The purpose of the grant is "to study how organisms respond metabolically to temperature." A different experiment was designed for PUB Scholars in biology, chemistry, and physics; and, according to PUB Science Teacher Darralynn Jones, they were "engaged and . . . excited to learn."

PUB GOES TO COURT

After PUB Scholars observed actual court cases, 50th District Court judges, attorneys and other court personnel shared all about their various positions and what it took to get where they are. Through this exchange, Scholars received firsthand information about careers that are available in the court system. To wrap up the day, Chief Judge Cynthia Walker created a scenario in which Scholars enacted a mock criminal trial. She was assisted by Oakland County Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Leen Nachawati in preparing Scholars to assume their personas. This allowed Scholars to experience the roles of judge, defense and prosecuting attorneys, defendant, witness, and juror. After Career Day, Judge Walker commented, "I was moved by



their talent, insightfulness, and their ability to run with a fact pattern and make the experience their own . . . These Scholars have big dreams and I hope we can encourage their success!"

GOSPEL EXPLOSION

With OU and Pontiac in an intentional community engagement relationship for the past few years and Pontiac as part of PUB's target area since the first grant application was approved in 1965, PUB wanted to honor that 52-year relationship by hosting a notable event in the Pontiac community. 

CLASSROOM ON WHEELS

Field trips scheduled around the Independence Day holiday helped Scholars to become more familiar with the cultural offerings in nearby Detroit. Scholars were emotionally moved by their guided tour through the Charles H. Wright Museum of African-American History – the second largest in the world only to the Smithsonian. At the Motown Museum Scholars learned about the Gordy family's entrepreneurial spirit, their genius at improvising resources to develop a unique sound, and how the music made at Hitsville USA had worldwide impact. Finally, while cruising the Detroit River we received a history lesson about Detroit's birth, development, and renaissance; the use of the waterways currently and historically (such as for the Underground

Railroad); and a little about our nearby Canadian neighbors.


The Men of Excellence Conference at the University of Northern Iowa provided targeted group conversations about what it means to be an honorable person in society today through mentors with inspiring success stories. As the event was a regional conference, I connected with people from many different

states and backgrounds.

I also met people native to Taiwan, Nigeria and other places who are now living in the mid-west. Having the opportunity to learn about their experiences and about what motivates them was truly eye opening.

The number of successful speakers who shared experiences close to those of us attending provided a new sense of motivation and accomplishment. People like James Mc Bride, author of "Color of Water" and other titles, gave speeches with societal issues as a focus. The Men of Excellence Conference taught me to be R.E.A.L. (Responsible, Educated, Authentic, Leader).

I enjoyed my experience at the EOA Men of Excellence Conference. I learned about different people's interests and where they come from. I really enjoyed the banquet. Our speaker, James McBride, was inspirational. Mr. McBride spoke to us about staying focused and how he grew up in Brooklyn and overcame heavy drug

We also had many workshops that involved working on networking and finding our future success. My biggest

Ms. Diana Patton's speech was most impactful for me. She gave

us seven ways to rise up and conquer fear: become more self-aware; work on forgiveness; become impeccable in word use; don't take things personally; don't make as-



sumptions – ask; always do your best; and, stand for what is right.

This weekend was great and I am thankful to have been able to participate. We were able to bond, eat dinner, and play games with CMU Upward Bound. We also created a vision board and talked about some of our goals. We shared where we see ourselves in 1, 4, and 8 years. It was a real eye-opener for me to actually see where my path is headed.

In self-defense class we learned helpful moves to protect ourselves. Then we enjoyed "Painting with a Twist." We all have different ways of expressing ourselves, and this is a great way I learned.



The EOA Girls in STEM Conference was definitely an uplifting experience all around. We talked about self-care, gaining more confidence, and overcoming obstacles to get to our goals.

On the first night (Friday), we made vision boards in order to actually see our future and what

represents us. On Saturday, we had four sessions in the morning. In physics we built rockets and sent them flying into the air across campus. In "Women in Aviation" we learned about how the presenters overcame their obstacles to become female pilots when their class was only ten



percent women. Did you know that in the United States, Bowling Green is one of two campuses to have an airport on campus? In architecture, one of the women talked about how she applies her roles as mom and wife to being an architect. She doesn't let those roles get in the way of her career;

they taught her selflessness, consistency, and patience. Another architect said, "Every great achiever is inspired by a mentor. Mentoring opens new perspectives, knowledge, improved confidence, increased



motivation, a new developed relationship, respect, time, privacy, and trust for the mentor and mentee."

We did multiple dances before eating including the cupid shuffle, turbo shuffle, and cha cha slide. Then we bonded with the Central Michigan University Upward Bound group and had a little pizza party which was nice. The self



-defense class helped us know what to do if we are attacked, then our painting session was very relaxing. The instructor does canvases and raises money off her

painting to donate to sick children.

My favorite part of the conference was meeting Diana Patton, an author and attorney. She was so energetic and kept it real with us. She taught us her seven steps to conquer fear: 1) pray or meditate; 2) don't hold grudges; 3) use positive uplifting words; 4) let opinions and actions of others bounce off you; 5) assumptions get you nowhere; 6) always do your best; 7) stand for what is right. She also said to put passion in all that you do as if God is sitting on your shoulder. Overall, this conference was filled with positivity and uplifting others.

The EOA Girls in STEM Conference was a great experience for me because I got to meet people from different states who interacted with us. When we first arrived we headed over to the Bowens Building where we listened to motivational speakers Shanda L. Gore and Mr. and Mrs. Daniels.





Oops, they did it again! For the second summer in a row, all scholars earned above a 3.0 GPA. The final average GPA was 3.59, the second highest over the last seven years,

with a range of 3.08 to 4.0. This was an outstanding achievement!



Testing took on a new look this year. The lowa Tests of Educational Development (ITED) are being phased out, and the PSAT10/SAT is being phased in. Rising Juniors



and Seniors took the ITED, achieving a **0.84 improvement**, nearly a full year of growth, with **91% improving by greater than 0.20**. The Rising

Sophomores were taking the test for the first time this year and set a baseline of an average improvement of **55.45**.

New classes this year included American Sign Language

and **Public Speaking**. The scholars thoroughly enjoyed

mechanical,

their skills during the Gospel Explosion scholarship event. The always-popular STEM class continued its STEM career exploration with different types of engineering including **robotics**, **bio**-



and structural engineering. The scholars were especially intrigued by the prosthetic legs they crafted. A new aspect for this year was the collaboration with **Dr. Thomas Raffel** on his ground-breaking research into the effect of temperature on an infectious disease in frogs. Scholars were asked to stretch their skills as they learned logarithms and the laws of thermodynamics in preparation for a set of three lab experiments. They all did a wonderful job and learned a lot from the experience (see lab photos on page 6).

As always, the highlight of the summer was the final performance. This year's program was based on the



90's film, *Friday* and was entitled *Monday*. The scholars developed the script, reworked the songs, and handled all of the staging.

Sadly, the end of summer also saw PUB bidding a fond farewell to two of our senior mentors. Sarah Hensley started as a volunteer in September 2014 and quickly became an integral part of the program. She started her
