New master's programs approved

The Oakland University Board of Trustees has approved three new graduate programs to respond to student interest at the master's degree level.

The new master's degree programs approved May 24 are in computer and information science, linguistics, and public administration.

The board deferred action on an investment policy toward banks and corporations doing business with the Republic of South Africa until its November meeting so that more input can be obtained from students and staff. The board also decided that tuition and fees for persons auditing a course will be the same as for those persons registering for credit. This is a common practice in Michigan's public colleges and universities.

In another action the board approved a Community National Bank proposal to install an automated teller machine on campus. The facility will be available to other interested financial institutions through negotiations with the bank.

The board also passed a resolution honoring Christina C. Meredith, trustee of the Matilda R. Wilson Fund, who died April 30, 1978. The noted community leader served for many years as a personal administrative assistant to university benefactress Matilda R. Wilson who died in 1967.

A \$133,176 grant from Oakland County was the largest single sum in \$469,534 in gifts and grants accepted by the Board at the meeting.

The grant supports the second year of a project entitled the "Comprehensive Employment Training Act Student Intern Program." Students from the county are paid to intern in various offices in county government with the possibility of permanent employment upon graduation.

Other large grants include \$68,000 from the Michigan Council for the Arts to provide operational support for Meadow Brook Theatre, \$57,719 from the Public Health Service for the School of Nursing project entitled "Teaching Ethnic Diversity In A New Program," and \$44,874 from the National Institutes of Health to provide biomedical research support grants to OU faculty.

Musical opens

The musical "Jacques Brel is Alive and Well and Living in Paris" will be presented by the Department of Music on four successive Friday and Saturday nights starting June 2-3.

The program features 25 songs by the Belgian-born poet and composer performed by members of the Meadow Brook Estate, the university's student jazz and musical troupe. Curtain time is 8 p.m. in the Studio Theatre of Varner Hall.

The production is directed by Stephanie Rivers, a director-choreographer who has worked in schools and theaters from Chicago to Florida. Tickets are \$3 for general admission and \$2 for students and senior citizens. For information call 377-2030.

Long or short distance bicycle riders are invited to participate in the Father's Day Cyclethon to be held Sunday, June 18.

Riders will be collecting sponsors who promise to donate a certain amount for every mile they ride on the 2.4 mile course which winds around Oakland's campus. The cyclethon is being sponsored by the Michigan Heart Association (MHA) and the Wolverine Sports Club (WSC).

Proceeds from the riders will be used by the MHA to further heart research and public education about the disease and by the WSC to promote bicycle safety and other sports programs. Sponsors contributions are tax deductible.

Sponsor forms or information are available at most schools and bike shops or by calling 557-9500 or 547-0050. Registration begins at 7:30 a.m. Sunday at North Foundation Hall and the course will be open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

An embroidered patch will be awarded to each rider who completes nine laps of the course (21 miles) and turns in a minimum of \$5.00 by July 31, 1978. Bicycles and other prizes will be awarded to riders who turn in the most funds. Winners will be notified by the Michigan Heart Association.

Oakland University is sponsoring a Slavic Studies Tour July 4-28 for interested students and citizens. The participants will trace the spread of the Slavic Christian culture from Turkey through the Ukraine to its northernmost point in Yaroslavi, Russia.

The program is offered by the Slavic Area Studies faculty and the Center for General and Career Studies. Participants can register on a credit or noncredit basis.

Robert C. Howes, professor of history and member of the Slavic Area Studies faculty, will direct the tour. Enough early applications have been received to assure the success of the program, but some places are open for non-students who want to take part in this unusual opportunity, Howes said.

The tour will cover the St. Sophia Basilica, Blue Mosque, and the Hippodrome in Istanbul, the Alexander Nevsky Cathedral in Sofia, Bulgaria, the National Museum and other sites of interest in Bucharest, Romania. In Russia the group will visit Kiev, Leningrad, and Novgorod, one of the oldest of Russian cities, and Yaroslavl north of Moscow on the Volga River. In Moscow the tour will include Red Square, the Kremlin, and the Bolshoi Theatre.

Just a reminder that all reimbursable travel should begin or terminate at Oakland. Travel reimbursement to and from a location other than OU cannot exceed the amount of reimbursement from Oakland to the stated destination.

For your convenience, the cashier's office has instituted a special window for departmental business which is open Monday through Friday 9:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. A sign is posted above the cashier departmental window, the window closest to the northwest entrance of North Foundation Hall.

The purpose of this window is to reduce the waiting time for departmental personnel. Upon the arrival of an individual who wishes to conduct departmental business, the cashier will complete the transaction currently in progress at the student's window and then immediately service the departmental window.

If a department must wait in line at the departmental window, their deposit can be slipped under the window to the Cashier. This will relieve the Public Safety escort to return to his duties unless he is needed to escort the departmental person back to their office.

Under no circumstances should this window be used for transacting personal non-university business, as this defeats the purpose of the window.

The work of Will Hoffman, mathematics, on the lie transformation group theory of neuropsychology, which was presented at a conference organized in Marsellies, France, by the Institute of Neurophysiology and Psychophysiology, has been reprinted in a summary of the conference proceedings, Cahiers de Psychologie.

Twenty-four of the first 25 graduates of the Oakland University School of Nursing passed the state board test pool examination for registered nurse licensure. The State Board Examination consists of five tests, one for each of the five main nursing subject areas: medical, surgical, maternity, pediatric, and psychiatric, and the candidate must pass all five tests to receive the license. The same test is given throughout the United States with the five parts administered over a two-day period during February and July.

The percent failure rate for first time writers of the exam in Michigan is 8.4%. Oakland's rate was 4.0%. In addition, Oakland University's scores averaged well above the 350 needed to pass the exam.
