John Seeley

John Seeley, assistant professor of chemistry, joined the faculty ranks at Oakland University in 1997. He completed a Ph.D. in Atmospheric Chemistry at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1994 and served as a postdoctoral fellow at MIT until 1995, working in the laboratory of Nobel Laureate in Chemistry Mario Molina. Seeley also served as a postdoctoral fellow at the Air Force Research Laboratory from 1995 to 1997, prior to his appointment at Oakland University.

During his short career at Oakland, Seeley has established an international reputation for research contributions that have helped improve a fundamental aspect of separation science. He was invited to deliver the keynote presentation at the International Symposium on Comprehensive Two-Dimensional Chromatography in Volendam, the Netherlands, in March 2003, demonstrating the impact of his work to the field. Seeley's discoveries have been published in top-tier journals and are used in numerous environmental and biomedical applications. The importance of his work is recognized with significant extramural research support from the National Science Foundation and other major sponsors.
