New Students Join Honors College

Thirty-four OU students have been accepted to the Honors College for 1981 bringing to 90 the total number of students enrolled in that program.

Robert C. Howes, director, reports on the program, now in its fifth year. The Honors College provides a demanding general education program for the students in addition to the major course work taken elsewhere in the university.

Two distinctive features of the Honors College are a two-year foreign language requirement and an independent research project carried out by the student in the senior year.

Students are admitted to the program on the basis of an excellent high school record, high aptitude test scores, and recommendations from former teachers or others familiar with the academic work of the applicant.

"It is very rewarding to work with young people of such outstanding ability," Howes said.

Telefund Underway, Volunteers Welcome

The annual Alumni Telefund is underway with encouraging early results, but any additional telephone volunteers from the university community will be welcome states Joan Stinson, director of alumni relations.

The annual campaign continues through Nov. 24 with workers calling Monday through Thursday evenings from the Katke-Cousins Club House. Interested persons should contact the alumni office at 377-2158.

Stinson reports that the first four nights of calls have resulted in pledges from 1,124 alumni totaling \$18,834. "If we can keep up this pace we will certainly reach our goal of \$54,000," Stinson said.

To reach the goal, the help of at least 250 volunteers is needed for the remainder of the telefund. Training sessions are held

between 6:30 and 7 p.m. on telefund nights with actual calls taking place between 7 and 9:30 p.m.

As a bonus for helping, volunteers are allowed to make one three-minute long distance call at the end of the evening. In addition, area merchants have donated gifts to be distributed to volunteer callers who raise the most money in pledges or obtain the largest number of new contributors to the alumni fund. "Awards are made each evening to the callers who have achieved these objectives," Stinson said.

The alumni association is providing two \$500 tuition awards for students raising the most funds and signing up the largest number of new contributors during the 14-day telefund.

Specific alumni targets for the remainder of the telefund are Nov. 12, education alumni; Nov. 13, performing arts; Nov. 16, black alumni; Nov. 17, engineers; Nov. 18, nurses; Nov. 19, education; Nov. 23, Student Enterprise Theatre and performing arts graduates; and Nov. 24, open calling.

Stinson points out that the telefund is an excellent opportunity for faculty to contact some of the alumni in their disciplines.

AFSCME Approves Pact

Oakland University and Local 1485 of the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees have reached tentative agreement of a new two-year contract.

The tentative pact was ratified by the membership in a vote Nov. 5 and it will be presented to the Oakland University Board of Trustees for approval at the Nov. 18 meeting.

The proposed pact calls for a 7 percent across the board wage increase in the first year and a wage reopener for the second year of the agreement.

Faculty accomplishments noted

Philip Singer, sociology and anthropology and Center for Health Sciences, has had a paper accepted for inclusion in the program of the December, 1981 meeting of the American Anthropological Association. The title of his paper is, "Jews Do and Arabs Don't—A Cultural Analysis of Phenylketonuria (PKU) Dietary Compliance in Israel." The field work for this research was done by Professor Singer during a Fulbright Award, 1978-1979, in Israel.

A paper by Carlo Coppola, modern languages/area studies, entitled "Nissim Ezekiel: The Latest Poetry," was presented at the second triennial conference of the Canadian Association for Commonwealth Literature and Language Studies at the University of Winnipeg, Winnipeg, Manitoba on October 2.

Coppola will also present a paper, "Psychoanalytical Approaches to the Short Stories of Intizar Husain" at the 10th annual Wisconsin Conference on South Asia, to be held at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, on November 7, 1981.

He will also present a paper entitled "E.M. Forster's Muslim Archetypes in *A Passage to India*" at the annual meeting of the South Asia Literature Association, an affiliate of the Modern Languages Association, in late December in New York.

Keith E. Stanovich, psychology, recently had a chapter entitled "Attentional and Automatic Context Effects in Reading" appear in the book *Interactive Processes in Reading*. Dr. Stanovich was also recently appointed to the editorial board of the *Journal of Experimental Child Psychology*.

Egbert W. Henry, biological sciences, was recently selected to join the editorial board of the *Journal of Plant Physiology*. This is the leading journal in the field and includes other board members with national and international recognition in both plant physiology and plant biochemistry. Henry was recently elected secretary for the Michigan Electron Microscopy Forum, the electron microscopists and cell biologists regional society in Michigan.

J.H. McKay and S. Wang, mathematical sciences, recently have had an article entitled "The $v \times v(0, 1, -1)$ —Circulant Equation $AAT = vI - J$ " appear in the *SIAM (Society for Industrial and Applied Mathematics) Journal on Algebraic and Discrete Methods*, September 1981. Vol. 2, 266-275. The article settles two conjectures affirmatively which were proposed at the first IEEE (Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers) International Pulsed Power Conference.

Stuart S. Wang, mathematical sciences, recently has had an article, jointly authored with D.E. Dobbs of the University of Tennessee, accepted for publication. The article, entitled "A Note on Commutative Separable Algebras II," will appear in the *Mathematical Journal of Okayama University*.

Linda Lentz, School of Human and Educational Services, recently presented a paper "Tracking Women's Career Salience Ratings as a Function of College Type and Selectivity Level: A Longitudinal Study of the Class of 1979" at the Seventh Annual Meeting of Research on Women in Education, a special interest group of the American Educational Research Association.

Asish C. Nag, Department of Biological Sciences, has been awarded a federal research grant of \$99,677 by the National Institute of Health, and a grant of \$16,000 by Michigan Heart Association for his research projects on heart muscle cells.

Roberta Schwartz, journalism, published an article in *Antiques USA*, October 1981, "In The Tiffany Style." Her description of teaching feature writing, "Features Sell," appeared in the summer 1981 issue of *Community College Journalists*.

Barbara Hamilton, rhetoric, made a presentation on "The Lanham System of Teaching Revising" in a session on "The Use of Computers in Teaching English," at the fall 1981 Michigan College English Association meeting at the Fairlane Center in Dearborn. Donald E. Morse, rhetoric and president of the national College English Association also spoke briefly.

Sid Mitra, economics and management, participated in an educational symposium at the annual meetings of the International Association of Financial Planners in San Francisco, September 22-26. He has also been elected as vice president of programming and member of the Board of Directors by the Michigan Chapter of the IAFP.

Smokeout Nov. 16-19

Student volunteers, members of the Exercise Physiology Laboratory, and the Graham Health Center are participating in the Nov. 16-19 Great American Smokeout. The program is sponsored by the American Cancer Society.

A highlight will be the Nov. 18 program at which individuals will pitch their cigarettes into the fireplace in the Fireside Lounge of the Oakland Center. A specific time will be announced later.

In addition, volunteers will staff a booth in the center and offer pulmonary function testing.

"We really want to get people here to participate in the smokeout because statistics show that lung cancer in young women is on the rise and there is still a high rate of lung cancer in young men. If we can get people here to quit smoking for one day it will help them on their way to better health," states Sally Peters, campus coordinator for the 1981 smokeout.

Peters said the "smokeout is really important, but it is supposed to be fun—like a celebration, a day of independence from cigarettes." Yntema Lecture Series Begins

As part of the newly instituted Yntema Lecture Series sponsored by the School of Economics and Management, Professor Ray Battalio of Texas A & M University will speak Nov. 24 at 3:30 p.m. in room 206 Varner Hall.

All interested persons are invited to the lecture entitled "Using Animal Subjects in Economic Experiments." The lecture is a non-technical survey of research results in the relatively new field of experimental economics.

This subdiscipline of economics attempts to test the basic postulates of economics as well as to analyze economic behavior in a controlled laboratory setting rather than by gathering and analyzing data from the real world. The results have proved to be theoretically interesting and remarkably useful according to Professor

Tom McCarthy, economics and management. A Dec. 1, 1980 article in *Fortune* magazine was entitled "Economics According to the Rats." Professor Battalio has been a pioneer in this area of study.

Following the lecture, a wine and cheese reception will be held in the economics and management conference room on the fourth floor of Varner Hall.

The lecture series is made possible by the generosity of Professor Theodore O. Yntema and is named in his honor.
