

State of the Union From JFK Monday

WASHINGTON — President Kennedy will deliver his first State of the Union message to Congress Monday and plans to start submitting changes in the Eisenhower budget in the near future, possibly next week.

Kennedy will deliver his message in a joint session Monday at 12:30 p.m. EST. The next major message to follow will be a report on the state of the nation's economy.

Changes in the budget, according to press secretary, Pierre Salinger, will be contained in a series of messages dealing with specific subjects.

Speaker of the House, Carl Albert, announced that Congress will meet on Jan. 16. It was for fiscal 1962, starting July 1.

City Crime Up 15.5 Pct. in Past Year Over 1959

The amount of crime reported in Pontiac last year shows an increase of 15.5 per cent over 1959, according to year-end statistics released today by the Police Dept.

A total of 3,350 crime complaints was made to the department in seven major categories, ranging from auto theft to murder. The 1959 total was 2,900 complaints.

Three murders in 1960 were all cleared by arrests. There was only one homicide case in 1959 — the murder of an elderly Pontiac physician, Dr. W. Carlton Warwick. His murder has been cleared.

Other figures for 1960 show there were eight rapes reported, 13 robberies, 23 aggravated assaults, 13 burglaries, 1,410 larcenies and 139 auto thefts.

Statistics show five more rapes in 1960 than the previous year. Robbery complaints (93) dropped from 116 in 1959, while aggravated assault cases (133) were up from the 149 in 1959.

Purges (171) fell off in 1960, down from 802 the previous year, while the number of larcenies increased from 1,604 in 1959 to 2,111.

There were 40 less auto theft cases handled by police in 1960 than the 179 of the previous year.

Police also handled seven negligent homicide cases stemming from auto accidents, all of which were cleared by arrests.

The percentage of major crimes solved by the department in 1960 was exactly the same as in 1959 — 77 per cent.

The number of cases cleared by arrest showed police putting a 101 per cent clearance average on murders and negligent homicide cases, 50 per cent on rape cases, and 75 per cent on aggravated assault complaints.

Giving police the most trouble were burglaries and larcenies. The department cleared 25 per cent of the city's reported burglaries.

On grand larcenies (thefts over \$50), police were able to clear only six per cent, while on simple larcenies (under \$50), 25 per cent were solved.

Drunk arrests (65) increased from 1959 when 50 were placed in the hoosegery.

Other arrest figures showed: 11 for forgery, 37 for embezzlement or fraud, 18 for illegal purchase or possession of weapons, 42 for sex offenses (up from 37 in 1959).

Soldiers loyal to deposed Premier Lumumba were reported to be terrorizing and molesting nuns and missionaries in Oriental Province.

Unconfirmed Catholic mission reports from the northwestern section of the province said groups of Lumumba followers were roaming the region and breaking into houses of worship.

The reports said all mission posts east of the Itombi River had been abandoned after hospital attendants at Mokuwa, who had refused to hand over the keys to the pharmacy.

The reports said the soldiers also had molested the nuns of a mission convent in the same region after they had refused to admit the soldiers.

At least one missionary was arrested and carried off to Basoko, 125 miles northwest of Stanleyville, the reports said.

In Alive Province, pre-Lumumba troops also were reported to have molested missionaries, but United Nations soldiers succeeded in bringing at least four American missionaries out of the troubled region.

The new outbreaks of terror followed the release of 33 Europeans held by Lumumbist soldiers in the ex-president's stronghold of Stanleyville, capital of Oriental Province.

Nine skirmishes between Baluba tribesmen and Katanga guerrillas erupted at the vital grain and coal mining center of Luena, north of Elisabethville, the U.N. command reported today.

Gable's Final Role Is Top

Last Portrayal Called the Best Since 'Gone With the Wind'

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The movie icon portrayed Clark Gable as a gangster in his last role, a role he played with his best performance since "Gone With the Wind" in 1939.

A handful of Hollywood names packed the Screen Directors Guild Theater to see "The Man With the Wind" starring Gable, Marilyn Monroe, Montgomery Clift and Elia Walerstein.

Gable, who died last week, suffered a heart attack two days later and died two days after that.

Sadly, the movie gave a rugged hint of how his heart could have been taxed. In one scene, filmed 120 degrees below a Nevada desert day lake bed, Gable fought furiously with a wild horse.

It would have been an ordeal even for a young starlet, but Gable, 58, insisted on doing most of his own riding and rugged horse handling.

Playwright Arthur Miller wrote the rugged play especially for him, though Miss Monroe, but as it turns out it is mostly Gable's show.

His role is a character he and his late love lived best — a lusty, virile couple who hunted wild horses by day and wild women by night.

Some of his late lovers with Marilyn are listed in the scene of the old Gable and Jean Harlow movies of the '30s.

But there is one pathetic drunk scene which gave Gable a rare opportunity to prove that he was a better actor than even his most loyal fans realized.

His showbusiness epiphany came when he gave them an 11 o'clock finish.

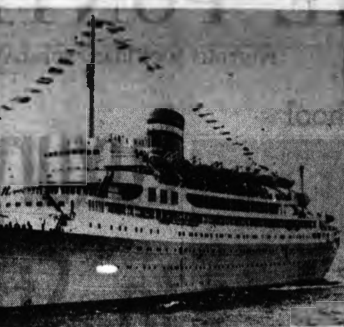
New Bills Aimed at Modernizing Our Immigration

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Six senators introduced legislation Monday to overhaul the nation's immigration laws by modernizing the old quota system and admitting 80,000 refugees from world trouble spots.

The national quota system would be based on the 1950 census, rather than the 1920 census as at present. Unused quotas could be pooled and reallocated on an order of the President.

Nonquota visas would be authorized for up to 40,000 refugees fleeing from Communist persecution in Cuba, the Middle East and other areas.

The measures were introduced by Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., Clifford Case, R-N.J., Wayne Morse, D-Ore., Leverett Saltonstall, R-Mass., and Hugh Scott, R-Pa.

Restrict Trailer Parks to State, U. S. Highways

BIRMINGHAM — A new ordinance designed to keep trailer parks at a minimum in Bloomfield Township was adopted last night by the board of trustees.

The ordinance specifically defines just what is required before a trailer park can be built, the number of trailers will be permitted and the lot sizes for each trailer.

The most important of these stipulations, according to Homer Case, township treasurer, is the provision that a trailer park be built on a state or federal highway.

"As far as the township is concerned this means that a trailer park could only be built on Telegraph Road or Woodward Avenue," Case pointed out.

"This will confine trailer parks to main roads and keep them out of residential areas," added Case.

The new ordinance was prepared by the now defunct township zoning board and approved by the Oak-Bud County Planning Commission and the new township planning board.

A \$4,000 1961 road improvement program for the township also was approved by the Township Board. Estimated cost to the township for the road program is \$22,000. The County Road Commission will match the amount if it approves of the overall project.

The plan calls for blacktopping 14-mile Road from Telegraph to Franklin Road, Quanton Road from Wing Lake to Franklin Road and Weller Road from Adams to Charing Cross Road.

Also included would be the improvement of Lone Pine Road from Telegraph to Lahser and Quanton Road from Telegraph to one-third of a mile.

In another action the township board tentatively accepted a petition to improve Long Lake Shore Drive pending the approval of the West Bloomfield Township Board.

The road is in the Long Lake Shore Subdivision which is located in West Bloomfield and West Bloomfield townships.

Estimated cost of the paving program is \$15,000, which would be assessed property owners benefiting from the improvement.

Pilots Captured, Says Red Story

NEW YORK (AP) — A Soviet magazine says the 11 missing crewmen of a U.S. reconnaissance plane shot down by Soviet fighters near the Turkish border on Sept. 2, 1958, parachuted to earth and were captured, the New York Times reported today from Moscow.

The bodies of six of the 17 crewmen of the U.S. Air Force C-130 were delivered to U.S. officials at the Turkish border 10 days after the plane was downed. The Soviets have never said what happened to the other 11 men.

The State Department told the Times it had asked the Soviet Foreign Ministry for clarification of the magazine article.

The Times dispatch said the report was buried in the magazine Ogoniok in a long article reprinted from the East Berlin magazine Neuberlin Illustrierte purporting to show that the United States had taken up where Hitler left off in an all-out espionage campaign against the Soviet Union.

"Despite this unusual source for information on the fate of the American flyers," the Times dispatch said, "it bore the stamp of a printing house of Pravda, the Communist party paper, and presumably was given official approval."

Trains Chug to Start as Tug Strike Ends

NEW YORK (UPI)—Trains began rolling from the Mississippi to the Northeast Atlantic Coast today with the settlement of the two-week New York harbor tug crew strike.

Freight barganoes from St. Louis and Chicago to New York and Boston were lifted by the New York Central, permitting the free flow of foodstuffs and other essential commodities after a half-day ban resulting from strikers' pickets.

The Central's first long-line train left New York late Monday night over the rails that had been idled from New York to Buffalo after the pickets started marching around huge Grand Central Terminal.

Commuter service via trains of the Central and the New Haven and Hudson River ferry boats resumed operations for the 100,000 commuters who had been forced to seek other means of transportation.

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Kennedy's 'New Frontiers' Linked to Past

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy, a student of both history and the presidency, is credited with having written a classic in his inaugural address. But his real achievement perhaps was that while he managed to convey a feeling of newness—and a new approach to peace—he also demonstrated his own sense of continuity with men who preceded him.

Let the rest of the world get the notion America is fat and tired, he said. "The torch has been passed to a new generation of Americans."

And indeed it has, to such a

degree that American leadership now is the youngest of any major power. The leaders of Russia, China, Britain, France and West Germany are old or aging.

But his use of the word "generation" has a special meaning for those Americans who were alive and listening when President

Franklin D. Roosevelt in the crisis of the depression said his generation had a "rendezvous with destiny."

Kennedy made no such hopeful promise for his generation. He said in the presidential campaign he did not know what the 1960s would bring "except hard times in the international sphere."

Because this is probably a conviction with him, it explains why he said in his inaugural that the work ahead will not be finished in the life of this administration, nor even perhaps in our lifetime on this planet."

His words were almost identical with a man of a generation before him and Roosevelt—Democratic Secretary James V. Forrestal—who, looking ahead in 1941, said: "Not in our lifetime, or in that of the next generation do I foresee the time when a strong military potential will not be needed to back up our diplomacy."

MUST STAY STRONG

Kennedy did not get that blunt in the inaugural speech. "But his views—like those of Presidents Truman and Eisenhower before him—are the same as Forrestal's as he showed during the presidential campaign when he said: 'Peace requires an American defense posture strong enough to convince any potential aggressor that war would be a mistake. This means we must have a military force second to none.'"

Perhaps the most memorable phrase Kennedy has uttered since accepting the Democratic presidential nomination last summer was his vision of the "New Frontiers" facing America.

Here again he had a direct link with the past. He was not the first president to think in terms of American frontiers.

Just as Kennedy dwelt on the need for peace, so did Eisenhower in his second inaugural address in 1953 when he talked of building a "peace with justice in a world where moral law prevails." Kennedy last Friday, calling on the Communist world to cooperate in the search for peace, suggested creating "not a new balance of power but a new world of law."

Blame Ruptured Oil Line for Saratoga Blaze

ATHENS, Greece (AP)—The Navy blames a ruptured oil line for the raging two-hour fire that struck the huge aircraft carrier Saratoga, the U. S. 6th Fleet's big punch, killing 7 crewmen and injuring 23.

There was no indication how long the 26,000-ton ship would be out of action or if that repairs would be necessary. Newsmen were barred from boarding the carrier or talking to her crewmen.

Flames broke out in a machine

very compartment at 2 a. m. Monday as the Saratoga steamed across the Ionian Sea toward Athens after patrol in the eastern Mediterranean. Her skipper, Capt. J. W. Meile of Cincinnati, put the ship into Phaleron Bay near Athens hours later without aid from other ships.

CARRIER DISASTER—It was the second major disaster aboard a Forrestal class carrier in five weeks. The Saratoga's sister ship, the Constellation, was gutted by a \$48-million fire that started from a fuel oil leak Dec. 19 while she was under construction in the Brooklyn Navy Yard. Fifty civilian workers lost their lives.

A court of inquiry headed by Rear Adm. Arthur R. Gralla, commander of Destroyer Flotilla 2, was named to investigate the fire aboard the Saratoga.

Fire control parties from the Saratoga's 3,800 officers and men fought the fire for two hours deep below decks and finally extinguished it without help from other 6th Fleet units. The dead, a chaplain, 3 other officers and 33 enlisted men, were asphyxiated by heavy smoke.

The Saratoga is the flagship of Rear Adm. David L. MacDonald, commander of the 6th Fleet's carrier Task Force 60.

Feb. 28 is the deadline for replacing old license plate tabs. The office will stay open late in the latter part of February, Brewer said.

Refuses to Ax Censor Powers

Supreme Court Dumps
Challenge to Chicago
Movie Board

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court, in a significant free speech case, refused Monday to strike down all state and city movie censorship powers.

By a vote of 5 to 4, the high tribunal rejected a challenge to a Chicago censorship requirement on grounds it amounted to a "broad side attack" on the city statute.

In recent years, the court has ruled against state and local censorship actions but essentially the cases have dealt with specific movies.

At present, four states — Kansas, Maryland, New York and Virginia — and 15 cities censor or license movies. Movie industry representatives have been urging that all censorship be eliminated.

CALLS FOR HEARING
In another action Monday, the court ruled unanimously that a Florida Negro serving a 20-year sentence on assault must be given a hearing on his claim that his trial was unfair.

The Negro, described by the court opinion as "indigent, ignorant and morally ill," is Elijah McNeal Jr., of Lake Wales, Fla.

Dissenters in the movie censorship case were the court's so-called "liberal bloc" — Chief Justice Earl Warren and Justices Hugo L. Black, William O. Douglas and William J. Brennan Jr. Justice Tom C. Clark wrote the majority opinion.

Tired Machine Pays Off Double to Firm's Clients

NEW YORK (AP) — Duplicate year-end dividend checks have been sent out to about 200 clients of a New York brokerage firm as the result of a computer machine going whacky.

"These machines get tired just like everybody else," said a spokesman for Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, Inc., in explaining the mistake.

He said part of a steel tape feeding information to the machine had run through twice, causing each stockholder involved to be sent two checks instead of one.

Thinks He Has Way to Thin Blood Clot

ITHACA, N.Y. (UPI) — A Cornell University physician believes he may have found a way to dissolve blood clots, the nation's greatest single cause of death.

Dr. Eugene E. Clifton, associate professor of clinical surgery at the Cornell Medical College, has been warning for seven years to find a method of dissolving blood clots in the arteries of persons suffering from heart and other ailments.

Other scientists have developed a drug which prevents blood clots from forming.

Now, Clifton and his associates at other institutions have isolated and enzyme, fibrinolytic, which has proven highly successful in dissolving already formed blood clots in tests of persons whose conditions were critical.

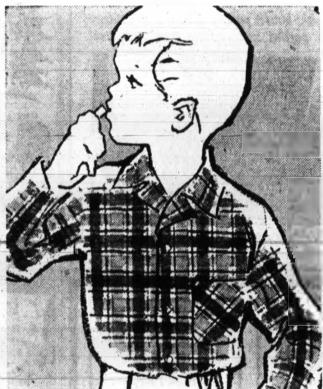

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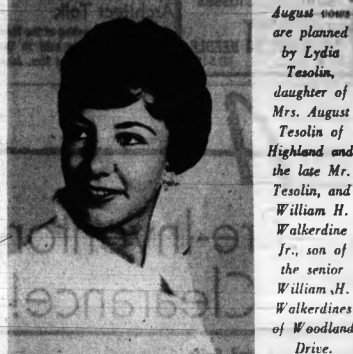

FRESNO, Calif. (UPI) — Mildred Cole, a youthful grandmother who wears her gray hair with fringe bangs, looks more like a PTA-president than an outstanding businesswoman.

She talks like a housewife, too, with little mention of the draperies enterprise whose success led her to Selection as "most outstanding" among the members of American Business Women's Association.

"I do not think a young mother has any right to leave home for a job unless conditions make it absolutely necessary," Mrs. Cole said firmly. "I suspect it is for their own convenience that most women seek an occupation outside their home."

"I think they felt I hampered them by having a business in the home," she said. "They said they were relieved because they didn't need to be afraid to sit on a chair or sofa for fear of pins."

Now both daughters are married and have homes of their own—Mrs. William Sauer, at Palo Alto, and Mrs. Charles Talbot at Fresno. But the five grandchildren frequent the Cole household.

Mrs. Cole credits much of her success to the 30 persons who work for her, and to the tremendous importance of windows in modern architecture.

"So much wall space is now glass, draperies have become almost the most important furnishing in a room," she said.

Once a pediatrician, he is now a child psychiatrist and the father of Al, aged 5.
He recently had a birthday. To celebrate it, his wife made him a particularly handsome cake.
When it was placed before him, he made his secret wish, blew out his candles and, after serving his wife and daughter, was preparing to cut Al's slice when Al cried, "Wait, daddy, wait!"

Clambering down from his chair, Al ran around the table to his father's place and said, "Give me the knife, daddy. I want to cut my slice myself."

Said his father, "No you can't have the knife. This is my birthday and this is my cake. I am the person who cuts it."

Outraged by this declaration of separate identity, Al retired to the living room where he hid under a table. He was permitted to stay there.

Nobody followed him to beg him to return. Nobody said, "Al right, you can cut daddy's cake." So, just before bedtime, he emerged from under the table to accept the cake slice his father cut for him—and the idea that he and his father were not the same person.

Many modern children see no difference between their parents and them. Because we are either sentimental or frightened of their displeasure, they are permitted to cut our birthday cakes when they are young, so, as they grow they never learn to see us as separate

identities with separate rights, wishes and possessions.

As a result, we can never count on finding our white gloves in the drawer where we put them. We can never be sure that our umbrella will be available when we need it.

What's worse, we are so used to our young people's regarding us

and everything we've got as part of themselves that we do not even question their failure to ask permission to use our possessions.

This is not funny, though TV's family comedy writers try to tell you it is. In this country children's adolescence involves genuine suffering for many parents. We suffer horribly when Betty

and Ronny say, "No, this is my life and I'll cut it the way I want to." We merely resent their declaration of separateness from us.

If we'd ever been able to stand up for our own, our resentment would be less. But how many of us can say, "No, this is my cake" to cuddlesome little boys and girls?

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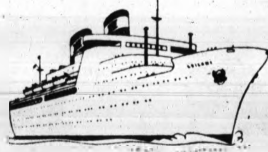

1 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup applesauce
1/2 cup apples

Sift dry ingredients and cut in shortening with a pastry blender. Beat together egg, milk and vanilla. Stir into dry ingredients just enough to moisten them. This makes a rather lumpy dough.

Spread evenly on a well greased 8-inch pan in a 1 1/2 layer. Break with 3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons sugar and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.

Top with even rows of cored, peeled and sliced apples. Sprinkle fruit with 3 tablespoons sugar and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. Drizzle 2-3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine over the top. Bake 40 minutes in 400 degree oven, or until apples are tender. Serve slightly warm. Top with a custard sauce if desired.

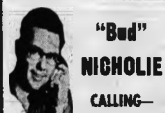

Contact Lenses Popular



Some people, like this girl, become accustomed to contact lenses very quickly. Others never adjust to them. Within one month to three, most people can wear their contact lenses the greater part of the day.

Every single day the popularity of contact lenses increases. By far the greatest majority of those who wear them do so for the sake of appearance. There are other advantages such as easier participation in sports and freedom from the nuisance of mist, snow or rain on the usual lenses. However, the greatest motivator is the desire for attractiveness.

It is interesting to know that five times as many girls as boys are fitted with contact lenses and the vast majority of adults who wear them are under 35.

Contact lenses always should be prescribed by an ophthalmologist. An ophthalmologist is a regular physician just like your family doctor, only he specializes in care and treatment of the eyes.

There are certain conditions which make contact lenses inadvisable; therefore your eye doctor should be the one to tell you whether or not they are safe for you. He will check on the condition of your eyes periodically after the fitting.

Some folks never become adjusted to contact lenses but most become accustomed to them within a few weeks' time. This varies with the individual. Some people can wear them for four hours a day within a week's time. Within from one month to three, most people can wear their contact lenses the greater part of the day.

There are two kinds of contact lenses: the single-vision and the bifocal. The bifocals have not been as satisfactory as the others.

It is hard to start to wear bifocal contact lenses unless you have had previous experience with the single-vision type.

The contact lenses have many advantages. Everything is so clear when wearing them and the breadth of vision is enlarged when there are no frames. They are convenient and flattering since they cannot be seen.

But—you must see an ophthalmologist and let him check your eyes and prescribe for you. Then go back for check-ups at regular periods even if your eyes seem perfectly all right.

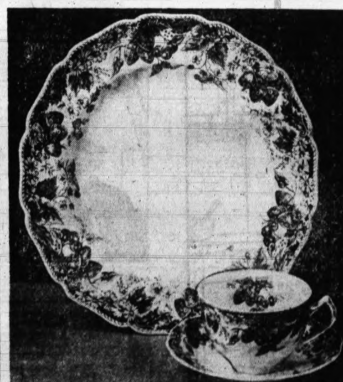

State Uncertain on 'Extra' Food

Welfare Aide Claims Michigan Now Giving More Than Average

LANSING (AP) — State welfare officials have declined to speculate on the effect of President Kennedy's order to increase free food distribution to needy families in chronic unemployment areas.

"We have yet to learn what new foods may be added to the list and whether eligibility requirements will be relaxed," said John Gambotto, administrative aide in the welfare department.

"We are already distributing more free food than any other state," he said. "In fact, federal officials report that we distribute more than the six or seven in the region not to bother."

"This is because we have a large, active and well-organized distribution program, not necessarily because of unemployment," Gambotto said.

Last month, he said, 229,110 of the 356,638 Michigan residents certified to receive surplus commodities were given 2,100,417 pounds of free food.

"Recently the number of those eligible has been climbing, because of rising unemployment," Gambotto said. "We understand that the number in the Upper Peninsula will increase about 19 percent this month."

Unlike some states, he said, Michigan does not set a ceiling in the amount of food a family can receive.

Clothing Rack Aids Students

ITHACA, N.Y. (UPI) — Hand-made sweaters are keeping 800 foreign students at Cornell University warm this winter.

It all started with the same old, worn brown cardigan sweater after year on the backs of students from other countries. This stirred the curiosity of David B. Williams, the director of the Cornell foreign office.

Williams made inquiries of the current beneficiary and learned that each year a graduating student would pass the cost on to an incoming student.

Williams thought the practice might solve the winter clothing problems of many students from hot climates attending the university. He expanded the idea into the foreign students' clothing exchange.

AT LAIN PRIN

Today, students can buy, at a low price, clothing collected by volunteers from the hospitalities committee of Cornell's Campus Club. An overcoat or suit costs \$1.50 and a sport jacket sells for \$1.

The money paid for the clothing is used to clean and press other garments that are collected. When a student leaves the university he usually returns the clothing to the committee or gives it to another student coming from abroad.

Williams pointed out that winter clothing is unnecessary and unavailable in Italy and other countries.

The modest stipends and scholarships many of the students receive are not sufficient to pay for new warm clothing in this country.

BATTLE CREEK (AP) — A \$450,000 grant for the new Kellogg Community College has been announced.

The grant, from the Lant-Thomson Foundation of Battle Creek, is to be used for a new technical training center which school officials said will help meet the challenge of automation.

Kellogg Community, a two-year college, will be permitted to expand its technical training services greatly because of the grant, said Dr. Robert O. Hutton, college director.

Dr. Hutton said the impact of automation has been such that there is now a far greater need on the part of industry for persons given college training in the technologies.

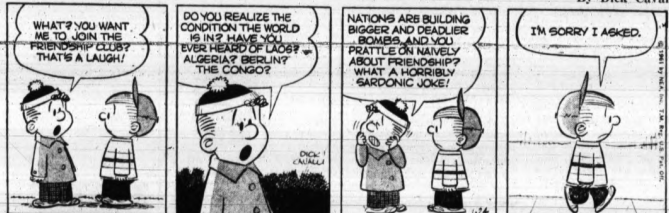

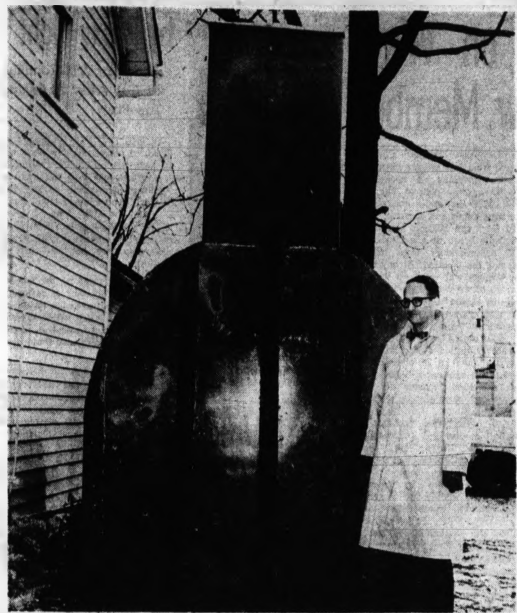

Old Orion Hotel Called Unsafe

Owner of Ver-Wood Repairs Building, Will Talk With Council

LAKE ORION—Like Rochester officials, the Lake Orion council is attempting to have an old hotel in the center of the village's business district either removed or completely renovated.

All but one tenant of the Ver-Wood Hotel at 34 S. Broadway St. have been ordered to vacate the building by Oscar Boyea of the Oakland County Health Department.

Boyea, who acts as village health officer for both Rochester and Lake Orion, told the council last night that the hotel was dangerous because of faulty wiring, unstable construction and an unsafe boiler.

However, Boyea said the owner of the hotel, Frank Danuski of 460 Crescent St., believes that the council is being "unduly harsh with him" about the issue.

Danuski has hired an attorney to represent him in the matter. "Not appearing" at Boyea's, the hotel owner and his lawyer will appear before the council at its next meeting, Feb. 6.

Danuski believes that certain improvements have been made recently on the building should be sufficient to keep the council from condemning the hotel.

However, a council spokesman said that the work done at the hotel does not appear to be sufficient to save it from condemnation.

Boyea said he would have the hotel inspected by the state fire marshal and building and electrical inspectors before the next council meeting.

Before leaving for another meeting last night in Rochester, Boyea urged the council to take action on a building next to the hotel and a private home in the village which he also called unsafe.

In other business, the council voted to donate \$50 to the newly formed parks and recreation committee which is studying joint recreation facilities to serve both the village and Orion Township.

Hotel Faces Demolition; to Dedicate Civic Center

ROCHESTER — The old and the new in public buildings here shared the spotlight at last night's village council meeting.

The old, the Rochester Hotel which dates back to 1847, has been termed a hazard to health and safety and legal action has been instituted to have it razed.

The new municipal building erected in Stone Park also prompted action by the council to rename the park and to start the ball rolling for dedication of the structure.

In a prepared statement of fact and observation Councilman Jay Eldred gave seven reasons for changing the name of the park to the Rochester Civic Center to better best its projected usage as the community affairs center of the village.

Most of Eldred's reasons were based on the anticipated use of the 11-acre parcel at the end of Sixth Street primarily as a civic center rather than a recreational area.

The property now contains the municipal skating rink and the Lions Club warming shelter which has been given to the village.

The council voted 5 to 2 in favor of the name change. The two dissenters were not necessarily against the proposal but wanted two weeks to think over the idea before acting upon it.

They were Clarence M. Burr and Roy Rowold. Burr made the original motion to name the park. Former Village Manager Robert A. Stone in recognition of his outstanding service to the community.

Eldred was appointed chairman of the dedication committee with Don Piskey named to assist him.

Action on condemning the old hotel stemmed from reports made by local officials. Deputy Health Officer Oscar B. Boyea and a qualified structural engineer, Clifford W. Holforty, P. E., of Birmingham.

All agreed that the building was a fire hazard and dangerous to the public health, welfare and safety and that even improvement of 50 per cent of the structure could not restore it to acceptable standards of safety.

As unidentified heirs to the hotel property spoke up at the meeting stating that the heirs were "entirely in sympathy with the council" but were helpless to do anything themselves to expedite the situation.

They are just trust beneficiaries and do not have possession of the property, the spokesman said.

Building Inspector Thomas J. Turlette, Electrical Inspector C. E. Kremer and Fire Chief George Ross all had signed statements testifying to the "terrible condition" of the building. And pictures were presented last night to substantiate their findings.

The building now houses the

Waterford Board Studies Highland Road Rezoning

A request to rezone four acres from commercial to light manufacturing on Highland Road in Waterford Township was tabled for further investigation at last night's township board meeting.

The president of Futurmill Inc., now in operation at the Pontiac Municipal Airport, Robert G. Beale of 3881 Millersway Drive, Birmingham, wants the property rezoned to build a new \$100,000 office and plant building. The property is located one-quarter mile west of the present factory operation.

The company manufactures cutting tools for the metal working industry and employs some 50 area residents. The township zoning board had approved the change.

A complicated discussion on just "where to draw the line" in setting up special street lighting as assessment districts in the township ended with the issue being tabled for additional study.

The discussion got under way after members of the Highland Estates subdivision association had requested that ornamental, underground cable, low-voltage type lights be installed in the subdivision. Regular bituminous lights would be put up along the main highways surrounding the subdivision.

The board approved a request for some \$1,000 in police car equipment, and will ask for sealed bids on mobile radio units for the three new police cars.

A complaint on township police inefficiency was presented by Robert Ream of 3189 Fremont St. He told the board that although he called the police department early Saturday regarding stolen equipment from his

fishing shanty on Loon Lake, it wasn't until 72 hours later the call was acknowledged.

Police Chief Millard Pender summoned Sgt. Frank Randolph to the meeting, but no record could be located that Ream's call had been made. Pender told Ream and the board that every effort would be made to clear the matter.

ADMIT CRIME

In the meantime, a witness to the theft gave Ream the names of four juveniles, who admitted the crime to police last night.

The board approved a request from clerk James E. Seeterin for a \$350 generator for use in the cemeteries, and a request for installation of a street light at the intersection of Silver Lake Road and Walton Boulevard was approved.

After the township board adjourned at 8:30 p.m., Pender introduced two representatives of state fire and police organizations, urging that the police department be put under civil service.

Several weeks ago the township board had denied the police department's request that the civil service question be placed on the ballot, as the board said an administrative commission might be a better approach.

Edward B. Levand, legislative chairman of the Fraternal Order of Police League of Michigan, explained the advantages of civil service and finished with "Gentlemen, I beg you to give these men a break, and put civil service on the ballot."

George Campbell of the Firefighters Association also urged that the board take advantage of Act 78 and include the police in the ordinance promoted by firemen who have civil service. A civil service commission has been set up for the fire department.

According to board members, the "door is not closed for negotiations" and a committee of the police and township board will meet for further study.

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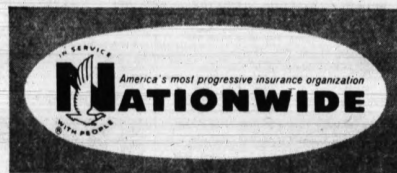
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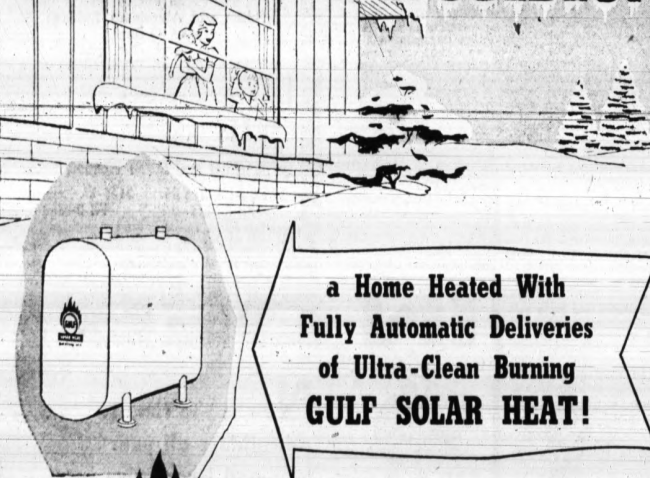

Rescue of Sons in Africa Best Birthday Gift

Two Pontiac Doctors Escape Rebel Province With U.N. Help

A Pontiac mother received her "best birthday present" yesterday when she learned her two missionary sons had been rescued by United Nations patrol from rebel-held Kivu Province in the Congo, where they were being held prisoners.

The sons, Drs. John, 29, and Dwight Slater, 34, of Pontiac were to be reunited today with their families in British Uganda.

Their mother, Mrs. Albert Slater of 187 E. Huron St., who celebrated her 46th birthday yesterday, was told by The Pontiac Press the same day that her two sons were safe.

The Press learned from the Associated Press at Leopoldville, the Congo, that a U.N. patrol rescued the two doctors near the border of British Uganda, adjacent to the Kivu Province.

Drs. John and Dwight Slater, who were being held against their will at the Palmer Mission Hospital in the rebel-controlled province, had managed to flee to the border about 125 miles distant.

They had been turned back at the border of Ruanda-Urundi, a U.N. trust territory, by troops loyal to Ex-Premier Patrice Lumumba, when the U.N. patrol found them and escorted them to safety.

The doctors were to be reunited today with their wives and children at the hotel where they were staying under U.N. protection at Kampala, Uganda.

The doctors' wives and children managed to escape Kivu Province a week ago Saturday as rebels went on a rampage in the area molesting white persons.

The doctors at first had elected to stay on at the remote mission hospital. But they said their parents (Continued on Page 2, Col. 2)

\$250 Million in 1960

GM Spending in Area

Nearly \$250 million was spent in the greater Pontiac area by General Motors for wages, supplies and other local expenditures during 1960, top officials of the city's three GM facilities announced today.

The statement was released jointly by S. E. Knudsen, general manager of the Pontiac Motor Division; C. J. Werner, general manager of the GMC Truck & Coach Division; and T. F. Wiethorn, manager of the Fisher Body Plant.

Employment last year increased \$28 million over 1959, rising to \$75,045,000, the GM executives reported, during the same period, average monthly employment rose from 22,700 to 23,312.

Payments for goods and services in Pontiac area suppliers totaled \$40 million for 1960, further increasing GM's economic contribution to the city.

With the start of the 1961 model year, modernization of the Fisher plant neared completion, making it possible to produce bodies for the Pontiac Tempest as well as the standard-sized Pontiac car.

Two separate body producing systems, 4 1/2 miles of plant conveyors, and a tool and die facility make the Fisher plant one of the largest and most diversified operations in the division.

Other figures for 1960 show there were eight rapes reported, 85 robberies, 233 aggravated assaults, 234 burglaries, 5,113 larcenies and 118 auto thefts.

Statistics show five more rapes in 1960 than the previous year. Robbery complaints (93) dropped off from 116 in 1959, while aggravated assault cases (223) were up from the 167 in 1959.

Burglaries (731) fell off in 1960 down from 862 the previous year, while the number of larcenies increased from 1,604 in 1959 to 2,113. There were 10 less auto theft cases handled by police in 1960 than the 179 of the previous year.

Police also handled seven negligent homicide cases stemming from auto accidents, all of which were cleared by arrest.

The percentage of major crimes solved by the department in 1960 was exactly the same as in 1959—21 per cent.

City Crime Up 15.5 Pct. in Past Year Over 1959

Mutineers Hold 600 Passengers 'in Terror'

Uprising Called Start of Effort to Overthrow Portuguese Premier

American and British warships and planes crisscrossed Caribbean and South Atlantic seas today in a hide-and-seek search for a luxury cruise liner whose 600 passengers were reported being held in terror by 100 heavily-armed and desperate men.

The pirates who took over the Portuguese liner Santa Maria were believed headed for Brazil but hours of searching by U. S. and British craft failed to turn up any trace of the ship.

A communication received in New York from the hijacked ship indicated that the piracy was part of an uprising against the government of Portugal's Premier Antonio de Oliveira Salazar.

From elsewhere came the story of terror.

"They've got this big, well-armed gang of 100 pirates terrorizing the ship," said Douglas D. McGowan said at the British Windward Islands Port Council, where the pirate crew dropped off one wounded, one sick and five other members of the 300-man crew Monday.

"Everybody on the ship is pretty afraid," he said.

McGowan added, however, that he had "no word any of the passengers have been harmed."

McGowan quoted one of the crewmen as saying, "I thought they (the pirates) were Communists."

The act of piracy apparently took place Monday on the same route where the notorious Blackbeard the Pirate became the scourge of the Caribbean with his forays against shipping more than 200 years ago.

The pirates were reported to have seized control of the 20,000-ton ship in a gun battle that killed at least one crew member and wounded others and ended with the ship's captain a prisoner.

The hijackers threatened to scuttle the ship if interfered with.

The leader of the armed gang was identified by the Portuguese government as army Capt. Henrique Galvao, 60, a short, balding man of Prime Minister Salazar.

The RCA radio station at Chatham, Mass., said that at 2:30 a.m. it received a message in Portuguese addressed "to all newspapers" saying: "All is normal aboard. We will inform the world in due time." RCA said the message was signed "Capt. Henrique Galvao." There was no indication of the location of the ship or Galvao's plans.

REPORTED GOING TO BRAZIL

The British frigate Rothesay reported that the Santa Maria appeared to be headed for Brazil at a speed of about 20 knots.

The British Admiralty said the Rothesay, a 370-foot submarine hunter, was trailing the Santa Maria somewhere off Trinidad.

The admiralty said its frigate has been ordered to try to arrest the liner if she could do so outside territorial waters and by peaceful means—"without loss of life or the risk of scuttling."

Two U.S. Navy destroyers and a flight of Navy planes also were ordered on the trail of the fugitive ship. The Navy ordered the captains of the destroyers Wilson and Damato to find the Santa Maria, board it and escort it to the nearest U.S. port.

State of the Union From JFK Monday

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy will deliver his first State of the Union message to a joint session of Congress Monday.

House Speaker Sam Rayburn, D-Tex., told newsmen the date was agreed on at a meeting of Democratic congressional leaders with the President this morning. He said he assumed the hour for Kennedy's appearance before the joint session will be the usual one—12:30 p. m.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana told newsmen there was no discussion at today's meeting of the legislative branch of the executive.

He said that he expects separate messages embodying legislative proposals will be sent to Congress within a week or two after Kennedy delivers his State of the Union message.

In other developments: Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced the government will buy most eggs and some other items not now in surplus.

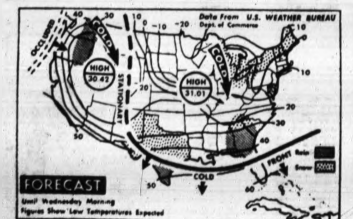

Kennedy Can Keep Talking

No Limit on Press Confab

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House will impose no arbitrary time limit on President Kennedy's first news conference at 6 p. m. EST Wednesday, or on any subsequent conferences, Press Secretary Pierre Salinger announced Monday.

All three major television networks and the four big radio nets plan to present the news conference live.

Salinger said the networks have indicated they will keep the broadcast going regardless of length, on the Wednesday conference, but have made no such commitment on future ones.

During the Eisenhower administration, White House correspondents were requested not to let the sessions extend beyond half an hour. Salinger said that henceforth the cutoff will be entirely at the discretion of the senior wire service correspondent.

Marvin Arosow, of the Associated Press, who as senior correspondent usually gives the "thank you, Mr. President" signal ending the news conference, said the length of future news conferences will be determined entirely by their newsworthiness.
