FACULTY AND STAFF MOVES ARE NEAR COMPLETION

Moves involving faculty and staff in five OU buildings are expected to be completed prior to the opening of classes Sept. 4, according to Robert Bunker, assistant vice president for academic affairs.

Already completed are the following moves: departments of Mathematics and Learning Skills from Hill House to Vandenberg Hall; Student Services from Hill House to North Foundation Hall; Economics and Management from North Foundation Hall to Vandenberg Hall; and History from Varner Hall to Vandenberg Hall.

Moves within Varner Hall include transfer of faculty in Sociology-Anthropology from the 4th to the 5th floor; moving of the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences from the 4th to the 5th floor; and changing of offices in the School of Education from the 4th and 5th floors to the 3rd and 4th floors. In addition, Employment Relations is expanding its office space in North Foundation Hall, and one move is still scheduled for the summer, that of Speech Communication from South Foundation Hall to Varner Hall.

Bunker is coordinating the academic moves for the Provost's Office. He paid tribute to the physical plant staff for its cooperation in making the space moves possible before the opening of fall classes.

ORIENTATION PLANNED FOR NEW FACULTY, STAFF

An orientation program for 50 new faculty and staff has been set for Thursday, Aug. 30, from 1:00 p.m. in the Clubhouse.

Speakers will include: Fred Obear, academic vice president and provost; Donald D. O'Dowd, president; Manuel Pierson, dean of Student Services; and Doug Woodard, dean of Student Life. A 4:30 p.m. reception in the Clubhouse will follow the orientation program.

BUSINESS OFFICE ISSUES BASEBALL CHALLENGE

FALL CONVOCATION IS SEPT. 9; DEAN REUBEN TORCH WILL SPEAK

Oakland University's traditional fall convocation for new students and their parents will be held Sunday, Sept. 9, from 3:00 p.m. in the Howard C. Baldwin Memorial Pavilion. Faculty and staff will march in an academic procession preceding the

convocation.

Keynoted speaker will be Reuben Torch, newly named dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Dean Torch's address is entitled "The Goose That Laid The Golden Egg-And Other Truths." President Donald D. O'Dowd will welcome the students and outline the new programs and other highlights students may expect during the year.

A cook-out with salads and franks will be held immediately following the formal program. The cook-out will give students, faculty and parents a chance to get acquainted, according to Judith Keegan, dean of freshmen. The university expects more than 1,700 freshman and transfer students to enroll for classes that open Sept. 4.

Dean Keegan said a shuttle bus service has been established for students needing rides. Departures have been arranged from the Oakland Center at 2:15, 2:30, and 2:45 p.m., and students will be returned to campus following the convocation and cook-out.

CONTINUING STUDENTS REGISTER AUG. 30-31

Formal registration will be held for continuing daytime students on Thursday and Friday, Aug. 30-31, in the Offices of the Registrar in 161 North Foundation Hall. Registration for on-campus evening credit students will be held there Wednesday through Friday, Aug. 29-30-31. Approximately 3,000 continuing daytime students have already enrolled and paid their fees through advance registration held last March, Registrar Lowell Ruggles said.

OU FACULTY APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED FOR 1973-74

Eight faculty appointments for 1973-74 and changes of status for five continuing members of the faculty have been announced by Frederick W. Obear, academic vice president and provost. All appointments were effective Aug. 15, the date they were approved by the Board of Trustees.

Four of the appointments involve faculty who have carried visiting lecturer or visiting professor status last year and who are now regular members of the faculty.

Those four appointments are: Carol E. Halsted, instructor in education. She holds a B.S. degree from the University of Michigan and an M.A. from Wayne State University; William Pfaff, instructor in education and baseball coach. He holds a B.A. degree from Washington and Jefferson and a M.A. degree from the University of Toronto.

Sue Tenorio, assistant professor of education. She holds a B.S. degree from Eastern Michigan University, a master's degree in special education from Wayne State University, and she is completing her doctoral dissertation at George Washington University.

Kathleen Williams, instructor in education. She received her B.A. degree from Central Michigan University and her M.A. from Michigan State University.

Newly appointed faculty are: Rose Marie Cooper, instructor in learning skills. She has her B.A. and M.A.T. degrees from Oakland University.

Michael Kenney, assistant professor of education and assistant director of teacher education. Kenney's B.A. degree is from San Diego State College, and his M.A. and Ph. D. degrees are from Michigan State University.

Alfred Stransky, assistant professor of education. He received an undergraduate and master's degrees in education and he received his Ph. D. from Florida State University.

Socrates Tountas, visiting instructor in economics. Tountas received his undergraduate degree from the Athens School of Economics, the M.A. from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, and he is a Ph. D. candidate at Wayne State University.

Changes of status have been approved for: Eugene H. Boldon, from associate professor of education, coordinator of intercollegiate athletics, and head basketball coach to associate professor of education, associate director of intercollegiate athletics, and head basketball coach, effective July 1, 1973; James F. Clatworthy, from assistant professor of education and chairman, New College, to associate professor of education and chairman, New-Charter College, effective August 29, 1973, through December 19, 1973 (The change from assistant professor to associate professor, effective August 15, 1973, was approved by the Board of Trustees on June 27, 1973.); Hollie L. Lepley, from professor of education and coordinator of physical education to professor of education and associate director of physical education, and golf coach, effective July 1, 1973; Robert L. Stern, from associate professor of chemistry to associate professor of chemistry and chairman, New-Charter College, effective January 3, 1974, through April 23, 1974; Nalin Unakar, from associate professor to associate professor and acting chairman, Department of Biological Sciences, effective August 15, 1973, through August 14, 1974.
