News Briefs

The OU Board of Trustees will meet at 7:30 p.m. on February 17 in Lounge II of the Oakland Center. The agenda and board materials will be on display at tables in the back of the room.

George Catton, director of campus facilities and operations, has asked that university employees honor the university's decisions to close the institution and refrain from coming to work on the day or days in question. A decision to close the university is made in the interests of safety. Vehicles driven on university streets or parked in lots actually hinder the snow removal operations, Catton said. These drivers run the risk of having their vehicles plowed in or struck by snow removal equipment. The Jan. 30-31-Feb. 1 snow removal operation of the current semester and have \$6,100 in overtime and equipment rental costs. No figures are available at this time for the Feb. 3-4 closing.

The change in title was made to emphasize the broad scope of responsibilities handled by the office, responsibilities that extend beyond the narrow definition of affirmative action in employment.

Committee On Budget Meets

The Executive Committee on the Budget (George Catton, Brian Copenhaver, Ronald Horwitz, Willard Kendall, Andrea Lindell, Robert McGarry, Wilma Ray-Bledsoe, Jack Wilson, Ray Harris, Robert Bunger, Lowell Eklund, Keith Kleckner, Gerald Pine, and Robert Swanson) has been meeting since December to develop a 1982-83 General Fund budget

recommendation for President Joseph E. Champagne. They have tentatively set a budget reduction (from 1981-82) target of \$3.3 million.

Divisional plans are to be submitted to the Committee during February and March. The committee's recommendation will be given to President Champagne in May.

The university is accepting applications for its prestigious Upperclass Achievement Scholarships for 1982-1983.

Assistant Provost Thomas H. Atkinson said, "In our desire to promote scholastic achievement and to encourage students to enroll full time and remain at Oakland University, we offer a \$250 honorarium and the distinction of being known as an outstanding upperclass achiever during 1982-83. Resources to pay for this program have been donated by private individuals and groups. To be selected to receive this honorarium and distinction, students must be undergraduates and

have a cumulative GPA of 3.50 at the end of the current semester and have completed 32 credits during fall and winter semester, 1981-82. To receive the award (paid half in the fall and half in the winter), students must remain enrolled for 16 credits fall and winter, 1982-83."

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Faculty Activities Are Noted

James Dow of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology is trying to locate, abstract, and archive sources of demographic data on local communities in southeastern Michigan. James Dow, sociology/anthropology, presented a paper at the 80th annual meeting of the American Anthropological Association in Los Angeles. His topic was "The Process of Magical Healing among the Oromi of the Northern Sierra de Puebla, Mexico."

Gerald J. Pine, dean, School of Human and Educational Services, is coauthor of a new book, **Client Centered Counseling: A Renewal**, just published by Allyn & Bacon. This is the fifth book he has coauthored with Angelo V. Boy of the University of New Hampshire. Their other books include: **Client Centered Counseling in the Secondary Schools**, **Counseling in the Schools: A Reconceptualization**, **Expanding the Self: Personal Growth for Teachers**, and **Learner Centered Teaching**. Their books have been translated into Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, and Spanish language editions.

Boaz Kahana, psychology, presented a paper at the 34th annual meeting of the Gerontological Society in Toronto in November of 1981 called "Treatment of Stress-Related Reactions Among the Aged."

Hoda S. Abdel-Aty-Zohdy, engineering, presented a paper on noise measurements in sampled-data systems at the IEEE Electrical and Electronic Measurement and Test Instrument Conference and Exhibition (EEMTIC 81), Ottawa, Canada. An article authored with S.C. Chamberlain of the University of Waterloo, has been accepted for publication. The article entitled "The development and application of the correlation method for noise spectral intensity measurements in sampled-data circuits" will appear in the IEEE Transaction on Instrumentation and Measurement (IM), March 1982.

Richard J. Rozek, an expert in worker health and industrial hygiene toxicology, has joined the faculty in the Center of Health Sciences.

Rozek is an assistant professor of industrial health and safety. He received the B.S. degree in psychology from Western Michigan University, the M.S. in occupational and environmental health and the Ph.D. in physiology from Wayne State University.

James Dawson, music, has been asked to represent the United States at the International Meeting of the World Saxophone Congress to be held in Nuremberg this July and will deliver a paper entitled "The Music of Charles Dakin: Microtonal Music in Theory and Practice." The British Broadcasting Corporation has asked Dawson to appear on the program "Kaleidoscope" and while in England he will perform a recital in London for the international meeting of the Clarinet and Saxophone Society. The BBC appearance is in conjunction with the recent publication of Dawson's book, **Music for Saxophone by British Composers, an Annotated Bibliography**.

An International Workshop on Hydrocephalus will be held in November 1982, in California, under the auspices of the Medical Physics Program, Oakland University, and the Leo Davidoff Department of Neurosurgery, Albert Einstein School of Medicine, and sponsored by the American Heyer Schulte Corporation of Galena, California.

Dolores Burdick, Modern Languages, recently read a paper entitled "Story and History: Ambiguity in **Reds**" at the Seventh Annual Florida State University Conference on Literature and Film. A paper she read at an earlier conference has just been published in a book called **Fearful Symmetry: Doubles and Doubling in Literature and Film**. Burdick's article is entitled "The Line Down the Middle: Politics and Sexuality in Fassbinder's **Despair**."

Richard Stamps, Department of Sociology and Anthropology, presented a paper at the Fifteenth Annual Meeting of the Society for Historical Archaeology. The paper dealt with archaeological excavations at Thomas Edison's boyhood home in Port Huron, Michigan and summarized the findings of 83,699 artifacts analyzed by Stamps while on sabbatical leave in fall, 1981. Stamps has also recently delivered a three-part lecture series at the Cranbrook Institute of Science dealing with modern China.

Daniel F. Ring, assistant professor, university library, has had an essay entitled "Fighting for Men's Hearts and Minds: William Howard Brett, The Cleveland Public Library and World War I," accepted for publication by **The Journal of Library History**.

Tucker Gets NEH Award

Richard Tucker, history, has recently been awarded a research fellowship from the National Endowment for the Humanities to continue his research on the Indian Himalayas for the coming academic year. He will divide the year between research in England and India and a writing residence at the University of California, Berkeley.

Tucker spent the fall 1981 semester on research leave in north India, where he continued research on the ecological impact of British colonial rule in the western Himalayas. His work took him to the former Chamba State near the Kashmir border, as well as Kumaon, adjacent to western Nepal. Returning to this country, he presented one aspect of his research at the January 1982

conference of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. For a seminar on social forestry on Africa and Asia, his paper was entitled, "The Historical Roots of Social Forestry in the Kumaon Himalaya, India." Proceedings of the seminar are to be published as an AAAS special volume.

On his way to India, Tucker stopped in Kyoto, Japan to present a paper on the history of forestry management in north India, at the quinquennial meeting of the International Union of Forest Research Organizations. That conference established a new research group to study the history of tropical forests, which are being rapidly depleted in recent years. He was asked to chair and develop the project for the coming five years.

Marvin L. Katke Resigns

Marvin L. Katke, charter member of the OU Board of Trustees and university benefactor, has resigned from the board effective Feb. 15, 1982.

In a letter to Gov. William G. Milliken, Katke said, "I appreciate your confidence in me over the past years. I am sorry that I find it necessary to resign before completion of my second term appointment. My resignation is for personal reasons, finding it difficult to attend board meetings during the winter months when we spend considerable time out of the state.

"I have enjoyed my association with Oakland University, working with the members of the board and with President Champagne and all members of his administration. They are a dedicated group doing a remarkably fine job under restricted budgetary conditions brought on by the state of our economy."

Katke is retired from Ford Motor Company where he served as vice president. In addition to serving in an executive capacity at Ford, Katke had worked for General Motors Corporation earlier in his career.

President Joseph E. Champagne expressed his regret at Katke's resignation. In a letter he told Katke, "You have served Oakland University in every respect possible. We will indeed miss you from its formal operation. However, let me invite you to participate in all aspects of university life as a member of our extended family."

President Champagne expressed the hope that Katke would continue to take a deep interest in the activities of the university and that his advice and counsel might still be available.

Grants to Meadow Brook

The Michigan Council for the Arts has made two grants to Oakland University totaling \$207,000.

One grant of \$104,000 is for operational support of the Meadow Brook Performing Arts Program. A second grant of \$103,000 supports an arts outreach program of Meadow Brook Theatre.

Both grants were accepted by the OU Board of Trustees during the Nov. 18 meeting on campus.

Lighting Levels Reduced

Lighting in corridors, offices, and classrooms is being reduced by a third wherever feasible.

University officials said lighting levels in parking lots and around building exteriors have already been reduced. The cuts should result in a drop in energy consumption and in a significant saving on utility costs.

The Career Advising and Placement Office has received information from the New York City Urban Fellows Program and the Summer Management Intern Program. Both programs enable college seniors and recent graduates and graduate students an opportunity to enter nationwide competition which culminates with an employment opportunity in the New York City government. The Urban Fellows Program provides a nine-month opportunity to work in New York City. The Summer Management Intern Program provides an opportunity for employment from mid-June until mid-August.
