OU Hosts Microscopy Meeting

Scientists who look into the very molecular structure for keys to aging and disease will discuss the state of their art at the Michigan Electron Microscopy Conference May 7 at Oakland University.

Researchers from Michigan and Northern Ohio will meet to exchange papers, attend workshops, and to hear two keynote addresses, one by Dr. John E. Johnson, guest scientist at the National Institute on Aging, and Dr. Herb Hagler of the University of Texas Health Science Center.

Dr. Johnson will speak at 9:45 a.m. on "Aging and Cell Structure" and Dr. Hagler at 1:30 p.m. on "X-Ray Analysis and the Electron Microscope: An Important Tool for Pathology and Physiology." The day-long program begins at 9:00 a.m. in O'Dowd Hall.

Other highlights of the meeting include poster sessions, reports on current research in the field, and workshops on image analysis and diamond knives microtomy.

During the meeting Robert H. Gray of the University of Michigan will receive a distinguished service award for his work.

Dr. John Matthews of the Upjohn Company will receive the distinguished service award for his contributions to the organization.

Jane Tsui, Nalin Unakar, and George Price, Department of Biological Sciences, will present Arylsulfatases in normal and cataractous rat lens.

We will meet regularly through the end of October with the objective of formulating university-wide general user requirements and a master plan for the implementation of the Student Information System. As the planning proceeds, we will conduct in-depth sessions with each user to determine their needs and formulate the support they will require.

Student Discounts for MB Festival

For the Festival's 1982 season, full-time Oakland University students are eligible to purchase up to two (2) lawn tickets for most Thursday or Sunday Detroit Symphony Orchestra Classical Concerts for \$2.00 on the night of the performance. This offer is available to all Oakland University full-time students who were enrolled during the winter semester or will be enrolled during the spring and/or summer terms.

In order to receive this discount full-time students at OU must receive

a Meadow Brook/OU Student Club discount card. These cards will be available at Room 122 Wilson Hall, beginning May 1, 1982. There is no charge for this membership and all full-time students at the university are eligible for one of these cards, upon request.

Members of the Meadow Brook/OU Student Club may then use this card to purchase, at show-time, up to two (2) lawn tickets at the \$2.00 price for any Thursday or Sunday DSO classical concert at the 1982 Festival, with the exception of Thursday, July 8 and Sunday, August 1. This card is good for lawn tickets only and can only be used on Thursday and Sunday DSO classical concerts. Student Club members will also be required to show some other form of ID, such as a driver's license, along with this card at the time of purchase.

The Meadow Brook Music Festival hopes that many of the university's full-time students will take advantage of this very special offer.
