FOLLOW THE COP

The evening of June 9, two members of the Fitz-Bitz staff played a new and exciting game, and we have decided to pass the game on to you. The game is called "Follow the Cop." Rules are very basic. Get a car--number of players being limited by the number of seats in the car. Pick out one of our Department of Public Safety employees and follow him. Follow him wherever he goes--on campus, off campus, down Squirrel Road, behind the IM building, just anyplace. There are two ways to win. First, have the game end in a 0-0 tie. (Points are scored only by the cop--one point each time he loses you.) Second, if the cop leaves the campus grounds for a period of time longer than thirty minutes. We lost our test game by 2-0.
