Predicts Republicans to Boost House Majority in Next Election

Speaker of the U. S. House of Representatives Joseph W. Martin Jr., last night placed economy and anti-Communist measures among major accomplishments of the present Republican-controlled Congress and foresaw a greater GOP majority after the Nov. 2 elections.

Martin (R-Mass.) paid the first Michigan visit by a house speaker in nearly 90 years to speak at a testimonial dinner at Northwood Inn, honoring Congressman George A. Dondero (R-Royal Oak) for his 22-years of service as a national lawmaker.

Speaking of Dondero's record, Martin said, "The St. Lawrence Seaway Bill could not have passed except for the high regard (by fellow legislators) for George Dondero."

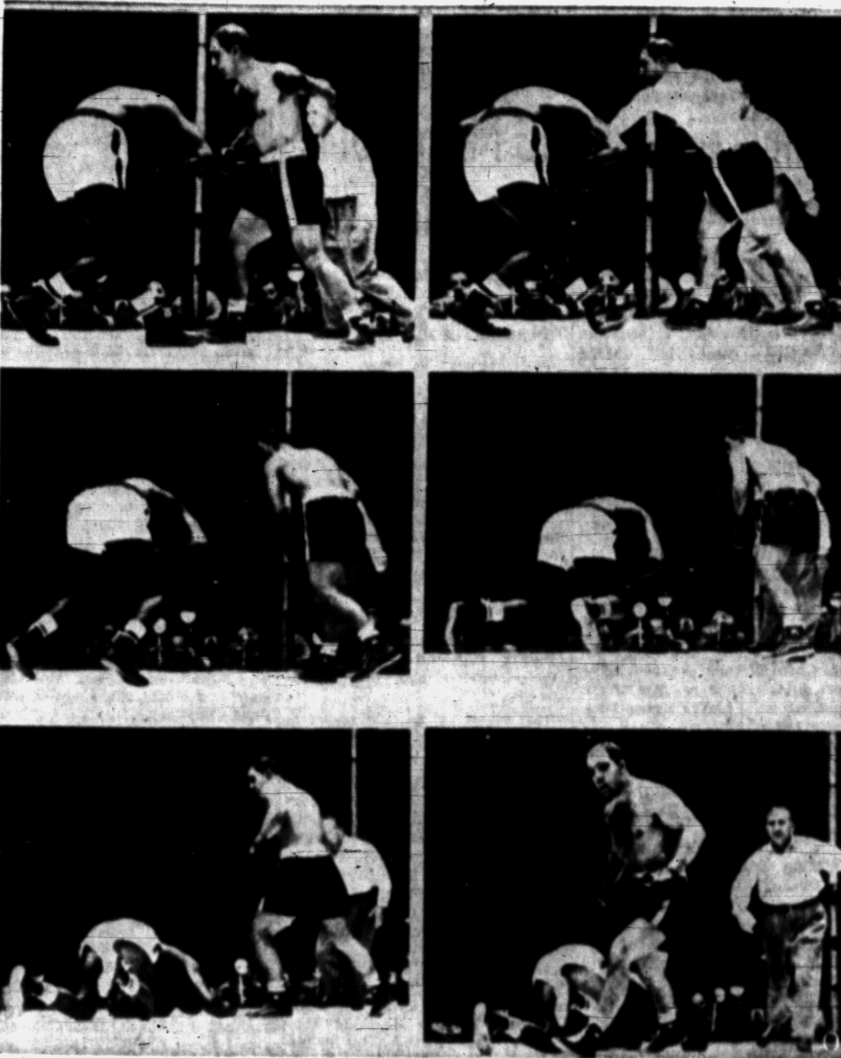
"This dinner is a great tribute to a splendid public official." Turning to the national scene, Martin said, "When the present Congress came in we were handed a budget which Democrats said could not be cut."

Some 13 billion dollars was cut, Martin stated, without impairing national security.

"Taxes were reduced by \$7.4 billion. Every household in the land already feels the effect of those cuts. Every worker, every farmer, every small business owner knows he can spend his own money . . . far more wisely than

Busy Secretary Arrives Home From Europe

Eden Agrees to Buildup for West Germany but France Gets By-Passed

WATERTOWN, N. Y. (INS)—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles returned to the United States from Germany and Britain today.

He indicated more discussions will be needed before any flat Anglo-American accord is reached on a substitute for the European Defense Community.

"It is apparent," Dulles said in a statement issued here, where his plane landed unexpectedly at 8:20 a. m. EDT, "indeed it has long been apparent, that there is no adequate substitute for EDC (killed by the French Assembly)."

He also declared "it would be a mistake to assume that any acceptable solution has been fully developed" in seeking means of restoring full West German sovereignty and granting the Bonn government equality in the European allied defense system.

The much-traveled secretary to confer with West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and British Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill and Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden.

Adenauer and Dulles came to quick agreement on what they viewed as the need for restoration of West German sovereignty and full partnership in Europe's collective security setup.

Then, after a three-hour talk in London, Dulles and Eden agreed on "speedy action" to make West Germany a full-fledged partner in the Western defense alliance.

Dulles passed Paris, visiting only Bonn, Germany, and London in his mission to solve what he called "a grave situation" posed by France's refusal to accept EDC and its controls on West German rearmament.

His pointed omission was regarded as the sharpest diplomat rebuke that the U. S. has administered to France since the end of World War II.

Dulles also won the apparent support of Sen. Alexander Wiley (R-Wis.), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee who

2 Officers Die in Crash of Jet

T33 Trainer Trying to Land at Harrisburg, Hits Farm

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP)—A T33 Lockheed jet trainer crashed in a cantaloupe patch on a farm near the Pennsylvania Turnpike early today while trying to land at Harrisburg state airport. Two Air Force officers were killed.

Officials at the nearby U. S. Air Force materiel depot at Middletown said the plane was en route from Bryan Air Force Base, Tex., to Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D.C. The plane was unable to land at Andrews because of electrical storms.

The names of the dead fliers were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

Wesley Wheeler, a control tower operator at Harrisburg airport, said there was no radio contact with the plane before it attempted to land. He said the plane came in too high to land and was banking around the field, apparently for another try, when it crashed on the farm of Charles Grissinger, about 75 yards from the West Shore interchange of the turnpike.

Ex-Mate Turns Self In to Police

Thomas Crane Faces Charges of Assaulting Hubby No. 2

GRAND RAPIDS (UP)—Dowagiac Police were expected to come to Grand Rapids today to pick up Thomas P. Crane, 35, and return him to Dowagiac to face an assault charge.

Crane, a railroad worker, was subject of a statewide search Friday when his former wife's second husband, William Dandurand, told police at Dowagiac that Crane had forced his wife and her small child into a car and fled after assaulting him.

Dandurand told Dowagiac authorities that he met Crane on a street in downtown Dowagiac Thursday night and was assaulted during an argument and that when he returned to his home at nearby Twin Lake, neighbors told him that Crane had come to his home and forced his attractive wife, Sybil, 32, and her 3½-year-old child into his car and fled.

Crane, accompanied by his former wife, turned himself in to police headquarters here at 1:15 p.m. Friday.

Police said Mrs. Dandurand told them she left her home and went with Crane willingly. She said she had called her former husband to come and get her and planned to leave her second husband, police said.

Lapeer Farmers Found Innocent

Jury Deliberates Three Hours in Clearing 6 of Obstructing Justice

CHARLOTTE, Mich. (AP)—Six Lapeer County farmers were found innocent of obstructing justice yesterday by a jury of 12 men in the 1952 eviction case of Mrs. Elizabeth Stevens.

The jury, made up of 11 farmers and a furniture dealer, deliberated three hours, 23 minutes. The foreman, M. L. Hutchinson of Eaton Rapids, said the jury studied the case against each defendant separately, as ordered by Circuit Judge Timothy C. Quinn in his charge.

The defendants took the news without emotion, shook hands with the jurors and left quietly.

They were accused of hawking with Lapeer County Sheriff Clark W. Gregory and a deputy when

BRAZZAVILLE, French Equatorial Africa (AP)—It was a wartime idea to print a picture of King George VI on the cotton cloth which forms the basis of the female garb in Africa. It seemed to be a good piece of propaganda and a cheap one too.

The printed cotton became a tremendous success, so that today, even in French Equatorial Africa, among natives who do not speak one word of English, "Kingey Zorgey" is a well known ruler.

There were also cotton prints showing Roosevelt and Churchill together or Churchill alone in a whole series of brilliant uniforms. "Kingey Gurtseil" in the average African's mind is the ruler of some mythical country beyond the sea where they smoke cigars all day long.

Except for "King Gurtseil," the war leaders like President Roosevelt or Gen. De Gaulle slowly dropped out of circulation.

Communist Border Guards Argue Over Grab of 2 Gls

MARKTREDWITZ, Germany (AP)—Bavarian border police said today they believe one of the two U. S. Army men captured yesterday by Czech frontier guards was an officer in civilian clothes on his way behind the Iron Curtain on an espionage mission. The Army said it wasn't so.

"The soldier in question was a lieutenant," a U. S. Army spokesman at Heidelberg said. "He was in civilian clothes. He was not en route to Czechoslovakia and he did not carry forged credentials. The lieutenant was in civilian clothes because as an interrogation officer he must interview German civilians on this side of the border."

Wrens on Strike; Food Too Fattening

LEE-ON-SOLENT, England (AP)—Two hundred "Wrens"—of the Women's Royal Naval Service—are on hunger strike. They find navy food too fattening.

The dispute arose over yesterday's lunch—bean puree, grilled sausages, fried onions, and boiled potatoes followed by suet pudding and treacle. The girls took one look and tried to march out to restaurants near their barracks.

But their commanding officer told them to eat the lunch provided, or go hungry.

The girls complain the food is cooked by men who don't know what a woman wants to eat and keep her figure.

Indian Parliament Sets Minimum Marriage Age

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Parliament's lower House has voted that Indian girls can't marry before they are 18 and boys must wait until they're 21.

Before that law went into effect many Indian unions were arranged in infancy under the old Hindu tradition of child marriage.

Democrats Locked in Bitter Fight for Control of Party Machinery

Democratic factions were locked today in what appeared to be a bitter fight for control of the party machinery even as the campaign for control of the 84th Congress was getting started.

A Democratic conclave at Indianapolis, billed as the kick of the party's drive to capture a majority in the next Congress, produced angry interview statements by National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell and former Chairman Frank McKinney.

Mitchell, a backer of Adlai E. Stevenson, said "a former official" of the national committee has tried to insure the failure of a \$100-a-plate party dinner which Stevenson will address tonight.

And McKinney, once the favorite party chieftain of former President Truman, said the Mitchell organization failed to sell the 1,000

seats for the dinner. He said the tickets found few takers at a cut rate of \$7.50.

Truman, still convalescing from major surgery last June, said yesterday in Kansas City he'll have to take a back seat during the campaign. But both Democrats and Republicans made it clear his name will not be forgotten.

Mitchell said he had been forced to halt printing of official programs for tonight's dinner to insert a portrait of Truman. A picture of Stevenson, the 1952 Democratic presidential candidate, already was in the program.

In St. Louis, Vice President Nixon last night invoked Truman's name as symbolic of what he said would happen to the government should Democrats win the election. The result, he said, would be "Trumanism."

Nixon's cross-country campaign tour was eclipsed, for the moment, by the Democratic feud at Indianapolis.

Democrats generally regarded the squabble as primarily a local fight between dissident party leaders. There was ample evidence, however, that it goes to the heart of a battle for party control after Mitchell retires. He has said he'll

step down as chairman after the Nov. 2 elections.

McKinney and Paul M. Butler, who may succeed Mitchell, are both from Indiana. Butler is Indiana national committeeman and a South Bend attorney. McKinney is an Indianapolis banker.

Mitchell told a newsman he has no doubt a former committee official has tried to make him and Butler look bad on Stevenson's appearance. He said his critic—whom he did not name—hopes to contrast tonight's affair with a testimonial dinner for McKinney

last Oct. 30. On that occasion, a sell-out audience greeted Truman.

Despite the offstage battle, Democrats at Indianapolis continued to express optimism about the outcome of the campaign. They concentrated their fire on the record of the Eisenhower administration.

Nixon also emphasized the Eisenhower record—but in a different way. He told a \$100-a-plate GOP fund raising dinner that the real election issue is the Eisenhower record versus a return to what he called "Trumanism."

The vice president said a Democratic Congress next year would mean a return to Truman-Acheson policies that "got us into war."

He said Eisenhower-Dulles policies "got us out of war."

Nixon also linked the Truman administration with communism, controls and corruption.

Rep. Sam Rayburn of Texas, the Democratic House leader, contended the Eisenhower administration has made no changes in the Truman-Acheson foreign policy but has "blundered" and lost prestige abroad.

Parochial Schools Push to Provide More Rooms

BIRMINGHAM — Parochial schools in this area are having their difficulties, with building programs pushing to keep pace with mounting student enrollments.

Ground was broken for Our Lady Queen of Martyrs Catholic School, on Oct. 3, 1953, the second anniversary of the parish.

On Sept. 9 of this year the school at 3240 S. Pierce St. opened its first six classrooms, along with a clinic and general offices. In the first unit, some 300 first through fifth graders have started their studies.

Looking to the future, an underground foundation was constructed for six additional classrooms, with plans already under way to build two of the rooms in April. It is anticipated that these will house sixth grade students by fall of next year.

Grade seven should be added in 1956 and grade eight in 1957. A second floor eventually will be constructed to bring the school to an ultimate of 22 classrooms. When completed the school will represent a cost figure of \$188,000.

Some relief for Holy Name Catholic School was anticipated with the coming of the new school to serve Catholic children in the area, but long waiting lists prevailed in most of the eight grades before the opening day of school.

Holy Name also lost one of its classrooms this semester. The Alumni House which had doubled as a classroom, was torn down to make way for the new Holy Name Church. A capacity enrollment of 675 students was reached this year.

The 1948 enrollment of 300 was more than doubled in 1949, when a 10-classroom addition was built. Church officials say two more rooms are needed now.

A modernized kitchen will be ready for tomorrow's Homecoming Sunday at the First Baptist Church. The 11 a.m. service will be marked with special features, and a church dinner for all will follow at 12:30 p.m. A program of interest and inspiration will conclude the day.

Union, Square D Continue Talks

Judges Suggest Strike Be Called Off for 30 Days for Negotiations

DETROIT (INS)—Company and union negotiators were scheduled to meet at the bargaining table again today to try to reach an agreement that would halt the three-month-old Square D strike.

Up for discussion at the 9:30 a.m. meeting was a proposal by Circuit Judge Frank B. Ferguson suggesting that the strike be called off and that both sides get together to negotiate for 30 days.

If no agreement has been reached by that time, Ferguson proposed, the matters in dispute should be submitted to arbitration.

Chief issue in the dispute, and the one responsible for the long stalemate, is the company's insistence that a no-strike clause be inserted in the contract.

Strike action at the plant yesterday was comparatively mild. More than 500 pickets lined up in the morning and nearly 250 remained at quitting time, but there were no incidents.

Former Rep. Fish Quits 'For America'

CHICAGO — The For America organization accepted former Rep. Hamilton Fish's resignation yesterday—four days before he threatened to resign publicly unless the organization returned to what he termed its original concept for political action.

Fish, one of the founders of For America, said in New York yesterday that he discovered a clause in the organization's charter which, in effect, prohibited political activity.

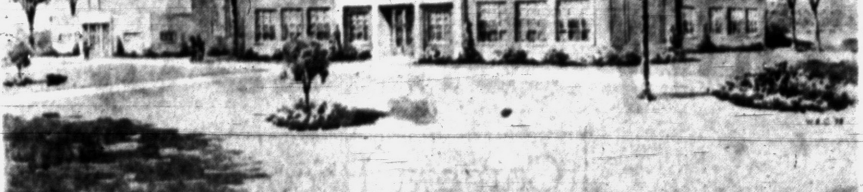
This, he said, made the organization "utterly, totally useless." He added 90 per cent of For America members agree with his view.

GG Might Cut Infant Mortality

Three Doctors Suggest Solution to Mysterious Normal Baby Deaths

CHICAGO (INS)—Three Brooklyn doctors reported today a possible solution to a mysterious malady which suddenly and unexpectedly kills thousands of apparently normal newborn infants each year.

The doctors said a study of a group of such cases points to infection, particularly in the respiratory tract, as the possible death factor.

They suggest routine injections of gamma globulin "might prevent a substantial number of these sudden and unexpected deaths."

Drs. David M. Spain, Victoria A. Bradshaw and Irving J. Greenblatt reported their findings in the current Journal of the American Medical Association.

The strange and sudden deaths have their highest incidence between 2 and 3 months of age. The doctors report the usual tragic pattern involves a mother putting her healthy baby in a crib or carriage and finding it dead several hours later.

The period of greatest death coincides with the "critical stage" in the life of the infant when the antibodies (disease-fighting substances) given to the baby by the mother during pregnancy wear out.

The baby then begins to build up its own antibodies to fight infection and the doctors reason that a low level of this vital substance may account for the deaths.

Similar low levels of gamma globulin were noted. Gamma globulin is a protein substance of the blood with a makeup similar to antibodies.

The researchers noted GG-injections have cleared up other diseases like measles and suggest it as a possible solution for preventing unexpected deaths of newborn babies.

Pedestrian Fined on Traffic Charge

BIRMINGHAM—In the first case tried in the courts of Birmingham, a man was found guilty yesterday of violating a traffic signal as a pedestrian.

Leon C. Cowan, 78, of 740 Oakland Ave., pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined \$4 plus \$3 costs by Justice John J. Gaffill.

that there was a house of an early settler near the site of the present diggings.

According to the old resident's theory, the survivors buried the epidemic victims in a family plot. More graves, he claims, are believed to be located in woods to the west of the present project site.

Michigan State Police Troopers William Dreger and Harold Wade said a complete skeleton and a smaller skull, perhaps that of a child, will be sent to Cranbrook for examination today.

Workers pushed two or three of the skeletons back into a "fill" before they discovered the bones were human.

The skeletons, Dreger said, were buried in about six feet of sand. Bits of wood that could have been a coffin or cross, and some old-fashioned square nails, were also dug up.

Some old-timers claim that "square nails" have been out of service now for about 75 years.

Action is slated to fill a vacancy on the Oakland County Planning Commission.

returned yesterday from a 30-day survey tour of Europe.

Wiley said his talks with European leaders convinced him that they are seeking unity and added that West Germany should be brought into the defense system.

"The Dulles-Eden accord was seen as a move to cement what appeared to be a slight strain in allied relations and a guarantee that the Germans will not be left out of Western defense plans."

A foreign office spokesman said the British would shortly issue invitations for a nine-nation parley in London to work out the details of Germany's military contribution. The conference probably will be held Sept. 27.

Diplomatic informants said Dulles and Eden also agreed to ask for a North Atlantic Pact council meeting in mid-October to discuss the defense situation.

Eden hinted that his talk with Dulles may be fruitful. Before Dulles boarded a plane at London Airport for Washington, Eden said: "We are very grateful to Secretary Dulles for coming over and I am sure that our conversations will prove most useful."

Berkley Woman Knifed in Home

Attacker Flees After Being Stabbed; Police Seek Suspect

A 40-year-old Berkley housewife was attacked and beaten by a knife-wielding intruder in her home last night but she told police she managed to inflict a stab wound on her assailant before he fled.

The woman, Mrs. George W. Hillman, of 3482 Oakshire, who was treated for cuts and bruises, told Police Chief Frank Irons that she discovered the man lurking in the basement stairs adjoining the kitchen she returned from a 10:30 shopping trip. He was holding two kitchen knives, she stated.

Mrs. Hillman, whose husband was at work in Detroit, said the slim, blond attacker lunged at her and threatened to kill her. "He picked me up and carried me into the bedroom, and rushed to close the front door," she told Irons.

During the brief struggle, she managed to take one of the knives from her attacker and inflict a wound in the abdomen and several other cuts, Irons quoted her as saying.

The man, described as about 28 years old and five feet eight inches tall, escaped through the bedroom window after kicking out the glass, she said.

An unidentified neighbor told police she saw the man enter the home earlier but thought he was a guest there.

Irons said the attacker was reported wearing tinted glasses, a light yellow jacket and dark trousers.

the government can spend it for him.

"These tax cuts voted by the 83rd Congress amount to \$200 a year for every family in the country. The days of tax and tax-spend and spend are gone forever as long as we keep a strong Republican Congress to support President Eisenhower's program."

Martin asserted that "courageous legislation" enacted by the present Congress assures that Communism "will never gain a foothold in this favored land."

He cited the Republican loyalty program for separating 2,486 security risks from the federal payroll, seeing 93 subversives deported, preventing 127 persons with Communist ties from entering the country and adding 62 groups and associations to the subversives list.

Martin noted six new laws directed against Communism: 1. Communism has been outlawed as a political party.

2. Citizenship is revoked from persons convicted of conspiracy to overthrow the government by force and violence.

3. The death penalty is now imposed for peacetime espionage.

4. Printing equipment operated by Communist organizations must be registered with the Department of Justice. "Communist propaganda no longer enjoys the official protection of the U. S. Government."

5. Federal pensions are denied those convicted of espionage or treason.

6. Immunity is granted to those wishing to renounce communism and tell their story to the FBI.

Other new legislation touched on by Martin included the highway bill which he said makes certain an extensive program of road building making up for necessary lags during the war years.

Martin saw the recent election of a Democrat as Maine's governor as the result of local issues and not significant of a national trend.

Turning to foreign affairs, Martin said, "France failed to grasp the torch of liberty" when it voted against entering the European Defense Community. If EDC is impossible, he stated, "let us speedily devise something similar."

He termed Germany "a strong nation now rising which won't live in a vacuum. We must have a rearmament West Germany on our side."

Gifts were presented to Dondro including the pen which the President used to sign the Seaway bill. A message was read from Elsiephower commending Dondro's leadership of the Seaway fight and his long record of service.

In a short address, Dondro said "This is the crowning occasion of my entire life and career." He called for an unrelenting fight on communism, saying, "If we go down, freedom on earth will perish forever."

Introduced by Martin R. Hemphill, dinner committee chairman, was Congressman Kit Clardy of Lansing.

Hem and Haw
In your youth you liked to dance the hesitation waltz. It was all the rage. But have you followed down the years by living a hesitation life? Do you pause more than you pursue, go hither rather than thither and hem and haw rather than hop?
I met two former friends in Florida this week and asked them about a forward looking program we had developed some years ago for the good of the community. Had they carried on? They began to make excuses, and then, realizing the feebleness of them they started criticizing the plan and the people back of it.
Who were these men? They vote as Smith and Jones, but their real names are Hem and Haw. They are familiar figures in every community, talking much and doing nothing. Bliss Carman describes them thus—"Hem and Haw are the sons of sin, created to shilly and shirk. He lay 'round and Haw looked on while God did all the work."
Surely you have met these gentlemen. You may be one of them, never ready for a forward step, or for a change, and always ready to criticize those who are. "Hem was the father of bigots and bories; as the sands of the sea were they. And Haw was the father of all the tribe who criticize today."
These fellows are present on every street corner, in every assembly, discussing, objecting, and criticizing, while "over the quivering lips of Hem is the defining voice of Haw." They are political experts but never go to the polls to vote. Rather they cry out against the winning candidates.
Sometimes they get into government positions and hem and haw, afraid to strike the blow while thousands of our sons are dying on a hopeless foreign battlefield. They initiate in defense of foreign governments an accounting of the millions of our tax money being dumped into their yawning laps.
Hem and Haw sometimes occupy a church pew. You see them whispering about the service and shaking their heads when the collection plate is passed. I have seen them clanking the pulpit stairs and heard them criticize the congregation for the things they themselves were responsible for.
Let's quit the company of hem and haw and turn our backs on Haw, and forward press, forgetting them—their every fluke and flaw, and build a world of righteousness of liberty and law.

The Harvest Banquet, an annual affair, will be held Oct. 1 at 6:30 p.m. for the 64th time.

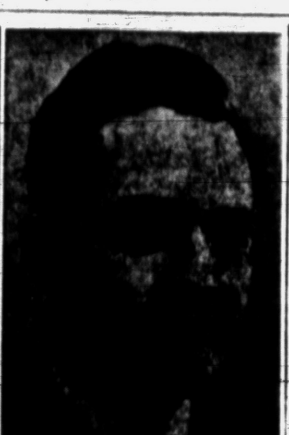
