Dear Dr. Piskulich:

As past Chair of the Academic Conduct Committee, I enclose the 2014-2015 report of the Committee's activities which I received today. There were 91 cases involving 117 students submitted this past academic year compared to 95 cases involving 128 students for the 2012-2013 school year.

Of the 91 cases submitted for 2014-2015, 12 student cases were withdrawn after fact finding, 96 students were found responsible, nine were found not responsible, and no cases remain pending. There were two appeals from the Committee sanction recommendations for this period. We continue to see an increase in the number of students who admit responsibility and are processed through administrative hearings rather than deny responsibility and choose full Conduct Committee hearings. In connection with the sanctions mentioned in the report, you will note that 24 students were referred the Writing Center's Cite Right Program which is designed as a remedial effort for those charged with plagiarism.

During this reporting period, 91 cases were submitted involving 117 students. There were 64 transfer students compared to 50 for the 2013-2014 academic year. Of the 117 students, 96 were found responsible and 9 were found not responsible. After fact-findings, cases were withdrawn for 12 students.

There were 2 appeals for this reporting period. Appeal considerations are based on two criteria: significant procedural error or new evidence not available at the time of the hearing.






