Chaturi Edrisinha Gives Presentations on Autism

Chaturi Edrisinha conducted a two-day workshop on "In-Service Training on ASD Transition Planning for High School Teachers and Counselors" for the Langley ISD in Langley, WA.

The workshop focused specifically on what aspects of the law and legal requirements teachers and counselors need to understand and prepare their students as they transition to a college environment.



Dr. Edrisinha also presented on "Addressing Sexuality with Individuals with Autism on a

University Campus" at the Annual Michigan Autism Conference in Kalamazoo, MI from October 10 – 12.

She presented on issues related to high school students with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) who enter as freshman college students.

She said they immediately lose access to the benefits and coverage of IDEA and enter the world of ADA and FERPA. The responsibility of identifying, documenting, initiating services and advocacy shift from the school personnel to the individual student.

University students over 18 are considered adults. Issues related to relationships, sexuality, sexual health, consent and sexual behaviors are topics that are not always specifically addressed with students regardless of their prior history of accessing services through K–12. Yet, these are the very issues that high-achieving students on the autism spectrum struggle most with. Left unaddressed, these behaviors may result in negative outcomes not only to the individual and their quality of life, but also the university community, affecting college attrition, completion rates and campus culture.

She discussed some ways to address this timely topic with incoming freshman students.

Weekly ERL Update: Kids Need to See Themselves in Books

Dyslexia is a language-based learning difference usually resulting in difficulties with word recognition, pronunciation, reading fluency, spelling and writing. Perhaps you know some children living with dyslexia who would like to see themselves in the books they read and to identify with characters who share



their point of view and experience. Here are a few suggestions:

A popular series of books written by Henry Winkler and Lin Oliver feature main character Hank Zipzer, an underachieving student who is diagnosed as dyslexic. The books have plenty of white space, and are written in a new type-font, designed for kids with dyslexia. The ERL owns four of the books in the Hank Zipzer series.

In Rick Riordan's Percy Jackson and the Lightning Thief, the main character is portrayed as having dyslexia and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). He finds that his "disabilities" in this world actually have a purpose, helping him in his role as a hero and descendant of the Greek gods.

Patricia Polacco, a Michigan author and illustrator, thought she was stupid and struggled in school until a teacher spotted her dyslexia, helping her to get the support she needed. Her autobiographical tribute, dedicated to him, is a picture book called *Thank You, Mr. Falker*.

"What's at Stake for Education in Michigan?" – November 5


