EIGHT NEW FACULTY APPROVED BY BOARD

Eight new faculty appointments including five full-and part-time positions in nursing were among personnel actions approved by the Board of Trustees May 28.

The new nursing faculty are: Ellen A. Cary, part-time visiting instructor; Odis L. Matlock and Virginia Helen Matlock, part-time adjunct clinical instructors; and Evelyn J. Piehl and Diane R. Wilson, full-time instructors in nursing.

Other new faculty are: Luther Nichols Grimes and Asish Chandra Nag, assistant professors of biological sciences; and Carla M. Zainie, assistant professor of art history.

Reappointments were approved for Robert A. Morgart, visiting assistant professor of education, and Gifford G. Scott, part-time adjunct professor of physics.

\$217,666 ACCEPTED IN GIFTS AND GRANTS

Among the major grant sources were: U.S. Office of Education, \$120,000 for the Special Services for Disadvantaged Students program; Leukemia Society of America, Inc., \$31,000 to Dennis M. Callawaert, chemistry, for research on "Mechanisms in Cellular Immunity"; National Institutes of Health, \$11,333 to Arun K. Roy, biology, for "Homonal Control of 2U Globulin Synthesis in Liver," and \$11,000 to Joseph D. Hovanesian, engineering, for "Use of Moire Techniques to Measure Corneal Topography"; National Science Foundation, \$8,970 to Paul Tomboulian, chemistry, for an undergraduate research participation program, and \$8,200 to Ronald DeVore, mathematics, for research entitled "Degree of Approximation."

THIRTY PERSONS INITIATED TO SIGMA XI

Twenty-two Oakland University faculty and eight students were initiated May 28 into the university's chapter of Sigma Xi, the scientific research society of North America. The society has

more than 400 national chapters and clubs. Its purpose is to encourage original investigation in science, pure and applied.

The university received chapter status last fall and was the youngest institution nationally to receive recognition. As a chapter, the university has the right to elect faculty to full membership in Sigma Xi.

Full members are chosen on the basis of noteworthy achievement in original scientific research. The associate memberships are based on a marked aptitude for research.

Promoted from associate to full membership were: John Curtis Chipman and Jon Froemke, mathematics; Paul R. Paslay, engineering; Dean G. Purcell, psychology; and Theodore Yntema, economics and management.

Named outright to full membership were eight faculty from biological sciences. They are: Thomas B. Friedman, Mary E. Hight, Robert D. Hunter, Charles B. Lindemann, Michael V. Riley, John T. Romeo, Arun K. Roy, and Barry S. Winkler.

Other full members are: Gottfried Brieger, chemistry; Denis M. Callewaert, chemistry; Tung H. Weng, engineering; Richard E. Ewing, mathematics; Jeffry V. Mallow, physics; Leonard C. Ireland; Virginia E. O'Leary; Amos Spector; and Harold Zepelin. Ireland, O'Leary, Spector, and Zepelin are psychology faculty.

Students elected to associate membership are: Raymond E. Ciaglowski, biological sciences; chemistry students Irene A. Gennick, Rebecca A. Failor, and Christine M. Russell; engineering students Burdette Terry Beck and Bhushan L. Bhatt; Timothy K. Stanton, physics; and psychology student Gregory M. Chilenski.

Gennick and Chilenski have received National Science Foundation Graduate Fellowships for three years of study at the institutions of their choice. Beck and Bhatt are candidates for the Ph.D. in systems engineering.
