## News briefs

The OU Board of Trustees will meet Feb. 18 at 7:30 p.m. in Lounge II of the Oakland Center.

Peter Szolovits, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, will deliver a President's Club Lecture Series address Feb. 9 at noon in the Gold Room of the Oakland Center. His topic is "Medical Diagnosis Through the Computer."

A winter semester enrollment record seems assured. As of Jan. 29 the university had 11,517 full- and part-time students enrolled, well ahead of the 11,090 enrolled for last winter. While some drops and reinstatements are still to be processed, the final figures will remain above those recorded last year.

There will be no university annual report this year. The move saves some \$1,000. Instead, copies of divisional reports and the university financial statement will be on file in the Office of Public Relations and in the Kresge Library. Interested persons are invited to read the materials at either of the above sites.

**New Directions for Experiential Learning** is a new book just released by Jossey-Bass Inc., Publishers. The Guest Editor, **Carroll M. 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## Library loan services change

George L. Gardiner, dean of the library, announces a change in interlibrary loan services.

For a number of years, the Michigan State Library provided a subsidy for resource sharing among Michigan libraries through funds deposited with the major research libraries, including Wayne State University, the University of Michigan, and Michigan State University. That subsidy was revoked by the State Library this year and redirected to other uses. Without this financial support, it is obvious that the research libraries must institute such charges or other measures that will enable them to balance their respective borrowing and lending costs. This action has equally obvious ramifications for the libraries which must do business with them. Each of these libraries must similarly attempt to balance their accounts for the borrowing and lending of materials as well as for recovery of costs from their users where or to an extent that may not have been previously necessary.

The Oakland University Library regards interlibrary sharing neither as a potential profit-making operation nor as a service it is able to offer library users free of charge. The Interlibrary Loans unit must keep its own borrowing, lending and cost recovery accounts jointly in balance. Thus, the unit has followed a policy of passing on charges imposed by lending libraries to Oakland University patrons. When the research libraries were not charging the Oakland Library for its requests, the Oakland Library did not impose charges on its patrons. Now that Wayne State University and Michigan State Library are levying fees of \$4 per request, the the University of Michigan has limited the number of requests it will accept from Oakland, these fees and limitations will be passed on to our patrons. Although the Oakland Library has not instituted any changes in its interloan policy, there is now a greater probability that Oakland's faculty and students will be charged for any interloan they request and receive than was previously the case.

## Personnel notes

R. Craig Taylor, chemistry, was promoted to the rank of full professor at the Jan. 21 meeting of the Board of Trustees. Darrell P. Schmidt and Stuart S. Wang, mathematical sciences, Judith S. Canfield, health sciences, and Ronald A. Sudol, learning skills, were reemployed as assistant professors for final, two-year probationary terms. After a considerable discussion and a recess to consider action on the reemployment of William Macauley, political science, the board took the following action. "The Board of Trustees approves the recommendation not to reemploy William Macauley, assistant professor of political science, and his notification of this action by Jan. 30, 1981 in accordance with the faculty agreement. However, the board is prepared, with the approval of the AAUP and the employee, to review any additional information submitted to the president by the provost following a meeting involving the provost, the acting dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, and the chairperson of the Department of Political Science. This review is to occur no later than Feb. 18, 1981 which is the date of the next scheduled board meeting. Unless altered by further board action, Mr. Macauley's employment terminates on Aug. 14, 1981."

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## Discrimination studied

The ad hoc Commission of Inquiry was established by Interim President Matthews in April 1980 to investigate allegations of disparate treatment of students on the basis of race, and to recommend to the president "such changes in policies and procedures that may in the view of the commission serve to improve the quality of life on the Oakland University campus for all students and especially for those students who are members of minority groups." The commission has been meeting on a regular basis since May

1980. It invites any member of the community who has information or concerns relevant to its charge to appear before it. An appointment on the commission schedule may be obtained by calling the office of the chairperson, Ms. Wilma Ray-Bledsoe at 377-3487.

A consultant has been employed to assist the commission on in-service training sessions for student life, public safety, and other segments of the community.

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## Sports notes

Oakland University women's basketball coach Dewayne Jones and his team are tied for first place in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference midway through the 1980-81 cage season.

The women cagers have posted an overall mark of 10-6 and an impressive 7-1 conference record. Sophomore forward Linda Crawford leads the state of Michigan in scoring with a 23.3 average and is also ranked 11th nationally in scoring average.
