

Kennedy Facing Major Test

House Will Vote Today Over Rules Committee

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy, only 11 days in office, faced his first major test in the House today with no real assurance he would win.

By his own estimate his prestige at home and abroad were at stake. His backers held prospects for House action on some of Kennedy's New Frontier legislation also hung on the outcome of today's vote.

Opposing forces said this wasn't necessarily so.

Administration forces predicted they would win by a handful of votes. But they conceded that this was not certain.

The question was whether to add three members to the 12-man

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Speaker Sam Rayburn predicted victory by a "rather close" margin in the House today on his controversial plan to liberalize the House Rules Committee.

House Rules Committee and thus end its control by a coalition of Southern Democrats and four Republican members.

Rep. Howard W. Smith, D-Va., Rules Committee chairman, and House Republican Leader Charles A. Halleck, Ind., led the conservative forces opposing the change. Smith charged the move was a "pack" to his committee.

Republicans as a group stood with Smith.

Veteran Speaker Sam Rayburn proposed the membership increase as an "easy way" to break the Rules Committee deadlock which he said threatened to foreclose House action on such Kennedy measures as school aid, minimum wage, and medical care for the aged.

Democrats as a group stood with Rayburn.

There were defections from both sides, however. About 50 Southern conservatives indicated they would cast their lot with the Smith-Halleck bloc. Rayburn's backers were counting on enough help from Republicans to offset this loss.

Both sides said last-minute pressures were tremendous.

Ice Threatening Traffic on Major U.S. Waterways

Despite a warming trend over much of the nation the past two days, the icy grip of prolonged frost threatened to choke off traffic on major waterways in the Midwest and Northeast.

Inland waterways from the Mississippi to the Hudson were closed in the tightening stranglehold of ice as the cold spell entered its 13th day for many areas.

The Mississippi toll control described the ice situation as the worst he'd seen in 28 years.

Temperatures remained below freezing from the middle Mississippi Valley northwest with sub-zero readings in northern Minnesota and northern New England.

...proved the extra velocity, altitude and range. The capsule thus was sighted in the water by an aircraft. A recovery ship should reach the spacecraft within three hours. Telemetry received during the flight indicates the chimp performed satisfactorily.

"Telemetry received from capsule indicated the chimp was still alive when it hit water. However, radio telemetry circuits immediately went out when it landed and no further signals were received."

Reports from Miami Weather Bureau said the weather in the area where the capsule hit, with water features broken clouds, with about half the sky obscured, with 6,000 to 7,000 feet. The wind was 15 to 20 knots, which is about normal for the area.

The chimpanzee had 28 hours of oxygen remaining in the capsule, unless the lines were damaged. However, there was no food or water inside the small, specially formed craft in which he was enclosed.

Douglas is charged with breaking and entering U.S. Drugs, 601 S. Sanford St., Dec. 29.

Reported stolen were \$800 money orders, a money order stamping machine and \$3,000 in cash and merchandise.

Routine investigation led police to Douglas. They were arresting him at his home when he risked police bullets in fleeing.

A crowd estimated at more than 250,000 persons braved intermittent rain to listen to the speeches marking the official installation of the new president.

Quadros was sworn in first by the supreme electoral court of Brazil but his term did not begin formally until he and outgoing President Juscelino Kubitschek appeared before a joint session of Congress.

OK School Bond Issue in Bloomfield Hills

BIRMINGHAM (AP)—Approval of a \$4,150,000 bond issue for school construction and site purchases was given by voters in the Bloomfield Hills School District by a 2 to 1 majority.

The 30-year bonding proposal was accepted by a vote of 2,087 to 1,027. The total vote represents nearly 50 per cent of the registered voters in the 28-square-mile school district.

The approval of the bond issue will mean a tax hike to property owners of about 1/4 per cent over the current levy.

School officials, however, believe that the higher rate will be in effect only one year as a result of the increasing property valuation in the district.

The proposal was presented to the voters after studies made by Michigan State University indicated that enrollment in the district will rise by nearly 400 students annually for the next five years.

A primary concern of the school board was the anticipated student increase on the high school level. Presently there is only one high school and it has reached its capacity of 600 students.

"Undoubtedly the most serious of the school board will be to have a 32-room addition built on the high school," said Asst. School Supt. Irving Mennet. "The addition will nearly double its present capacity."

"We will move as fast as we can to get construction under way, probably as soon as the bond leaves the ground," Mennet said. "The need for additional classrooms is urgent."

2ND JUNIOR HIGH
Other plans call for building a second junior high school, an elementary school and six-room additions and libraries for three elementary schools.

The voted funds also will be used to purchase sites for a second high school, a third junior high and three elementary schools.

School district voters went to the polls last time in March 1959. At that time they approved a \$700,000 bond issue which was used to construct an addition to the junior high school and build the Conant Elementary School.

Peiping Is Getting Into Food Trades

WASHINGTON (AP) — In what may be the start of a new Red Chinese trade offensive in South Asia, Peiping quietly has offered to sell 30,000 tons of Cuban sugar to Burma at an undisclosed price.

U.S. officials, reporting this today, said Red China also has shipped more than 100,000 tons of rice to Cuba, 15,000 tons of rice to Guinea in North Africa and the equivalent of more than \$20 million in foodstuffs, mainly rice, to Ceylon.

Thus, China would be exporting food although it has reported its harvests have been struck by the greatest natural calamities in a century.

U.S. experts closely following Chinese Communist affairs say that, so far, there has been no evidence of mass famine on the Chinese mainland although there are signs of localized scarcities, particularly in South China.

Costs to Consumers Up 0.1 Pct. in Month

CHICAGO — The Detroit Consumer Price Index advanced 0.1 per cent from November to December, according to a report issued today by the North Central Regional Office, U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The December index for Detroit is 125.8 (1947-49 equals 100), 1.5 per cent above the level of a year ago.

Decreases of 1.2 per cent for transportation, 0.4 per cent for personal care and 0.1 per cent for medical care were partially offset by increases of 0.6 per cent for food and 0.3 per cent for housing from November to December.

Decreases in the prices of new and used cars were responsible for decreases in the transportation index. During this same period, apparel, reading and recreation and "other goods and services" remained unchanged.

Compared with a year ago, there were increases of 4.2 per cent for personal care, 3.3 per cent for food, 3.2 per cent for "other goods and services," 3.1 per cent for medical care, 2.3 per cent for reading and recreation, 1.0 per cent for apparel, and 0.3 per cent for housing. Over the same year period from December 1959 to December 1960 the transportation index declined 2.0 per cent.

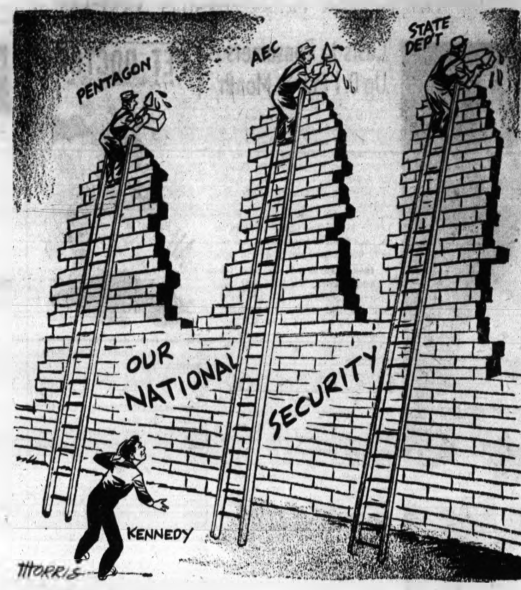

David Lawrence Says:

Kennedy Is Nursing 'High Hopes'

WASHINGTON—If the aspirations of President John F. Kennedy, as revealed in his "State of the Union" address to Congress, could ever be fulfilled, he would be the greatest chief executive in our history.

If the rest of the world heard the vision to reform themselves and shape their policies to conform to President Kennedy's ideas, especially in the use of our funds, Utopia would be just around the corner.

In fact, the President's cordial invitation to the Russians to join us on a trip to Venus and Mars wouldn't seem so unreal either.

For, on international policy, it was a splendid message, keeping with the idealist of fourth time and again by President Eisenhower.

On domestic policy, the speech was a series of contradictions between hope and reality, between theory and practicality.

While painting a gloomy picture of the internal economy of the United States and presenting a fine analysis of the gold problem—on which, incidentally, his views are as sound as a dollar—there wasn't a single sentence that explained the causes of the so-called "recession."

There were few details as to what the new administration intends to do about all the ills which it says are present in our domestic economy, though it promises that the new program of expenditures, "including revenue from a stimulation of the economy, will not of by themselves unbalance the earlier budget."

VAN SPENDING PROGRAMS It's hard, however, to see how the "government will balance its budget" while it keeps spending programs as Kennedy mentioned.

The domestic part of the President's address was plainly political and partisan. It raised high hopes and talked optimistically of desired reforms. But how can they be achieved? Kennedy spoke two sentences in his address that will puzzle Americans of good deal (he said):

"Before my term has ended, we shall have to test some whether a nation organized and governed such as ours can endure. The outcome is by no means certain."

Did the President mean that a controlled economy would have to be imposed from the top? Did he mean that, in the present state of conflicting forces, the groups with the largest voting power are to be heeded, irrespective of the merit of their demands?

On the military side, the President's proposals will be welcomed as a sound policy of protection. As

the President said: "We shall have to test some whether a nation organized and governed such as ours can endure. The outcome is by no means certain."

Did the President mean that a controlled economy would have to be imposed from the top? Did he mean that, in the present state of conflicting forces, the groups with the largest voting power are to be heeded, irrespective of the merit of their demands?

to the words addressed to foreign nations, Kennedy's advisers gave him the right counsel.

He does not minimize the Communist threat. Indeed, he pointedly drew attention, for instance, to Latin America as an area in which "Communist agents seeking to exploit that region's peaceful revolution of hope have established a base on Cuba, only 90 miles from our shores. Kennedy declared flatly, amid applause, that "Communist domination in this hemisphere can never be negotiated."

Most important in the whole address was the following succinctly worded statement:

"The first great obstacle in all our relations with the Soviet Union and Communist China. We must never be lulled into believing that either power has yielded

its ambitions for world domination—ambitions which they forcefully restated only a short time ago.

"On the contrary, our task is to convince them that aggression and subversion will not be profitable routes to pursue these ends."

This utterance transcends all others in the address, and it pursued by Kennedy's Cabinet and other advisers, it will go a long way toward removing fear that the new administration will try to appease our potential enemy.

Another Vote Cast to Let Husband in Delivery Room

"My husband was in the Air Force and our baby was born in the Philippines. But a doctor that he had to beat. He held prenatal classes that were a must to attend, and he practically insisted that the husband remain with his wife in the labor room and in the delivery

"So my husband was with me the whole time, and it was an experience we'll never forget. After I was taken back to my room the doctor let me remain with him while the baby was being bathed and weighed, and the two of them sat and enjoyed a cup of coffee. Now, what do you think of that?" (Mrs. W. S.)

I infer that the doctor was a human being, a square-shooter, had nothing to hide, respected you and your husband's intelligence, and had enough character to ignore hospital rules and regulations excluding husbands from the delivery room.

"I didn't have a rooming-in," continues Mrs. W. S., "but the doctor let me go home in my own car and I was then able to take care of the baby. The doctor wanted his obstetrical patients to go home as soon as possible so you could be with your baby, and he made sure you would have the necessary help at home."

"When you say 'home' is the best place to have a baby, I'm sure you know what you are talking about. But I think I'd be a little frightened. For instance, what happens in case of hemorrhage? Being a layman, I can imagine all sorts of horrible things going wrong. It would be senseless to have the baby at home and then to be rushed off to a hospital."

In case of hemorrhage it would be far better to treat the patient at home than to "rush" her to a hospital. The rush to the hospital would be more dramatic, but after all, real doctors and nurses can't compete with movie and TV actors in their performances.

This and other "complications" are less likely to occur at home than they are in a hospital. I recall only one instance of anything so untoward happening at home, and that was, as I have described in this column, due to the fact that the patient's physician, a very successful one in

the eyes of the public, had entered practice directly from medical school, without wasting any time in an internship.

Seventh Chapter . . . Michigan's Role in Civil War

Slave Incident at Marshall Prompted Writing of 'Uncle Tom's Cabin'

(Editor's Note: This is the seventh in a series of articles on Michigan's role in the Civil War.)

Probably no book served to ignite Northern sentiment against slavery as much as Harriet Beecher Stowe's "Uncle Tom's Cabin." And perhaps it was fitting that the Rev. Josiah Henderson, the original Uncle Tom, came to enjoy freedom in nearby Chatham, Ontario and that a Michigan incident prompted the writing of the book.

In a cemetery on the Thames River, a marker reads, "The grave of Rev. Josiah Henderson, the original Uncle Tom of Uncle Tom's Cabin by Harriet Beecher Stowe."

And Uncle Tom's final resting place, Ontario, came to be the "promised land" for thousands of slaves who used the "underground railroad" to freedom.

At the start of the Civil War there were between 60,000 to 75,000 Negroes who had found homes in Canada. They had arrived at their new homes via this railroad that began mysteriously just beyond the Ohio River.

IN HATCHER'S BOOK

President Harlan Hatcher of the University of Michigan in his book, "Lake Erie," gives credit for the name to a Kentucky master who followed a runaway slave across the Ohio River only to learn that he had disappeared. He gave up the pursuit saying that his slave "must have gone off on an underground road."

Michigan, because of its location on the Canadian border, was about the most important terminus in the road and thousands crossed at various points on the Detroit River.

Levi Coffin of Cincinnati generally has been considered as the "President" of the railroad. He often raised money for rail tickets North and helped establish the many "stations" along the way that provided safe havens for those making the move to freedom.

The routes from the South generally led through Toledo and Indiana towns such as Angola, Gosport, South Bend and Michigan City. Some of the slaves moved to freedom by Great Lakes steamers which carried them from Chicago, Racine or Milwaukee to Sarnia, Battle Creek was an important stop on the road from Indiana. This route came into Michigan near Cassopolis where the leader was Zachariah Shugart.

At Cassopolis the agent was Parker Osborn while at Schoolcraft it was Dr. Nathan Thomas. At Battle Creek it was Erasmus Hussey.

Jabez S. Finch was the agent at Marshall and Edwin M. Johnson at Albion. It was generally regarded that Toward E. Gidley was the man to see at Farmington. There were two agents at Jackson, Lomon Wilcox and Norman Allen.

At Michigan Center it was Abel F. Fitch while there were also stops at Leoni and Grass Lake. John Geddes was in charge at Geddes and there were more stops at Plymouth and Ypsilanti. Some of the men in Detroit were Horace Hallock, Silas Holmes and Samuel Zug.

One of the main "passenger depots" in Detroit was the livery stable at the corner of State and Griswold, now the site of the old

of the Detroit Bank and Trust Company.

In a large livery stable owned by Seymour Flansy, many Negroes were held until it was safe to move across the river. Flansy also owned a hotel and many of the slave-owners seeking their run-away slaves often stayed with Flansy not realizing that their slaves were housed in Flansy's livery stable.

Marshall figured in one of the most important incidents of the "underground railroad" days through the celebrated Crosswhite case. Many of the slaves had elected to stay in Marshall instead of proceeding on to Canada.

They had formed a settlement on the outskirts of the town and it was here that Adam Crosswhite and his wife and four children settled after fleeing their owner in Kentucky, when they learned their family was to be sold separately.

They lived in Marshall in comparative peace with the children attending the district school, but they had arrived at their new home via this railroad that began mysteriously just beyond the Ohio River.

Frank Troutman, the agent and nephew of the owner of the Crosswhite, led the group that had come to Marshall to return them to custody. Troutman and his friends found themselves facing a hostile crowd of Marshall residents who were opposed to returning the Crosswhites to slavery.

The crowd surrounded the Kentuckians and Troutman, upset, spent his time jotting down the names and comments from the group.

County officers soon arrived on the scene with warrants for the

Kentuckians for exhibiting weapons in a rude and threatening manner, assault and battery, breaking into houses and various other offenses.

When the "slave catchers" were arrested and removed, the Crosswhites were left unguarded and free and then they lost no time in taking the "railroad" to Canada.

RETURNS AND SUES

In May of the next year, Troutman returned to Marshall to secure evidence, retain counsel and to seek prosecution for the men who had prevented the capture of the Crosswhite family.

On June 1, 1847, a suit was filed in the Circuit Court of the United States for the District of Michigan in an action of trespass against Charles T. Gorham, Oliver C. Comstock Jr., Asa B. Cook, Jarvis Hurd, John M. Eastley, George Ingersoll, Herman Camp, Randal Hobart, Planter Moss, William Parker, Charles Berger and John Smith for requiring Adam Crosswhite and his family.

The suit claimed large damages. On June 12, 1847 the jury disagreed and was discharged. The second trial was held in Detroit beginning Nov. 18, 1848 and on Dec. 3, 1848 the case was rendered in favor of the Kentuckians and the defendants were assessed the sum of \$1,000 damages with the defendants also to pay the costs of the suit.

Since at that time Chief Justice Roger B. Taney and a majority of the associate judges of the Supreme Court were slaveholders of pro slavery men, an appeal offered little or no promise.

Zachariah Chandler, a Detroit merchant, who was a staunch antislavery man, stepped forth to assume a share of the cost and to prevent financial ruin for some of the defendants.

The aftermath of the Crosswhite

case was a determined effort on the part of the Southern slaveholders to introduce national legislation to prevent a recurrence of the Crosswhite affair. Kentuckian Henry Clay, a personal friend of Francis Pickens, the former owner of the Crosswhites, on Jan. 29, 1850, introduced legislation into the U.S. Senate demanding a more "effective fugitive slave law."

LAW WAS BIASED

The law itself, which was signed by the President on Jan. 29, 1850, was prepared by the radical pro-slavery people. It provided for numerous United States commissioners to be appointed and gave them the power of judge to remand men to slavery, deprived the slaves of his own testimony, right of jury trial and habeas corpus.

The commissioner got \$10 if he decided in favor of the slave owner and \$5 if he decided in favor of the slave.

If U.S. marshals declined to make arrests they could be fined \$1,000 and made to pay for the slave. If a citizen refused to aid a marshal in a capture he could also be fined \$1,000 and be made liable for \$1,000 damages.

The law had just the opposite effect and encouraged free men everywhere to aid the cause of the antislavery movement.

It also was the big factor that led to the writing of "Uncle Tom's Cabin." Nearly a half million copies of the book were printed and it was translated into 30 different languages.

Some of the Northern States, claiming that the law of 1850 was unconstitutional, treated it as a nullity and did not even bother to pass personal liberty bills.

The Civil War itself brought an end to a need for an "underground railroad" although the movement remained active help-

ing freed slaves relocate in the North.

In 1870 Detroit celebrated the adoption of the 15th Amendment, which gave citizenship to Negroes, with George DeBaptist, another leader in the "railway" movement, displaying a sign on his store-

front which read:

"Notice to stockholders of the underground railroad: This office is closed. Hereafter all stockholders will receive dividends according to their merits."

It is debunked many of the fallacies to which overweight people are hopelessly clung, such as blaming the extra pounds on glands or heredity. It long has been recognized that only a very small percentage of overweight is due to glandular disturbance or to other disorders.

According to Dr. Edward J. Steigitz, of Washington, D.C., 99 per cent of overweight is due to overeating.

FOOD DIFFERENT

Yet folks continue to contend that the food they eat, in some unusual and magical way, is different from the food others eat and turns into fat more readily. Also, some feel they cannot escape their inheritance and are therefore helpless so far as slimming is concerned.

I have said often in this column that the chances are that you do not inherit your overweight, but rather the eating habits of your family which you learned early in life and which have a strong hold.

Women (and men too) always have been interested in losing weight for cosmetic reasons, but today it seems clear that obesity is a real health hazard.

The distinguished Dr. C. Ward Crampton, former chairman of the subcommittee on geriatrics of the New York County Medical Society, has said that white overweight is a greater hazard from

middle life on, it even can shorten life after the age of 25.

Dr. Crampton also said, "In aging, calories must be cut down. The decrease in activity from 25 to 60 calls for a reduction of food. BUT even if the activity is the same at 60 as it was at 30,

the basic caloric requirements have diminished 25 per cent."

Well, we certainly have had the word from the medical profession! The important thing is to make a decision or a choice. This is an individual matter but we no longer can hide our heads in the sand of self-delusion.

Hope for Increased Spending

Grim JFK Could Spur Business

NEW YORK (AP)—The very grimness of President Kennedy's view of the state of the economy could give business a lift.

This seeming paradox lies in the response that Wall Street and business planners often take to any indication that Washington is about to loosen further the government purse strings.

And they figure that if the President thinks business is that bad at home and defense needs that urgent, he'll lend an ear to advocates of more spending.

After their first reaction to the President's State of the Union message, stock traders might well take the view that certain industries are bound to be getting new orders soon, that new money will be finding its way into the pockets of the unemployed and others, that various other spending schemes will be pushed.

PROGRAMS TAKE TIME

Such programs usually take a time to be turned into actual money in the bill, but the prospect of their approach could give a new outlook on business prospects to many who have been waiting to see just what the new administration would do.

President Kennedy says flatly we've been in a recession since mid 1950. And he thinks the recovery from the 1958 recession isn't what very convincing. All of which, he says, calls for government action which he'll spell out in coming days.

At the same time, however, he pledges to keep the dollar sound. Just how he proposes to do both—push government pump priming and avoid further inflation—he promises to outline later.

Business already had taken note of the sizable jump in government expenditures proposed in the 1962 fiscal budget offered by outgoing President Eisenhower.

And businessmen are well aware that Kennedy's advisers are using plans that would call for still larger spending.

POSSIBLE INFLATION

The Wall Street bulls have tentatively started pawing the ground.

Businessmen—both Democrats and Republicans—could take the same attitude as to the probability of inflation on the economy of the State of the Union views. Democrats, along with most labor leaders, will say it's about time Washington admitted business conditions needed a helping hand. Republicans, although—doubtless thinking the pump priming unnecessary, will see it as threatening more inflation—the end result being business stimulation, however unhealthy.

Space Heaters a Hazard

The use of space heaters in Pontiac homes has discouraged to day by Fire Chief Dennis R. White who urged home owners to install furnaces whenever possible.

"I realize that many people, because of economics, are unable to purchase 'safety' heating units," White said.

But they should take into consideration that it might pay off in the long run.

Thirty-four fires in 1960 were caused by space heating devices. And the worst fire fatality toll in the city's history was caused by the heating unit. A mother and three of her children perished in the fire.

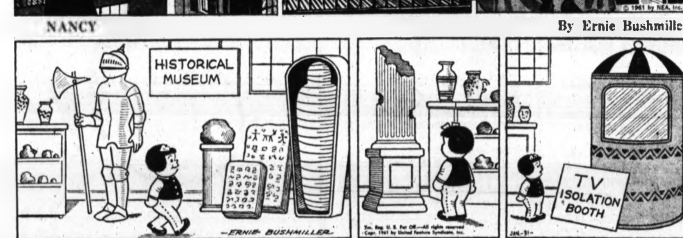

Walled Lake Votes

Extension of 4-Year School Tax Okayed

WALLED LAKE — A four-year extension of a school operation tax was overwhelmingly approved yesterday by voters in the Walled Lake School District.

The proposal which asked the renewal of a special four-mill tax for day-to-day operations carried by a vote of 819 to 327.

The 44 tax is levied against each \$1,000 of assessed valuation and brings in approximately \$250,000 each year to the school district.

The quarter of a million dollars received from the special tax represents 28 per cent of the total school budget, said Supt. Clifford H. Smart.

Because of this high percentage, the superintendent had pointed out prior to the election, that if the proposal failed, drastic cuts would have been required in the school curriculum program.

Voters first approved of the four-mill tax in 1957 for a four-year period. The tax would have been discontinued at the end of the school year had it not been approved again yesterday.

The present levy will handle school operations until September. The renewed tax then will become effective.

The tax does not increase the total operating levy of \$14.12 for each 1,000 of assessed valuation. The school district has a total tax of \$20.12, of which \$6 is used to pay off bonded indebtedness.

Less than 20 per cent of the total registered voters in the school district cast ballots yesterday, Smart said.

May Leave Out One Community

Group Talks of Going Ahead With Drain Plan, Forget Madison Heights

TROY — Mayor Robert J. Huber told the city commission last night that a committee of South Oakland County mayors is considering entering the 12-Town Drain project without including Madison Heights.

If Madison Heights was dropped from the agreement, then the city would not be included in the plan for a combined storm and sewage drainage system to serve several South Oakland cities.

The mayors discussed starting the project with only 11 of the municipalities since the Madison Heights City Council recently voted to take its legal battle on the matter to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Madison Heights officials think the city's \$2.8-million assessment for the 12-Town project is too high.

However, Commissioner Roy L. Duncan proposed a plan under which the city managers of the 12 municipalities involved, including Madison Heights, would meet to negotiate an agreement on the matter.

A motion to have Troy City Manager David E. Firestone enter into negotiations with the 11 other cities was approved by a unanimous vote of the commission. The drain project often has been blocked by litigation since Madison Heights became a partner in the project in 1956.

Twice-Beaten Police Tax Hike to Return to Ballot

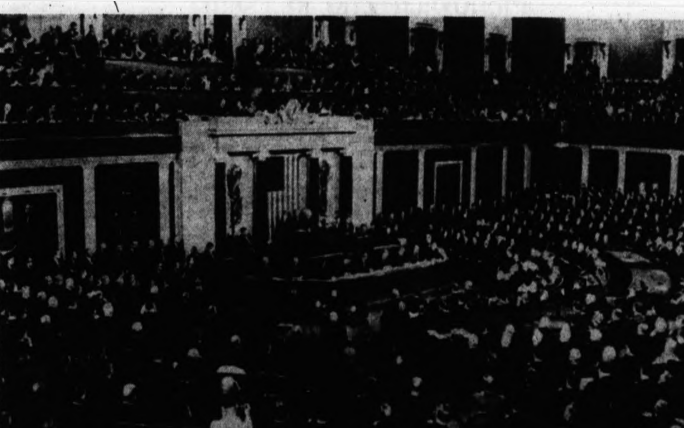

There's only one thing to say about the Ohio State basketball team.

The Buckeyes are without doubt the finest college quintet EVER.

There have been some great basketball units just in the past 20 years.

Basketball fans may remember some of these teams: Kentucky (1947-48-49 and 1953-54-55) with Alex Groza and Ralph Beard; Bradley (1948-50-51) with Gene Melchiorre and Paul Unruh; Oklahoma A & M (1945-46-47) with Bob Kurland; Kansas (1952-53) with Clyde Lovelette.

From this corner, these four in the order given, with the present OSU team on top of the list, comprise the greatest "Big Five."

The Kentucky and Bradley teams during the eras mentioned were without doubt the greatest before this Buckeye unit.

Easing it on personnel, season records and the rough schedules they played are the strong points for picking these five.

Some basketball fans will argue. What about the San Francisco team which ran up 60 straight games, a so-called Major College record?

We've said it before and our contention will always be that the 1955-56 San Francisco teams were good quintets playing a schedule of palsies.

Most coaches know how difficult it is to keep any team keyed up to peak under pressure of a tough schedule with five, six or 10 powerhouse teams in a row.

The same coaches will also tell you how much easier it is to get a team "up" for a big game after playing four or five softies in a row.

Every year there are teams sitting up high in the ratings because of their record and not their schedule.

Lets take a look at St. Bonaventure, the number two team in the nation at this writing. Before giving Ohio State the tough game in the New York Festival, the Bonnies played such "mighty" teams as John Carroll (3-8), Murray (5-5), Villa Madonna (8-7), Morehead (6-5) and Western Ontario.

Ohio State meanwhile played St. Louis (10-4, Army (13-2), Loyola (8-4), Detroit (11-5) and St. Johns (10-2, every one of which are good bets for tournament bids. Since losing that 84-82 game to OSU, the Bonnies have added Belmont Abbey, Duquesne (8-4), Gannon, Niagara (8-4) and Canisius (6-5) to their list of victims.

Would anyone say that this schedule has put tremendous pressure on the number two team in the country?

The Buckeyes may get a taste of defeat this season. We have a hunch it will happen at Indiana as it did last year. But even if it does, for reasons mentioned, they are still the greatest college basketball team ever.

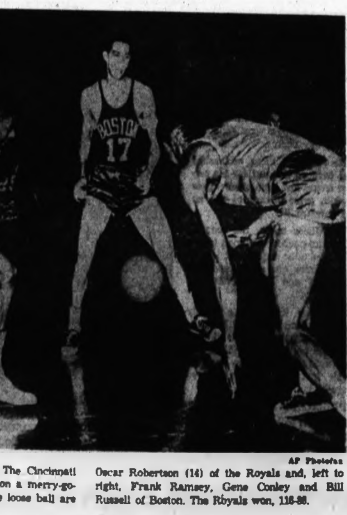
After his club won four of its final five games of the 1960 National Football League season, Hickey was given a new three-year contract with a raise.

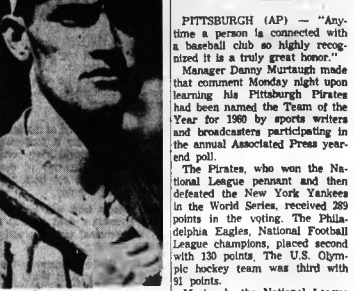

Red Paper Wants Back Talk
Slams Silent Soviet Students

By PRESTON GROVER
MOSCOW (AP)—Students at Soviet technical schools are so afraid they will lose their scholarships that they never question what their teachers say, Komsomol Pravda declared Monday.
The result is that no one ever speaks his mind, declared the Soviet youth newspaper.

The article headed "Incubator of Silent Men" came only two weeks after Premier Khrushchev dressed down agricultural leaders. The principal replies of the culprits were "You are right, Nikita Sergeyevich."

No one word of defense was raised, or at least not published during the week-long agricultural meeting of the Communist party Central Committee. The only defense appeared today, when the Soviet press ran a report by a farmer named Dyabokhshin protesting that production goals the farmers sometimes failed to fulfill were not their own estimates but those imposed upon them by their superiors.

SOUND STRANGE: Komsomol Pravda's complaint about students afraid to talk back sounded strange in the atmosphere of official scoldings.

The paper's article was prompted by an anonymous letter saying that punishment for questioning a teacher in the technical schools is cancellation of the pupil's scholarship.

The letter cited the case of a student named Yuri Lapota, who protested being sent to do no real practical work in the field before he had time to complete his thesis.

Kennedy Facing Major Test

House Will Vote Today Over Rules Committee

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy, only 11 days in office, faced his first major test in the House today with no real assurance he would win.

By his own estimate his prestige at home and abroad were at stake. His backers said prospects for House action on some of Kennedy's New Frontier legislation also hung on the outcome of today's vote.

Opposing forces said this wasn't necessarily so.

Administration forces predicted they would win by a handful of votes. But they conceded that this was not certain.

The Rules Committee cannot draft a bill itself but it can keep the House from acting on bills drafted by the so-called legislative committees.

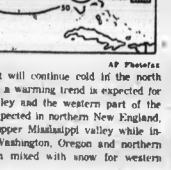

JFK's Economic Proposals to Go to Congress Thursday

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy will send Congress a special message Thursday on his recommendations for "economic recovery and growth." Democratic congressional leaders disclosed to the press that they would support the proposals.

He will send a second message to Congress next Monday on the balance of payments problem and the drain of gold from the United States to foreign countries.

The first items on the Kennedy timetable of legislative recommendations were reported by Speaker Sam Rayburn after House and Senate Democratic leaders held the second of their weekly legislative conferences with the President at the White House.

The meeting with the House and Senate leaders started off a busy day. After conferring with them, Kennedy met with a task force studying the nation's farm problem.

Following this was a meeting with Ogden Reid, former U.S. ambassador to Israel, to review American relations with the small Middle Eastern country.

Rayburn said Kennedy went over the subjects to be covered in these messages—including federal aid for school construction and depressed areas.

75 Cubans Cleared to Stay in U.S.

NEW YORK (UPI)—At least 75 Cubans won emergency entry to the United States today as political refugees from Fidel Castro's government.

Several of the Cubans, who asked for asylum Monday in a surprise move after their Spanish-bound ship "Covadonga" docked in New York, said they planned to go to Florida immediately to join anti-Castro elements training to overthrow the Cuban leader.

Immigration officials cleared the Cubans to land in Manhattan on an indefinite parole status after eight hours of tape testing.

Joseph Miranda, president of the Spanish-American committee for Latin American relations, which first got word of the Cubans' hopes to live in the United States, credited President Kennedy and Secretary of State Dean Rusk with clearing the way for the emergency entry.

Miranda said he contacted Angler Biddle Duke, head of the International Rescue Committee, who contacted Kennedy and Rusk.

But P. A. Eberly, head of the Immigration Service for the New York District, said that "as far as I know the decision to permit the Cubans parole status here did not involve them (Kennedy and Rusk)."

OK School Bond Issue in Bloomfield Hills

BIRMINGHAM — Approval of a \$4,135,000 bond issue for school construction and site purchases was given by voters in the Bloomfield Hills School District by a 2 to 1 majority.

The 30-year bonding proposal was accepted by a vote of 2,087 to 1,027. The total vote represents nearly 50 per cent of the registered electors in the 28-square-mile school district.

The approval of the bond issue will mean a tax hike to a 35-cent rate, from the 27 1/2 cent over the current levy.

School officials, however, believe that the higher rate will be in effect only one year as a result of the increasing property valuation in the district.

The proposal was presented to the voters after studies made by Michigan State University indicated that enrollment in the district will rise by nearly 400 students annually for the next five years.

A primary concern of the school board was the anticipated student increase in high school level. Presently there is only one high school and it has reached its capacity of 660 students.

"Undoubtedly the first move of the school board will be to have a 35-room addition built on the high school," said Asst. School Supt. Irving Menucci. "The addition will nearly double its present capacity."

"We will move as fast as we can to get construction under way, probably as soon as the frost leaves the ground," Menucci said. "The need for additional classrooms is urgent."

the boy's room at about 10:30 p.m. The students were in the room when the police arrived. The police were called and when the culprit finally came home, he jumped through the window right into his room.

Pender believes that if policemen sit down with an offender and try to find why he is taking the road to crime, the problem usually comes through with honest answers. Actual experience along this line in the department has proven successful.

The township police department is receiving growing cooperation from residents, teenagers, and businessmen in tracking down offenders. However, the coordinated program so far is often times withheld, results in long months of unnecessary police investigation, Pender says.

Attorney General Paul L. Adams is in the process of promoting a statewide conference in establishing a program of crime prevention.

"Crime rates, particularly among juveniles, continue to soar," Adams commented. "There is no coordinated program so far to meet the erosion and waste resulting from the growing crime rate."

Pender has approved the program, which he said will give all the assistance possible in helping to get the project established.

In the meantime, the police chief has urged township citizens to be on the alert and call the department if they notice any suspicious "goings-on."

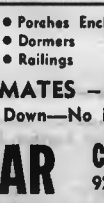

JFK Leases New York Penthouse for 4 Years

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The word in New York is that President Kennedy likes his two-story penthouse at the Carlyle Hotel so much that he's leased it for four years at \$35,000 per year. The 26th floor duplex suite consists of a living room, study, dining room and kitchen. On the next floor there are two bedrooms and a glass-enclosed bathroom. A winding staircase connects the two floors.

Other members of the Kennedy family may use the apartment from time to time because the President won't need it for the next few months, unless he plans to run up for the upcoming United Nations meeting in March.

On the afternoon of Jan. 23, 12:40 p.m., he was exact, a whisper-voiced woman telephoned the White House and murmured quickly, but distinctly, "You bet we'll do this Kennedy — he hasn't long to live." The Secret Service was notified immediately, but the caller was gone in seconds.

Between the election and the inauguration, security men were somewhat surprised by the volume of "base" calls that poured in on Kennedy. Little if any of it was shown to him.

At the recent Alitalia Society dinner, the President was joking about his chief liaison man with the past Eisenhower administration, Clark M. Clifford, who has made much of the fact that he wants no federal job and intends to stick with his lucrative private law practice.

"All he's asked," Kennedy said, "is the right to advertise his law firm on the back of dollar bills."

Kennedy also kidded Clifford about failing to get him a good locker at Burning Tree, the golf club where former President Dwight D. Eisenhower staff had departed and the bulk of the Kennedy staff was occupied watching their man sworn into office.

The Air Force has a new plane

ready for the President; not new in age, but in White House usage. The plane is a C-119 (DC 6B) in commercial life (C-119 terms) and will be used on trips where jet travel is not justified. This probably will end up as Kennedy's version of the Columbine, the super-2 Constellation used by Eisenhower for shorter hauls.

The C-119, as yet unnamed, can haul 28 passengers as currently equipped has a range of about 3,500 miles and a cruising speed of about 275 miles per hour.

Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy has passed the word: No more talking for publication by anyone about the redecoration of the family quarters in the White House. When the project is finished in about a month, she'll permit a small descriptive statement on the results.

She disliked the daily sturps about her conferences with art experts, painters and decorators. If the lady wants the walls a particular shade, she wants them all done before her color schemes are held up to public appraisal and comment.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Things seem to be looking up in the movie business. Studio streets are busy. Sales executives are getting chipper again. But the indications of prosperity are not merely in these intangible signs.

You can also see it in the hard facts reported in the trade press: M.G.M. stepping up production to a 13-year high, earnings highest in 12 years, 20th Century-Fox's ahead of 1960 in top grossers.

Paramount Invests \$21.4 million in nine pictures now shooting, \$30 million in films in preparation.

Hollywood payrolls up from \$185 to \$193 average over previous year. Universal - International takes biggest stock jump in 1960. Hollywood studio shortage looms.

Producer chief Eric Johnston has cited a "pervasive optimism" in the film business. He predicted 170 films to be made here in 1961 vs. 140 in strike-torn 1960.

Predicts the most authoritative sign comes from the U.S. Department of Commerce. It estimated American box office receipts for 1960 at \$1.37 billion, 7.5 per cent better than 1959 and the highest figure since 1931. The department estimated that 1961 receipts will be even higher.
