IT'S BUDGET TIME AGAIN The University's 1969-70 budget was doubly topical last week. Governor Milliken announced his appropriation recommendations for higher education, and members of the Legislature's joint appropriations committee came on campus for a look at what we do and would like to do. Milliken recommends OU be given an appropriation of \$6,233,406, an increase of \$1,187,097 over the current appropriation. OU had asked for \$7,586,984. If unchanged by the Legislature, the governor's recommended sum would amount to \$1,070 per fiscal year equated student (FYES), \$46 more per FYES than the current level of state support.

ANTI-MISSILE MISSIVE Rallying of public opposition to proposed anti-ballistic missile sites near Rochester is the aim of a meeting that will be held at 8 p.m. Thursday in the Gold Room. Mayors in the Detroit area have been asked to represent the views of their communities. Physicists A. M. Saperstein of Wayne State and Robert M. Williamson of OU will speak. Three sites being surveyed by the Army as possible ABM sites are at Avon and Rochester Roads, Squirrel and Featherstone Roads, and Seventeen Mile Road and I-75.

FLY ME TO THE MOON If this is one of your favorite tunes, you should be interested in learning about the U. S. space program--past, present, and future--as it will be related at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday in Dodge Hall auditorium. A team from the Air University will show films of the recent Apollo 8 flight and discuss future Apollo flights.

The exhibit includes some ancient Icelandic books, books on Iceland written in English and Icelandic, and native handmade clothing and jewelry. OU MOVES DOWNTOWN

Manpower and donated furnishings are urgently needed to spruce up a house in Detroit that is being used as the University's "downtown campus" for the Detroit Teacher Internship Program (DTIP). The program--a venture in cooperation between OU, Oakland Community College, and the Detroit Public Schools--offers OU graduate courses for more than 100 interns teaching in inner city elementary schools. A house at 8311 East Jefferson has been leased to serve as a center for seminars, informal gatherings, a library, teaching demonstrations, and some student housing. Marc Briod (education), who calls himself the "philosopher-in-residence" at the center, says that donated rugs, drapes, curtains, and other items would be most welcome. Pickups can be arranged by calling DTIP at the School of Education office or Briod at 331-8022. "The curious are invited to drop by for a paint-in 'happening' all day Sunday, February 2. Bring your brush," Briod adds. "Or stop in any time."
