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STUDIO COMPANY PRESENTS AN ADDED ATTRACTION

Those who have missed the opportunity to see the many talents of the Studio Company of the Academy of Dramatic Art this year will get another chance this month. An extra play has been added to the schedule and will be presented June 10-13 in Meadow Brook Theatre. The offering is Luigi Pirandello's psychological drama, *Six Characters in Search of an Author*, which involves principals in a play who assume lives of their own and invade a theatre during a rehearsal of another play.

Terence Kilburn, who recently directed the John Fernald Company production of *Ah, Wilderness!*, will direct the Studio Company finale. He also directed one of the troupe's one-act plays presented in December, *The Happy Journey* to Camden by Thornton Wilder.

Tickets may be bought at the Studio Company office, 282 Hannah Hall (ext. 2267), or at the door on the night of each performance. Faculty/staff rate is \$1.50, students \$1.00 and general admission \$2.00. For the final play, the company is offering student rates to all Oakland University alumni.

HEADING FOR EUROPE

He has a tentative offer from the Experiment in International Living, assigned to Ghana, Ireland or Great Britain. If the offer should not come through, however, Toby says he still will spend the year in Europe. Upon return to the U.S. he plans to begin work on his doctorate in psychology, either at MSU or the University of Arizona.

The workshop is being conducted under the auspices of NEA/AID in cooperation with the Kenya Ministry of Education and UNESCO. He will also be visiting in Morocco, Mali, Liberia, Ivory Coast and Ghana during the summer to gather materials relative to a course being offered in the fall for the first time by the school of education, "Teaching about Black Africa in the Elementary School."
