Board Approves Contract

The Oakland University Board of Trustees has approved a new three-year contract between the university and the OU Chapter of the American Association of University Professors.

The 5-0 vote came at the Sept. 22 meeting of the board and is contingent upon ratification by the union membership in a vote scheduled Oct. 4-5 of this week.

The contract guarantees a step increase in salary of approximately three percent in each of the three years; a salary lift-of-scale of two percent is provided in the third year only; and a two percent increase in the university's contribution to the employees' retirement program is provided in the third year. However, the retirement program's terms have been changed to require a two-year waiting period for junior faculty to enter the program (faculty have had the right of immediate enrollment).

In addition, there is agreement to provide additional salary payments if OU's revenue exceeds certain amounts.

1. During 1982-1983 and 1983-1984, if OU's total general fund revenue exceeds 102 percent of the preceding year revenue, as determined at year end, then a retroactive salary payment will be made to all continuing full-time faculty. This salary payment will vary with OU revenue, but in no case will be greater than four percent.

2. During 1984-1985, if OU's total general fund revenue exceeds 104 percent of the preceding year revenue, then a retroactive salary payment will be made. Such payment will in no case exceed two percent.

Any such payments will be included in the calculation of the salary base for subsequent years.

New Officers

The Oakland University Board of Trustees has new leadership for 1982-1983.

Elected as the new chairperson and vice chairperson of the board at the Sept. 22 meeting were Ken Morris and Alex C. Mair. Morris steps up to the head job after two years as vice chairperson to Richard H. Headlee. Headlee served the customary two one-year terms.

Morris is a charter member of the board (1970) and director of Region IB, UAW. Mair is vice president and group executive, General Motors Corporation. He has been a member of the board since 1976.

Headcount Up Slightly

Oakland University's fall headcount could be up as much as one and one-half percent over the 11,644 student count of last year, David C. Beardslee reports.

But Beardslee, the director of institutional research, notes that the number of Fiscal Year Equated Students (FYES) will probably increase just under one percent over last year or a total of 35 FYES. The university had 4,065 FYES in the fall of 1981.

The headcount increase was helped by a slightly larger number of new undergraduates and a larger number of returning undergraduates enrolling this fall. In addition, some increases in graduate programs like the M.B.A. and engineering partially offset declines in other areas of graduate study.

Beardslee says the retention and increases in undergraduates could reflect the soft job market, among other considerations.

The university appears to be on track with a trend noted by several news magazines and in an informal survey of member institutions of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

That trend, Beardslee says, is for public commuter institutions to show slight enrollment increases at the expense of private and of largely residential colleges and universities.

The students are facing not only the depressed economy but cuts in student aid funds as well, making institutions that are closer to home look even more attractive, Beardslee says.

Dawson has been asked to present a mini concert tour of England this fall and will perform in Leeds, Manchester, and Nottingham and two performances in London.

Recent publications include: "The Music of Carey Blyton," "An Interview with Charles Dakin" and a review and translation of *Les Sons Multiples Aux Saxophones* by Daniel Kientzy for the *Clarinet and Saxophone Society Journal (UK)*. His paper "Music for Saxophone by British Composers: Reflections and Perceptions" delivered at the

International Clarinet and Saxophone Symposium this summer has also been published in the proceedings.

John Barnard, history, has published an article on "American Workers, the Labor Movement, and the Cold War, 1945-1960," in Robert H. Bremner and Gary W. Reichard, editors, *Reshaping America: Society and Institutions, 1945-1960* (Columbus, Ohio: Ohio State University Press, 1982). The article analyzes the impact of the Cold War on the opportunities, challenges, and pressures facing American workers and labor organizations. *Reshaping America* is the first volume in a continuing series entitled *U.S.A. 20/21: Studies in Recent American History*, to be published by the Ohio State University Press.

Engineers Get Use Of PDP

The School of Engineering, with a proposal on behalf of the Center for Robotics and Advanced Automation, has been chosen to use the new PDP-11/23 minicomputer donated to the institution by Digital Equipment Corporation.

The recommendation was made by Lewis N. Pino, director of research services and acting dean of the graduate school. Keith R. Kleckner, senior vice president for university affairs and provost, concurred and made the award.

The PDP-11/23 was donated to the university with the stipulation that it be used in research and research training in the physical and/or biological sciences. Interested disciplines were asked to submit proposals for the use of the new minicomputer.

Only four of the machines were donated to institutions in Michigan. OU received one in recognition of its research activities as did the University of Michigan, Michigan State University and Western Michigan University.

The engineering proposal calls for use of the instrument as a host computer for the advanced vision concepts laboratory in the Center for Robotics and Advanced Automation and for computer-aided design work in the center.

These two activities will account for the major use of the PDP-11/23 system states Mohammed S. Ghausi, dean of the School of Engineering.

The system will aid the school in three preliminary long-term research proposals in advanced vision concepts to the U.S. Army which have received tentative approval, Dean Ghausi said.

Search For AD Begins

The search for a new director of athletics is underway with the appointment of a nine-member search committee chaired by Glenn A. Jackson, engineering.

The committee was appointed by President Joseph E. Champagne. The director of athletics will report directly to the president. Applications are due by Nov. 15, 1982.

Other members of the search committee are Beverly K. Berger, physics; Dewayne Jones, physical education and athletics; Fred Stransky, physical education; Ron Forbes, physical education and athletics; Barbara Murphy, affirmative action officer; student Anne Kish; alumnus Richard Bishop; and Rochester businessman Fred Carbonero.

The job description states that the "Responsibilities include administering the NCAA Division II athletics program for men and women and the university's intramural program, overseeing the management of sports and recreational facilities, administering programs that promote leisure time recreation for members of the university community and for members of the local geographic area, administering wellness and cardiac rehabilitation programs, initiating and directing major fund raising activities." The description also calls for an individual with a master's degree, experience in coaching, fund raising, and a commitment to the scholar-athlete philosophy.
