Primarily an open session for students to follow-up on unanswered questions from Capstone including using Interlibrary Loan to get articles we don't have, using Write-N-Cite to format your project background and introduction, as well as searching and exporting citations from other databases.

- **Anatomy.TV via STAT!Ref** - a suite of 3D interactive models of human anatomy...check out specifically the human anatomy regional series, which breaks down anatomy by area of the body. Also included are MRIs, X-rays, live-action movies and animations.
- **Proquest Statistical Abstract of the United States** - previously published by the government, this database provides a variety of statistics. Those related to medicine and health include: healthcare expenditures, mortality and morbidity, nutrition, health insurance, employment in healthcare services, annual health revenues, organ transplants, and more!

**Michigan Libraries for Life Donor Registration Drive** The Medical Library's 2nd annual organ donor registration drive registered 73 new donors (potentially saving 584 lives), talked with 307 already registered donors, and passed out information to 78 more for a grand total of 458 interactions!

Thank you to our 11 medical students and the faculty and staff of the Medical Library who volunteered their time to support the cause! And a very special thank you to Dean Folberg for kicking off our drive with an inspirational talk on October 4!

**Q: How does 'Be the Match' for Bone Marrow Donation relate to the Michigan Organ Donor Registry?**

**A:** The Organ Donor Registry is completely separate from the Bone Marrow Donor Program, therefore you must register for both.
