TRUSTEES VOTE 5-3 TO APPROVE INDEPENDENCE FOR OU

The MSU Board of Trustees voted Friday to approve independence for Oakland University on a date to be set by legislation. House Bill 3896, introduced by Rep. George F. Montgomery of Detroit, calls for an independence date of July 1. The long-awaited board vote was 5-3, with "no" votes cast by trustees Warren Huff, Clair White and Frank Hartman.

Independence specifically would put OU under its own eight-member board, to be appointed by the governor. In a public statement issued after Friday's vote, Chancellor O'Dowd said "At this point in our history, the thrust of our development, the nature of our program, and the magnitude of our operation clearly require the assistance and guidance of a fulltime board. We believe this change to be appropriate at this time, and look forward with enthusiasm to serving the State of Michigan and its young men and women in our new role as an independent university."

UJAMAA PLAY TUESDAY

The University community is invited free of charge to attend the first campus performance of the new dramatic group known as the Ujamaa Theatre Workshop, an offshoot of the Pontiac Black Cultural Center. The group will perform Elizabeth Blake's "The Man Nobody Saw" at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the Meadow Brook Estate clubhouse. The play is concerned with racism in America and it will be followed by a discussion with the cast and audience. The performance is being sponsored by the "Contemporary Issues" group of the University Women's Club. Entrance to the estate is on Adams Road about a half mile south of Walton Boulevard.

OU TO HONOR VARNER

A proposal to focus the spring Commencement ceremony on "Chancellor Varner and his great contributions to Oakland University" was approved last week by the Board of Trustees. Varner will be the principal Commencement speaker and, in a change from usual practice, he will be the only honorary degree recipient. He will receive a Doctor of Humanities degree. Varner, now chancellor of the University of Nebraska system, was chief architect of Oakland since its founding in 1957 until he accepted the Nebraska post last month.

CROWDER WINS OFFICE Troy F. Crowder (University Relations) was elected last week at the annual conference of the Great Lakes District of the American College Public Relations Association as district director for the 1971-72 year. He served as program chairman for the conference.

LEAVES, PROMOTION AND APPOINTMENTS APPROVED BY TRUSTEES

Two leaves of absence, one promotion and four appointments to the OU faculty were among personnel items approved last week by the Board of Trustees. Leaves, both for the 1970-71 year, will be taken by two history department members, W. Patrick Strauss, who was awarded a Fulbright-Hays lectureship to teach in Hong Kong, and Leonard Bushkoff, who plans to write in the Boston area.

In other action the board approved the promotion of James M. Bingham (education) from instructor to assistant professor, and the appointment of John Marney, assistant professor of Chinese; Robert J. Christina, instructor in education; Joel S. Fink, instructor in education, and W. Dorsey Hammond, assistant professor of education. Marney, who lives in Pontiac, has been on the faculty this past year as a visiting assistant professor. He is a doctoral candidate at the University of Wisconsin and did his undergraduate work at London University before pursuing graduate studies at Oxford. Christina is a doctoral student at Syracuse University, from which he received his master's degree, and received his bachelor's degree from Bloomsburg State. Fink holds bachelor's degrees from Boston University and Hebrew Teachers College and a master's degree from Harvard. Hammond, formerly a reading specialist with the Maryland State Department of Education, holds a bachelor's degree from Washington College and master's degree and doctorate from the University of Delaware.

A meeting of the newly-organized Clerical-Technical Association was held Monday, March 16. Following the dissolution of the ad hoc fact-finding committee, Patricia McAlpine (Public Safety) was elected chairman. Bertha Ginter (Purchasing), Roger Harris (Computing Center), Thelma Kehoe (Provost's Office), Betty Lerner (Oakland Center) and Charles Olsson (Audio-Visual) were elected to the nominating committee. Two positions on this committee will be filled following reballoting on a three-way tie.

Varma of the Institute of Biological Sciences.
