October 24, 1978 Reddy honored for research work

Venkat N. Reddy, director of the Institute of Biological Sciences, has received the prestigious Jonas S. Friedenwald Award of the Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology (ARVO).

Reddy will receive a plaque and a lectureship during the ARVO annual meeting next April. The Friedenwald Award recognizes outstanding contributions to ophthalmic research.

ARVO began with informal meetings held in New York in the 1920s, and it has become the predominant scientific eye research organization in the country with more than 2,000 members.

Reddy has been professor and director of the OU institute since 1975. From 1968 until that date he was professor and assistant director under the late V. Everett Kinsey. For the past 20 years Reddy has studied the mechanism of aqueous humour secretions and the basic mechanisms of cataract formation.

Jin Kinoshita, chief of the Vision Research Laboratory, National Eye Institute, cited Reddy for being "highly regarded internationally" in the field of eye research particularly for his contributions in understanding the fundamental transport mechanisms in ocular tissues and for work on cataract formation.

Kinoshita is the only man to win both the Friedenwald and Proctor Research Awards, the two highest awards made by the ARVO. He said the "Friedenwald Award is probably the highest scientific award in the field of eye research. Dr. Reddy is an outstanding man and Oakland University is lucky to have him."

The Proctor Research Medal and lectureship was established in 1949 for the memory of the eminent Boston Ophthalmologist who investigated trachoma and other diseases prevalent among the American Indians.

Friedenwald was the first winner of the Proctor Medal and a distinguished leader in both clinical ophthalmology and basic research. ARVO established the award in his honor following his untimely death in 1956.

A Bloomfield Hills resident, Reddy came to OU in 1968 after appointments as assistant professor of ophthalmic research (1957-61), and associate professor of ophthalmology (1961-68) both in the Kresge Eye Institute, Wayne State University School of Medicine. He remains an adjunct professor of ophthalmology at the Kresge Eye Institute.

Reddy holds a B.S. degree from Nizam College, University of Madras, India, and the M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from Fordham University where his major work was in blochemistry.

Frederick W. Obear, OU academic vice president and provost, called the award a "significant award for Reddy, for Oakland University, and for the Institute of Biological Sciences." It follows earlier recognition given to director emeritus V. Everett Kinsey. Kinsey, who died on July 23 of this year, won the Proctor Medal in 1952.

David Kelm of Southfield will play the title role of Count Dracula with Jerry Bacik of Union Lake as Dr. Van Helsing, and John Cowen of Royal Oak as the mad Renfield, the fly eater.

A Lansing resident (formerly of Rochester & Pontiac) has been named the seventh recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Service Award at the university.

Al Mann of 815 Prospect Avenue received this year's award, the highest honor provided for Oakland graduates. The Distinguished Alumni Service Award is given each year to alumni who have given continued service to the university or alumni association or have worked on a project that has special impact on the development of the university or alumni association. Mann chaired the 1977 Alumni Annual Fund Drive, which raised 57 percent more dollars from alumni than the 1976 campaign. He inaugurated a program of face-to-face solicitation of major gifts which resulted in six alumni becoming members of the University Associates with gifts of \$500, and Oakland's first alumni member of the President's Club, which requires a gift of \$1,000 annually for 10 years.

His work required extensive personal sacrifice, as he commuted from his home in Lansing every day of the telefund and for numerous committee meetings.

Following the fund drive, Mann initiated the first extensive alumni survey, charting alumni opinion on the image of OU and its alumni program

A 1970 graduate of Oakland, Mann is the director of Campaign Operations for the Senate Republican Committee. While living in Rochester, he was president of the Rochester Jaycees (1973) and selected a Key Man by the Jaycees that same year. A native of Pontiac, he graduated from Pontiac Northern High School and was formerly assistant city director of the Republican Party in that city. Mann's parents are residents of Manistee.

Advance registration for the winter semester, 1979, will begin on Monday, November 6, and continue through Thursday, November 16. Advance registration will be conducted at the Office of the Registrar, 161 North Foundation Hall, from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. daily, with the exception of Friday, November 10, when registration ends at 4:30 p.m.

Students are urged to register early for several reasons: convenience, a better chance for preferred courses and sections, no payment is required during advance registration, and students are slotted into their preferred courses on the basis of class ranking, not on the basis of the day registered.

Advance registered students receive a mailed confirmation of their schedule. Those students who receive a partial schedule will be permitted to add courses between December 4 and 8. All students who are advance registered will then be billed December 13, with payment due in full by January 3, 1979.

As in the past, there will also be a structured ("students eligible at specific time only" according to last name) one day final registration on Thursday, January 4, 1979, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. in the Oakland Center.
