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## Winter Registration Nears

The frost may just be settling on the pumpkin, but already it's time to think about winter registration.

Registrar Lawrence Bartalucci says advance registration begins Monday, November 7 and continues through Thursday, November 17 in 100 O'Dowd. Hours will be 8:30 a.m.-6:30 p.m., except for Friday, November 11 when registration will end at 4:30 p.m.

Bartalucci says there are four main reasons for encouraging students to register early, with the first being convenience. Other reasons, he says, are:

—Better chances for receiving preferred courses and sections. Early registration will also help departments because they will find out what courses are in high demand. Based upon data provided by the registration office, all academic departments will be able to adjust offerings from November 21-28.

—No payment is required during advance registration. Students are slotted into their preferred courses on the basis of class ranking, not when they registered. Advance-registered students who receive a partial schedule will be permitted to add courses between December 1-7. All advance-registered students will be billed December 12 with full payment due January 12. Regular- and late-registered students will be assessed the late registration payment penalty if fees are paid after January 3.

—More predictable weather and more days and hours to register.

Bartalucci says a regular registration period will be held from 8:30 a.m.-7 p.m. January 3 in the OC. Students will register then at specific times only as determined by their last name.

## OU Board OKs Budget

The OU Board of Trustees has approved a \$42,729,481 operating budget request for 1984-85.

The budget was approved October 19 and forwarded to the Executive Office of the State of Michigan. It represents a \$3,056,209 increase over 1983-84.

University officials said the additional funds were needed for inflation, wage and salary adjustments, utility increases and necessary scientific and other equipment purchases.

# Lecture On Tap

Richard B. Lee, a noted anthropologist who is concerned with the position of minorities in a larger society, will give a free public lecture on South Africa and Israel on November 11 at OU.

The talk entitled **Ethnicity, Militarism and Human Rights in South Africa and Israel** will begin at 2 p.m. in Room 128-130 of the OC.

Lee, professor of anthropology at the University of Toronto, has just returned from the Kalahari Desert in South Africa where he worked on a film for public television. Lee has done years of field work in the area and has become caught up in the politics of the region.

The professor is best known among anthropologists for his field research among the Kung San of the Kalahari Desert. His studies of these hunter-gatherers are among the most renowned of mid-20th Century anthropology.

The lecture is supported by the Department of Sociology and Anthropology, The Society for Archaeology and Anthropology, OU Anthropology Alumni, the CIPO office, and the Student Allocations board.

# Student Wins Grant

Nursing student Joan M. Cambray received the first Home Health Care, Inc. stipend for tuition, fees and travel to the Michigan Nurses Association annual meeting.

The \$3,000 award was developed by the School of Nursing and Nancy Dobson, administrator and director of clinical services at Home Health Care.

The stipend is to be awarded annually to a senior student or students who have maintained a minimum grade point average of 3.5 and who plan to pursue a community health nursing career. Selections are made by the university and Home Health Care representatives.

# News Notes

## Ozinga Published

Political science Associate Professor James R. Ozinga has signed a contract with McFarland & Co. to publish his book, **The Prodigal Human**.

The theme of the book is the human addiction to short-term gratification, which causes the global problems described in the first seven chapters. Silent killers such as dioxin or low-level radioactivity, oil and natural gas problems, coal use, nuclear fission, nuclear proliferation, water shortages, and population growth and food supplies are all issues of global significance, Ozinga writes.

The seventh chapter, about population and food supplies, is being reviewed by the director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's International Economics Division. The division requested the chapter because it is preparing a study of long-term food prospects.

The eighth chapter concerns the context of potential solutions—ideology, utopianism and the issue of centralization vs. decentralization. The final chapter describes the human addiction to short-term gratification and what might be done to alleviate the problem.
