### 'U' GROUP SUPPORTS COMMUNITY DRIVE TO AID STARVING BLACK COMMUNITY

Project RIGHT NOW--Beaufort was launched on campus last week to marshal student (and other) power behind a drive to alleviate pitiable living conditions in Beaufort County, South Carolina. The student effort is being spearheaded by Ed Holloman, who invited a community worker from the destitute area, William W. Grant, Jr., to address three sessions in the Oakland Center on Wednesday. Local attention to the plight of the people was drawn by a Jet magazine article which reported: "Today, this 'lost colony of poor blacks,' scorned by the whites and ignored by most of their more-fortunate brothers and sisters, exist in a pitiable state, skeptical, disillusioned and uncommunicative." Local welfare aides have admitted that their department reaches only about 20 percent of the black poor, according to the magazine. The people suffer from undernourishment, disease and parasitic infestation, lack of fresh water and abominable living conditions.

The campus group plans as its first program in the project to conduct a drive to collect food which will be trucked to the area. Boxes will be set up at collection points in the main entrances of major buildings and at other scattered points on campus beginning Tuesday. Any nonperishable foodstuffs will be appreciated. Tentative plans are to conclude the drive by Friday.

### CLASS HONORS MANGRUM

A short-term loan fund of \$50 in memory of James C. Mangrum has been established as a class gift by the 1969 graduating class. Mangrum, an education major, was a victim of muscular dystrophy and attended classes here for four years in a wheelchair. He died two weeks before spring commencement. Disabled students will receive priority in the use of the loan fund. The class also gave \$95 remaining from its fund-raising activities to buy plants for the expanded area of the Oakland Center.

## FORMS AVAILABLE FOR FULBRIGHT AWARDS PROGRAM FOR 1970-71

William Schwab (English), faculty Fulbright adviser, has received announcements of the Fulbright program for 1970-71, which will include: (1) U.S. government grants under the Fulbright-Hays Act, for university lecturing and advanced research; (2) Fulbright-Hays lectureships in American studies; (3) university lecturing and advanced research in economics and business administration, and (4) Fulbright-Hays awards for lecturing and research in linguistics and English as a foreign language.

The subject matter lists have been curtailed to three, according to Schwab, since the number of awards in fields other than American studies, English language, and economics and business administration are insufficient in number to warrant separate publications. Application forms for items 2-4 are available by calling Mrs. Doris Boegler, ext. 2097. The form for item 1, only two copies of which are available, may be borrowed. Deadline for application (with some flexibility) is June 15.
