OAKLAND UNIVERSITY

Oakland University is a state-funded, four-year institution with an enrollment of more than 11,500 students. Located midway between Rochester and Pontiac, Michigan, the university is approximately 30 miles from all the cultural and entertainment opportunities of America's fifth largest city—Detroit.

Oakland University was founded in 1957 when the late Mr. and Mrs. Alfred G. Wilson donated their 1,600-acre estate and \$2 million to Michigan State University to begin a new college in Oakland County. The university, named Michigan State-Oakland, enrolled its first students in 1959. In 1963 the name was changed to Oakland University and in 1970 the state legislature granted Oakland University its independence.

Since its inception, the university has been committed to offering a diverse set of academic programs. Anchored by a strong liberal arts program, the university is organized into a College of Arts and Sciences, and Schools of Economics and Management, Human and Educational Services, Performing Arts, Engineering, Nursing, a Center for General and Career Studies, a Center for Health Sciences, and a Center for Community and Human Development.

The athletic program strives for continued success in achieving its educational goal of providing total participation within a framework of excellence. Under the guidance of the Director of Athletics Corey Van Fleet, Oakland University's athletic department has 12 sports and offers cardio-vascular rehabilitation and physiology laboratory programs including prescriptive exercises and stress testing.

The Hollie Lepley Sports Center houses a range of facilities for individual and team activities including: a swimming pool; courts for handball, paddleball, badminton, squash, basketball and volleyball; a wrestling room; and an updated weight room. There is also an 18-hole golf course, eight excellent outdoor tennis courts and several well-groomed playing fields. These facilities combined with the university's beautiful wooded landscape and rolling fields make the Oakland campus one of the most ideal environments for sports activities.

Oakland University is a member of the NCAA Division II and the AIAW Division I and the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. Its academic programs are accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

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COREY VAN FLEET

Director of Athletics

Corey Van Fleet was named director of athletics at Oakland University in 1972. Upon his arrival at OU in 1965, he was swimming coach for the Pioneers until 1979 when he stepped down to devote his full-time duties to the ever-increasing job of director of athletics.

He has, however, remained active in swimming on the high school level by serving as an official at high school meets. He also officiates for the Big Ten Conference, the National Collegiate

Athletic Association (NCAA), the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) meets, and the Olympic Trials.

A native of Battle Creek, Michigan, he received his bachelor of science degree (1959) and his master of science degree (1971) in physical education from Wayne State University. He also has completed course work in a doctoral program at Florida State University.

His recent honors include: the Matt Mann Swimming Coach Award from the Michigan High School Coaches Association; appointment to the board of directors, American Red Cross, U.S. Olympic Swimming Committee; the Master Coach Award from the Michigan Amateur Athletic Union. Van Fleet is also a member of the YMCA National Aquatics Board of Directors, a member of the Rochester Rotary Club, past president of the College Swimming Coaches of America, Inc., and an active member in the NCAA and AIAW governing bodies.

An associate professor of education with tenure, Van Fleet and his wife, Mary, have one son and live in Rochester.

GREG SMITH

Sports Information Director

Greg Smith is in his second year as sports information director at Oakland University after serving for two years as SID at Valparaiso University in Valparaiso, Indiana.

Smith's 1980 OU swimming brochure was judged second-best in the nation by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

The 25-year-old SID received his Bachelor of Science degree in Public Relations Journalism in 1977 from Bowling Green State University (BGSU) in Bowling Green, Ohio. While a student at BGSU, he was a sports information assistant for four years, assistant sports editor for the **BG News**, the campus newspaper, and a sports writer for the **Bowling Green Sentinel-Tribune**. He was also president and founder of the Sports Information Club at BGSU. In addition, his experience includes sports writing for the **Findlay Courier**.

Smith is a member of CoSIDA and the Detroit Sports Broadcasters Association. He is a bachelor and lives in Pontiac.



COACH ERNIE MAGLISCHO



Beginning his second season as men's swimming coach at Oakland University, Ernie Maglischo has a tough act to follow after winning the NCAA Division II Swimming and Diving Championship at Youngstown State University in Youngstown, Ohio last year. It was the fifth consecutive NCAA Division II title for the Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania native, a mark which is truly amazing.

In 1973 Maglischo swimmers at California State University at Chico won the first of what would become a streak of four consecutive NCAA Division II swimming and diving championships. Maglischo left the coaching profession to concentrate on the academic field before returning to coaching in grand fashion at Oakland University last season.

Since he began coaching in 1960 at Bowling Green State University where he led the freshman team to an 8-1 season, Maglischo has established a winning atmosphere wherever he has gone. While at California State University at Chico he compiled a 73-25 dual meet record and gained eight Far Western Conference (FWC) crowns from 1967-76. Before leaving Chico State the author of numerous articles on coaching and training techniques had been honored as the Far Western Conference Coach of the Year eight times and the Northern California Coach of the Year five times.

After obtaining his bachelor of science degree in physical education from Ohio University in 1960, Maglischo went on to receive his master's degree from Bowling Green in 1961 and his doctoral degree from Ohio State in 1974.

Maglischo left his coaching position at Bowling Green in 1961 to coach the varsity at Ohio Wesleyan University. In his only season there, the team finished second in the conference with a 7-3 record.

In 1963, Maglischo was appointed the first swim coach in the history of New Paltz State University, located in New York. Despite a 1-4 finish his first season, Maglischo turned the program around the next year, upping the team's record to 6-4. In 1966, he moved on to California State.

In addition to swimming, Maglischo has also coached water polo, tennis, soccer, and track during his career. A professional highlight came in 1977 when he was invited by the Rumanian Sports Federation to visit that country as a consultant, observing their national and junior national swim programs.

Maglischo, who enjoys tennis, volleyball, handball, and weight training, lives in Rochester with his wife, Cheryl, an Oakland University professor in the physical education department.

COACH PETE HOVLAND



Success and Pete Hovland go hand-in-hand. Beginning his second season as women's swimming coach at Oakland University this year, Hovland has the difficult task of improving on last year's outstanding season. The Pioneer "Swimmin' Women" placed third at the AIAW Midwest regionals, up four places from the year before. During the course of the year his swimmers also shattered 16 school records. In addition, Hovland guided the Oakland Live Y'ers to the boys' state AAU championship and the state YMCA championships in 1980.

Turning down swimming scholarships from several west coast universities, Hovland decided to attend California State University at Chico because of the excellence of both its swimming and academic programs.

As a sprint freestyle specialist and as a member of relay teams, he won no fewer than 13 national championships and led his team to four consecutive national NCAA Division II National Championships. Hovland's first national championship came as a member of the 800-yard freestyle relay team in 1973, his freshman year. Pete's first individual national championship and national record came the following year in the 200-yard freestyle event. However, it was his senior year that proved to be his most triumphant and the "icing on the cake" to what many consider to be one of the greatest athletic careers in Chico State history. In the 1977 national championships Hovland won the maximum of three individual events, two with record-breaking performances. In addition, he was a member of three winning and record-setting relay units, and his performance enabled his team to accumulate a record 438 points in the championship. For his efforts he was accorded such honors as Chico State Senior Athlete of the Year and the Far Western Conference Athlete of the Year. He still holds the school record for the 50-yard freestyle with a 20.93 time and was named Chico State's Swimming Athlete of the Decade in 1979.

After graduating from Chico State in 1977, Hovland earned his master of arts degree in physical education from the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) in 1979. While at UNI he gained valuable coaching experience and also taught physical education classes.

The 6-5, 195-pound California native is a bachelor and lives in Pontiac. He enjoys working with people, traveling, fishing, hunting, skiing, and photography.

COACH SHAWN McCORMICK



Shawn McCormick is a man on the move. A father of two children and a devoted family person, McCormick begins his fifth year at Oakland University this year. He is an associate professor and chairperson of the physical education department in addition to being the Pioneers' diving coach.

A 1964 graduate of Michigan State University, he obtained his master's degree in 1968 from Western Michigan University (WMU). While at WMU he was a graduate assistant and diving coach for the Broncos before becoming the assistant swimming and diving coach at Northern Illinois University from 1965-67. After spending a year at Indiana University working as a graduate assistant, McCormick went to the University of Wisconsin-Superior as an associate professor of health and physical education, head swimming and diving coach, and head tennis coach for eight years before coming to Oakland University.

McCormick has done much research in the last 15 years which includes writing an article with two other persons entitled "Anthropometric Measurements of Competitive Swimming" that appeared in the April, 1966 edition of **Swimming World**. He has also written 10-year, 11-year, and 12-year indexes for the publication. A meet director of many important swimming championships, McCormick has been honored as the NAIA District 14 Swimming Coach of the Year during the 1969-70 season while he was at the University of Wisconsin-Superior. He has also served as a diving referee at the NAIA championships in 1976 and the NCAA Division II championships last year at Youngstown State University.

McCormick has also written an article with OU mathematics professor Subbaiah Perla that appeared in **Research Quarterly** concerned with the diversification of scoring criteria among diving judges.

McCormick and his wife Vivian and their children live in Rochester.

MEN'S SWIMMING OUTLOOK

How do you spell success? Well, experts in NCAA Division II swimming and diving circles spell it M-A-G-L-I-S-C-H-O. That's Maglischo as in Ernie Maglischo, the second-year head swimming coach at Oakland University.

Success has managed to follow him wherever he goes. The soft-spoken OU head coach won four consecutive NCAA Division II swimming and diving championships while at California State University at Chico from 1973-77, before winning his fifth personal championship last year for Oakland University after taking a two-year leave of absence from the coaching field. It was the first national championship for the Pioneers in any sport and a fitting return to the coaching ranks by one of the nation's experts in the swimming world.

Maglischo and his squad will try to repeat their 1980 heroics and five-time national champion Mark Doyle will lead the way. Doyle won the 100-yard and 200-yard backstroke events in school record times of 52.19 and 1:53.66 respectively. His 200-yard time is the national standard for the NCAA Division II this year. Also returning is junior 200-yard freestyle national champion Mark Vagle. Vagle captured the national title with a 1:40.56 clocking. He also anchored the winning 800-yard freestyle relay team (6:49.22) of Gordon Geheb, Ian Dittus and Mike O'Hagan. Geheb also placed sixth in the 50-yard freestyle and third in the 200-yard freestyle events last winter.

Senior co-captains Tim Murphy and O'Hagan will lead a team with only four other seniors (Doyle, Gregg Santo, Gordy Haigh, and Doug McIntosh). Murphy placed ninth and eleventh in the 200-yard and 500-yard freestyle events respectively, and was a member of the third-place 400-yard freestyle relay squad. O'Hagan finished fifth in the 200-yard freestyle and was a member of the 400-yard and 800-yard freestyle relay teams.

Juniors Brian Brink and Eivind Hansen should also be in the limelight as well as sophomores Rick Cozad, Steve Gallagher, and Mike Sammons. Brink placed fourth and eighth in the 100-yard and 200-yard butterfly events respectively, while Hansen finished eighth in the 1,650-yard freestyle and eleventh in the 400-yard individual medley. Cozad received twelfth place honors in the 200-yard individual medley, while Gallagher, a transfer from Northern Michigan University, promises to provide depth in the butterfly events. Mike Sammons, the school record holder in the 1,000-yard and 1,650-yard freestyle events, should be a dominant force in the distance freestyle events after placing seventh in the 500-yard event at the national championships.

Maglischo is looking forward to another successful swimming campaign but cautions that the 1979-80 season was last year, and this year is another story. With a talented freshman class and proven returnees, however, Oakland University should be one of the top contenders to defend its national championship.

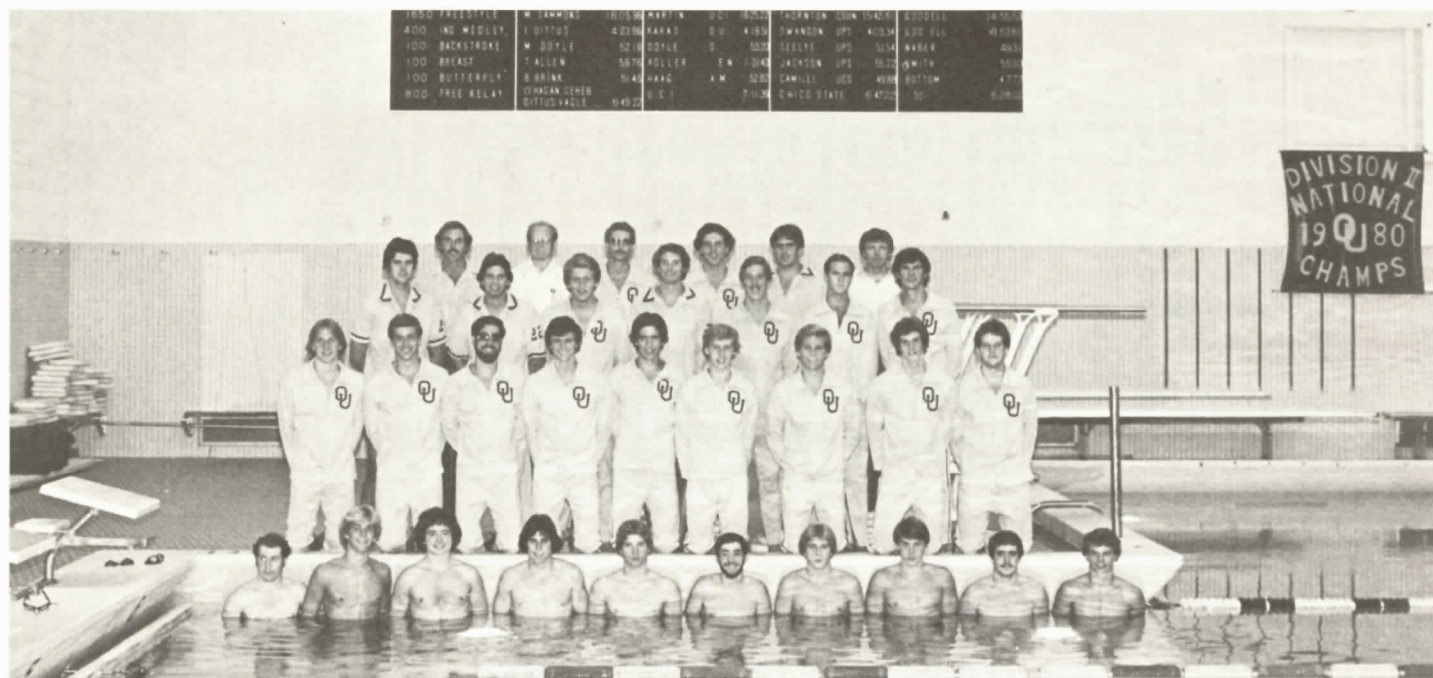

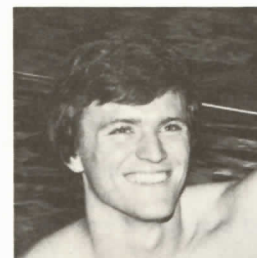

1980-81 OAKLAND UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S SWIMMING OUTLOOK

Breaking 16 school records and placing third at the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIWA) Midwest Regionals, is quite an impressive start for a first-year coach.

That's just the beginning, however, for Coach Pete Hovland and his Pioneer "Swimmin' Women," as 10 tankers return from last year's 6-4 dual meet squad.

Senior Lizbeth Hatfield and junior Kyrston Peterson are this year's co-captains. Hatfield had season-best team times of 1:59.60 in the 200-yard freestyle and a school record clocking of 2:34.10 in the 200-yard breaststroke and was a member of the school record-holding 400-yard and 800-yard freestyle relay teams. Peterson gives Hovland great versatility in many races and should be one of the swimmers to watch this year.

Sophomore sensation Tammy McGinnis also returns this year after rewriting many of the school swimming standards last winter. McGinnis set OU marks in the 500-yard (5:10.77), the 1,000-yard (10:47.75) and the 1,650-yard freestyle events as well as the 400-yard individual medley (4:44.56). She was also a member of the record-setting 800-yard freestyle relay team (7:58.20) and had a team-best time in the 100-yard backstroke (1:05.00). Sophomore Kim Rohm will be another swimmer to watch after a fine first season as well as junior Linda Hein. Hein, the team's butterfly specialist, holds the school record in the 50-yard event (26.70) as well as the 100-yard race (57.63).

Seniors Marsha Dahlgren, Patty Doherty and diver Janet Mecoli should provide excellent leadership for the Pioneers along with juniors Nancy Finzel and Michelle Postler for a large group of freshman swimmers.
