Van Fleet Is Athletic Director, Lepley Heads New Course Program

Creation of a new position within the Dept. of Physical Education and Athletics and shifts of responsibilities in that department were announced today by James Appleton, vice-president for Student Affairs.

Hollie L. Lepley, former Director of Athletics, will assume new responsibilities as Coordinator of Physical Education. Corey Van Fleet will become Director of Physical Education and Athletics and Gene Boldon has been named Coordinator of Inter-

collegiate Athletics and Associate Professor of Education.

Lepley, a nationally-recognized clinician and teacher, will supervise the teaching staff for the credit physical education courses, which OU began offering this year. He is a full professor and has been a member of the faculty since 1959. He will continue to coach the varsity golf team and teach.

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Premiere Recital Series Opens With Hollander

The University Recital Series premieres Nov. 8 with Lorin Hollander, acclaimed as the "leading pianist of his generation."

Elisabeth Schwarzkopf, well-known soprano; Sahomi Tachibana, Japanese dancer; pianist Alberto Reyes and violinist Nejmi Succari round out the Series with their classical talents.

W.W. Kent, general director of Cultural Affairs, feels that the Series will "arouse public interest in the arts by bringing to the campus the finest artists in the world of the professional performing arts."

Pianist Hollander begins the Series at 8:30 p.m., Wed., Nov. 8 at Varner Recital Hall. Hollander, who devotes a good part of his time to the musical enrichment of young people, believes that re-opening basic lines of communication with youth is crucial to the future of the arts.

Sahomi Tachibana, Japanese classical dancer, appears Fri., Nov. 17. Her repertoire is a panorama of the color and excitement of the Japanese theatre, including ancient dances, stately court dances and excerpts from the Kabuki theatre. Miss Tachibana's appearance is in conjunction with the Japanese Ink Painting exhibition opening Nov. 5 in the Meadow Brook Art Gallery.

One of the most distinguished sopranos in the contemporary musical world, Elisabeth Schwarzkopf, appears in recital Dec. 6.

Veterans' Counselor Appointed

The 400 veterans enrolled at OU now have their own counselor in the Office of Student Services. Cleveland Hurst, counselor, plans to be a lot more than a counselor—he has plans for a Veteran's Club, for helping vets get jobs, and in general, to help them be more informed about the University and veteran's benefits.

First on the agenda is a delayed tuition payment plan. To be eligible for GI Bill benefits, a veteran must first register for classes. But often, veterans cannot afford to register for classes until they get the GI Bill benefits. Hurst recommends a deferred payment plan, letting veterans registering for classes sign a promissory note to

OU; then paying their tuition when their GI benefits come through.

Also being considered is college credit for armed services experience. Eastern Michigan University now gives up to eight credits to incoming students who are veterans. President O'Dowd is enthusiastic about these proposals and definite guidelines are being worked out, according to Hurst.

The veterans would also like one floor of a dormitory allocated for veterans with room and board on an ability-to-pay basis.

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Chinese Women Happier Since Cultural Revolution

Two Detroit-area residents, Sharon Goldwasser and Stuart Dowty, gave a slide presentation of their recent visit to mainland China. Both Sharon and Stuart are Socialists and were interested to see how the Chinese were making Socialism work for them. Their talk was based on the history and status of women in China.

The many women they interviewed cited examples of how much better things are for them since the "cultural revolution." Living conditions for the peasants and working people have improved, food is more plentiful, slavery has been abolished and parents are no longer forced to sell their children.

According to the Chinese, the struggle for the equality of women has taken place on three fronts: ideological, practical and leadership.

Ideologically, newspapers promote the status of women and school children are taught that men and women must work to make their society a success. The Women's Federation and the Communist Party have helped greatly in the battle to "liberate the women from the home," Sharon said.

Practical problems such as nurseries and day care centers have been solved by the state.

Mechanical food preparation is releasing the woman from the kitchen, Sharon said. She showed an automatic dumpling-maker, invented by workers, which bore out their saying that "the creativity of the masses is boundless."

Leadership roles open to women are mostly within the Communist Party.

Sharon and Stuart ended with Mao's thought that the four ropes binding women (men, religion, politics and clan) must be broken.

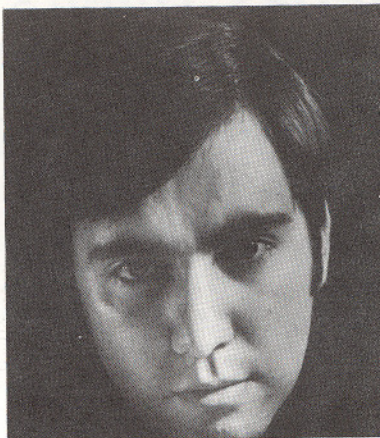
Womens' Club Meets

Epling Tells Parents of Drug Dangers

His message to parents is, "A child, to some extent, is a product of his own life." Bill Epling, head of OU's drug education center, stresses an open, honest reaction on the part of parents who find their children using drugs.

Epling will speak from 8-9:30 p.m., Nov. 9 at St. Andrews School in Rochester on "The Drug Problem and Its Meaning in the Adolescent Scene."

He sees his job as giving as many facts as possible to parents and their children, but says that they must make their own decisions in the end. Everyone must face the question--"If I use chemical means as a crutch, how successful am I as a living person?"

Epling said he gives a general knowledge test on drugs at the beginning of most talks, and said he had never given the test to adults

and had the average rise over 50 per cent.

Hoping to give out useful drug facts, Epling will pass out a synopsis of Michigan's revised drug laws and a list of drug centers in Oakland County.

His talk is part of the Inter-Church Adult Education program, Oct. 12-Nov. 16 in the Rochester area.

Van Fleet will assume responsibilities for all existing programs and program development and personnel in the Dept. of Physical Education and Athletics, including budget preparation and supervision. He will develop policy procedures for the department. This fall he was official starter at the U.S. final Olympic swimming trials. In addition to his administrative responsibilities, he will continue to coach the varsity swimming team.

Boldon will continue to direct Oakland's strong basketball program in addition to supervising inter-collegiate athletics. Among his responsibilities will be the investigation of two possible conference affiliations now being considered by Oakland University.

gram to publicize money available to veterans from the GI Bill. Hurst is a member of its executive board. Twenty-one institutions (of which OU is one) serve as resource centers for CERV.

The Michigan Employment Security Commission works with CERV supplying job lists with veteran priority. In the future, Hurst hopes to pay wages to veterans attending college for their recruitment of other veterans.

Plans for a Veteran's Club are underway here. Aiming at unity among veterans, it will give them an organization through which to work and find companionship. It will also serve as a base to publicize any veteran benefits or legislation which may be pending.
