radio" broadcasts sounded markedly like the propaganda line used by both Moscow and by the Cairo and Damascus radios.

"Compatriots, now we can speak and breathe," one broadcast said. "The handcuffs have been shattered. Now we can raise our heads and speak freely and say 'down with imperialism, with traitors and with mercenaries.'"

At Istanbul, Turkey, leaders waited in vain at the airport today for Faisal, Abdul Ilah and Nuri Es-Said to arrive for the meeting of the Moslem members of the Baghdad Pact tomorrow.

Then Turkish President Celal Bayar, Premier Adnan Menderes and Foreign Minister Fatih Ruzhu Zorlu took off unexpectedly for their capital, Ankara.

Hunt Resumes for 4 in Plane

Wisconsin, 3 Adjacent States Being Searched for Missing Craft

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Search planes will resume an intensive hunt in Wisconsin and three neighboring states today for an Army electronic engineer and three other persons aboard a missing plane. Hope for their survival was slim.

Lester Weber, 43, an electronic specialist employed at 6th Army Headquarters at the Presidio in San Francisco; his wife, Lorraine, 41; his brother, Richard, 42, and Richard's wife, Frances, 29, were aboard the plane. Lester Weber was the pilot.

More than 70 aircraft ended the second day of the intensive search yesterday without finding a clue to the whereabouts of the single-engine aircraft.

The search extending into four states became one of the biggest Civil Air Patrol missions in recent history.

The Wisconsin CAP planes were joined by four CAPs from Sawyer Air Force Base in Upper Michigan, three STCs from the Glenview Naval Air Station near Chicago and by CAP units from Illinois, Minnesota and Iowa.

grown up, playing and developing as well as any other physically normal child. Her excessive energy has not been restricted because of her condition, and, according to her physician, Dr. Robert Ziegler, "this is the best way."

He explained that by allowing Linda to romp and play normally, her body is now in perfect physical condition, ready to undergo the ordeal facing her.

She has been swimming and playing in the Lake Oakland waters in front of her home, and even danced the "Rock-a-Boogie" with her three older brothers and sisters, John, 11, Kenneth, 12, Walter, 14, and Susan, 16.

An appeal for blood donors for Linda was announced in many Waterford Township churches at yesterday's services through the efforts of the Ministerial Association.

Volunteer blood donors have been going to the Elks Temple in Pontiac all day, and will continue to do so until 5 p.m., according to recruitment chairman, Mrs. F. J. Mansfield.

The Forbes family have been warned by doctors that open-heart surgery usually takes from six to eight hours to perform barring complications, and at least 14 pints of blood will be needed, probably more, they added.

The tiny hole in Linda's heart will be filled with a new plastic-type material and she will be living with a mechanical heart while the repair work is in progress.

Linda has never been in any pain, and does not realize the seriousness of why she will have to remain in the hospital until late August.

Her main ambition in life is to "be a baton twirler," and she hopes that a new baton will be among some of the presents she receives at her seventh birthday party, to be held at the hospital July 30th.

Find Remains of Area Man Missing 7 Years

The remains of an elderly Birmingham man, missing on St. Joseph Island, Ont., 40 miles southeast of Sault Ste. Marie, for seven years, were discovered yesterday. A youth saw a human skull on the ground as he walked through the bush at Peck's Point, near the resort town of Milford Haven on the island.

A search revealed other human bones, identified as the remains of John Anderson who vanished in June 1951, while on vacation with his son Henry and daughter-in-law.

Identification was made through a change purse and a snuff box which Anderson was known to have carried and by remnants of clothing.

Anderson was 83 when he disappeared seven years ago. Only last week his son Henry revisited the island in an attempt to find new clues in the case.

Sputnik Due to Pass Over State Tonight

The Russian satellite Sputnik III will pass over Michigan shortly after 9:50 p.m. today, according to the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory at Cambridge, Mass. After coming in sight over Mexico, the sphere will move over Central Texas northeasterly to Wisconsin and Michigan.

Tuesday the satellite will pass over the western tip of Lake Superior at about 10 p.m. Sputnik III was seen in the Detroit area Saturday night. It appeared as a bright white light low in the sky about 10 p.m.

Sheriff Warns Water Skiers

Oakland County Sheriff Frank W. Irons today voiced a warning to water skiers on county lakes in the face of several skiing accidents this weekend.

"The fault usually lies with the person operating the boat which is towing skiers," he asserted. "The operator should watch where he is going rather than watching the skier."

"In fact, it is best to have another party in the boat so one can watch the skier and another the boat's course," he added.

Of a half-dozen boating accidents reported this weekend, two accounted for four injuries. Both involved water skiers.

Dorothy Button, 32, of 81 Goldner St., Waterford Township, was treated at Pontiac General Hospital for injuries received in a freak accident early Sunday afternoon on Lake Sherwood, according to Pontiac State Troopers.

She had fallen from water skis and was about to be pulled into the boat towing her which was operated by Harold Anderson, 30, of Livonia. An unidentified speeding motorboat passed nearby creating waves which sent Anderson's boat out of control.

Before he regained control, the boat wheeled and struck the skier, said troopers.

Three persons were reported injured in a collision on Lake Oakland, said sheriff's deputies. Listed as treated for minor injuries at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital were Gertrude Biskner, 30, 148 Elmwood St., Clawson; Michael Verrier, 9, of 1909 Northwood Rd., Royal Oak; and Michele Collins, 9, of 117 Murphy St.

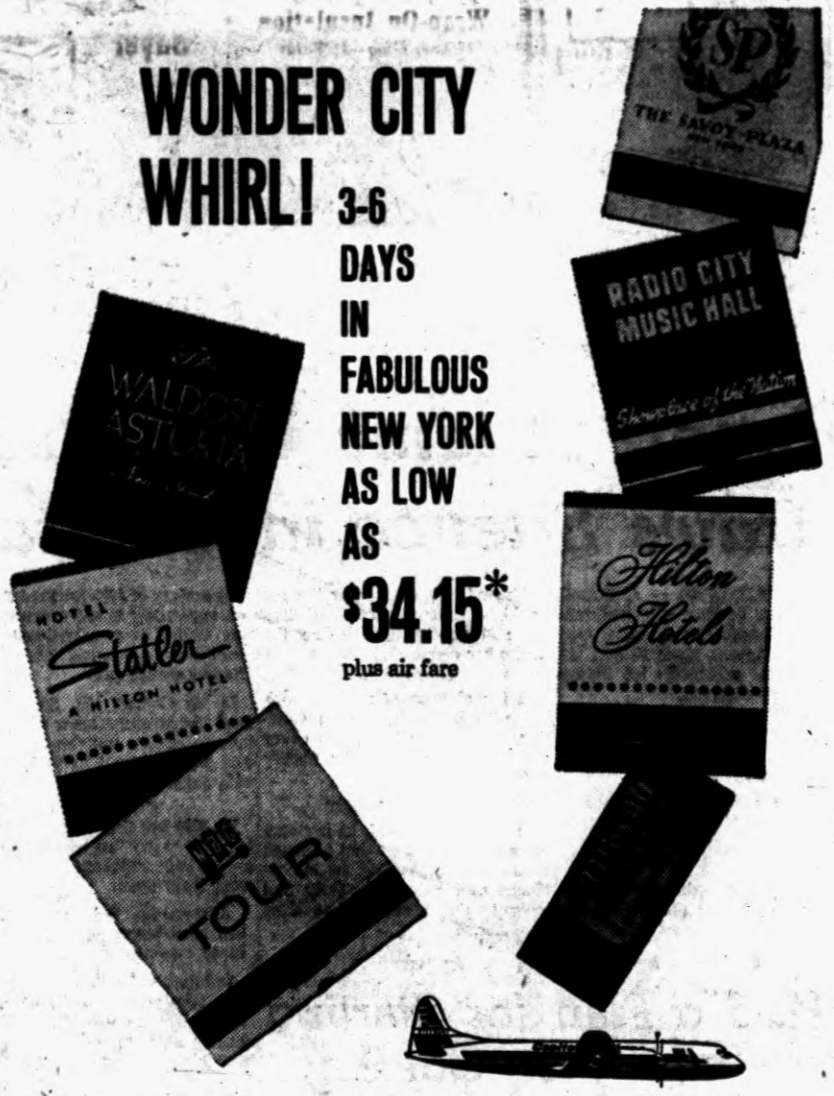
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Detroit Boy, 15, Shot Fleeing From Police

Booming Era Promised by Iraq's Natural Wealth

Iraq, the legendary site of the Garden of Eden, has spawned rich civilizations in the past and has the natural wealth to bring forth a new era for its Arab people.

Oil, the black gold of the Middle East, has been paying for the vast development projects the nation started under 23-year-old King Faisal II and his crafty political strong man Nuri Said.

Instead of pouring all oil revenues into the royal treasury as King Saud has done in Saudi Arabia, the young king has turned as much as two thirds of the royalties back to the nation's development board in a year.

This money went for roads, slum clearance in the ancient capital of Baghdad and an expanding irrigation program aimed at bringing the nation's parched deserts back to the fertility which supported the Sumerians 3,500 years before Christ in the famed valley of the Tigris and Euphrates.

But it still has a long way to go. Annual income is about \$85 a person and illiteracy runs 80 per cent.

World War I freed Iraq from the Turks of the old Ottoman Empire. The nation went to Britain under a League of Nations mandate, and the British presided at its formal birth as a nation in 1932, when King Faisal's father took the throne.

Ever since then the British-owned Iraq Petroleum Co. has been one of the most pro-Western of Arab nations.

The pro-Western policy continued into the cold war, when Iraq was the only Arab state to join the Baghdad Pact—the so-called "Northern Tier" alliance against the Soviet Union.

For their allegiance to the West, Iraq's rulers had to fend off attacks from the other Arab countries, who charged Faisal and Nuri Said with selling out the golden dream of Arab unity.

Chief among the attackers was President Nasser of the United Arab Republic, who has had his eye on Iraq's oil resources to help raise the standard of living for the miserable peasant crammed into Egypt's Nile Valley and help boost his power.

Iraq has no overpopulation problem like Egypt. Her five million people (one fourth of Egypt's) are spread out over the Tigris-Euphrates Valley in the south and working in the northern oil fields and southern Basra fields and refinery near the Persian Gulf.

But though the pro-Western policy brought Iraq prosperity unparalleled in most of the Middle East, Iraqi nationalists were embittered because of the rise of Israel and their own hard struggle for independence from Britain. They harkened to Nasser's call for Arab unity despite the wily political machinations of 70-year-old Nuri Said, one of the cleverest politicians in the Middle East.

Fourteen times premier of Iraq and then premier of the new federation with Jordan, Nuri Said always before had managed to land on his feet in a power play.

In a country like Iraq where most people vote the way their local tribal shiek tells them to—and the shieks themselves often run for parliament with no fear of opposition—the monarchy usually is an important institution.

Faisal ascended the throne after his father died in an accident in 1939. The nation was put under the regency of Abdul Ilah, his uncle, who set about training young Faisal for the problems of ruling.

Abdul Ilah dressed himself as a woman after a 1941 coup and smuggled the young King out to Britain, where he got a solid education at Harrow, Winston Churchill's alma mater.

Faisal returned in 1953 to take over the throne he had held longer than any Arab monarch, since he was 9. But Abdul Ilah remained his chief adviser and was viewed in Iraq as the real power in the palace.

Dead Horse OK as Tax Deduction if It Devours a Hat

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—A dead horse just possibly might be accepted as an income tax deduction, but only if the end came from eating a hat.

A businessman who owned the horse—a fine saddle specimen—and shared his riding pleasure with his customers, deducted \$500 as a business loss when the favorite was laid low.

He told the Internal Revenue Service that while he was riding one day his hat fell off and the horse ate most of it. The horse died soon afterward.

A veterinarian said that flu, not the hat, killed the horse. The businessman's \$500 item was thrown out.

Grain Futures Move Higher

CHICAGO (AP)—A flurry of rapid dealings carried futures prices of wheat and corn substantially higher shortly after the opening of the Board of Trade today.

There was a good mill demand for wheat and as prices firmed up the buying brought out a good volume of short-covering on reports that weekend receipts of the grain at terminal markets still were well below normal harvest-time amounts.

Offerings of corn were light until buyers bid the prices up major fractions of a cent. At the higher levels there was some profit-taking.

Soybeans also firmed up on an accumulation of weekend processor demand but oats and rye held mostly around steady.

Near the end of the first hour wheat was 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents a bushel higher, July \$1.87; corn 1/4 to 1/2 higher, July \$1.30; oats 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, July 64c; rye unchanged to 1/4 lower, July \$1.25; soybeans 1/4 to 1/2 higher, July \$2.26; and lard unchanged to 7 cents a hundred pounds higher, July \$12.57.
