EDITS HISTORY SERIES John Barnard (history) is associate editor of a five-volume series entitled *Children and Youth in America: A documentary history*, being published by Harvard University Press. Volume One of the series, covering the period of 1600-1865, is just off the press, and the other four volumes will be published in 1971 and '72. The works consist of selected and edited representative documents drawn from the history of education, child labor, dependency, delinquency and other aspects of public policies affecting the lives of the young. Introductory essays and notes are written by the editors.
