

COUNTY INTERNSHIPS AVAILABLE

The Urban Affairs Center is accepting applications for positions with the Oakland County/Oakland University Student Intern Program. Eligible OU students can acquire valuable career skills while participating as student interns in various county departmental offices. In addition to the experience gained from such a placement, participants will be remunerated at an hourly rate.

Current assignments are available in the following county departments: Circuit Court Probation, Probate Court, Co-operative Extension, Sheriff's Department, Manpower, and Veteran's Services.

Applicants must be an Oakland County or on-campus resident; a regularly enrolled, full-time OU student; a junior, senior, or graduate student in good academic standing at the time of application; unemployed, underemployed, or not in the labor force; and available to work 20 hours per week.

BOARD APPROVES BUDGET REQUEST

The Oakland University Board of Trustees approved a \$24,708,558 general fund budget request for 1977-78, \$3,914,225 above the budget for fiscal 1976-77.

The request was approved by the board at the January 26 meeting. It is already under consideration in Lansing. The university will approve a formal budget at a much later date when enrollment and funding patterns become clear.

The proposed budget is comprised of a request for \$16,691,558 in state appropriations, \$7,212,000 in tuition and fees; \$280,000 in indirect cost recovery; and \$525,000 in miscellaneous income.

The university received a \$13,802,801 state appropriation in 1976-77 and Governor William Milliken has recommended \$14,904,154 for 1977-78 or \$1.7 million less than OU has requested. Some of the difference may be restored as the budget is considered in the legislature. The university's fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30.

Alumni office helps grads

The Graduate magazine will be given free to all graduating seniors at the Alumni Office, 105 NFH, during the month of February, compliments of the Alumni Association. April graduates may also sign up for their first year's free membership in the Alumni Association, which entitles them to use Oakland's facilities and receive ticket discounts for various campus events.

The 96-page "Handbook for Leaving School" is an easy-reading, educational magazine. It includes information on careers, job hunting and life styles, as well as numerous other articles designed to prepare seniors for life after college. "Employment Outlook '77" reviews and analyzes job options seniors have in several career areas, while "Choosing a Career" offers self-inventory exercises to help seniors determine their skills and where they can lead.

CHERNO HEADS HONORS COLLEGE

Mel Chernob, a veteran OU history professor, was appointed associate dean and director for the new Honors College of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences at the January 26 meeting of the university's Board of Trustees. Chernob joined the OU faculty in 1960, one year after the university opened for classes.

During his tenure at OU, Chernob has served as chairperson of the Department of History and as chairperson/designer of New College, one of the university's experimental colleges formed in the 1960s and now part of New-Charter College.

FELTON PUBLISHES TWO ARTICLES

Geraldene Felton, nursing, has co-published an article entitled "Supportive Measures for the Relatives of the Fatally Ill" in a 1976 issue of Nursing Research, while a previously published article by her has been reprinted in a Sigma Theta Tau (national nursing honor society) 1976 monograph series. The article was "The Collaborative Process in Generating a Nursing Research Study."

Felton also was elected to the Governing Council of the American Academy of Nursing for 1976-78. The purposes of the Academy are to advance new concepts in nursing and health care; identify and explore issues in health, in the profession and in society as they effect and are affected by nurses and nursing; examine the dynamics within nursing and among nurses; and identify and propose resolutions to issues and problems confronting nursing and health.

SEARCH FOR NEW REGISTRAR BEGINS

Administrative services has begun its search for a new university registrar.

During the search process, Pauline Scott will be responsible for supervising the university records section, including transfer evaluations, record audits, and teacher certification recommendations. Ron Somerville has accepted the responsibility for registration, preparation of class lists, time schedules, room assignments, and grade reports.

Any matter of concern, i.e. policy matters, out-of-state tuition, or external reports, that does not fit under either records or registration may be referred to Tom Atkinson, director of administrative services.

Overseas opportunities

The Institute of International Education, 809 United Nations Plaza, New York, N.Y. 10017, is screening candidates for two-year appointments in Africa. Those chosen will be paid partially in local currency and partially in U.S. dollars. Benefits include housing, round trip air travel, insurance, and costs of shipping household goods.

The positions anticipated range from agriculture, engineering, and the sciences to English and communications, as well as posts as guidance counselors, librarians, and registrars.
