Morrow, Stebbins win Wilson Awards

Marilyn Morrow and Lawrence Stebbins have been chosen Matilda K. and Alfred G. Wilson Award Winners for 1979.

The two seniors were honored June 2 at separate commencement exercises. The winners receive checks for \$200 and medallions.

The awards go each year to members of the senior class who have distinguished themselves academically and have demonstrated a concern for the solution of social problems.

Morrow studied communication arts and was active in newscasts over the campus radio station, active in promoting summer sports, Students for the Village projects, and a Spring Arts Festival. In addition to campus activities, Morrow obtained work experience in local businesses and was a teacher of piano.

Stebbins is an engineering major with a

concentration in management. He has been active in campus development plans that will respect both the environmental and energy concerns. He has been cited for bringing both human and technical skills to planning of those activities. Stebbins qualified for a Student Life Scholarship during his undergraduate career.

OU readies methanol car

Oakland University engineering students are entering the final stages of preparation for their competition in the 1979 energy efficient vehicle competition to be held Aug. 12-17.

Body work on the automobile has been completed, the engine carburetor modified, and the transmission has been changed. Road tests will begin in about two weeks, faculty project director Robert H. Edgerton, said. Edgerton is associate professor of engineering.

The contest is drawing entries from across the United States and Canada. The university is host for the event with all competitors staying in the residence halls.

The testing and judging will take place at the General Motors Proving Grounds in Milford; the criteria are fuel economy, environmental impact, safety, performance, and marketability.

Winners will be announced Aug. 17 at a 6:30 p.m. dinner in the Michigan State University Management Education Center. Guest speaker will be U.S. Secretary of Transportation Brock Adams.

OU will enter a Pinto car modified to burn methanol. The OU effort is assisted by the student branch of the Society of Automotive Engineers and aided by a grant from the Alumni Association.

OU gives tax credit awards

Effective July 1, Oakland University will be able to advance the Earned Income Tax Credit to employees who qualify.

To qualify for the credit, you must answer yes to the following questions.

Do you expect the amount of your "adjusted gross income" (including that of your spouse) to be less than \$10,000?

Do you expect at least one of your children to live with you full time

except when he or she is away at school or on vacation?

If married, do you expect to file a joint return?

Do you expect to claim an exemption for a child who will live with you, or do you expect to qualify as an unmarried head of household because of an unmarried child who cannot be taken as an exemption?

If not married, do you expect to pay at least half the cost of keeping up a household this year? (Aid to Families with Dependent Children payments may be counted as amounts furnished by you.)

If you answer yes to the above questions, come to the Payroll Office, Room 114 NFH and complete a W-5 form. You must complete the W-5 to participate in this program. The W-5 is effective from July 1, 1979 through December 31, 1979.
